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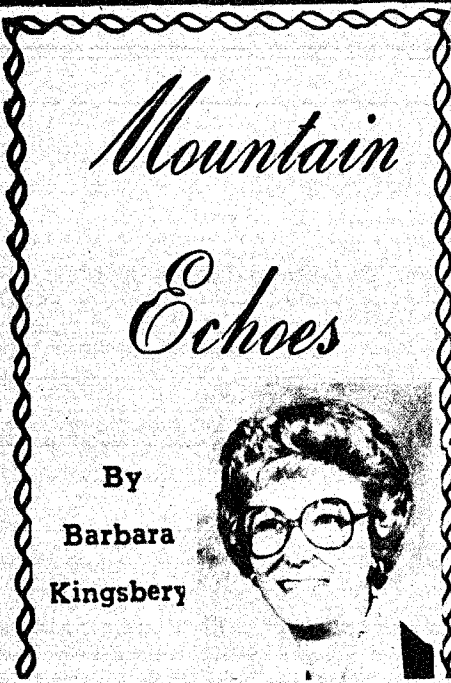

## Santa Anna's Population Increases During Decade

Santa Anna's population increased 17.3 percent from 1970 to 1980, according to the preliminary census count released this week by the Department of Commerce Census Bureau. The 1980 figure stands at 1536, giving Santa Anna the greatest percentile increase in the area. The 1970 census listed our town with 1320.

The preliminary count also listed Santa Anna with 673 residential units, a 12.9 percent increase over the 596 homes numbered ten years ago.

## Sites Listed For Tuesday's Election

Friday, October 31, is the final day to cast an absentee ballot for the Tuesday, November 4, general election. County Clerk Glenn Thomas stated last week that absentee voting was heavier than usual, indicating a good turnout for the election Tuesday.

Anyone who will be out of the county or November 4 or those over age 65 may vote absentee at the County Clerk's office in Coleman.

Santa Anna voters will cast their ballots at the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative building with Glen Copeland as election judge. Montie Guthrie III will serve as alternate judge, and clerks will be Oma Dean Horner, Lorene Rice, Helen Goodloe, Rose Bass and Patsy Isenhower.

Bert Fowler will be election judge for the Rockwood (2-A) box, and the Coleman 2-East box that includes the northeast part of the Santa Anna community will be at Dr. J. Ray Martin's office in Coleman with Roy Miller as election judge.

All polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Included on the ballot with the Presidential election, state and local contests, will be nine state constitutional amendments.

## Block Grant Funds To Be Available To S-Anna

City improvement projects for Santa Anna ranging from a municipal airport, golf course and swimming pool to sewer system extensions, were proposed at the Thursday public hearing for the Community Block Grant funding held at City Hall.

A good attendance was reported for the meeting that included presentations from Gary Smith from West Central Texas Council of Governments and Lynn Steinard and Joe Brannon from the Pecan Valley Economic Development District in Brownwood.

The federal funds are to be available to qualifying cities to be used for improvements and community development not included in general maintenance. Among the suggestions were construction of an auxiliary water storage tank and extra water lines as an emergency back-up supply for the town and the construction of sidewalks and curbs along Bowie Avenue and other streets where children most

often walk to and from school.

Among items for which the Community Block Grant is intended is rehabilitation of houses using low interest loans or grants, and housing developments.

City officials will review the suggestions from local citizens and prepare the application. An additional hearing is set Thursday, November 6, at City Hall at 6:30 p.m. The hearing will be in conjunction with the monthly meeting of City Council and will be open to the public.

People wishing to make suggestions for the use of the funds may give oral or written presentations at the meeting next week.

## Ace Reid Sr. Buried in S-Anna On Tuesday

Funeral services were held at United Methodist Church Tuesday, October 28, for Ace Reid Sr., 82, who died early Monday morning at Ranger Park Hospital after a short illness. The Rev. Mike Alexander, pastor, officiated at the services that were directed by Henderson Funeral Home. Burial was in Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mr. Reid was born March 22, 1898 in Taylor County, the son of C.M. and Susie (Baker) Reid. He married Callie Bishop in Electra, September 7, 1919. Mr. Reid lived in Electra 65 years, moving to Santa Anna in 1976. He was a member of the Methodist Church and a retired rancher, retiring in 1976.

Survivors are his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Stanley (Doris) Ernst of Fredericksburg; one son, Ace Reid Jr. of Kerrville; three brothers, Willis Reid of Olney, John Reid of Lipan and Hugh Reid of Orange; and four grandchildren.

## Hearing Slated Soon For Development Plans

Employment levels at Little Bull Creek Coal Mine near Rockwood have steadily increased over the past few months due to increased production. An additional 100 workers will be hired to meet the plant's needs, according to employer's estimates. This increase in employment will significantly strain the local economy if proper precautions are not taken.

The Pecan Valley Economic Development District in Brownwood has received planning funds to study the situation. PVEDD will be holding a public hearing in Santa Anna in the coming weeks. This will provide local citizens with an opportunity to express their

particular needs and concerns.

## New Equipment In Operation At R-Park Hospital

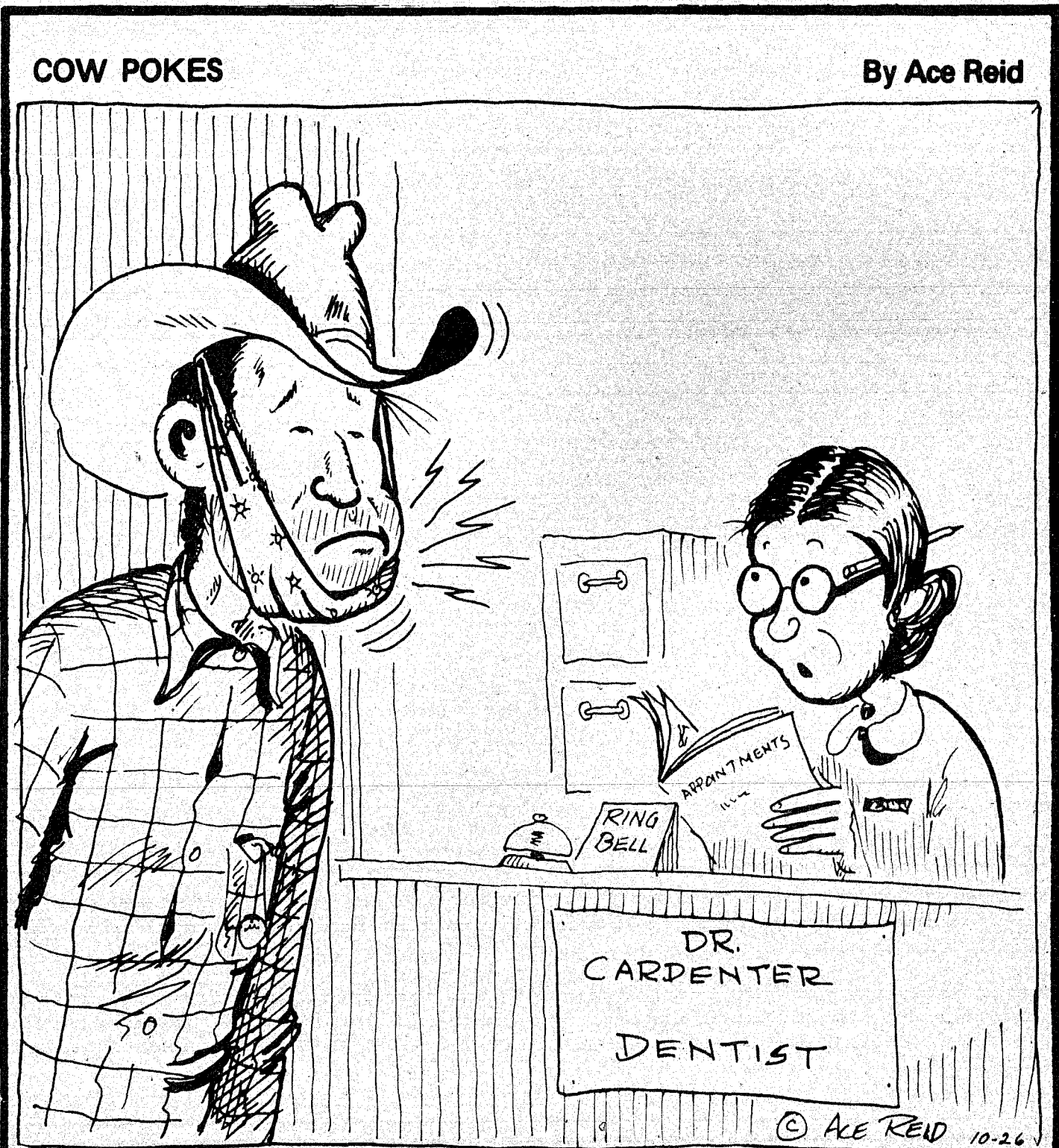
Ranger Park Hospital, in the continuing process of updating equipment, has recently purchased a Gilford System 103 Blood Analyzer.

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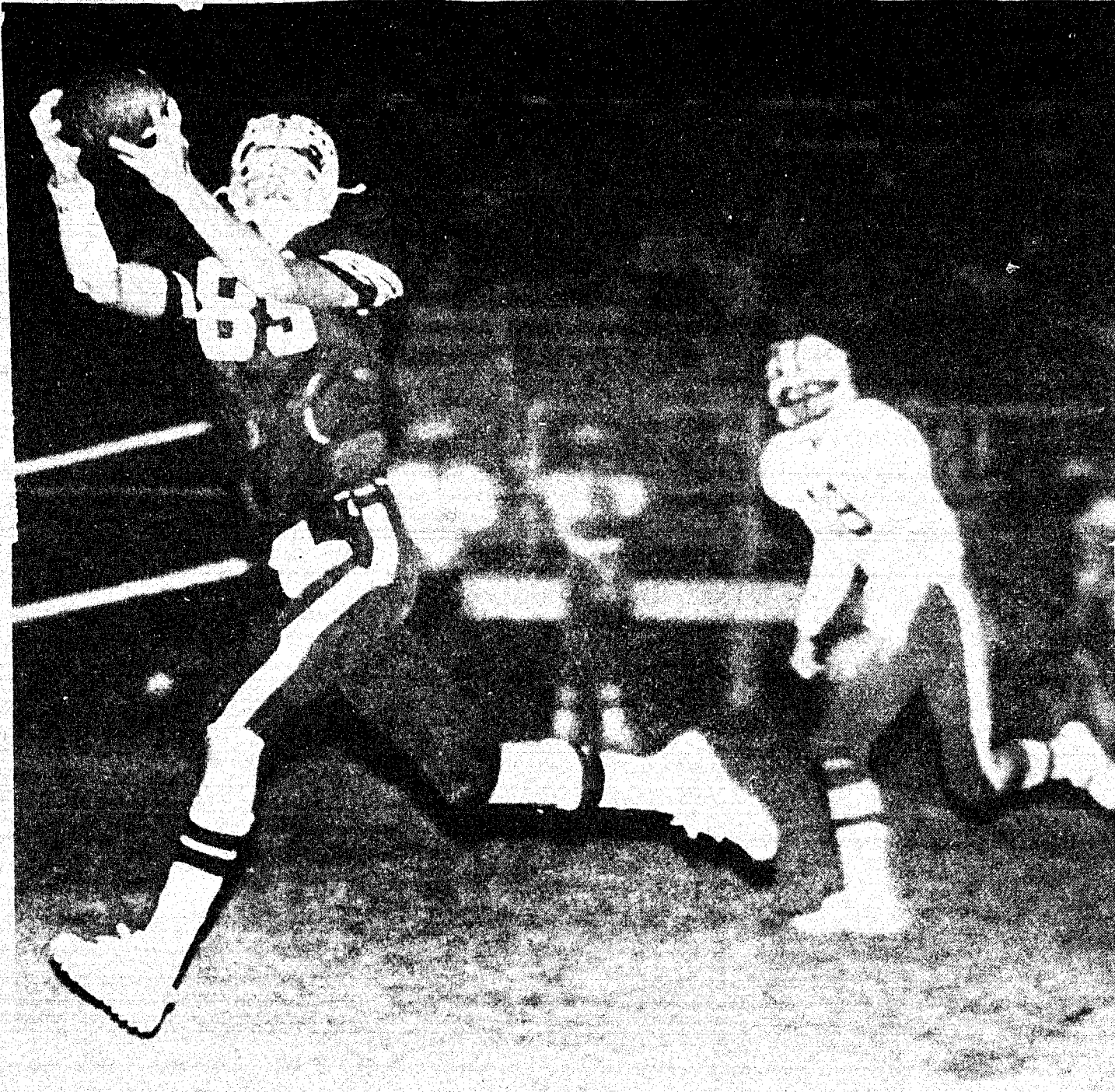
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## Santa Anna Wins 32 - 16 Over Irion County Team

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team is still a district contender after defeating Irion County Friday night 32 - 16. The victory keeps Santa Anna with a perfect district record, tied with the Bronte team for the district lead.

The Mountaineers were first on the scoreboard with a field goal by Rusty Buzzard in the first quarter. The Hornets scored a TD and made the extra points to take the lead 8 - 3.

In the second quarter Santa Anna went ahead to stay when Dwayne Warnock scored a

touchdown, and less than a minute later, Jimmy Clifton recovered a Hornet fumble in the end zone for six more points.

On the kick-off, an Irion County player was tackled in the end zone for a two-point safety.

Buzzard hit Clifton with a long pass, bringing the next TD, and Ernest DeLeon added the bonus points. DeLeon scored in the third quarter for the final score for the Mountaineers.

Irion County made their final score in the fourth quarter, adding the PAT for the 32-16 tally.

Santa Anna led in first downs with 23 to Irion's nine. The Mountaineers had 309 yards rushing and 70 yards passing, while the Hornets had 56 yards rushing and 272 yards passing.

Coach Roger Goodwin named Mike Salazar as outstanding player on defense. Albert Collins and Ernest DeLeon were cited for an exceptional game on offense.

The Mountaineers will travel to Cross Plains this week for a 7:30 p.m. game with the Buffaloes. Cross Plains is 0-3 in district play, losing to Miles 26 - 0 last week.

The club will meet Monday night at the Vocational Agriculture building at 7 p.m.

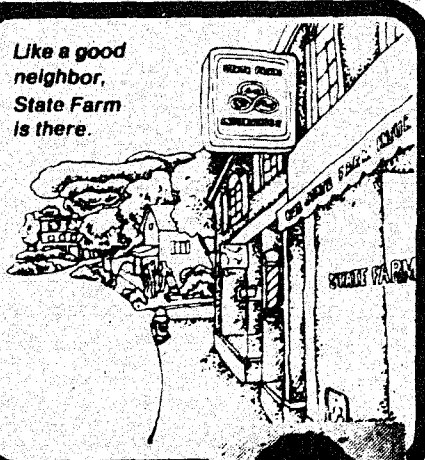
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## Rites Held Here For Robert Turner Last Sunday

Born in Santa Anna April 12, 1906, he was the son of the late Fred W. and Elizabeth (Bessie) Moore Turner. He attended the Santa Anna schools and was married to Ouida Vanderford in 1936 in Kerrville. She died in 1957.

Mr. Turner married Lillian Heller in 1958 in Dallas. She preceded him in death in 1971.

He was a resident of Denison from 1941 to 1974, moving to Santa Anna. He was a veteran of World War II, serving with the U. S. Navy, a Presbyterian and a retired antique dealer.

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## Austrian Charm, Beauty Enjoyed on Summer Tour

 Within an hour's drive of the seacoast area of Venice, Italy, our tour group was in the Dollomite Mountains in northern Italy where vineyards stretch up the inclines as far as can be tilled. Every few miles there was another picturesque village centered by a spired church. The highway climbed steadily upward for many miles, passing popular vacationing spots along the lakes and stream rivers.

Many large generating plants were along the route, providing electricity for a large area. Our route followed the Piave River through Cadore, Italy where the highest peak stands 11,000 feet above sea level. The solid limestone mountains were the most rugged I have ever seen, some with snow on top and little streams flowing down at every crease.

We passed through one little village after another, sometimes stopping completely for on-coming traffic in the winding, narrow streets.

We passed through Cortina and saw the ski jump used in the 1974 Olympic winter games. Crystal Mountain is a landmark of the city.

The Posteria Valley was one of the most beautiful areas with neat farms scattered up the mountainsides. Everywhere hay was being cut, raked and piled in long ricks to dry. What we saw was the second of the three hay harvests of the summer, and entire families seemed to be out in the fields taking advantage of the beautiful weather. Many lumber mills were also along the way.

We saw almost no livestock and were told the cattle were up in the mountains for the summer months.

Traces of the ancient Roman Road were visible along the route, and the fortress of Badia built in 1871 to defend Austria, dominated a mountain pass.

The northern part of Italy belonged to Austria before World War I and many people in that area still speak German and have an allegiance to Austria although governed by Rome.

The first time we showed our passports since flying from Dallas was as we passed into Austria at Brenner Pass. A young, polite official came on the bus and looked at each passport. We were told that Austria is more careful in checking aliens than any country. It is one of the smallest countries and an independent nation composed of about fifty percent mountains.

There were excellent highways, and we passed across

the highest bridge in Europe near Brenner Pass. It was about a mile long, spanning a deep mountain gorge. I had the sensation of flying across the neat farms and narrow valley.

We entered Innsbruck, Austria in the late afternoon, passing the Olympic ski jump used in 1960 and 1976. The city of 150,000 nestles in a valley along the Inns River in the Bavarian Alps. It is a quaint city that has restored the older section and closed many of the narrow streets to vehicle traffic. Small shops of all descriptions line the cobblestone streets, catering to the thousands of tourists that visit annually.

We spent one day on a tour to Salzburg, where we visited the childhood home of Mozart, the composer, seeing many pieces of his original compositions, his pianos and other memorabilia.

A cathedral, built in 700, dominates the city square. It was intended to equal St. Peter's cathedral in Rome as the resident cardinal at that time had hopes of Salzburg rivaling Rome in importance. A huge fortress overlooks the city, and across the Salz (Salt) River stands the castle where "The Sound of Music" was filmed.

There were flowers everywhere, both in the yards and gardens and growing along the highway. The drive from Innsbruck to Salzburg was beautiful, and also exciting as our large 45-passenger bus often had difficulty making the sharp mountain curves and once had to stop and back up to let another vehicle pass!

We attended a Tyrolean Folk Festival one evening, being entertained by traditional Austrian songs and dances and seeing some of the country's colorful heritage.

## FmHA Adds Funds For Rural Loans Thursday In Santa Anna

Temple received \$837 million during fiscal year 1980 in loans and grants by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) supporting farms, home improvement and community development in rural areas, FmHA State Director, W.H. Pieratt, reports.

The agency's farm loan services, which supplement private credit available in rural areas, added \$524 million to Texas's resources for operation of farms during a year of emergency and commercial credit shortage for many farmers.

FmHA home loan programs accounted for \$134 million to build or improve 3,847 homes in town and countryside areas.

Loans and supplementary grants to improve rural community water, sewer, health, fire protection and other public facilities totaled \$78 million for 164 projects throughout the state.

FmHA's service in guaranteeing commercial loans for business and industry that employ rural people accounted for \$101 million in the year ended September 30.

W.H. Pieratt said FmHA's improvement as a multi-purpose rural financial agency, serving rural localities through county and district offices, has resulted in \$1 1/4 billion more farm credit and community development in rural Texas during the past two years.

The state director emphasized that FmHA has been given a lead responsibility in the system introduced this year to coordinate the Federal Government's rural development assistance with goals adopted in local and regional areas of the states.

"This action to implement the Rural Development Act has provided a clear channel of communication from localities, through their state development organizations, to highest levels of Washington for finding resources to meet the greatest needs of rural areas," W.H. Pieratt said. "We expect to further improve this system of cooperation during the coming year."

He married Henrilee Ashmore Jennings November 11,

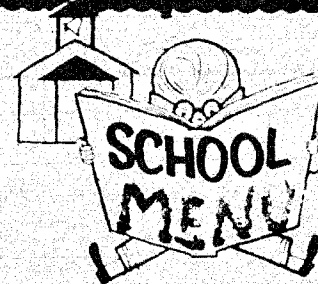

## Comptroller Warns People Of Fraud

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday warned that Texas smokers who try to stretch their tobacco dollars by purchasing mail order cigarettes may end up getting burned.

Bullock said advertisements have appeared in Texas recently offering mail order cigarettes and that the tobacco products do not carry the state's tax stamp.

"Cigarette bargains can go up in smoke quicker than a cheap cigar in a hurricane if the tobacco taxes aren't paid," Bullock said.

He said purchasers are required to pay his office \$1.85 a carton on cigarettes they order from out-of-state and may be liable for a \$1.85 a carton penalty if the tax is not immediately reported.

Two firms have been advertising cigarettes for \$4.75 not include the \$1.85 a carton tax, he said.

Federal law requires out-of-state firms to provide the Comptroller's office with a list of Texas residents who purchase cigarettes outside the state.

State law makes possession of more than 10,000 untaxed cigarettes--50 cartons--a felony.

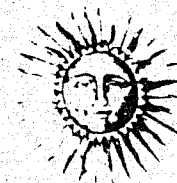
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# Speaking Up On The "4th"

Over the years voting eligibility requirements have become increasingly more liberal, allowing more and more people to express their opinions on public policy. Gone are property requirements, age limits have been lowered and many other restrictions have been eliminated. Yet as we strive to give the voice of vote to all so that we are truly, in Lincoln's words, a "government of the people by the people and for the people," large numbers of Americans are remaining silent on polling days.

"Voter apathy is in effect giving us government by the minority," said Robinson P. Rigg, spokesman for Americans United To Rediscover America (AURA) a nationwide voluntary organization dedicated to rediscovery of the traditional American values of honesty, integrity and thus leading to crime prevention.

In 1960 only 64 percent of the voting age population participated in the Presidential election. It declined to 54 percent in 1976 so that the President of the United States was elected by only one fourth of the voting population. All indications are that in 1980 voter participation

will be even lower. Often heard is the lament that "one vote does not mean much," but John F. Kennedy won the presidency by only 119,000 popular votes out of a total of 68 million in 1960. That translates to one vote per voting precinct. It was by only 28 votes that Lyndon Johnson won his first seat in Congress. Each vote does count.

The League of Women Voters asks "will you register your opinion in the voting booth or will you let someone else do it for you?" They cite the correlation between marking the ballot and getting action on key issues as a further incentive to vote.

In urging all registered voters to vote November 4th, AURA reminds you that each vote does count and sometimes that one vote can be the deciding vote. AURA also suggests that voters take

continued positive action in government affairs. If you support a particular candidate, do volunteer work for that candidate. Volunteers can help by making phone calls, mailing letters, passing out campaign materials and many other duties. Write your representatives in government on key issues concerning the nation as well as state and local concerns. You may not get an individual reply but elected officials monitor public sentiment by keeping a tally of opinions expressed by their constituents. Encourage your friends and relatives to register and vote. Be an informed voter. Many local groups provide voter education materials on candidates as well as key issues and pending legislation. Remember that elections are not just held every four years. Elections for offices on the state and local levels are held every year.

# Nine Amendments Listed On Next Tuesday's Ballot

Aside from the candidates for political office, including the Presidential election, there are nine constitutional amendments on the ballot.

Amendment Number one would permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience.

Amendment Number two is a constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused.

Amendment Number three would require setting up a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

Amendment Number four would authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by

a church, synogogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, non-profit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or non-profit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations.

Amendment Number five is a constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law.

Amendment Number six would authorize counties with a population of 5,000 or less to perform private road work for a fee.

Amendment Number eight would change the name of the court of civil appeals and names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the Appellate Courts.

Amendment Number nine would allow spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property.

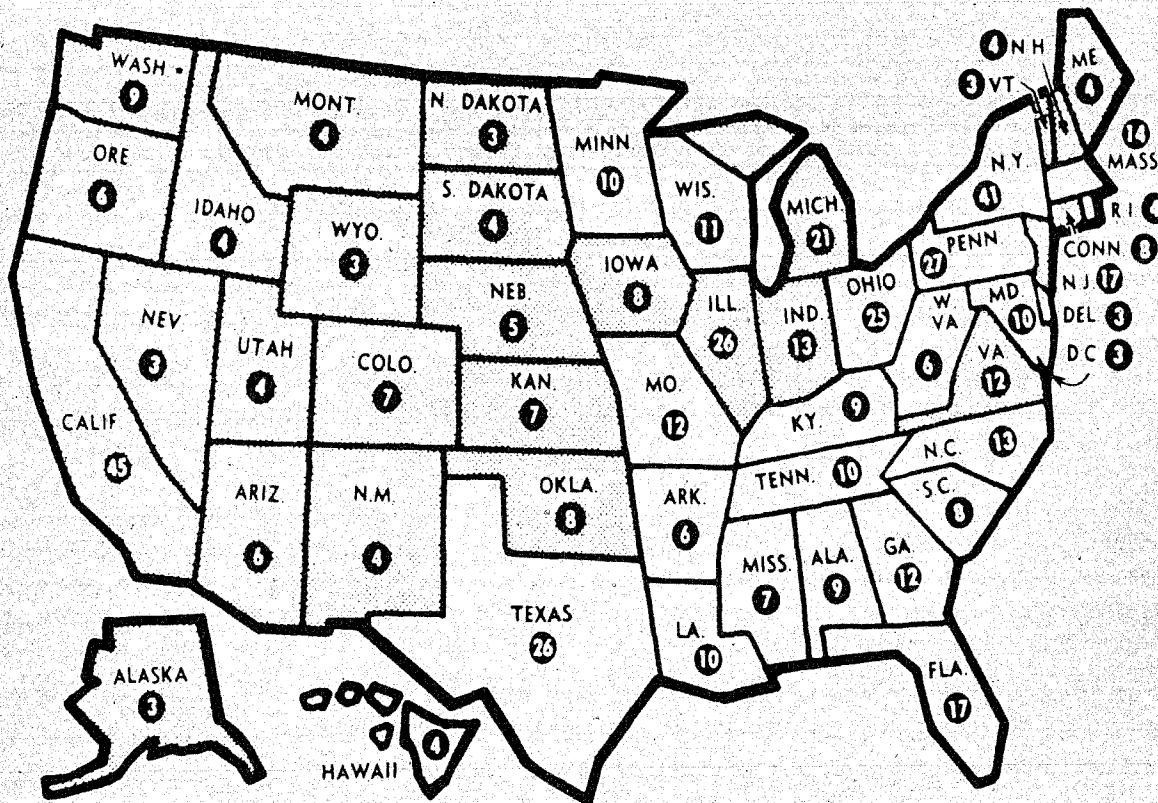

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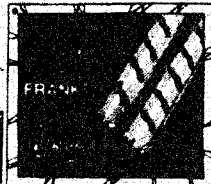
