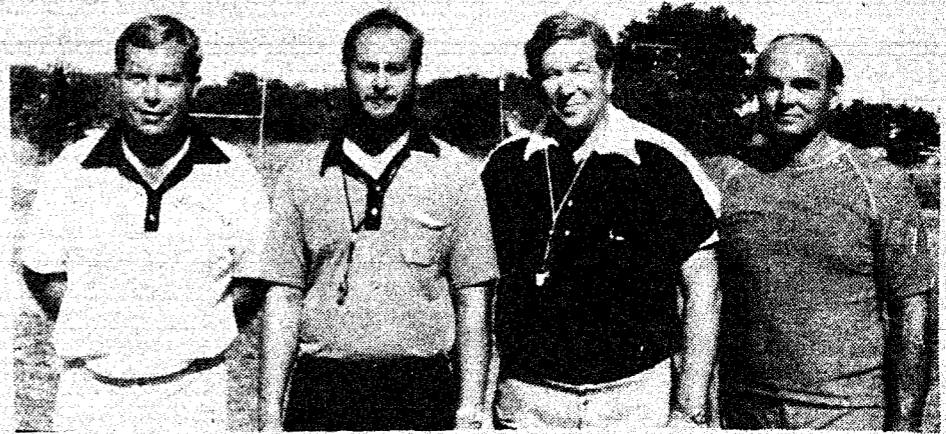
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at 6 p.m., and all local football fans are urged to attend and support the team.

Santa Anna Businessman Killed In Sunday Wreck

Harrel R. Cupps, 53, owner of Cupps Electric in Santa Anna, was killed in a two-vehicle accident about 4 p.m. Sunday at an intersection of two farm roads about five miles west of Coleman. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Walter Holt of Coleman.

The Chevrolet panel truck Cupps was driving was struck broadside by a 1971 Mercury that apparently ran a yield sign at the intersection near Hords Creek Lake. A heavy rain was falling at the time, according to Jay Moses, the DPS Patrolman who investigated the crash. Cupps was enroute home from a service call to a drilling site near Glen Cove when the accident occurred.

An all-points bulletin was issued for the driver of the Mercury, thought to be an illegal Mexican alien, who fled from the scene of the accident. The car belonged to Melvin Lawrence of Gouldbusk, who

formerly employed a man thought to be driver of the Mercury.

According to Moses, the Cupps vehicle went off the road after the impact, throwing Cupps into a nearby pasture. Although there were no witnesses to the actual wreck, several people from near-by houses and a bait shop went running to the scene after hearing the crash.

Funeral services for Mr. Cupps were held Tuesday, August 19, at the Assembly of

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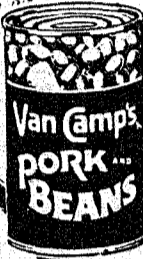

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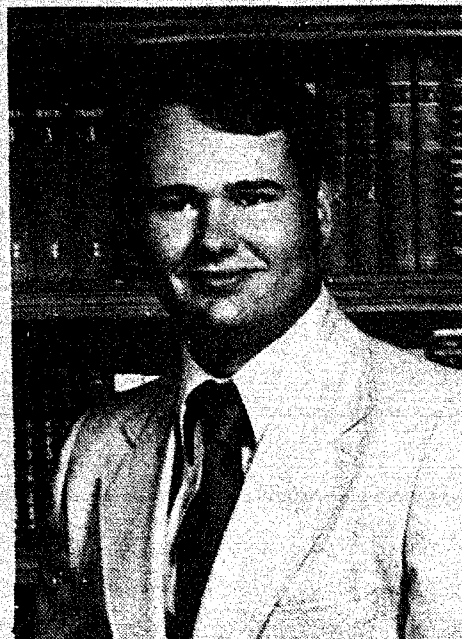

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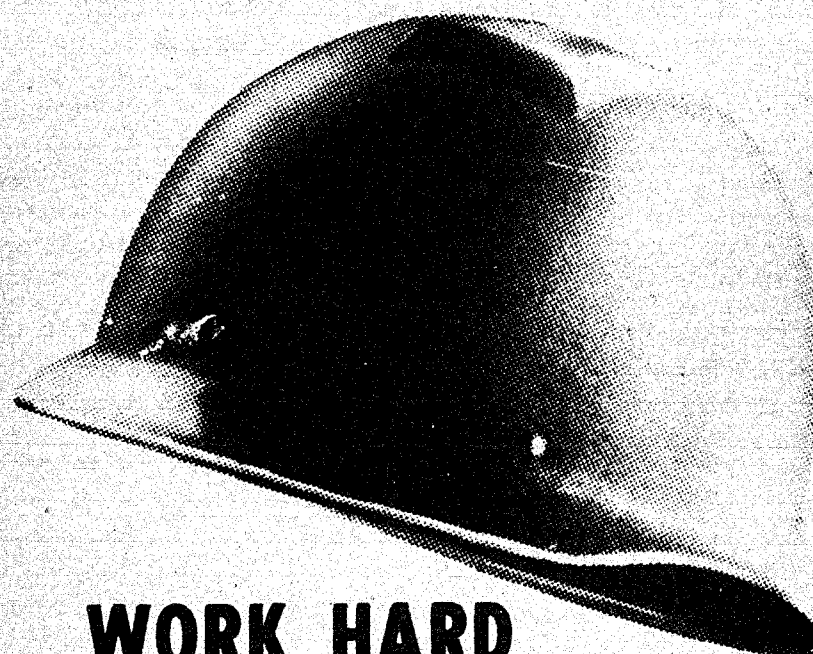

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Policy Available For Reduced Price School Meals

Santa Anna School Food Service has announced its policy for free and reduced-price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Child Nutritional Program.

Children from families whose income falls within guideline scales are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses or disaster or casualty losses may also be eligible. In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children and wishes to apply, they should contact the school or indicate on the application being given to the children.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of the child nutrition programs, no

child is discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the school offices. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. The central office of the Santa Anna ISD has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Prices for the meals at regular costs for the coming year include the lunches at 55 cents for elementary students, 65 cents for high school students and 95 cents for adults; and breakfast for 30 cents for all students and 50 cents for adults.

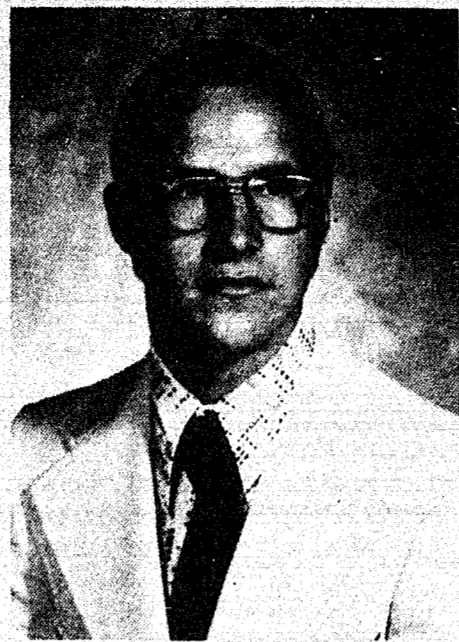

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Visit in French Village A Highlight of Trip

Can you imagine a continuous panorama of "picture postcard" scenes of little villages with tall-spired churches, white houses with red tile roofs? Can you picture miles and miles of green, green grass, ripening wheat and more flowers than you can name or imagine?

That was my impression of most of the area visited during my recent trip to Europe. Any west Texan would have been impressed by the climate and moisture we enjoyed during the nearly four weeks.

My visit at Bannost, France was a highlight of the vacation, visiting in the home of Mrs. Jean Roger, the mother of Jacqueline Woodward of Dallas. Bannost, with a population of about 400, is surrounded by fertile farms on gently rolling hills.

Located 30 miles east of Paris, Bannost was once on the main road from Paris to Germany, but now lies a few miles from any major highway. A Catholic church, dating to the 12th Century, centers the village that now has one grocery store, one pub, a post office and elementary school. Neat rows of white stucco houses line the narrow streets, with hedges of hydrangeas, roses and other flowers of all descriptions bloom in yards and gardens.

Suzanne Kingsbery and I enjoyed visiting relatives and friends with Jacqueline, most times only smiling and nodding when language was a barrier. We were welcomed by everyone and enjoyed their hospitality and the opportunity to visit in their homes.

A real treat was watching as the local baker delivered the long loaves of bread to the homes in the village, sounding his car horn to bring the housewives to window or door to be handed the baked goods. Meat is also delivered door-to-door by a butcher from a neighboring village.

It rained almost every day during our stay at Bannost, but wet weather does not hinder the activities -- other than farming -- and we donned raincoats and went about sightseeing and visiting without interruption. The sweaters and coats we took were welcome, and Mrs. Roger turned on the central heating in her home to accommodate our cold natures!

One afternoon was spent at the historic town of Provins,

about 15 miles away, where the castle-like dungeon is a landmark and now a tourist attraction. Richard the Lionhearted was imprisoned there as he returned from the Holy Crusades and Joan of Arc stopped there to attend church King Charles V as she returned from the battle of Orleans.

The area surrounding the dungeon is also in original style although still used for residences and shops.

The town and the fortified compound were severely damaged by Nazi bombs during World War II but are almost rebuilt.

I will include more stories of my trip as time and space permit.

Summer Shrub Care Suggested By TAES

Trees, shrubs and vines that were transplanted in recent months need a little extra care to make it through the long, hot summer, says Roger Blackman, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The most critical problem for newly moved plants is providing adequate moisture. Wind damage and excess fertilization also take their toll on transplanted trees, shrubs and vines.

He points out that mulches can help conserve soil moisture and are effective in controlling weeds. Apply the mulch several inches deep over the new plant's roots. Pine needles or bark, oak leaves, bagasse, gin trash or grass clippings can be used as mulch.

Some organic mulches become rapidly, taking nitrogen from the soil in the process and causing plants to yellow. This may be corrected by adding small doses of nitrogen fertilizer.

Blackman cautions against adding fertilizer at planting time. Only small amounts, if any, should be applied during the first growing season. Over fertilization is one of the major causes of plants dying the first season.

He also advises homeowners to protect new plants against wind damage. This is especially

true for trees or shrubs that are several feet tall. High winds can break limbs and damage newly forming roots as well as dehydrate the plant. So plants should be pruned or staked for

support. Homeowners also need to remember their plants before leaving for summer vacations by arranging for someone to water them regularly.



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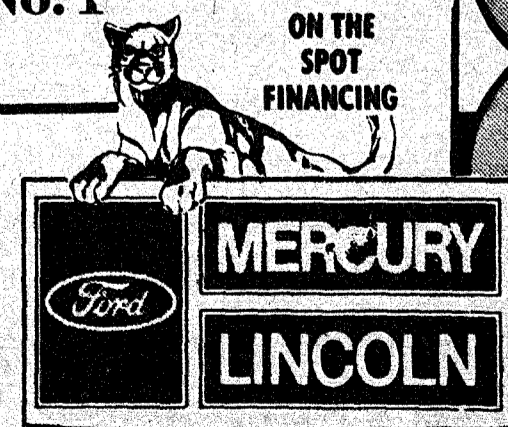

Howard Payne Costs Below Average

During an effort to be better than average, Howard Payne University officials can boast about being below average.

A recent announcement by the College Board, a national non-profit educational organization based in New York city, quotes a \$6,000 plus bill for private four-year colleges for the coming academic year.

HPU costs are much lower than the national average.

"Actually, the announcement was misleading," HPU financial aid director Glenda Huff said. "The \$6,082 figure quoted includes tuition, room and board, fees, books and supplies, transportation costs, and personal expenses.

"It's hard to determine an individual's personal and transportation costs," she said, "but we can compare actual college costs. Howard Payne University is considerably lower than the estimated national average the College Board released."

The College Board estimated an annual cost of \$3,279 for tuition and fees as compared to \$2,010 at HPU; room and board is an estimated \$1,746 versus \$1,500 at HPU; books and supplies—\$242 estimated, \$214 at HPU.

The total comparative figures show a \$1,543 difference in the national average and HPU sums for tuition, fees, room, board, books and supplies. The HPU total is \$3,724 against the College Board's \$5,267 estimate.

Mrs. Huff said that 85 percent of all HPU students receive some form of financial aid, which helps offset the amount individual students pay toward their total bills. Last year, she said, HPU students received more than \$1,750,000 in assistance funds.

However, Mrs. Huff stressed that financial aid is "not just

given" to students. "They must apply for it," she said.

The HPU financial aid director suggests that all prospective and current college students apply for financial aid, regardless of their financial status. "The amount of aid awarded is based on the student's financial need," she said, "determined by the aid application."

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We Shall Not Steal

Both public and private sins are included in this prohibition. The eighth commandment condemns man-stealing and slave-dealing, and forbids wars of conquest. It condemns theft and robbery. A deceptive courtship is maintained, private communications are kept up, until the affections of one who is inexperienced and knows not whereunto these things may grow, are in a measure withdrawn from her parents and placed upon him who shows by the very course he pursues that he is unworthy of her love. The Bible condemns every species of dishonesty.

To trifle with hearts is a crime of no small magnitude in the sight of a holy God.

As we deal with our fellow men in petty dishonesty or in more daring fraud, so will we deal with God. Men who persist in a course of dishonesty will carry out their principles until they cheat their own souls and lose heaven and eternal life.

So long as heaven and earth continue, the holy principles of God's law will....continue, a source of blessing, sending forth streams to refresh the earth.

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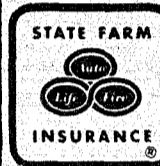


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Alcohol Abuse More Prevalent With Teenagers

If lifeguards on the beaches around Los Angeles are correct, teenagers are turning to alcohol as their chief drug of abuse. According to Los Angeles lifeguard Mark Thompson, the kids who came to his beach a few years ago smoked mainly marijuana. But this year it is alcohol in a big way. He says it is not unusual to see 13-year-olds polish off one or two six-packs of beer in a day.

But it is not all bad. Our government is more ambitious in preventing alcohol abuse where the number of abstainers are greater. The United States is one of six countries that are greatly concerned concerning this problem, says Dr. Gunnar, president of a group of insurance companies.

In the United States about 32 percent of the adult population are abstainers. The next highest country is Norway at 23 percent. This is increasing evidence that caffeine may promote alcoholism -- at least a large amount does -- according to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Drinkers pay a high price when you consider stomach disorders, anemia, liver ailments, epileptic seizures, hypertension and injuries resulting from fights or accidents.

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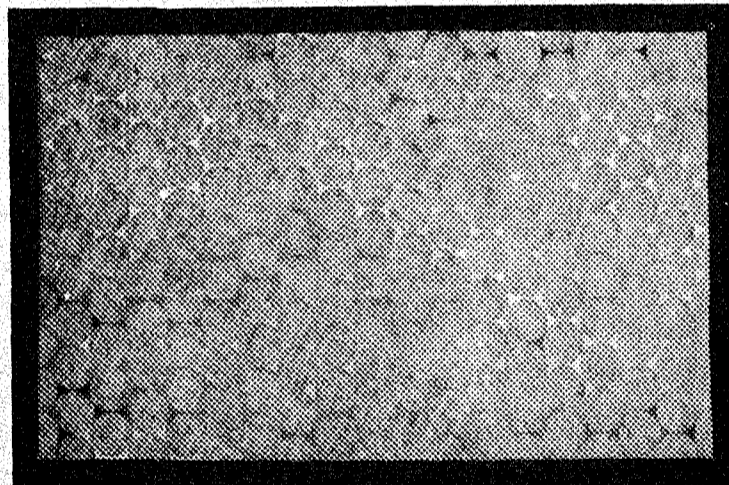

DAILY BAG LIMITS

MOURNING DOVES

Daily Bag Limit - 10.
Possession Limit - 20.

Daily Bag Limit - 10.

NOTE: Bag limits of both white-winged and mourning doves may be taken during the open white-winged dove season.

SHOOTING HOURS:

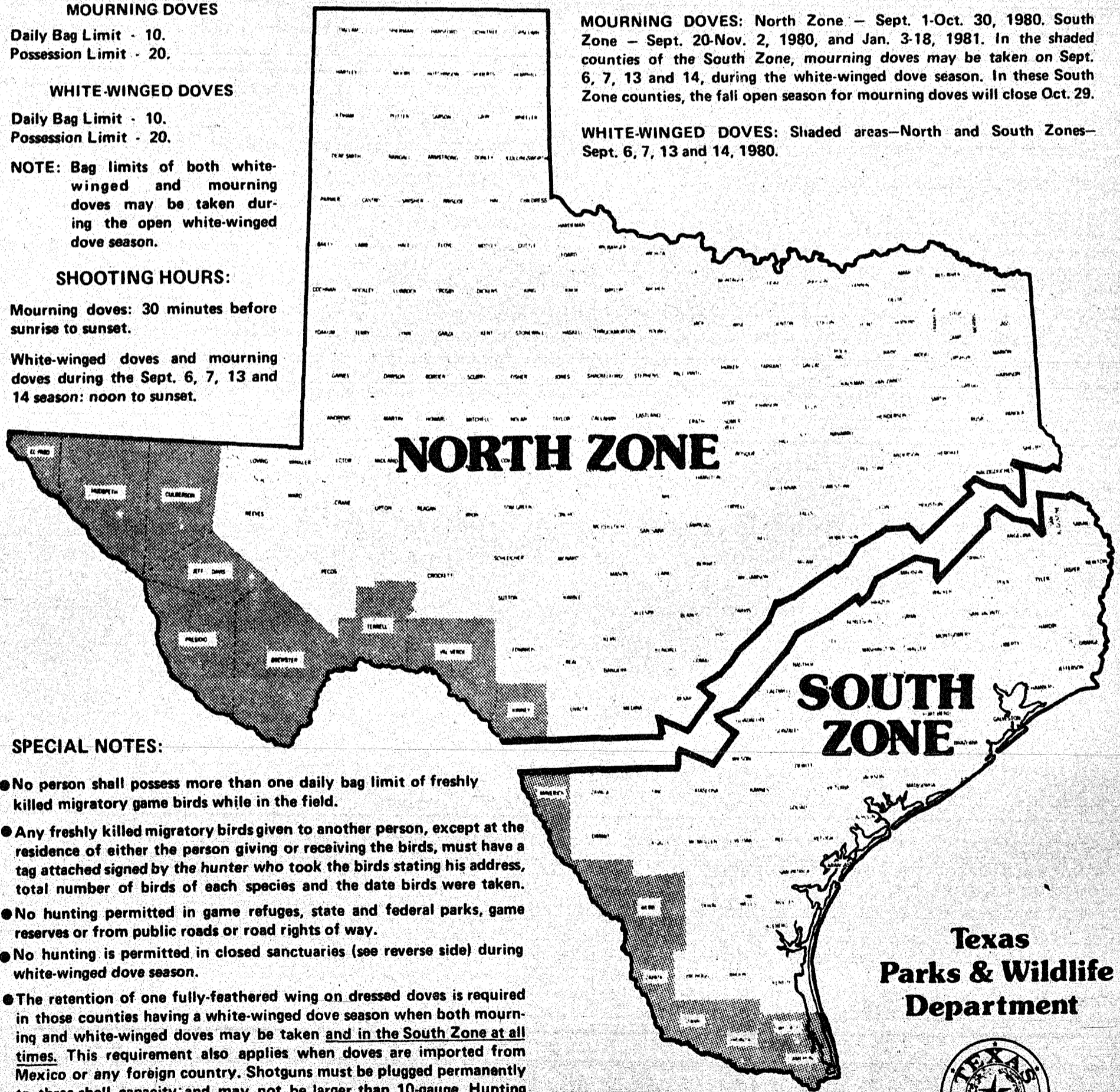
Mourning doves: 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

White-winged doves and mourning doves during the Sept. 6, 7, 13 and 14 season: noon to sunset.

OPEN SEASONS

MOURNING DOVES: North Zone - Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1980. South Zone - Sept. 20-Nov. 2, 1980, and Jan. 3-18, 1981. In the shaded counties of the South Zone, mourning doves may be taken on Sept. 6, 7, 13 and 14, during the white-winged dove season. In these South Zone counties, the fall open season for mourning doves will close Oct. 29.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Shaded areas—North and South Zones—Sept. 6, 7, 13 and 14, 1980.



SPECIAL NOTES:

- No person shall possess more than one daily bag limit of freshly killed migratory game birds while in the field.
- Any freshly killed migratory birds given to another person, except at the residence of either the person giving or receiving the birds, must have a tag attached signed by the hunter who took the birds stating his address, total number of birds of each species and the date birds were taken.
- No hunting permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or from public roads or road rights of way.
- No hunting is permitted in closed sanctuaries (see reverse side) during white-winged dove season.
- The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken and in the South Zone at all times. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10-gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.
- A White-winged Dove Stamp for a \$3.00 fee is required of all persons who hunt white-winged doves. This stamp is required in addition to the valid hunting license.
- Hunters who bring in wild game birds or animals from the Republic of Mexico must obtain a federal statement from a U.S. Customs official at a port of entry which shows the wildlife was brought from the Republic of Mexico.

MH-MR Center Serves Seven-County Area

The Central Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center (CTMHMRC) is a public, not-for-profit community mental health center which provides comprehensive treatment services to residents of Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch, Mills, and San Saba Counties.

CTMHMRC was founded in January, 1970 in response to community need for outpatient treatment of mental health problems. The center is governed by a nine-member board of trustees. The county judge of each county served by CTMHMRC appoints an individual to represent the interests of his or her respective county on the board. (Two members represent Brown County.) In addition, a trustee is on the board to represent the City of Brownwood, wherein the center's central offices are located.

CTMHMRC is a "quasi-state" agency, meaning that it is governed by a board of trustees which acts autonomously to establish policies of operation, although the center is accountable to the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, which licenses community mental health centers within the Lone Star State.

Mental health outreach offices are maintained in each of the counties served by the center, excluding Brown. However, the Mills County office will be closed permanently on September 1, 1980, because of funding cutbacks. Also scheduled to be shut down in September are two of the four county work activity centers for mentally retarded adults; reduced revenue for Fiscal Year 1981, which begins September 1, has forced the center to close activity centers in Coleman and Comanche, while programs in Eastland and Brady will remain open, at least for another year.
