## A Place Of Great Beauty

By Barbara Kingsbery
There is no adequate way to describe Versailles, and to attempt to teil of the beauty and elegance of the former royal palace and gardens near Paris is almost impossible. It is a sight to be seen to believel The first pink brick and marble building was built in the early 17 th century as a hunting lodge for Louis XIII. Each succeeding king added to the original structure, making a huge compound that includes an opera house and chapel, banquet halls, apartments and hundreds of rooms. A cobblestone courtyard about a city block in size is centered with a statue of Louis XIV. Facing the palace and about a quarter mile away are large stable buildings that housed the horses of the noblemen and soldiers.
At its zenith, Versailles housed as many as 1,000 noblemen and their 4,000 servants. Troops to protect the king and palace numbered The
The royal palace was a favorite spot of French royalty until early in the 18 th century. Louis XIV and Marie Antoinette were living there at the time of the Revolution, fleeing into the country in an attempt to avoid The roy

They, too, are decorated in the very grand style with ornate furnishings, paintings and statuary.

Marie Antoinette enjoyed "playing" as a peasant, so had a little farmstead constructed nearby where she and her maids-in-waiting went to feed the livestock, spin and weave. The adjoining woods provided a place to ride or walk.
We took one of the several tours of the main castle, visiting the living quarters of the ling. Renovation was underway and it was interesting to see the detail and precision involved in regilding the ornately-carved woodwork in the reception halls and rooms. Sand blasting, was underway on the outside of the marble palace, removing years of grime and pollution and restoring it to its pink beauty, modern indoor plumbing rather modern indoor plumbing, learning that the running water was provided by servants running with pails of water from downstairs to the roof-top storage tanks
