A recent note in Jack Maguire's "Talk of Texas" column in the Austin American Statesman had the following story:

Santa Anna, Coleman County, was named for a Roman Catholic saint, not the infamous Mexican general.

In the 1860's, it was first called Gap, after a pass through in the nearby Santa Anna Mountains. In 1879 it took its name from the mountains, which were named earlier by the Spanish for St. Anne.

Tax Appraisal Program Explained By Official

Ken Graeber, Executive Director of the State Property Tax Board in Austin, was speaker at a meeting Monday, October 20, at Coleman for interested citizens and representatives of the county taxing entities. The meeting was planned by the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board to acquaint area people with the new tax district structure and answer questions concerning the new system.

Graeber, a Texas A&M graduate, has had extensive experience in economics and tax practices, serving prior to the new post as Associate Director of the Valuation

Program of the School Tax Assessment Practices Board.

Mr. Graeber spoke briefly on the background of the current property tax legislation, explaining the single tax appraisal district structure. He outlined some of the problems involved and stressed the necessity of an accurate appraisal system.

Questions were answered following the presentation. Larry Luedtke, Associate Director of the State Tax Board, was also present.

About 30 were on hand for the meeting including people from Coleman and the surrounding communities and the Cross Plains area.

Hearing Tests Slated For Pre-Schoolers

Routine hearing screening for Santa Anna School students will be held Thursday, October 30. In an effort to make early identification of children with hearing problems, parents are also asked to consider how their preschool child hears.

A consultant from the Hearing Impaired Program will be available from 1:30 to 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 30, to answer questions or attempt to screen preschoolers if there is indication of hearing impairment.

Please contact the school if you are planning to bring a preschool child in order to predict the need for the consultant's time.

Parents are urged to note the following danger signals that may indicate a hearing

problem: if a newborn baby does not exhibit a startle reflex in response to a sharp clap within 3-6 feet, if at 3 months the child has not developed auditory orienting reflexes (searching for the source of a sound), if at 8 to 12 months the child does not turn toward the source of a sound, a whisper, a rattle, a spoon in a glass, or crinkling paper originating less than 3 feet behind the child, if at 24 months the child cannot identify an object by spoken stimulus, cannot repeat a phrase, and does not use some short phrases in talking, if parents report the child is not awakened or disturbed by loud sounds, does not respond when called, pays no attention to ordinary crib noises, uses gestures almost exclusively to establish needs and desires in lieu of verbalization, or watches parents' faces intently, if there is a history of upper respiratory infections, chronic middle ear trouble, meningitis, familial deafness, maternal rubella, prematurity, Rh incompatibility, birth trauma, or high fevers, if at 3 years, the child cannot find you when you call him from another room, if at 4 years the child cannot tell you about events that have happened recently, if at 5 years, neighbors and others outside the family cannot understand most of what the child says, if your child frequently requests that TV or radio be made louder than others in the family like, if your child frequently asks for things to be repeated, if your child often answers a question with an unrelated answer, or if your child watches your face closely when you speak.

The book, "Women of Courage" by Margaret Truman has been donated to Santa Anna City Library by the Self Culture Club. The book was given in memory of the late Maud Harris Lamb, a former member and past president of the club.

The book, along with several hundred other volumes, are on the library shelves and available to Santa Anna people at no charge. Other services at the City Library include large print books, mail service on films and books not available locally, and a paperback book exchange.

The library is open four and one-half days a week.

Christmas Mailing Dates Suggested by Post Office

Postmaster John C. Gregg has submitted a list of suggested mailing dates for military and international mail to assure Christmas delivery.

Parcels to points in the Far East and Asia should be mailed as early as October 27, with mailings to Central and South America suggested in early November. Parcels to Europe should be dispatched by mid-November.

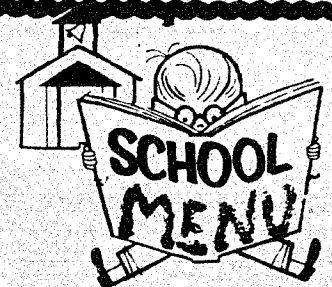
Parcels to Hawaii and Alaska should be mailed by December

1 to assure delivery by Christmas. Letters should be mailed as early as possible in December. Military mail should be at the gateway points by early or mid-December.

International air parcels or airmail letters or cards can be mailed about a week later than the regular surface mail.

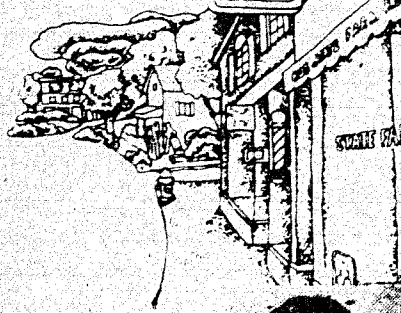

My doctrine shall drop as the rain, my speech shall distill as the dew, as the small rain upon the tender herb, and as the showers upon the grass. Deut. 32:2.

The chief requisite of language is that it be pure and kind and true--"the outward expression of an inward grace."...The best school for this language study is the home.

Kind words are as dew and gentle showers to the soul. The Scripture says of Christ that grace was poured into His lips, that He might "know how to speak a word in season to him that is weary." And the Lord bids us, "Let your speech be always with grace," "that it may minister grace unto the hearers." When the heart is pure, rich treasure of wisdom will flow forth.
