Santa Anna residents are being asked to conserve water for several days next week, according to announcement from the City Water Department.

As a final stage in the water improvement project, the clear well at the City treatment plant is to be refinished, and it must be drained and dried for the process.

The facility is to be drained Wednesday, July 2, and let dry for the day. The refishing will take place Thursday, July 3, and refilling is to start Friday, July 4.

During the time the clear well is being refinished, there will be no water pumped to the storage tanks on the east

It will take more than one tree to produce the canopy effect needed, but some trees can reach 15 feet in less than three years.

Air conditioning accounts for 20 percent of all home energy use in Texas, compared to the national average of under 5 percent.

## Questionnaires On Agriculture

What's the state of Texas agriculture in 1980?

That will be determined from information provided by many Texas farmers and ranchers in a questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service over the next few weeks. A select number of Producers will also be interviewed.

Information gathered through these questionnaires and interviews provides the basic for determining acreage devoted to various crops and midyear livestock numbers, points out Roger Blackman, Coleman County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Resulting crop and livestock reports developed from these surveys provide a dependable unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, says Blackman.

Farm organizations and legislatures use this data in planning agricultural programs, explains Blackman. Estimates are also used in establishing various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to promptly and accurately complete the survey forms.

### THE SANTA ANNA NEWS Fort McKavett Is Now Open For Visitors

The color and drama of life in a frontier fort is captured in an interpretive exhibit just completed at Fort McKavett State Historic Site in Menard County.

The fort, located at the headwaters of the San Saba River, was one of a line of military posts across West Texas established to protect settlers from Indians. This frontier line of forts also included Forts Richardson, Griffin, Concho and Clark.

Fort McKavett was an active infantry post from 1852 to 1883, except during the Civil War, and during its peak activity was manned by approximately 300 personnel.

The interpretive exhibits are located in the fort's original hospital ward room, and feature a general history of the fort in photos, illustrations, dioramas and approximately 200 artifacts. The exhibits also deal with the history of the fort community after the military moved out until the turn of the century.

Restored stone buildings at the fort include the hospital, barracks, headquarters, bakery and school. Restoration is underway on seven sets of officers' quarters.

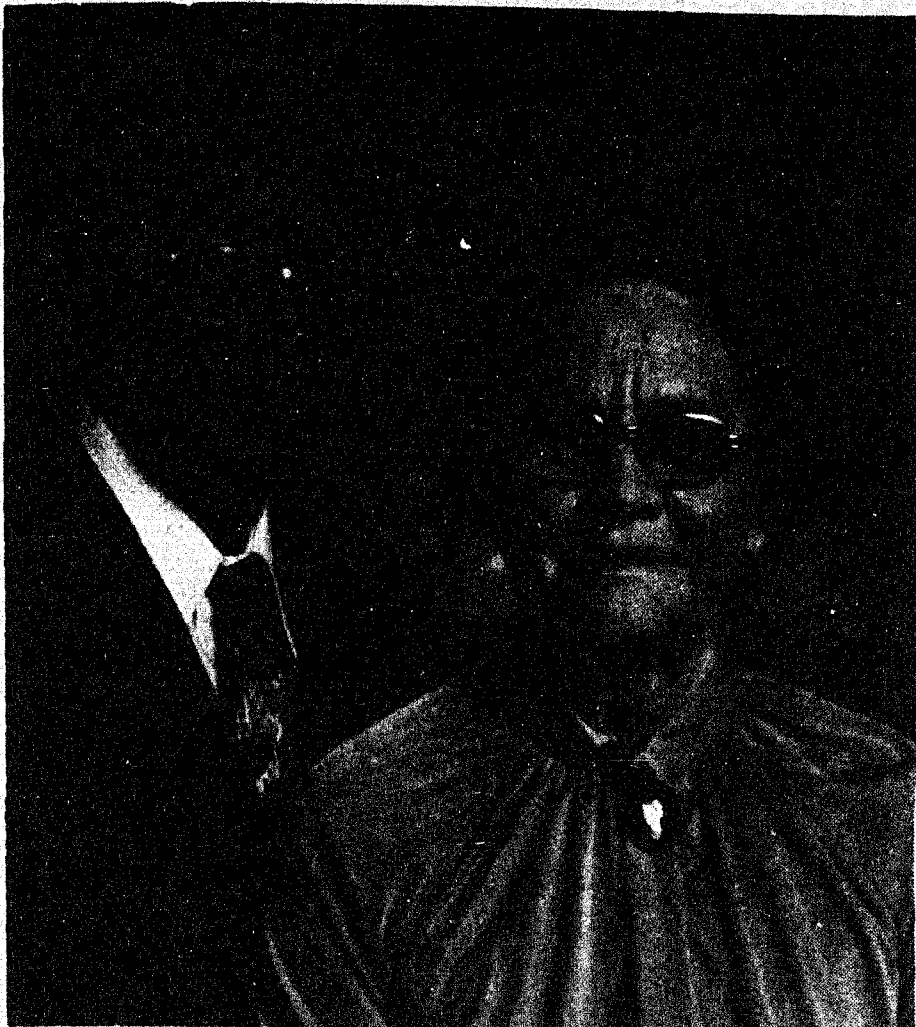
The fort is located about 60 miles southeast of San Angelo and 22 miles west of Menard, between U. S. Highway 190 (formerly U.S. 29) and U.S. Highway 290.

There are no overnight facilities at the park, but a picnic area is available.

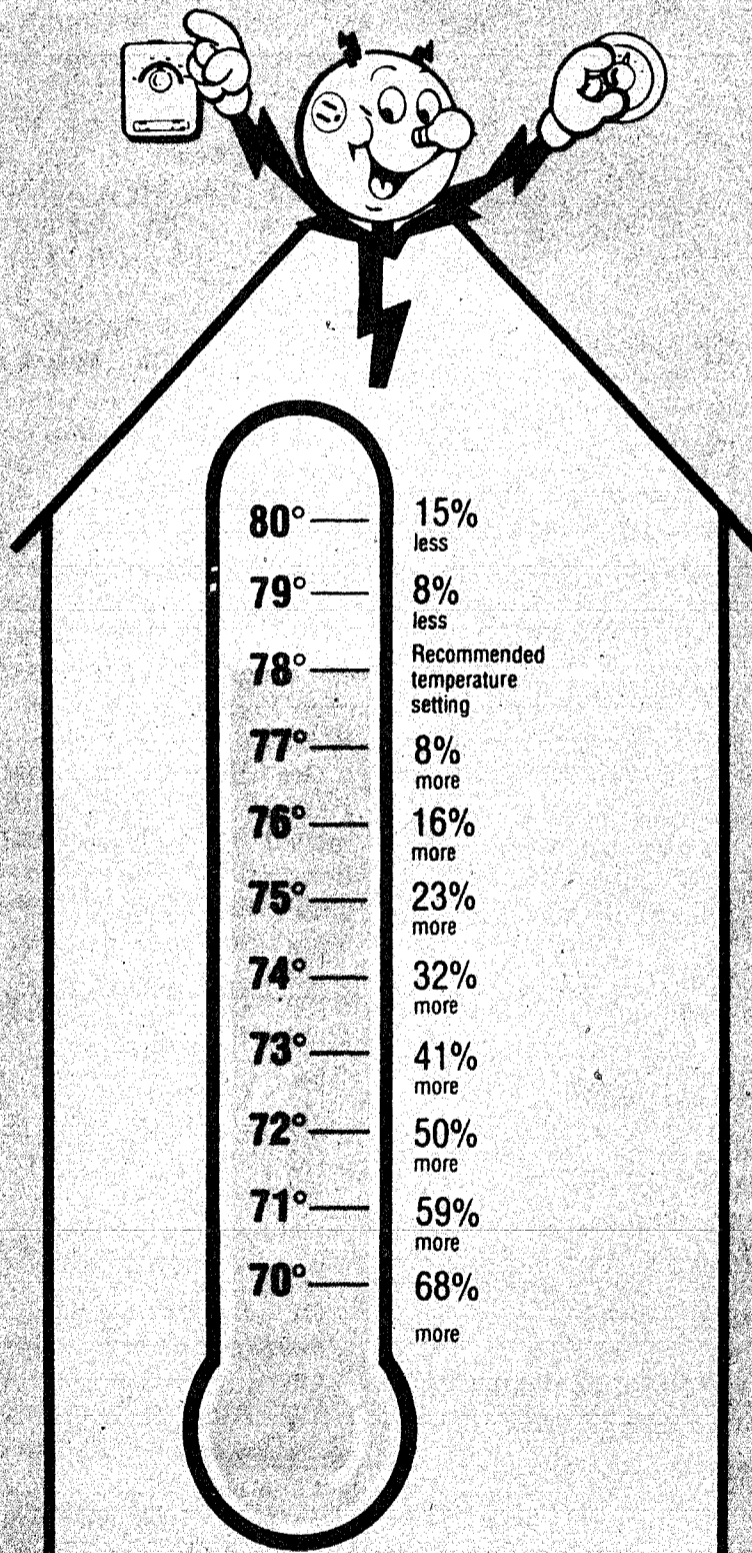
