More than 6,000 Future Farmers of America members and guests will meet in Houston's Astrodome this week for the Texas Association of FFA annual convention.

Santa Anna High School junior, Sherry Wilson, will be among the ten Texas girls competing for State FFA Sweetheart in a contest that will be held during the three-day meeting. Sherry, the daughter of Mrs. Linda Wilson and Bo Wilson, was winner of both the District and Area contests. The winner of the state title will be announced Friday morning.

Theme for the 1980 convention will be "Preparing for Progress." outstanding speakers will be on hand during the meeting, and more than \$321,000 in scholarships will be awarded to outstanding FFA members.

More than 900 FFA Chapters in Texas will be represented at the meeting this week. Delegates from the Santa Anna chapter will be Gary Morris, retiring chapter president; Randy Scarbrough, in-coming president; Ward Stewardson, Jr. Salazar, Danny Guerrero, David Strickland, and Leslie Wilson, a brother of Sherry Wilson.

Scott Patterson, chapter advisor will be accompanying the group. Also to attend with the local delegation will be Sherry's mother, Mrs. Linda Wilson.

Sherry, a former SAHS cheerleader, was chosen Santa Anna FFA Sweetheart last fall. The pretty coed was also selected Valentine Sweetheart this year and is a member of the Student Council at SAHS. She lists her

hobbies as sewing, swimming, cooking, and playing softball.

Sherry and other sweetheart contestants met for an orientation period Tuesday, then each of the girls took part in the activities of the convention Wednesday and were introduced and interviewed at Fun Night program and talent contest that night. The ten girls were in costumes representing some segment of Texas agriculture, with Sherry dressed as a "working" cowgirl to represent the area's biggest agricultural product-- cattle.

Thursday activities will include a breakfast for sweetheart candidates and state FFA officers, a luncheon at noon, and on Friday morning the election of the sweetheart and the announcement of the winner during the morning session in Astro arena prior to the closing ceremony at the convention.

The 43rd Annual Coleman PRCA Rodeo is underway this week, with performances to be held nightly through Saturday at 8:30 p.m. at the Coleman Rodeo Arena. Markum Rodeo Co. of Waco will produce the professional show that is sponsored by the Coleman Rodeo Association.

Miss Leslie Barr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Barr of Coleman, will reign as queen of the 1980 rodeo. Leslie is a freshman student at Texas

A&M University and has previously served as Coleman Junior Rodeo Queen and was selected "Miss Rodeo Texas Teen" three years ago.

Rodeo events will include bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding and girl's barrel race. Rodeo clowns will be Ford Britt and Wright Howington. Howington will also furnish specialty acts for the rodeo.

Allan Bing of St. Joseph, Mo. will provide background organ music for the rodeo as well as

entertaining prior to each performance.

Following the rodeo each night there will be a dance at the open-air pavillion at the rodeo grounds. The Heart of Texas Road Gang from Waco will furnish music for dancing from 9:00 p.m. until 1 a.m.

The final rodeo parade will be at 5:30 p.m. Friday and will feature floats from the local area and surrounding towns.

Santa Anna Population Increases During Decade

Preliminary census reports released last week by the Abilene District office showed Santa Anna's population at 1,513 in 1980, 203 increase over the 1970 figure. The rural

population of Coleman County lost 116 persons, according to the report, and the city of Coleman had a gain of only 92 people.

Other incorporated towns in the county are Talpa with an increase of 114 from 112, and Novice that remained the same with 191 listed for the two consecutive census periods.

Area counties with substantial

increases were Callahan with an increase of almost one-third in population, and Brown County, with an increase of 6,258 persons.

Captain Dwight Eppler, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Eppler of Rockwood, graduated from the Military Intelligence Officers Advanced Course with a superior grade average on May 30. The six-month course covered numerous military subjects but focused on the role of the

military intelligence officer in national defense. To achieve a superior grade average, the officer must exceed requirements in all areas of testing, briefing and research.

Immediately upon graduation, Capt. Eppler was named Chief of Exploitation Division, Department of Human Intelligence in the Intelligence Center and school. The main function of his division is to train interrogators for the Army, Marine Corps and Navy, utilizing instructors from those branches of service.

In addition to the military schooling at Ft. Huachuca, Ariz., Capt. Eppler has been active in scuba diving since in Arizona.

He recently received his advanced open water certification and a specialty certification of search and recovery diver. He is a member of the Cochise County Search and Recovery Team. The team is responsible for all of southern Arizona and part of the country of Mexico.

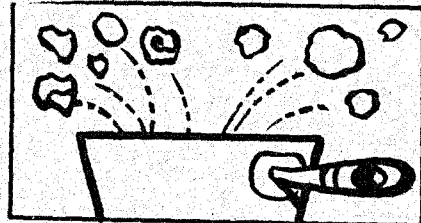

Worm Samples Requested For Eradication Program

The "S.O.S." call is going out to all stockmen over the state - that's "Send, Oh Send" any worm samples found in livestock wounds.

The reason for the appeal is that worm samples are coming in slowly to the USDA Screw-worm Eradication Laboratory in Mission, and prime screwworm season is at hand.

The only way for officials of the program to successfully attack the flesh-eating pest is to first identify worm samples as positive and to know locations of all possible cases through ranchers' reports. Then some recently developed insecticide pellets can be air-dropped to kill adult flies followed by an air-drop of sterile screwworm flies, explains Roger Blackmon, Coleman County Extension Agent.

The insecticide pellets, known as the Screwworm Adult Suppression System, quickly reduce populations of wild screwworm flies in an area. This enables sterile flies which are then dropped to "do their thing." Female screwworm flies that mate with sterile males produce eggs that will not hatch - and the females usually mate only

once.

Since sterile flies are no longer air-dropped routinely in Texas, it's especially imperative for stockmen and pet owners to check their animals closely on a regular basis and to submit any worms that may be found in wounds, emphasizes Blackmon.

Only one positive case of screwworms has been confirmed in the United States this year so far, that one being in Coleman County in April, a docking wound in a lamb at the Harold Bragg ranch in the Glen Cove area.

Worm samples can be sent to the Mission Lab in postage-free mailing kits available from veterinarians and the county Extension office, adds Mr. Blackmon.

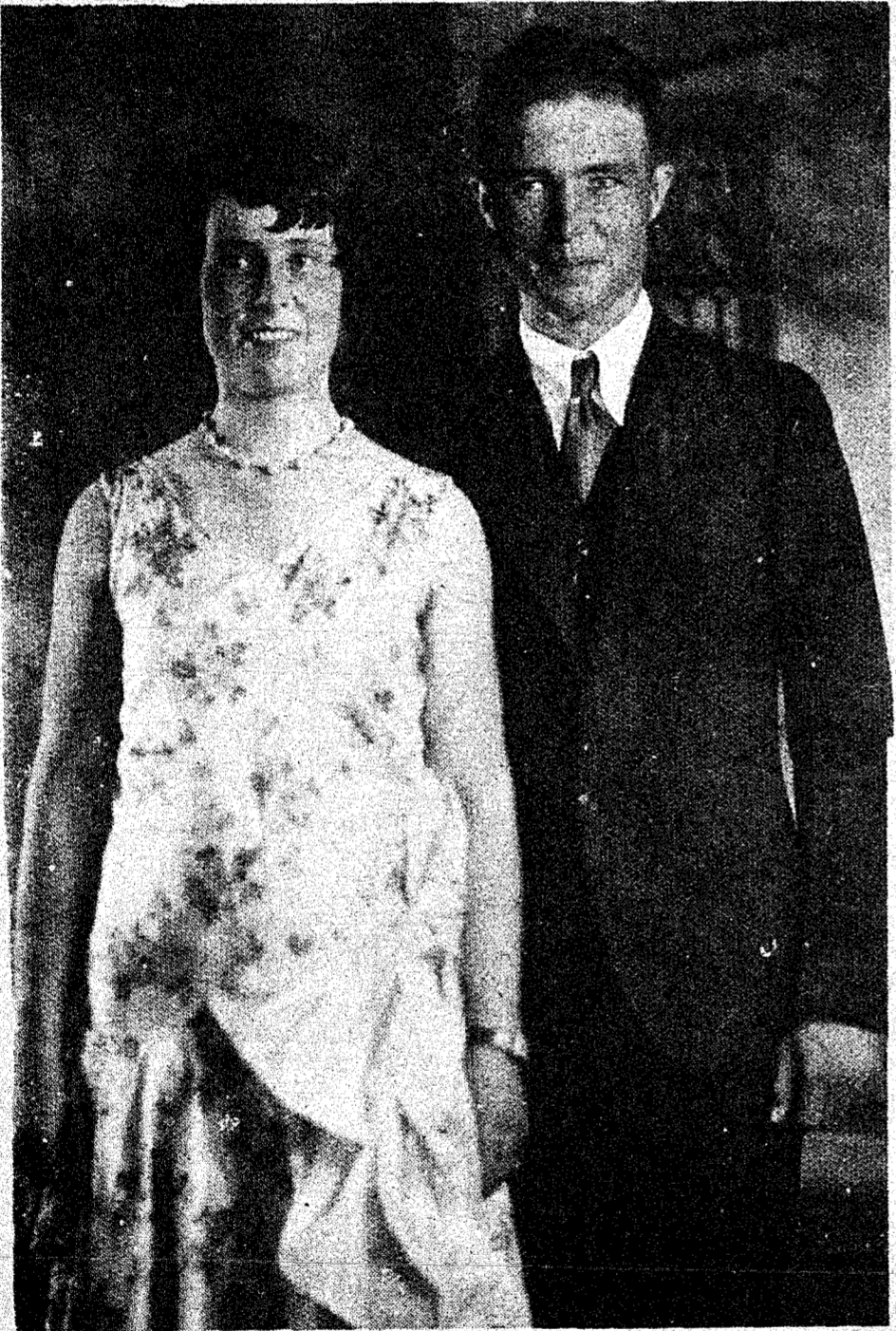

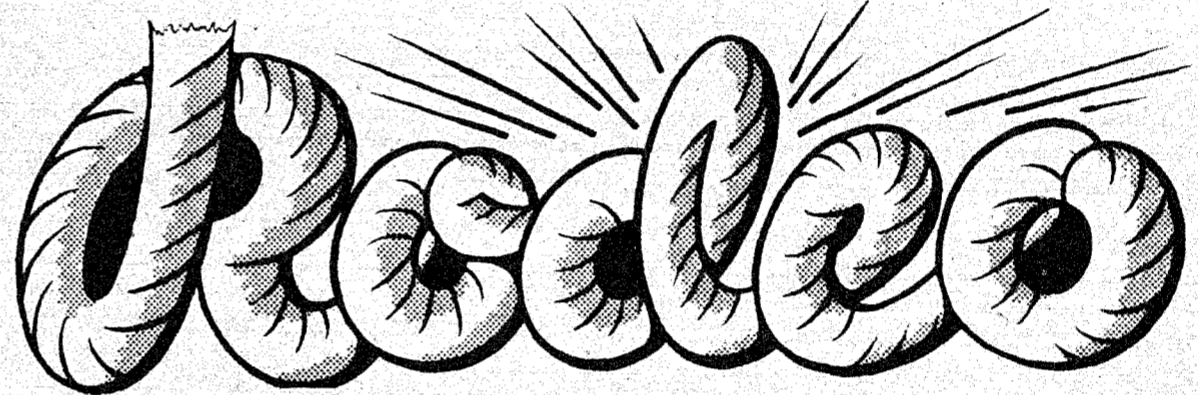

Deer Population Often Causes Poor Quality

AUSTIN— While Texas has the largest deer population in the United States, it also produces some of the poorest quality deer in terms of body size and antler development, according to officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

There are no simple explanations for this phenomenon, but stated simply it results from having too many deer competing with domestic livestock on overgrazed habitat.

The most direct method for dealing with this problem would be to remove a significant number of antlerless deer from the depleted range annually -- since an adequate harvest of bucks occurs during the hunting season, suggests Deer Program Leader Horace Gore.

Landowners and sportsmen have failed to utilize the antlerless deer permits the department had issued the past 27 years, and the problem has increased.

In some cases o overgrazing by domestic livestock causes the problem. The habitat can support only so many animals, and when the domestic livestock exceeds the proper level, something has to give.

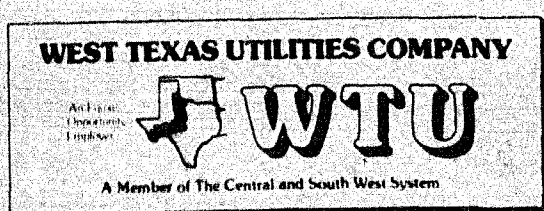

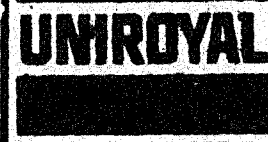


