Heartland Mall To Open At Early Next Wednesday

The big new Heartland Mall in Early will open Wednesday, October 8, with 28 businesses in the new location. The ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held at 9:30 a.m. and include music by the Howard Payne University band and speeches by local officials and dignitaries.

According to Don Sewell, mall manager, the new mall will have space for 40 businesses at peak capacity. The convenient location just east of Brownwood covers 246,000 square feet of space in the enclosed shopping center and has parking space

for 1,200 vehicles. Special opening events will be held through Saturday, October 11.

Major businesses located in the mall are K-Mart, Beall's Department Store, J. C. Penney Co. and Walgreen Drugs. A theatre is located in the mall area, and when development is complete, several other businesses will be located on property adjacent to the main mall area.

The new enclosed mall is the first in this immediate area and is expected to serve the 100,000 people living in the 60-mile radius of Brownwood.

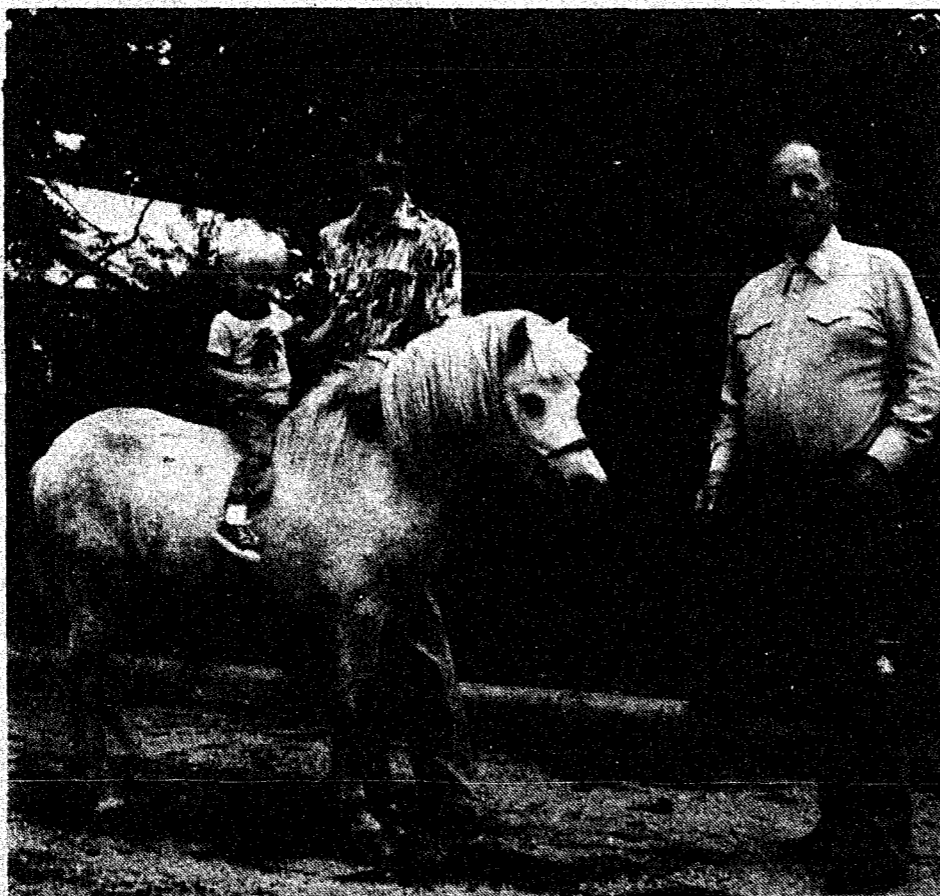

First Baptist Anniversary Slated Sunday, October 12

The 100th anniversary at First Baptist Church will be observed Sunday, October 12, with special activities planned during the day. Former members and pastors of the church are invited to be present for the occasion. Several former pastors will be present and take part on the afternoon program.

Santa Anna Young People Injured in Auto Wreck

Danna Pelton, 21, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. (Tex) Wright, is in Harris Medical Center in Fort Worth being treated for very serious injuries she received in an auto accident Thursday night of last week near Bangs. The young woman was a passenger in the 1967 Ford Mustang that was wrecked two and one-half miles south of Bangs.

Mark Martin, 16, was driver of the vehicle that is owned by Miss Pelton. He suffered a broken arm in the accident and was treated and released from Brownwood Regional Hospital. Also injured in the mishap were Melissa Moore, 21, who suffered a skull fracture and was hospitalized in Brownwood, and Sharon Rendon, 24, who was treated for cuts and bruises and released. Kenneth Patterson, 21 was uninjured in the accident.

According to Jim Byars, DPS Patrolman who investigated the accident, the vehicle went out of control on a county road and struck a utility pole. The car was demolished in the mishap.

Miss Pelton received emergency treatment in Brownwood before being transferred to the Fort Worth hospital. She underwent surgery for a broken vertebra and will be in a body cast and hospitalized for three to six weeks. There is no paralysis from the mishap, according to her mother.

She was transferred from the intensive care unit to the Jones Building, Harris Hospital, Room 294-B, where she may be addressed by those wishing to send cards and letters.

Day Care Center Will Not Open

The day care center planned in Santa Anna will not be opening as scheduled, according to Sharon Guthrie and Glenda Keeney. There was not enough response at the pre-registration to warrant the center, so it will not be opened at the present time.

New City Water System Is Being Connected

As a final phase of the new city water project, the water meters at each residence are being connected to the new lines. As each meter is connected, the water lines are flushed and tested for

leaks. Water will be turned off at each home at some time during the next two weeks as the new lines are put into service. Residents will be notified before the water is turned off if someone is at home at the time. The water service should be disrupted only a short time at each home.

The water project is expected to be completed soon, but some delay may be caused by the recent rains.

Good Rains Reported in Area

While some neighboring towns were flooded by the rain during the past week, the dry Santa Anna soil just soaked up the moisture without any damage. The rainfall from Tuesday night of last week through Tuesday, September 30, totaled 5.20 inches at the official gauge at the R. W. Balke home.

Rainfall measured up to seven inches in parts of the community, with the Gouldsbush area receiving more than that. Rockwood received good rains, filling the lake that was damaged in the last rain.

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Training Planned Here In Tractor Maintenance

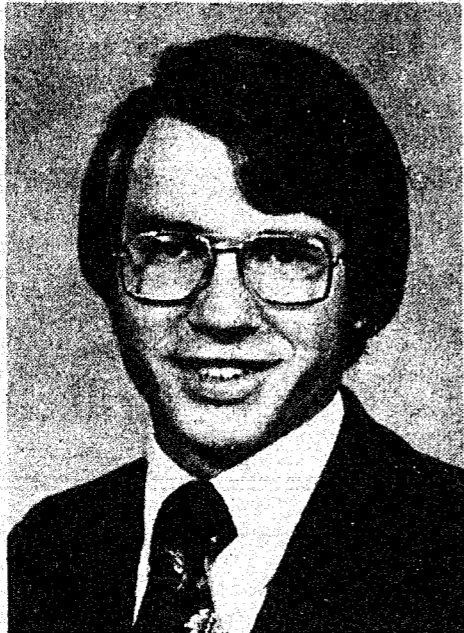
A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held October 20 - 23 under the sponsorship of the Santa Anna High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Scott Patterson, teacher of vocational agriculture and R. C. Smith, superintendent.

Richard Pivonka, tractor maintenance specialist from the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Pivonka received his B.S. degree in Mechanized Agriculture from Texas A&M in 1975. From June 1975 until April 1977 he worked for Rio Grande Valley Sugar Growers, Inc. as a Mechanical Equipment Foreman. He was responsible for the maintenance of a wide variety of shop and field equipment.

The short course at Santa Anna is scheduled to begin Monday, October 20, at 7 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. It will continue each evening through Thursday at 7 p.m.

During the time the course is in progress, Mr. Pivonka

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call Mr. Patterson or Supt. Smith. A fee of \$5 will be charged.

Tractor Maintenance Short Course certificates will be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Rate Increase Requested By West Texas Utilities

West Texas Utilities Company has filed application for a general rate increase, Charles Wetsel, local manager announced.

The official filing was made Tuesday, September 30, with incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to customers outside incorporated towns.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$12,729,619. This amounts to 8.27 per cent based on revenues of \$153,914,156 for the test period ending this past June 30.

The company requested that the new rates become effective November 4.

One of the basic reasons for the increase was cited as inflation.

"The cost of providing electric service continues to increase more rapidly than revenue," the manager said.

This rate adjustment would be only the second general retail rate increase in the company's entire history, which goes back more than 50 years. The other increase was in 1973 and amounted to about six per cent across the board.

Several reasons were given as to how WTU has been able to manage without a rate increase during the past several years of double-digit inflation. Chief among these was the timing of WTU's power plant construction. Its newest and largest station was completed in the mid-1970s and provided generation reserves sufficient not only to last for several years but to allow profitable energy sales to other companies.

The company also cited its reputation as a conservative company with firm control of its expenditures.

However, the WTU manager said, the company can no longer absorb the effects of inflation without risking a dangerous decline in its financial condition. Of neces-

sity, the company is entering into a multi-year construction program which will include a new coal-fired power plant and several high voltage transmission line projects.

The proposed rates were based on detailed analyses of each customer rate class, including studies of their energy usage patterns, the investment required to serve them, and the cost of operation applicable to those customers.

The Company's rate structure, which now has over 125 rates for many types and classes, would be reduced to less than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different customer classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.

For example, the typical residential electric bill would increase by about 10 per cent.

The cost of fuel has risen from 23 cents per million BTU in 1972 to \$1.96 this past summer. Generally, this fuel cost is the only increased expense that has been shared by the customer under WTU's recent rate schedule.

The city has several options in responding to WTU's rate request. It may approve the increase, deny the increase, or suspend the rates for a certain period of time. The city also has the option of denying the request and ceding future jurisdiction to the Public Utility Commission.

Mountaineers Lose Game; Battle Wildcats Friday

The Santa Anna High School football team took on the Blanket Tigers last Friday night and lost a close game 6 - 0. Although termed the underdogs in the game, the Mountaineers played an exceptional game, holding the strong team to one second-quarter touchdown. A steady rain did not dampen the two teams' playing, although three fumbles were lost by each of the opponents.

Blanket, ranked fifth in Class A standings, dominated the statistics with 15 first downs to Santa Anna's eight. They also had 184 yards rushing and 57 yards passing to the Mountaineers' 140 yards total offense.

Coach Roger Goodwin was pleased with the team's effort and praised the boys for the good game. Blanket now has a 4-0 record while Santa

Anna dropped to 3-1 for the season.

Santa Anna will host Rising Star Friday night in a 7:30 game. Rising Star is 1-3 for the season, but has a strong defense and will play a tough game.

CLASS OF 1955

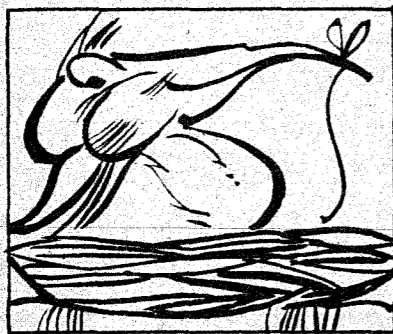

Detection Essential For S-worm Program Success

Livestock producers need to check their animals closely for possible screw-worm infestations, Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said today.

"It is essential in the Kinney County area where a confirmed screwworm case was found in a sheep near Brackettville about two weeks ago. If there are additional screwworms there, this is the time they will be hatching," Dr. Holcombe explained.

It is also vital for cattlemen in all parts of the state to check more closely now since this is the beginning of the usual Fall build-up of screwworms.

If you think it is too much of a bother to check for screwworms in your cattle consider the chore of Joe Bloodworth of Del Rio, staff member of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Bloodworth checks screw-worm fly traps along a 200-mile stretch of the Rio Grande River. The traps are on 15 ranches. Each trap is

baited and tied in a tree to intercept the route of flies. Trapped flies are inspected to make sure no native screw-worm flies go unreported.

Bloodworth makes his run twice a week over some of the roughest terrain in Texas. He also uses a microscope to detect any possible native screwworm fly.

Additional elements of the plan include distributing sterile screwworm flies over 5,600 square miles in the vicinity of the Kinney County case; pellets containing an insecticide are also air-dropped.

If you find an infected wound on an animal, get a sample of the larvae and mail it in postage-free mailing kits to the laboratory at Mission. The kits are available at county agent's offices, veterinarians, or Animal Health Commission area offices.

Treat all wounds on animals to prevent screwworm infestations. "Producer cooperation is the key in keeping Texas screwworm-free," Dr. Holcombe said.

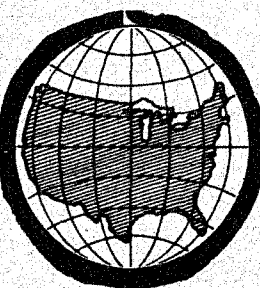

Seed varieties are dwindling, scientist warns

COLLEGE STATION

Some species of food crops are threatened with extinction as a result of a dwindling variety of plant seeds, says a genetic scientist at Texas A&M University.

"Scientists have been narrowing the gene pool through hybridization, making it difficult to find the old genetic varieties that could be used if the modern seed strains become diseased or are changed by the environment," said Dr. Homer Blackhurst, professor emeritus of horticulture.

Blackhurst explained the newer food crops have been developed to make mechanical harvesting easier to permit the highest possible output for large-scale production.

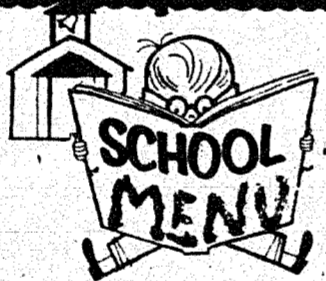

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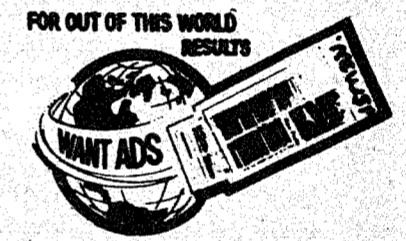
