## Increases During Decade

Santa Anna's population increased 17.3 percent from 1970 to 1980, according to the preliminary census count to preased this week by the leased this week by the Department of Commerce Cen sus Bureau. The 1980 figure stands at 1536 , giving Santa Anna the greatest percentile ncrease in the area. The 1970 census listed our town with The
The preliminary count also isted Santa Anna with 673 residential units, a 12.9 percent increase over the 596 homes numbered ten years ${ }^{\text {ago. }}$
increase in 1980 with 10,361 residents in the county. The the last coleman increased from percent census by a small percentage, listing 5,869 in
1980. The final tally will be released in early 1981 and may be slightly higher than the preliminary report.

## Enjoyed on Summer Tour

By Barbara Kingsbery Within an hour's drive o the seacoast area of Venice, Italy, our tour group was in the Dollamite Mountains in northern ltaly where vineyards stretch up the inclines as far as can be tilled. Every few miles there was another pictur esque village centered by a spired church. The highway climbed steadily upward fo many miles, passing popular lakes and stream spots.

Many large generating plants were along the route, providing eute follor a the piave route Cod Italy whe the hishest peat stands 11,000 heet above sea ley st

We passed through one little times stopping completely fo n-coming traffic in the wind ing, narrow streets.

We passed through Cortina and saw the ski jump used in 1974 Olympic, winter games. Crystal Mountain is andmark of the city.
The Posteria Valley was one of the most beautiful areas the mountainsides. Everywhere hay was being cut, raked and hiled in long cut, raked to and What in long was the secy of the three hay harvests of of the three hay harvests of he summer, and entire familes seemed to be out in the beautiful weather Many lumber mills were also along the way.
We saw almost no livestock and were told the cattle were ip in the mountains for the summer months
Traces of the ancient Roman Road were visable along the route, and the fortress of Badia built in 1871 to defend Austria, dominated a mountain pass.
The northern part of Italy belonged to Austria before World War I and many people in that area still speak German and have an allegiance to Austria although governed by Rome.
The first time we showed our passports since flying from Dallas was as we passed into Austria at Brenner Pass. A oung, polite official came on the bus and looked at each passport. We were told that Austria is more careful in checking aliens than any country. It is one of the mallest countries and an independent nation composed of about fifty percent mountains.

We spent one day on a tour to Salzburg, where we visited the childhood home of Mozart, pieces of his original composi tions, his pianos and other memorabelia. pianos and other A cathedral
dominates the calt in 700 , was intended to equal St Peter's cathedral in Rome as the resident cardinal Rome as time had hopes of Salzburg rivaling Rome in importance. A huge fortress overlooks the city, and across the Salz (Salt) River stands the castle where "The Sound of Music" was filmed.
There were flowers everywhere, both in the yards and gardens and growing along the gardens and growing along the Innsbruk to Salzburg from beautiful, and also exciting as our large 45 -passenger bus often had difficulty making the sharp mountain curves and once had to stop and back up to let another vehicle pass!
We attended a Tyrolean Folk Festival one evening, being entertained by traditional Austrian songs and dances and seeing some of the country's colorful heritage.

Gone are property requirements, age limits have been lowered and many other restrictions have been eliminated. Yet as we strive to give the voice of vote to all so that we are truly, in Lincoln's words, a "government of the people by the people and for the people," large numbers of Americans are remaining silent on polling days.
"Voter apathy is in effect giving us government by the minority," said Robinson \(\mathbf{P}\). Rigg, sporesman for Americans United To Rediscover America (AURA) a nationwide voluntary organization dedicated to rediscovery of the traditional American values of honesty, integrity and thus leading to crime prevention.
In 1960 only 64 percent of the voting age population participated in the Presidential election. It declined to 54 percent in 1976 so that the President of the United States was elected by only one fourth of the voting population. All indications are that in 1980 voter participation
