Santa Anna Defeats Lometa; To Meet Blanket This Week

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team won a thriller Friday night, defeating the strong Lometa team 8 - 0 in the last minutes of the contest. The win left Santa Anna with a 3 - 0 season record, and no team has scored on the Mountaineers this season.

Both the teams showed their good defense for the first three quarters of the game, with the only score coming in the last three minutes when Rusty Buzzard hit Jim Clifton with a 25-yard pass, and Clifton raced the last 25 yards to the goal line. The two teamed up for the two-point conversion.

Lometa led in first downs with ten to Santa Anna's eight. They also led in rushing yardage with 132 to 108, but Santa Anna had 73 yards passing to 24 for Lometa.

The Mountaineers completed three of six passes while Lometa had one of three. Each team punted

four times, with Lometa averaging 34 yards and Santa Anna averaging 28.

Both teams lost 60 yards to penalties, and Santa Anna lost one fumble to 0 for Lometa.

Coach Roger Goodwin listed James Pelton, Steve Hughes, David Strickland, Albert Collins, Mike Salazar, Dwayne Warnock and Rusty Buzzard as outstanding on defense.

Steve Hughes and Damon Harper were cited for their work on the offensive line, and all the backfield played an exceptional game, according to Goodwin.

The Mountaineers will travel to Blanket Friday for a non-district game with the Tigers at 8 p.m. The team will be in full strength and in good shape for the tough game.

The Tigers won over the Abilene Christian High team 42 - 14 last week and are considered a power-house in the East Zone of District 7-A.

Michael placed first in all pageant categories except one, winning trophies for each as well as the title trophy and a television set, luggage, two cameras and other prizes.

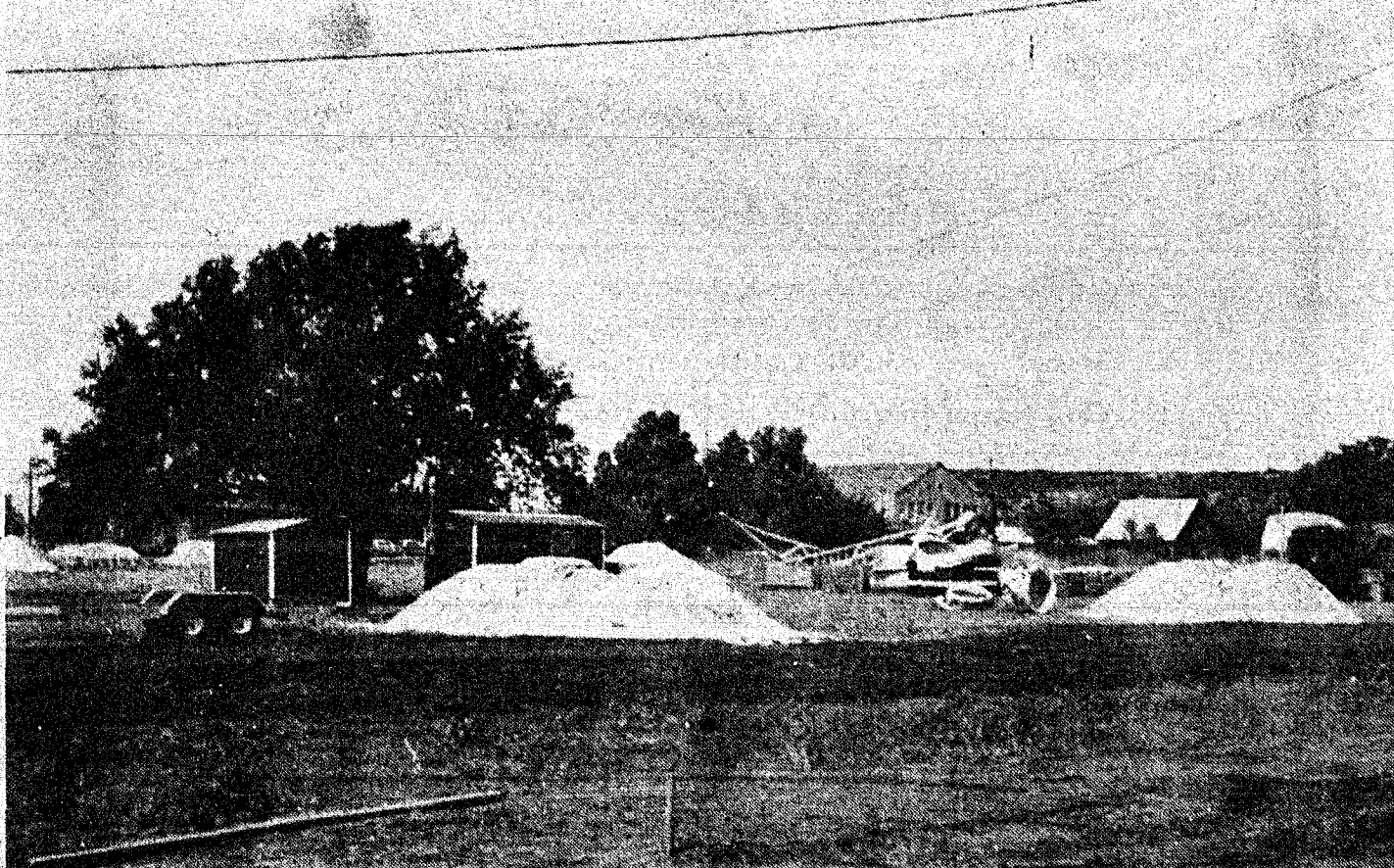

New Housing Project Is Under Construction

Construction is underway on twenty-four new housing units for the City of Santa Anna, the project funded by a \$480,100 loan from Farmers Home Administration. The twelve duplex buildings will be located on a five-acre tract east of the Santa Anna Elementary School, bordered by South Lee, South Jefferson and Clark Streets. The property is part of the Roy Stockard home-plate.

The new units are designed by Stanley Brown, Dallas architect, and Craig Norton Inc. of Brownwood is the contractor. The twelve buildings are to be completed in February of next year.

The new units will bring to 84 the number in town. The present apartments are in great demand, with more applicants than vacancies.

Rent is charged according to income and ability to pay.

The new units, approved under Section 8 of the Housing and Development Act of 1974, will be operated through the Housing and Urban Development Program. Provision will be given for occupants eligible for housing subsidy, giving more versatility to the city's housing project.

The new units will also include four units especially equipped for the handicapped. The others will be one-bedroom units for the elderly and two-bedroom units, located across the street from the school, for families.

The additional units are expected to ease the housing shortage in the community, according to J. L. Sparkman, housing director.

Date Is Changed For Local Visit Of S-Security Rep.

Effective October 1 the Brownwood Social Security Office has a change in the schedule of visits to Santa Anna. The new schedule has the Social Security representative in Santa Anna on the second Thursday of each month from 1 to 2:30 p.m. instead of Wednesday mornings from 9:30 until 12 noon once each month. The representative will be at Mountain City Center to meet with patrons.

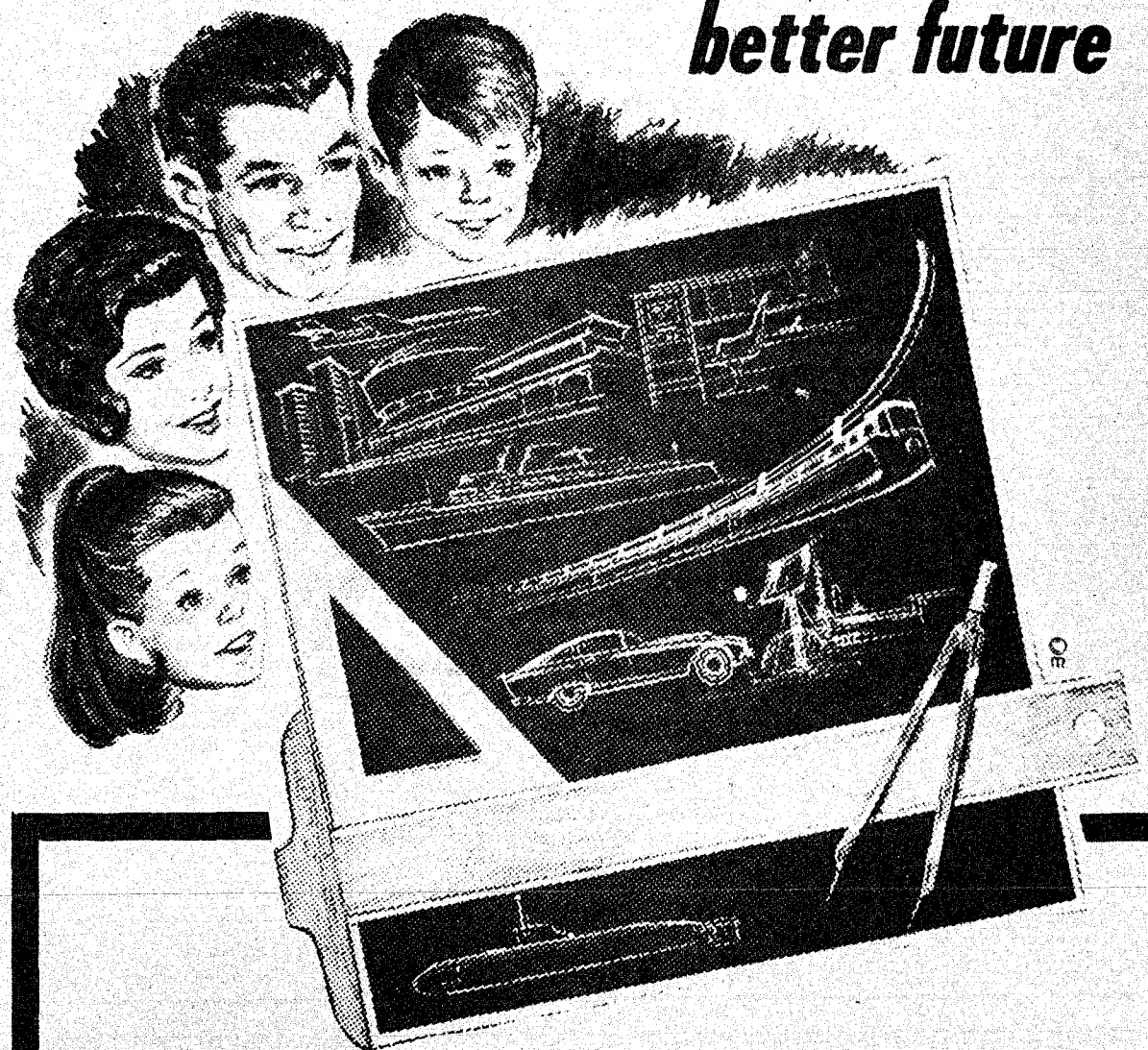
Girls Volleyball Is Underway

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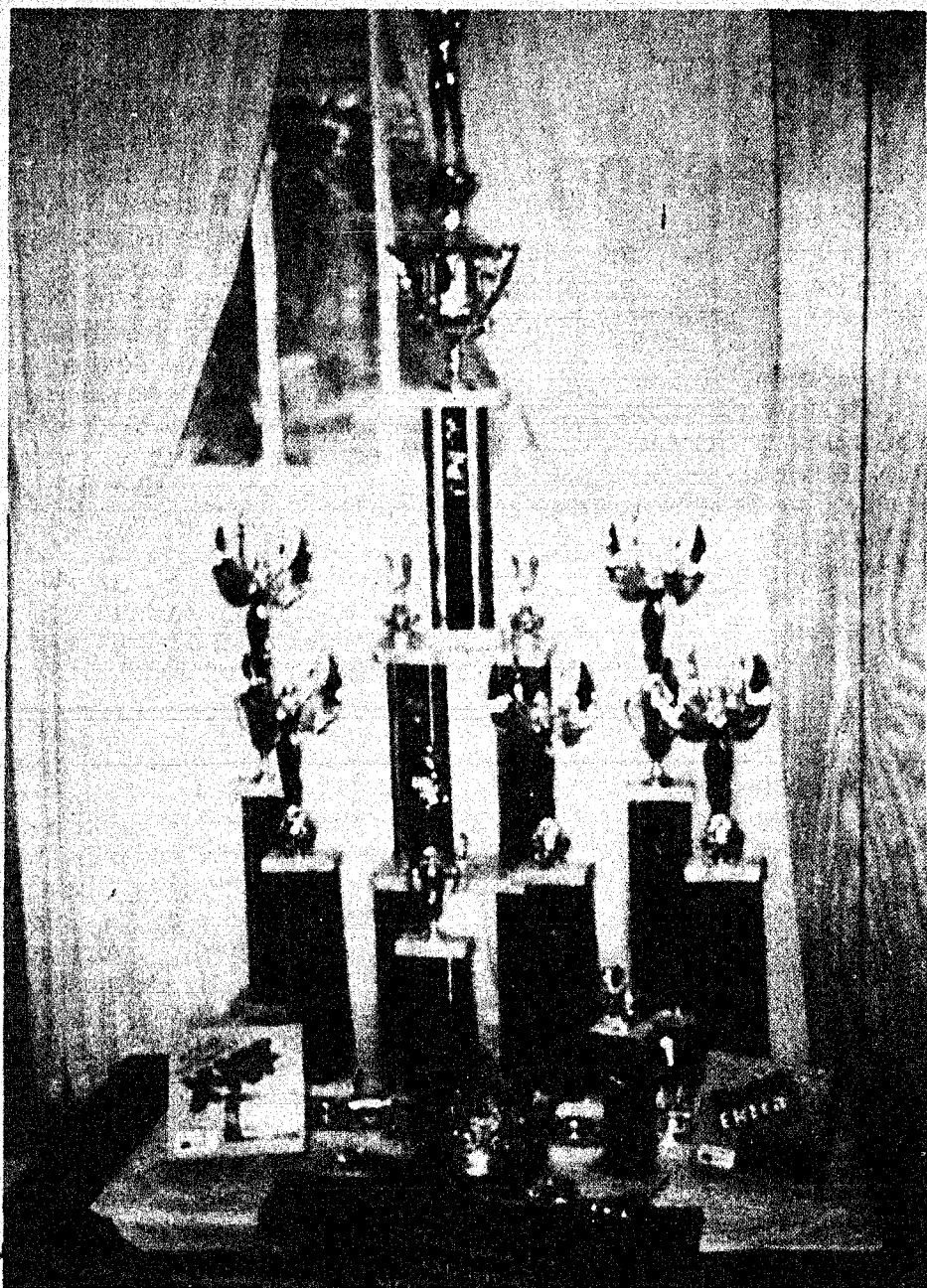

Guy Allen To Compete In Annual OS Roping

The top three 1980 steer ropers, including World Champion Guy Allen of Santa Anna, will be among the 37 steer ropers who will compete at Post Sunday afternoon, October 5, in the 10th annual OS Ranch Steer Roping.

Allen, by winning the \$8,900 first place check in the National Steer Roping Finals at Laramie, Wyoming, recently walked off with the world steer roping title with a new mone-winning record for the year of \$20,500.

Arnold Felts of Woodward, Oklahoma, who is the defending OS champion, finished No. 2 in

the 1980 standings with \$12,400 in winnings. Jimmy Brazile of Gruver, Texas, was third in the race for the world title with \$11,500.

Thirty-nine western artists will show some \$500,000 worth of western art in the OS ranch house with a Friday night prevue party leading off the sale of the art which totaled \$181,000 here last year. Most of the artists will be on hand personally for the three-day "OS weekend."

Team roping is scheduled for all day Friday on the Basinger Ranch with the Saturday schedule including girls barrel racing, an invitational calf roping, a NCHA championship cutting horse contest and a dance in the community center here to the music of Red Steagall and the Coleman County Cowboys.

Two new OS events are a fiddlers contest Saturday morning and a colt sale Sunday morning.

The "OS weekend" annually raises between \$40,000 and \$50,000 for the operation of West Texas Boys Ranch near San Angelo.

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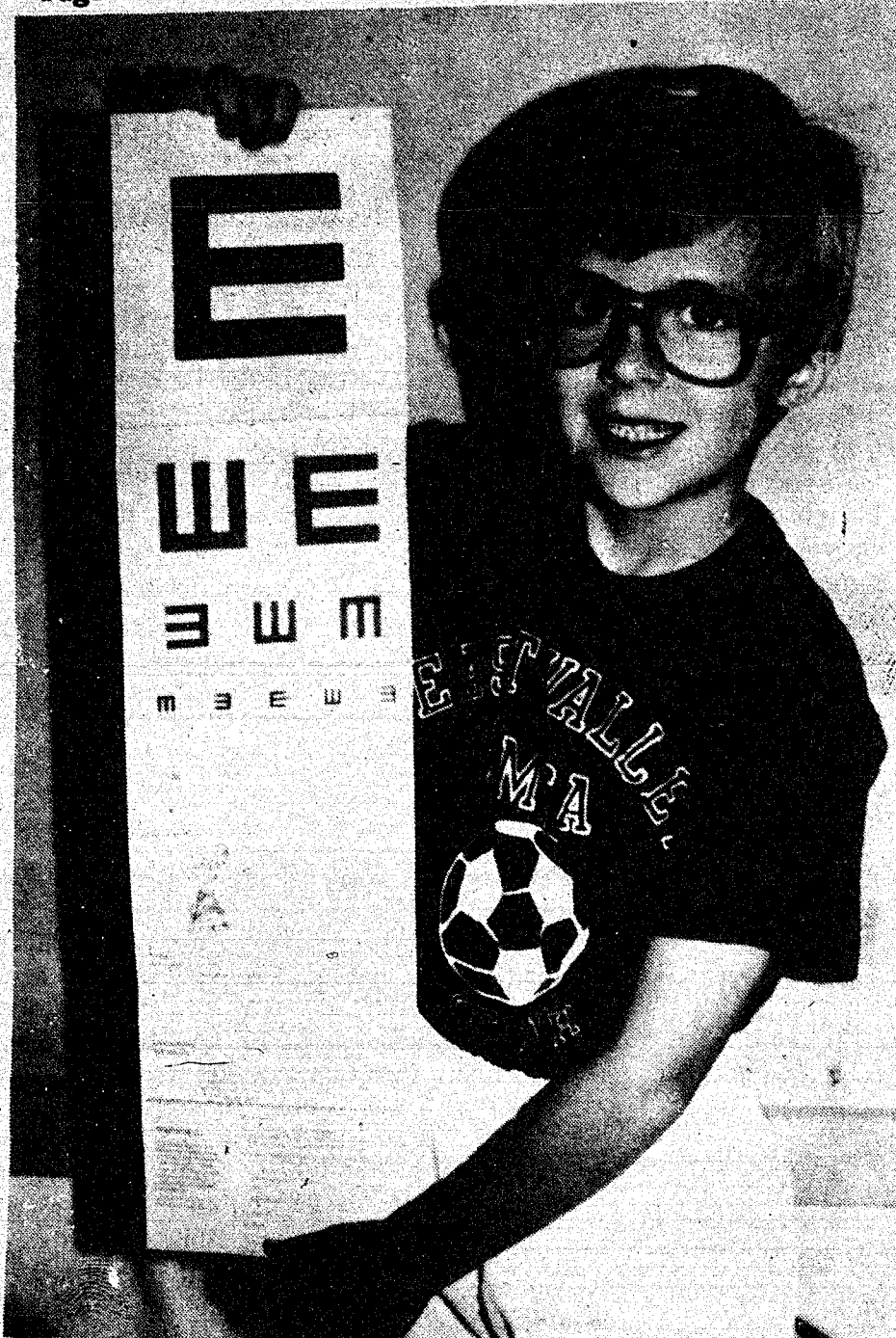

The "E" is the symbol on the basic vision test that, by law, all children must have. In Travis' case, the "E" chart indicated he had amblyopia or "lazy eye". If his problem had not been detected and treated before he was six, Travis would have lost all functional sight in his "lazy eye".

'Lazy Eye Alert' Test New State Law Highlights

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness is putting Texas on a "Lazy Eye Alert" this fall, the importance of which is highlighted by the new state law that requires a vision test for every child entering school, says the Society's president, Clymer L. Wright, Jr.

"The purpose of the new law is to find the one youngster in 20 who has an eye problem that needs to be treated early in life," Wright said. "However many children, especially those with amblyopia or 'lazy eye', have a condition that can be best corrected in the preschool years, often when the child is as young as three or four. That is why Prevent Blindness, even though busy certifying personnel in over 300 school and health agencies to screen under the new law, is also sponsoring open "Lazy Eye Alert" screenings during September and October through its volunteer preschool vision screening units

around the state.

"Vision screening of preschoolers is a year-round program for TSPB," Wright pointed out. Over 40,000 youngsters were screened by the Society last year alone. The "Lazy Eye Alert" has been added as a special project to draw attention to children's eye care needs and to increase the number of children reached by the program.

"The Texas Health Department says that 20,000 children enter school each year with vision problems. Two

HOME BUYING TIPS

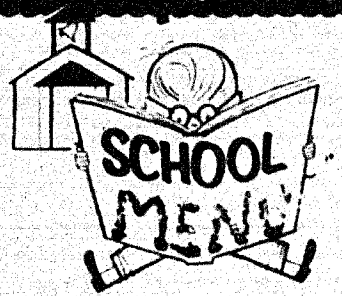
percent of those probably have "lazy eye", the chief target of all childhood screening programs. Without early treatment of this problem a child can suffer permanent vision loss or even blindness in the lazy eye by the age of 6, an age when many children are just starting school."

The basic screening test for both the Society's and the state's program involves "reading" a chart with the letter E turned in different directions. To children who haven't yet learned alphabet recognition, the "E" is a game in which they point in the direction they see the "legs" of the letter pointing.

"A companion project to the TSPB screening programs is its Home Eye Test for Preschoolers," Wright added. This is a free do-it-yourself kit that allows parents whose children are not able to take advantage of an organized vision screening to play the "E" game with their youngsters at home. The Society recommends that children who fail the "E" test should be taken for a professional eye examination."

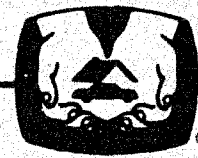

Howard Payne Experiencing 6.5 Enrollment Increase

Howard Payne University is not about to collapse, said President Dr. Ralph A. Phelps, Jr., Monday in citing a 6.5 increase in enrollment, the university's total endowment of \$8,095,187, the 1980-81 budget

of \$4,995,000 and the \$2,032,000 payroll for 180 employees.

Enrollment from Howard Payne's extension center in Houston is not counted in the 1,301 total, which means the enrollment will go higher when that figure arrives.

According to a financial statement released in July, HPU finished the 1979-80 year in the black. It also indicated that 30 percent of the total endowment of HPU has been received in the last five years.

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Direct Deposit For Social Security Checks

The direct deposit of social security checks provides a valuable service to beneficiaries. Under the program, social security or supplemental security income (SSI) checks are deposited directly into a checking or savings account at a bank or other financial institution, instead of being mailed to the person.

Direct deposit has a number of advantages. Most important, perhaps, is the fact that the possibility of loss or theft of a check is eliminated. Moreover, absence of the person from the home--whether for an extended vacation or simply for the day--no longer is a need for concern; the check is credited automatically to the individual's account. Direct deposit also saves time by doing away with the need to wait for mail to be delivered, or to wait in line to cash a check.

The program is completely voluntary and people can select the financial organization they wish to do business with.

Since not all financial organizations operate in exactly the same fashion, people might want to compare what each offers. For example, banks must notify people each month whether their directly deposited checks have been received and credited to their accounts or not; and some guarantee that the amount of the monthly check will be credited to the account on a specific day, whether or not it is actually received.

If a savings account is preferred, the bank or other financial organization should be asked about the types of accounts it offers, including the rate of interest paid on each.

The mechanics of arranging for direct deposit are simple. Form SF-1199, which can be obtained from the bank or credit union selected, must be completed. The direct deposit of checks will begin about 90 days after social security receives the form. If at any time a beneficiary decides to change from one financial organization to another, all that is required is completion of another Form SF-1199. Direct deposit can be terminated simply by notifying the social security office.

Use of direct deposit does not eliminate the need to advise social security of a change of address. In addition to benefit checks, notices about cost-of-living increases, changes in the annual earnings test, and other items of interest to beneficiaries are mailed out periodically.

Direct Deposit of checks gives beneficiaries an opportunity to do themselves a favor at no cost. Additional information about the program can be obtained from any social security office.

Providing emergency assistance to disaster victims is one of the responsibilities of the American Red Cross. Health maintenance and needs of the community become intensified in disaster situations. Assisting individuals and communities, as a whole, in alleviating some of the problems created by disaster situations is a major role of the Red Cross Nursing and Health Services Program.

Visit In Switzerland Is A Rare Delight

Leaving Paris to the south-east, the wide, heavily-traveled highway goes through Fountainbleau Forest, an area that resembles the Texas Hillcountry but with different varieties of trees--small pine-type and other conifers. Along the way enroute to Switzerland we passed near Dijon, where the hills are cultivated straight up and down, without terraces or even contour farming. Rain-fall comes often and softly, not the washing rains we have in Texas, so the soil is not eroded as it would be here. The only cattle I saw in the area were Charolaise.

With lunch at a lovely cafeteria in the little town of Beaune, France, I bought drinking water for the first of many times--a Coke-sized bottle of water was .75 cents. Water fountains are not in every building as they are here, and water is never offered in restaurants.

The countryside gradually changed from gentle slopes to hills, then mountains. Hay--both alfalfa and native grass--was being baled in almost every field. Everything was lush and green, with the countryside dotted with small villages. Little streams of water trickled from every hill, even from the "cuts" in the rocky highway right-of-way. Flowers were blooming in profusion along the roads.

We crossed the Rhone River at Montbelliard in the Alsace-Lorraine region that at different times was part of Germany. At Belfort we saw a fortress of ancient times that overlooks the town.

Our tour bus crossed into Switzerland at St. Louis, near the city of Mulhouse. The scenery seemed to change almost immediately, with farm-houses and barns scattered in the country instead of the clusters of houses in villages as in France. Switzerland is 75 percent mountains, with land cultivated as far as possible up the hillsides.

We arrived at Lucerne in time for dinner at our hotel--a small one in the downtown area. From our window we could see part of the city wall--constructed about 1500--on a nearby hill.

We had a bus tour of the city that nestles along Lake Lucerne, and ended at the city's main landmark, the Lion Monument, a tribute to Swiss soldiers who have given their lives for France. It was carved about 1895 into a solid rock hill near the downtown area, and one of the most impressive sites we saw.

The city has many old buildings, with the business district stretching across the lower end of the lake that forms a swift river. A rustic footbridge festooned with blooming plants crosses the river at that point as well as several vehicle bridges. Narrow, winding streets are lined with shops and stores in the older part of the city.

Suzanne Kingsbery and I took the trolley-bus to sightsee from one end of the city to the other.

Our second evening in Lucerne our tour group took a night boat ride on Lake Lucerne, with entertainment by musicians in native costumes. I regretted the boat ride was not during daylight hours, as I wanted to see more of the countryside.

The highway from Lucerne south toward Italy went through numerous tunnels. Waterfalls dropped to the valleys from the mountains, forming the Rhone River. Near the village of Wassen, we started the "switchback" route across the Alps to Gotthard Pass. We saw snow along the road, with beautiful wild flowers blooming right alongside it.

The Italian-speaking part of Switzerland lies across the Alps, with water from that point flowing into the Ticino River in Italy. The descent from the 8,000-foot pass was on a hairpin-turn highway also. I saw the first rock roofs in that area--small, flat rocks that are used like tiles on some houses and barns. We also soon saw the first of many vineyards, and the valley quickly became wider and flatter as we entered Italy.

Applications Taken For DPS Troopers

Major Ira W. Dees, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49 County West Texas Region, has announced that applications are now being accepted from men and women for the position of Trooper with the Texas Department of Public Safety. Applicants selected will be assigned to the next training school which will begin January 13, 1981.

Dees said, "Applicants must be between the ages of 20-35 having weight within 2-3 pounds per inch of height, for males or 1 1/4 to 2 1/4 per inch of height for females, have no less than 20/200 vision, and, have at least 60 semester hours of college credit. In addition, applicants must be in excellent physical condition, be of good moral character and a citizen of the United States."

Persons selected as recruits will be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning January 13, 1981, at the Homer Garrison Jr. Law Enforcement Academy. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference. After some 800 hours of intensive classroom work and rigid physical training at the Homer Garrison Jr. Law Enforcement Academy in Austin a Trooper is able to handle any of the various situations he may encounter.

"The salary is \$1,034 per month during the 18-week training period and goes to \$1,178 per month upon completion of the school," Dees said. Uniforms, uniform cleaning, vehicle, weapons, ammunition and necessary equipment are furnished. Group life and hospitalization insurance are provided and travel expenses are paid when the Trooper is away from home station.

Vacation, holidays, and sick leave are provided and Troopers become members of the Texas Employee Retirement System. Dees stated that The Department of Public Safety now has a Trooper in each region assigned to recruiting activities, such as contacting

colleges, radio stations, TV stations and individuals concerning employment. The Trooper assigned in this region, is Michael Espinoza. Persons interested in contacting Trooper Espinoza may do so by either calling 915-697-2211 or writing P. O. Box 4367, Midland, Texas 79704.

Applications can be obtained at any DPS office. After completion of the application it would be turned in to offices in Midland, Abilene, San Angelo, El Paso for screening. If all is in order the applicant can be tested

in El Paso, at 8:00 a.m. Monday thru Friday; in Abilene at 8:00 a.m. each Tuesday; in San Angelo at 9:00 a.m. each Wednesday; in Midland at 9:00 a.m. each Thursday. Applicants will be given written tests, physical capacity and physical agility tests. Those who pass these tests will undergo a background and character investigation as well as a physical examination. Dees said, "The Department is an equal opportunity employer and we need both men and women from all races. Those interested should contact the Department as soon as possible to be considered for the January 13th school."

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

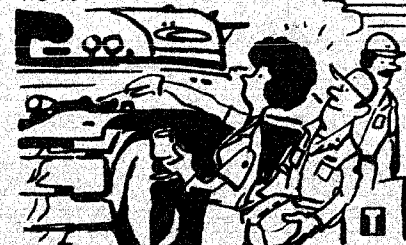

Plans were made to serve refreshments at each meeting, with the class presenting the program to furnish refreshments. The next meeting will be October 14.

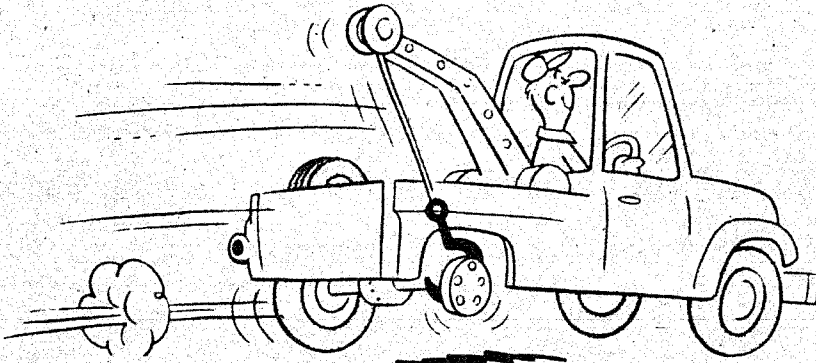
