Former Santa Annan Named Assistant Coach, Teacher

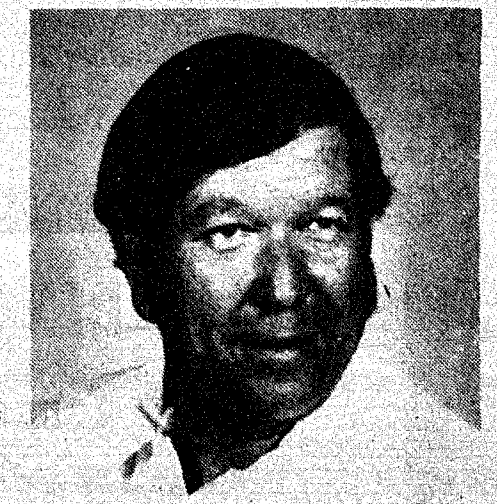

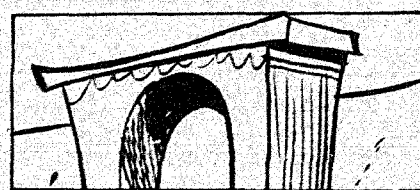

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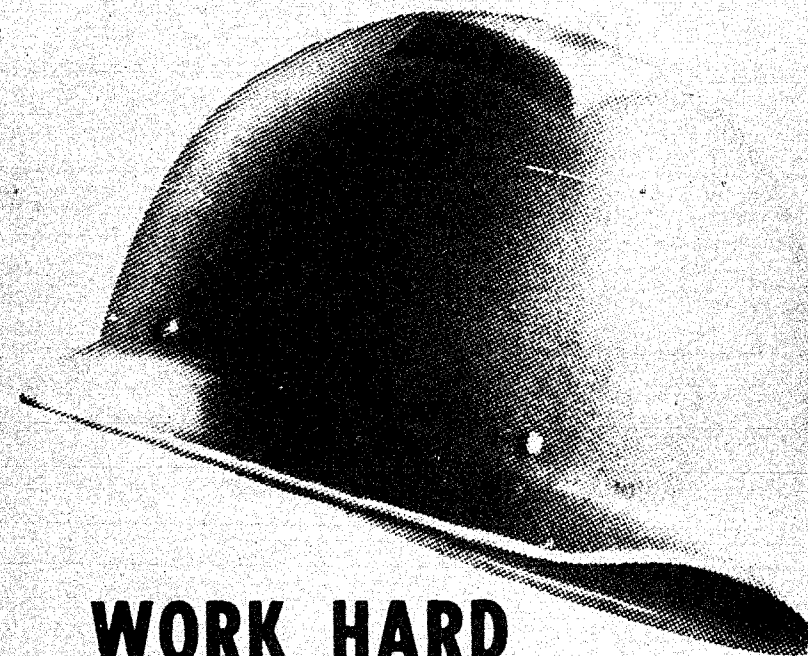
MOVING TO IDAHO

HPU Season Tickets Now On Sale For Home Games

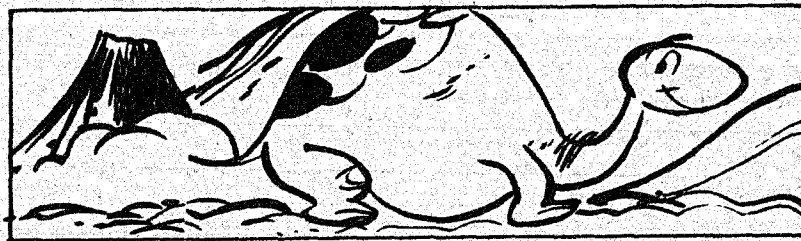

Food habits may be changed

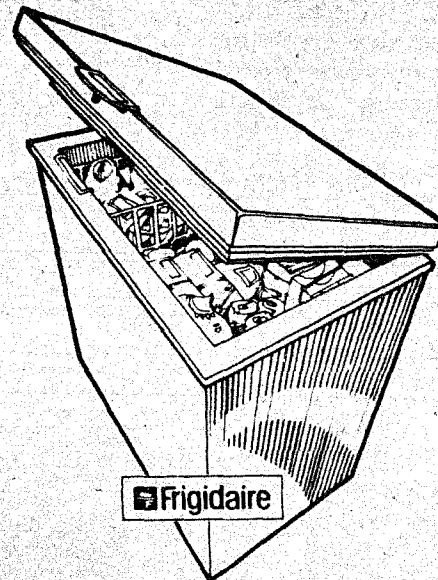
COLLEGE STATION — The fuel crunch may change as many eating habits as driving habits, says Texas A&M University's dean of geosciences.

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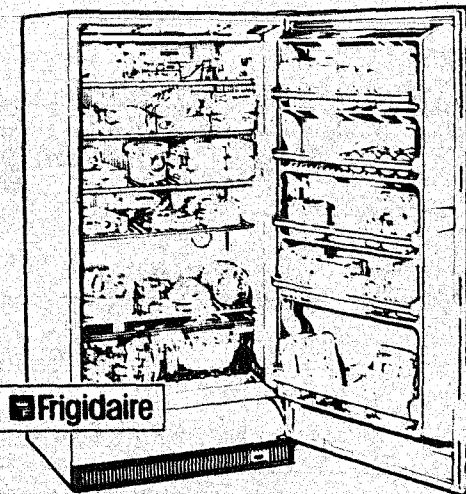

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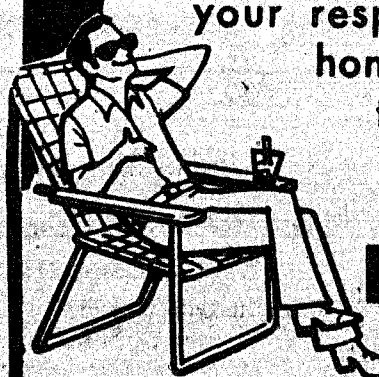

A one-time application during construction might run up to \$200, while homes already built could require as much as 18 cents a square foot to receive the treatment.

PROGRESSIVE MYOPIA

Dear Dr. Pettey: Ever since I was nine years old frequent changes in my lenses have been necessary to keep me seeing clearly. I'm twenty now, and I'm a little tired of having changes every year.

From your brief description, I would suppose you must have progressive myopia, a regular and continuing increase of nearsightedness.

Little has ever been found to control that condition consistently, although much research and experimenting have taken place in an effort to halt it.

There is strong evidence that heredity is involved, heredity at least to the extent of inheriting physical and chemical elements that might encourage progressive myopia.

Often patients with cases like yours are studious, with a compelling urge to learn. That means more hours spent reading. Many researchers are convinced that long periods of reading will tend to increase the myopia.

You have one consolation: Before many more years pass, perhaps before you are thirty, you can begin to expect a slowing down of the frequency of lens changes.
