## Zone Title Showdown Set

### Mountaineers To Host Bronte Friday; West Zone Championship "Up for Grabs"

The West Zone championship in District 7-A is on the line for Santa Anna this week when the Mountaineers meet the Bronte Longhorns at the Santa Anna stadium at 7:30 p.m. Friday night.

The Mountaineers won over Cross Plains 43 - 12 last week to keep their unblemished district record, while Bronte lost their first district contest to Miles by a 20 - 0 score. A victory will give Santa Anna the Zone title, while a loss will put the title in a tie.

Rusty Buzzard set up the first TD when he intercepted a Buffalo pass and ran it back to the one yard line. Dwayne Warnock scored on the next play and Buzzard kicked the PAT.

Warnock recovered a fumble and Buzzard passed to Clifton for the second score. Albert Collins scored before the quarter ended.

The Mountaineers scored 23

points in the second quarter that included two runs by Ernest DeLeon and a 26-yard field goal by Buzzard.

The third quarter ended the scoring for the Mounties, with Warnock and Collins making TDs for the home team. The Buffaloes scored their points in the last stanza of the game.

Coach Roger Goodwin cited Randy Casey, Mike Salazar and Rusty Buzzard as defensive stand-outs in the game. Each of the backfield players were recognized for their outstanding offensive performance in the game.

The Mountaineers will be

seeking their first Zone or District title since 1972, with a good support needed by the Santa Anna football boosters.

Bronte will come to Santa Anna with a 7-2 season record and 3-1 in district. The other contender for the title is Miles with an identical record.

Santa Anna is 8-1 for the season, losing only to Blanket, the East Zone contender.

## Cotton Harvest Well Underway

The cotton harvest is continuing in our area, with 137 bales of cotton processed at the Santa Anna Co-Op Gin during the past two weeks.

The cotton is coming in steadily and is of good quality. Price for cotton this week ranged from 70 to 74 cents per pound. Most of the cotton is from the Gouldbush - Mozelle area of the county.

Over 1,700 bales of cotton were ginned here last year, and that many or more expected this season.

Santa Anna will compete for a UIL rating that range from Division I (superior) to Division V. The local musicians received

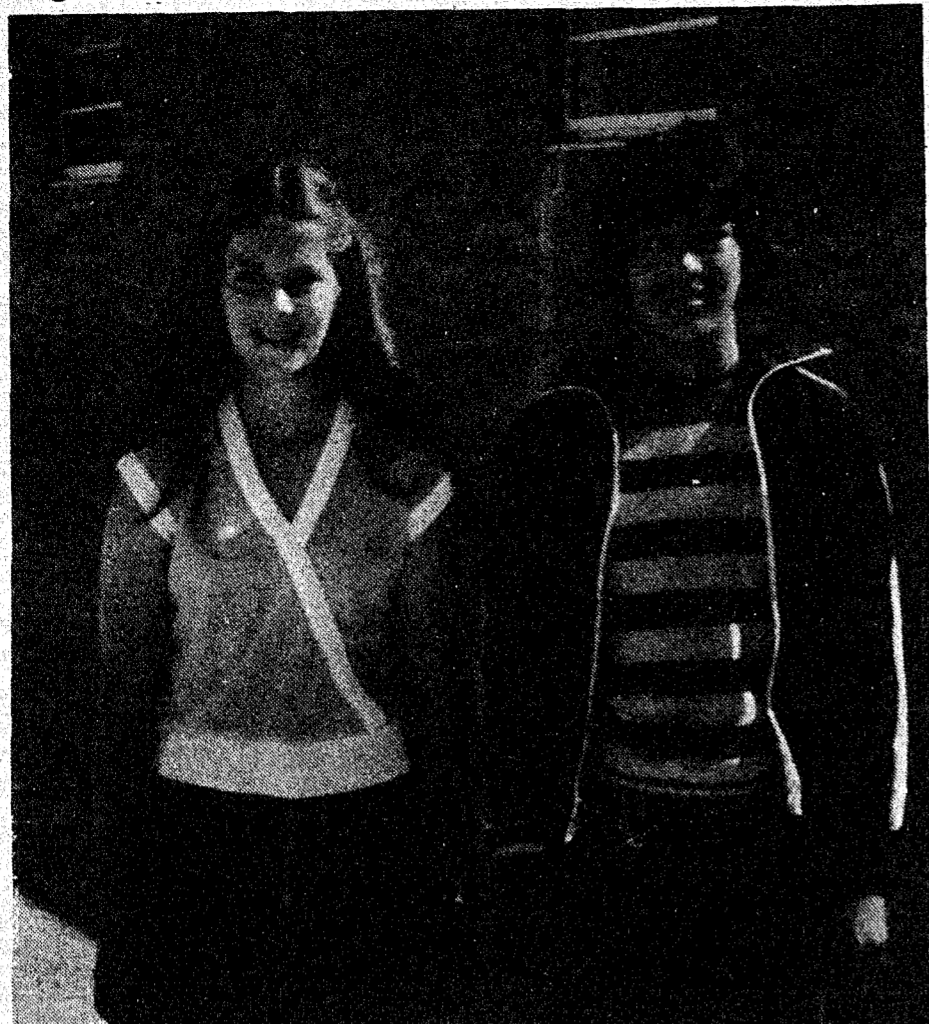
a II rating (excellent) last year. Other bands in the class A group will be Eden, Goldthwaite, Cross Plains and German.

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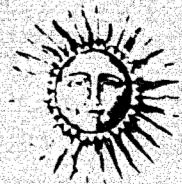

## Rites Held on Thursday For Former Santa Annan

Judge Walter C. Holt, 79, of Coleman and formerly of Santa Anna, the Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1, died Tuesday, October 28, in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene after a long illness. Funeral services were held Thursday, October 30, at Walker Funeral Chapel in Coleman with burial in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Rev. Charlis Schuler, pastor of Coleman First Presbyterian Church, officiated at the services, assisted by Rev. Clark Ford, area minister of the Christian Church from Abilene.

Mr. Holt was born in Coleman County March 4, 1901, the son of the late J. D. and Mattie Holt. He married Pauline Bull in Coleman October 31, 1933 and was a lifetime resident of Coleman County.

He attended the Santa Anna schools and Trinity University at Waxahachie.

In 1955 he was elected Commissioner of Precinct 2, a post he held for two terms. He was then elected Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1, the position he was holding at the time of his death. He was a member and elder of First Presbyterian Church of Coleman.

Surviving are his wife of Coleman; a daughter and

son-in-law, Paula Ruth and Bill Robinett of Brady; a grandson and his wife, Jeff and Denise Robinett of Fort Worth; a granddaughter and her husband, Jodie Anne and Raul Gonzales of Brownwood; another grandson, Joel Paul Robinett of Brady; and a great-grandson, John Dallas Gonzales of Brownwood.

Other survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Leoma Caudle of Port Arthur and Mrs. Ruth Bettis of Austin; and one brother, Roy Holt of Copperas Cove.

## Herpes viruses harm catfish, too

COLLEGE STATION — Herpes, the same group of viruses that produce cold sores and shingles in humans, can kill large numbers of stocker-size channel catfish. Texas A&M University scientists want to find out how and why because of the impact on commercial farms.

The studies at Texas A&M are still basic in nature, dealing with latency, immune response and molecular biology, said researchers.

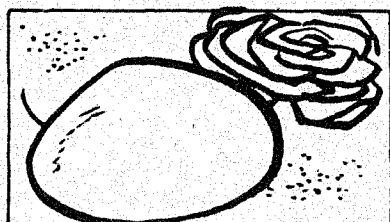

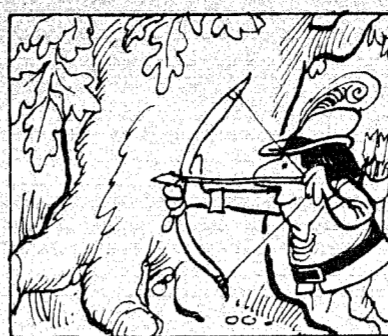

## Everyone's Work Clothes Affect On-the-Job Safety

People wear their work clothes for eight hours or more a day, which is more than just about any other set of clothes. Not only are they worn a lot, but work clothes affect their owners' safety and health. Even office workers' clothes can endanger them, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

Although not as dangerous as for manual laborers, office workers' ties, jewelry, and other objects can get caught in some typewriters and other office machines, possible damaging apparel, people and machinery.

Worse yet, office workers often are ill-prepared for occasional lifting or other manual labor so high-heel shoes or men's slick-soled leather shoes can interfere with even simple physical tasks.

There is probably no way

for office workers to avoid wearing ties and other possibly dangerous clothing. But just being aware of hazards can help avoid many mishaps, TMA says.

Other types of workers should make a special effort to wear safe clothing. Even clothes' cleanliness can make a difference since clean clothes are less likely to catch fire than greasy or chemical-contaminated garments. Work clothes should have safe sleeves and cuffs that cannot get caught in machinery. Long belts and jewelry that might get caught also should be avoided. Even

## New energy source found in desert plants

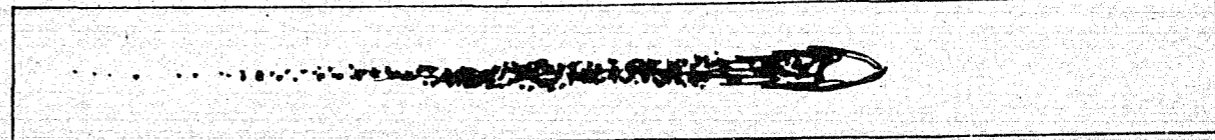
COLLEGE STATION — The search for alternate energy sources has led Texas A&M University and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers to the desert.

Scraggly shrubs like guayule, jojoba and euphorbia contain a rubber-like latex which scientists hope to convert into such commodities as rubber, lubricant and ethanol.

Such plants, which require little water and are among nature's most efficient solar collectors, are a key to any renewable resource money, say Texas A&M scientists.

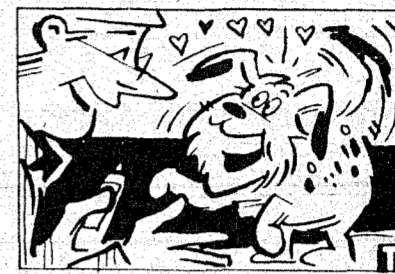

### Name Changes Should Be Reported

"I, Priscilla Mullens, take thee John Alden as my lawful wedded spouse..." Miles Standish was the only one Priscilla had to inform about her impending name change. Nowadays, it's important that the Social Security Administration learn about your name change when it happens, whether the change is due to marriage, divorce, or any other reason.

It's essential that you inform the Social Security office not only because of future benefits, but also because mixups about names and social security numbers account for many of the delays IRS experiences in getting tax refund checks out.

When problems in processing tax returns are attributable to social security number confusion, it turns out that over 50% of them are due to a name change.

When there are no mistakes on the tax return, a taxpayer will receive his or her refund

check on an average of within 6-8 weeks of filing. When the name and social security number on the return do not match, the processing time is often doubled -- and some returns may take even longer than that to be processed. Since between 75 and 80 percent of us receive refunds, this is worth remembering -- and worth letting Social Security know about your new name.

### Sound waves used to detect track flaws

COLLEGE STATION — An improved technique using ultra-high frequency sound waves for detecting flaws in railroad tracks is being developed by engineering researchers at Texas A&M University.

Each year rail failures are the single greatest cause of train derailments throughout the country. Many flaws in the rails remain undetected, despite a large fleet of flaw detector cars inspecting several hundred thousand miles of track annually, said researcher Dr. Don E. Bray, a Texas A&M mechanical engineering professor.

Present methods depend on a less sophisticated system to locate and identify dangerous weak points in the rails.

The new technique under study by Bray sends ultra-high frequency sound waves into the metal and measures their echoes, akin to the technique used in radar.

The study is funded by U.S. Department of Transportation and is a continuation of rail safety research conducted by Bray during the last 16 years.

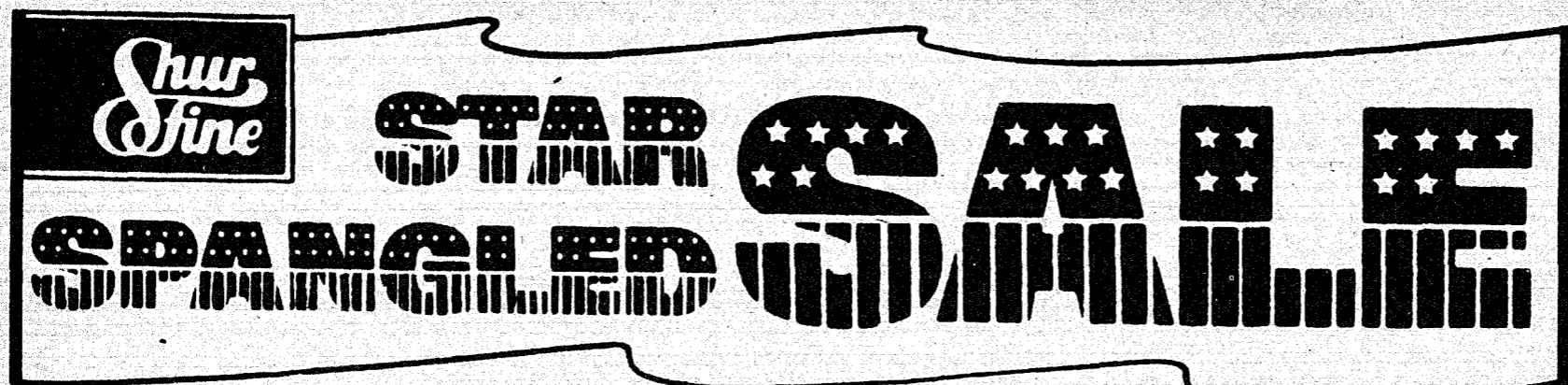

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# High-Fashion Hazards Information Given On Chain Saw Safety

## Women Now Wearing

Women looking at the fall shoe selection should keep in mind that many high-heel styles not only are fit for a fall—they also can be just the right thing to cause strains and pains from the toes to the back.

The Texas Medical Association (TMA) also warns that narrow, pointed-toe shoes can cause problems such as bunions or Morton's neuroma, a condition that occurs when narrow shoes squeeze foot bones which then painfully mash nerves. Repeated jolts or blows to the foot also can cause the condition, which may be relieved by wearing wider shoes, pads for the ball of the foot, other shoe pads recommended by a doctor, or possibly surgery.

Considering that feet absorb approximately 1,000 tons of force a day, much of it on hard pavement, it's amazing that feet survive the approximately 70,000 miles they carry a person during a lifetime. But bad shoes do cause break-downs. One orthopedic surgeon estimates that women have 40 times more bunion surgery than men mainly because of feminine shoe styles.

Some women wear high heels for years and never have problems. But others' feet, possibly 20 percent of the female population, are not as hardy and they fall victim to painful foot problems. Many of these problems are caused because high heels shift a lot of weight forward onto the ball of the foot. Over a long period of time, tissues may bend and cause painful deformities.

A bunion is one such deformity that occurs when a big bump appears at the outside base of the big toe. Some bunions seem to be inherited but narrow shoes with high heels can aggravate any tendencies. One possible solution is buying shoes that don't cramp a bunion and cause irritation and swelling. A physician's recommendations

might include surgery, wearing prescription shoes, or taking drugs to relieve pain.

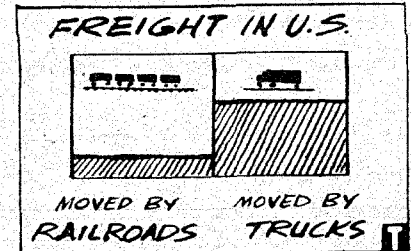
Shoe problems do not end with tortured toes. High heels can cause someone to fall off them and twist an ankle if she is not used to wearing them. Spike heels can get caught while walking and some clog styles even cause women to fall while walking up stairs.

Problems can creep on up to the back because high heels change the way someone steps and may stretch and strain ankles, knees and the back.

Many women probably will not want to avoid problem-causing shoe styles entirely. But it could help to alternately wear more sensible shoes and be aware of possible falls when wearing high-fashion hazards, TMA says.

### FACTS & FIGURES

Trucks have stretched their miles per gallon a surprising 25 to 40 percent during the last seven years. As a result, they are saving 100,000 barrels of fuel a day.



The right combination of fuel-efficient options on a truck can save the operator more than \$5,000 a year, says U.S. Dept. of Transportation data, if he drives at least 100,000 miles. He is likely to do that, too, since trucks serve all the nation's towns and cities.

Buzzing sound of chain saws at work fill the air this time of year—sounds that can signal impending danger.

"A chain saw is one of the most potentially dangerous power tools on the market today," points out Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Individuals using lightweight chain saws for trimming trees, cutting firewood or clearing land should be aware of hazards associated with their use."

Each year some 23,000 persons require hospital emergency room treatment for chain saw injuries, Nelson points out. Two of every three chain saw injuries to operators and bystanders are caused by inadvertent direct contact with the chain saw blade due to a failure to follow recommended

operating procedures. Chain saw accidents occur in many different ways. For instance, an operator may reach across or hold work too near the moving saw. Or he may lose control of the saw through loss of footing, sudden turns, climbing above ground level, shifting of the saw's weight while cutting at or above waist level, or through chain saw "kickback."

"Kickbacks can occur when something touches the top of the saw blade, causing the saw to jump or kick back at the operator," explains Nelson. "Kickbacks may also occur when the chain is misfiled or loose, when a cut is started too slowly, or when the blade nose strikes another object."

In addition, if the bumper at the rear end of the blade is not against the wood being cut, the chain riding across the wood may jerk the saw forward and out of the operator's hands.

According to the engineer, protective equipment is important to safe operation of a chain saw. He suggests protecting the eyes, head, ears, feet and hands from injury by wearing protective eyewear, a bump cap, heavy shoes and light, non-slip gloves. Ear

protectors are also a good investment for prolonged use of a chain saw.

"Another key step in chain saw safety is to keep the saw in good working order," emphasizes Nelson. "This includes sharp saw teeth, correct chain tension, proper lubrication and a properly tuned engine."

As a minimum precaution, study and understand the owner's manual before making the first cut, adds the engineer.
