Truck Driver Is Injured In Fire At Rural Home

A Coleman man is hospitalized in Coleman with injuries he received in a fire at the Burgess Stewardson place south of Santa Anna last Thursday. L. H. Johnson, driver of the gasoline transport truck for T & T Gulf Service of Coleman, is being treated for severe burns on his hands, face and shoulders. Johnson was filling a gasoline

storage tank at the Stewardson home when it ignited inside the tank and quickly spread to the truck and adjacent storage building. Although burned, Mr. Johnson attempted to extinguish the fire with his extinguisher, then drove the burning truck away from the Stewardson home. The truck was completely destroyed by the fire.

Firemen from Santa Anna and Coleman responded to the alarm, and Mrs. Stewardson was able to move the vehicles of her two sons from the carport attached to the storage shed before they ignited. Firemen were able to contain the blaze and keep it from spreading to the Stewardson home nearby.

Friends and neighbors also stopped at the home just off the Rockwood Highway and offered help. The fire burned the switch controlling the electric water pump, so there was no water to fight the fire until firemen arrived with tank trucks.

Despite the loss of the structures, tools and equipment, the Stewardsons felt fortunate that no more damage was done by the fire.

Auto Mishap Takes Life Of Rockwood Stockfarmer

A two-vehicle accident at Rockwood Sunday resulted in the death of a prominent Rockwood stockfarmer, Evan (Turkey) Wise. Mr. Wise, 83, was a passenger in the compact pickup driven by his wife that was in a collision with a vehicle traveling south on U. S. 283 in Rockwood.

According to Jay Moses, DPS Trooper who investigated the mishap, the Wise vehicle was crossing the highway at a county road when struck broadside by the 1975 Lincoln Continental driven by David Welch of San Antonio. Mr. and Mrs. Wise were both injured in the accident that occurred about 5 p.m. Sunday, and he died at Brownwood Community Hospital about midnight after having undergone surgery for his injuries. Mrs. Wise is still hospitalized there. Funeral services for Mr. Wise were held Tuesday in Rockwood, with a

complete obituary elsewhere in this issue.

The driver of the auto and his passengers, his wife, child and a sister, were not injured in the mishap but the auto suffered considerable damage. The Wise 1978 Chevrolet Luv pickup was heavily damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Wise were enroute to the home of their son, Joe W. Wise, at the time of the accident. Mr. Wise was taken by Henderson ambulance to the Brownwood hospital and Mrs. Wise was taken by private car.

Coleman Events Highlight Area Holiday Schedule

A full day of events and activities are planned in Coleman Friday in observance of Independence Day. Site for the events will be Coleman City Park where Coleman Chamber of Commerce and Junior Chamber of Commerce directors will be directing festivities.

Included during the day is a parent-child tennis tourney and a swim meet, a pre-school beauty pageant, fiddlers contest, domino and 42 tourney, and contests for watermelon eating, tobacco spitting and cow chip throwing.

Other activities will be a tow sack race, sprint races, arm wrestling, a wheelbarrow race,

a jogging contest, and horse shoe throwing.

A new feature of the annual event will be armadillo races and frog jumping contest.

Entertainment is planned during the day with several musical groups and the Coleman High School Drill Team to perform. Concessions and refreshments will be for sale during the day, and visitors may take picnic lunches to enjoy under the tall trees at the park.

The day will be climaxed with a fireworks display at dusk.

People from the entire area are invited to spend the day at the Coleman Park and enjoy the activities.

Grain Harvest Almost Complete

The grain harvest in our area is almost over, with only a few farmers still having grain in the fields. The wheat crop is about one-third of last year's crop, and the oats harvest is even less than that.

Central Texas Grain Co. has been in operation in Santa Anna the past month, buying grain and shipping it to outlets or for import. Wheat has brought up to \$3.75 per bushel, off about 50 cents from the top price last year, and oats have sold for \$1.70, which is a little higher than 1979.

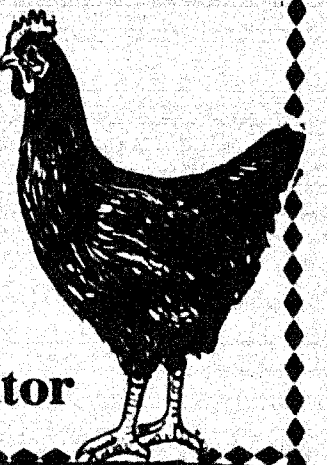
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S-Anna Native Retires From Teaching Career

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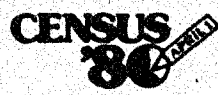

The closing exercises of the Santa Anna schools was held at the Methodist Church last Friday night with the church crowded from the balcony to the doors and numbers were forced to leave on account of not even having standing room. The salutatory was delivered

by Miss Eudora Garrett and the valedictory by Miss Nettie Turner. Selections by the quartet and Glee Club accompanied by Miss Sarah Ramsour and a piano solo by Miss Nettie Turner were features of the evening showing much skill and talent.

Following an address by Dr. C. W. Thompson, president of Daniel Baker College, Supt. Eaves presented graduates with diplomas.

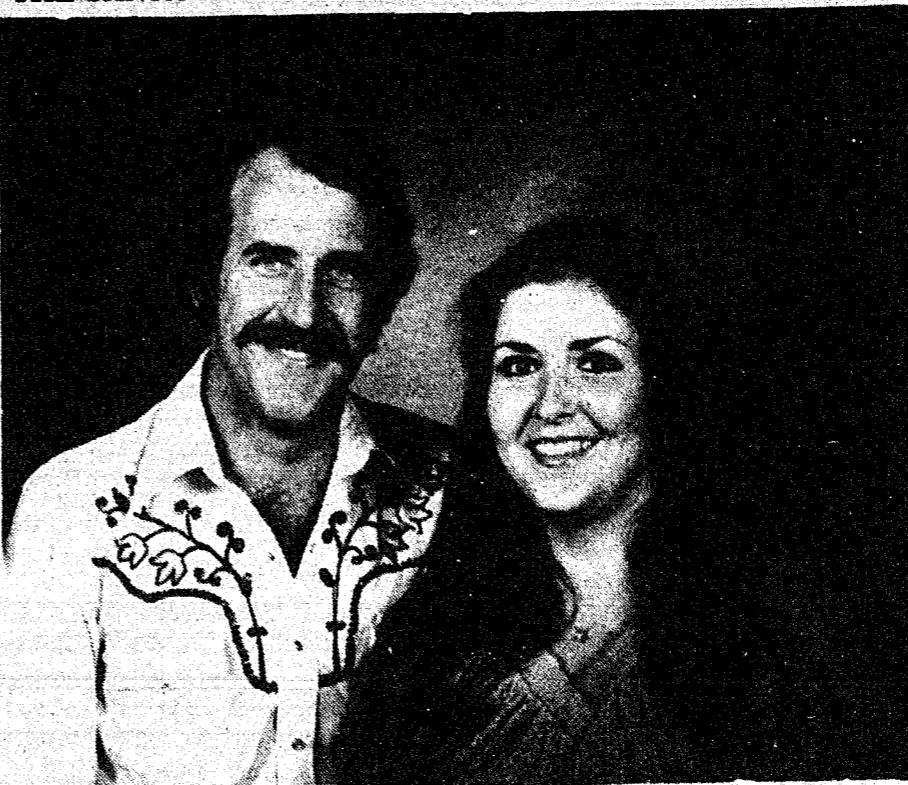

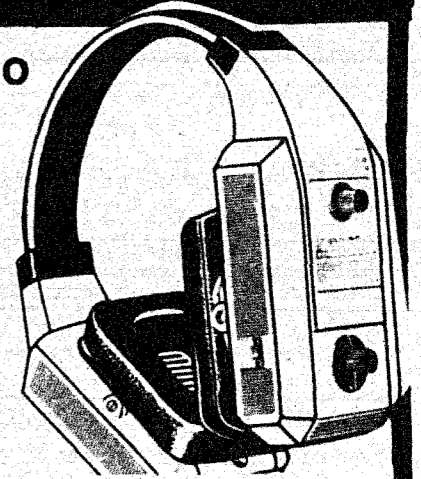

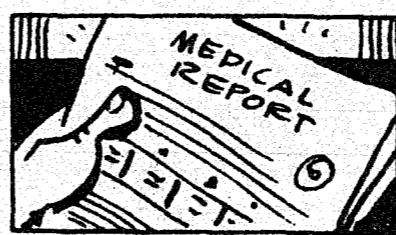

Farm Workers *Trickham* Covered By *News* Social Security

Farmers: Will you hire someone to help on your farm any time this year? With summer here and harvest in the offing, many of you will. Chances are, the wages you pay those workers will be covered by social security and must be reported.

If you pay a farm worker \$150 or more cash wages in 1980, the wages are covered. If an individual works for you 20 or more days on a time basis (by the hour, day, week or month) during the year, then those wages count too.

A "farm worker" is not just someone who helps plant, harvest, process or deliver a crop, or does other farm work. It also includes a person who does domestic work in a farm home. If you hire someone to help cook for a harvest crew, for example, his or her work is covered if he or she meets the pay test mentioned here.

If your son or daughter 21 or older, or a parent, is paid to work on your farm, their wages are subject to the social security tax. However, any wages you may pay your spouse are not covered.

It is important to your employees that their farm wages be properly reported. In this way they earn valuable credits that mean they can receive monthly benefits should they become severely disabled and can't work for a year or more, or die. And later on they will need those credits to get retirement checks and Medicare protection.

Does a migrant crew help harvest your crop or do other farm work? If there is a written agreement stating the crew leader is your employee, then you must report all wages. If the crew leader pays the workers (for himself or for you), he is their "employer".

If you want more information about reporting wages for farm crew workers, ask at any social security office. There are IRS publications that will be of help, also.

A representative of the Brownwood Social Security office visits Santa Anna once a month on the second Wednesday. The representative may be found at Mountain City Center from 9:30 to 12 noon.

Plant oils can cause engine damage

COLLEGE STATION — Many American farmers, desperate to cut diesel costs, are experimenting with alternative fuels such as sunflower, soy-

bean, cottonseed, peanut, and other plant oils and risking engine damage, warns an agricultural engineer at Texas A&M University.

"They will operate as a fuel, but with several hundred hours of operating time, they are harmful to the engine," Dr. Wayne LePori said. "There are people who will try it and damage their engines."

LePori said the primary problem is with serious carbon build-up in the engines that are run on plant oils alone or mixed with diesel fuel.
