

School Enrollment Chief Appraiser Selected **Shows Increase** For County Tax District

Enrollment at the Santa Anna schools is up slightly from the first week's figure of 1979. There are a total of 381 children in the kindergarten through twelfth grade. The total last year was 359.

According to Gerald Brister, high school principal, there are 99 students this year compared to 100 during the first week of the past year. There are 25 seniors, 34, juniors, 19 sophomores and 21 freshmen.

Charles Brewster, elementary principal, listed 282 students including four in the MHU unit

Class numbers by grades include kindergarten, 37; first, 19 and 18; second, 23; third, 19 and 21; fourth 19 and 19; fifth, 23; sixth, 28; seventh, 23; and eighth, 29.

John Skelton, a former Coleman County Tax Assessor-Collector, was chosen Chief Appraiser for the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District at the meeting of the Board Friday, August 29, in Coleman. He will assume the new position January 1, 1981 at a salary of \$22,500 per year.

Other applicants for the position were David Cooper of Comanche, Max Eubank of Santa Anna and Judi Wilkinson of Coleman.

Mr. Skelton is currently (special education) at the Civic serving as tax assessor and collector for the rural school districts of Mozelle, Santa Talpa-Centennial and Anna, Novice.

After serving as County Tax Assessor- Collector from 1957 through 1973, Skelton served as

Chief Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector of Crockett County and Ozona Schools from 1973 - 1975. His office for the rural school districts is currently located in Coleman.

He has been certified as a Registered Professional Assessor, a requirement for the position that has been mandated by the State Legislature.

Harold Pittard of Novice is chairman of the County Tax Appraisal District Board, presiding at the Friday meeting.

The next meeting of the Board will be Wednesday, September 10, at 4 p.m. The meetings are open to the public, and those interested may meet with the group at the Commissioners Court room in the County Courthouse.






On a lighter note, the group was entertained by Rev. Sanders singing a parody on Billy Boy accompanied by Mrs. Bruce at the piano.



Deer Population High; Large Hunt Encouraged

Recent rains resulting from hurricane activity will have little affect on deer herds in

Southwest Texas and the Rio Grande Plains, according to Dr. Dwight Guynn, area wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Some new plant growth will be generated from the moisture, received, but most of the damage has already been done by the extended drouth, he points out.

"It's a classic case of too little rain received too late to be a great deal of help," Guynn says. "Some deer on the brink of starvation will be saved, but the number won't be significant."

Guynn continues to emphasize that overpopulation of deer in certain areas has resulted in large starvation deaths, up to 60 percent in some parts of the Hill Country and South Texas. Even with such losses, Guynn says ample deer will be available in most areas of Texas for hunting this fall.

"There should be plenty around, but hunters will be confronted with more smaller, inferior deer which have survived the drouth but suffered its effects. Antlers may be somewhat smaller this year due to the lack of nutrition which occurred this summer when the bucks were developing them."

Guynn stresses that good antler development is directly associated with proper nutrition, a luxury that deer and other wildlife species have been virtually without most of the year.

This year Guynn is encouraging landowners and ranchers to harvest more does than in recent hunting seasons. These 'reproductive factories' of the deer herd, if left untouched, will continue to re-populate, continuing the cycle and resulting in more deer than ranges can support.

Guynn suggests that a significant doe harvest in most areas this fall is the only measure outside starvation that can keep deer numbers in balance with deer food sources.

The wildlife expert looks upon the approaching hunting season as a true test for many landowners and wild game hunting operators.

Car care protects investment

COLLEGE STATION — An automobile has become too valuable an investment to ignore its maintenance needs, says an automotive specialist at the Texas Transportation Institute.

Service station attendants who once spotted danger signs and recommended action are not seeing as many cars today and warning signs that repairs are needed often go unnoticed, says Rick Tonda of the transportation institute at Texas A&M University.

Tonda recommends that a car owner shop around and find an inspection station that does a thorough job.

The rest of the year, the owner who has no automotive skills should either seek expert checks and pay for them or learn to watch for extreme wear and possible failures, Tonda advises.

Pet owners warned not to leave pets in hot, closed cars

COLLEGE STATION — As summer temperatures continue in the 100s, pet owners should avoid leaving their animals shut up in the car for more than a few minutes — if at all — says a Texas A&M University expert.

When temperatures inside a closed auto soar to 140 degrees or more, the pets inside quickly succumb to often-fatal heat stroke, said Dr. Robert Playter, head of the small animal clinic at Texas A&M's College of Veterinary Medicine.

Home prices are up,
but sales are down

COLLEGE STATION — The number of previously owned homes sold in Texas during the first quarter of 1980 was down 5.2 percent from the same period in 1979, but prices were up 14.6 percent.

Dr. Arthur Wright, research economist with the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University said the drop in sales was a result of the unavailability of mortgage funds, high interest rates and the general slowdown in the economy.

Wright said if housing sales continue to lag, home prices may stabilize or even drop.

"With mortgage rate declining, both sales volume and prices likely will increase during the next several months," he explained.

If it could be seen that the faith of such selfish, overreaching, money-loving men, to men who love to do good, who seek opportunities to use their means to bless those who need to be blessed, who visit the widow and fatherless in their affliction, and who keep themselves unspotted from the world, it would be an evidence that their religion was genuine.... Those who profess to be waiting and watching for the appearing of their Lord should not disgrace their profession by bantering in deal and standing for the last penny. Such fruit does not grow upon the Christian tree.

The tenth commandment strikes at the very root of all sins, prohibiting the selfish desire, from which springs the sinful act. He who in obedience to God's law refrains from indulging even a sinful desire for that which belongs to another, will not be gulty of an act of wrong toward his fellow-creatures.

The ballooning crime rate among campers is so striking that a Texas A&M University park expert warns campers from the city not to leave their street sense at home when venturing into the wilds.

"For some reason, people in a big park seem to think they are completely safe and secure, said Dr. Jim Fletcher, a professor in Texas A&M's Department of Recreation and Parks. "They don't put gear away. They don't lock their cars. It's just as essential to take the same precautions in the woods as they would when they're home in the city," he warned.

Thefts in the state and national park systems have ranged from expensive down sleeping bags to four-wheel drive pickup

Fletcher suggests campers always lock their cars and secure personal possessions like stoves, clothing and sleeping bags when away from the camping site.





Paris A City of Interest **During European Holiday**

Paris, France is a city best seen with a good guide, which Jacqueline Woodward, a French native and former resident of that city, spent several days with us

We stayed at the apartment of the Jacques Thauvins, Jacqueline's cousins, who were vacationing in Corsica and graciously opened their home for us. (They are parents of Blaise Thauvins, a 12-year-old, who visited with us at Santa Anna last summer.)

Over five million people live in the Paris area, with miles and miles of centuries-old apartment buildings of four and five stories housing dozens of families. A one-family house on a separate plot of land is an oddity, and I can't remember seeing more than one or two in the entire city.

The buildings are mostly in perfect condition, with intricate carvings and facades, with the lower floors often housing shops and stores with apartments in the upper floors. Streets and sidewalks are kept clean and attractive, with trees growing along most streets in the city.

We drove down the famous Champs Elysees to the Arc de Triomphe where traffic is six or seven unmarked lanes, with vehicles on the right having the right-of-way. Needless to say, it was a thrilling experience!

We also drove around the Eiffel Tower, an awesome structure that in the past years was listed as one of the 'Seven Wonders of the World'. We also walked along the noted 'Left Bank' of the Seine River where I purchased a pencil sketch from one of the many sidewalk artists.

The best way to get around Paris is to take the subway, and we were able to travel to almost any point from Saint Maur, the suburb where we were staying. Traffic and parking are problems, and sightseeing is best done by foot anyway.

Buildings and places of architectural historic and interest are too numerous to list, but our visits took us to the famous Cathedral of Notre. Dame, dating to the 12th century, the Lourve and Latin Quarter and Twilerie Gardens.

We had dinner one night at a quaint restaurant along the Marne River near Paris, then took a sightseeing boat on the Seine River through the old section of the city. The statues, buildings and landmarks are more beautiful at night, with one of interest being the Statue of Liberty, a smaller version of the one in New York Harbor that France gave to the United States.

We enjoyed shopping in the stores--or mostly just looking--to compare prices of goods and services with those at home. All

of Europe is plagued with inflation, plus the American dollar is of depressed value, so prices seemed very high on everything. Gasoline is approximately \$3.50 per gallon (if computing francs to dollars and liters to gallons was correct.)

The weather was delightful during our stay in Paris. The days were warm and the nights cool and clear. We sat in the sunshine for lunch in a typical sidewalk cafe one day, enjoying the warmth.

We visited Montmarte, a tall white church on a hill north of Paris surrounded by a region that is now an art colony with shops that attract tourists and sightseers. We also drove through the Pigalle section so well-known for the night clubs and entertainment.

One incongrous sight among the ornate buildings in Paris is the Beau Borg, a modern art center that resembles an oil refinery painted in bright colors. The building was quite controversial, but really makes a 'statement' to the world with its unusual architecture.

I was impressed with the preservation of the beautiful old buildings, and we noted the work being done to remove the black film and soot caused by years of pollution from coal smoke and vehicle pollution.

The original city of Paris was settled in the 3rd Century BC on a small island (La Cite) in the Seine River to be fortified from enemies. It was awesome to think of the centuries of history at that place in comparison with our country's relatively short span.



September Is

License Time

AUSTIN...Hunters and fishermen are reminded that September 1 is renewal time for hunting and fishing licenses in Texas.

The 1980-81 hunting and fishing licenses are now available at stores where hunting and fishing equipment is sold, and at department stores across the state.

Resident hunting licenses cost \$5.25 and are required for all Texas citizens who hunt outside the county of their residence or who hunt deer or turkey. Exceptions include persons under 17 or over 65 years of age; persons hunting on land where they reside or certain disabled veterans. However, persons in the above exempted categories still must purchase a \$1.25 resident exempt hunting license to hunt deer or turkey.

Resident fishing licenses cost \$4.50, and they are required of all Texas residents who fish in the state's waters except: persons under 17 or over 65 years of age; persons fishing on property they or members of their family own and reside on; those fishing in their county of residence with trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; persons holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holder of a \$1.25 exempt fishing license available to certain disabled veterans or the blind.

Persons who wish to both hunt and fish may save \$1 by purchasing a resident combination hunting - fishing license for \$8.75.

For full information concerning license requirements and other hunting and fishing laws, consult the 1980-81 Guide to Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations booklet, available at license outlets.

Coleman County Extension Agent, Roger Blackmon said yesterday a local group will go to San Angelo for a September field day.

Sept. 4 is the date of the annual Sheep and Goat Field Day at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

"Producers at the field day," said Blackmon, 'will hear about progress in the search for a bluetongue vaccine."

Registration for the morning program in the Center's auditorium will begin at 9 A.M.

After a Dutch-treat lunch, the Coleman County group will join others for an out-of-doors program.

Besides the serious sheep disease of bluetongue, other topics in the morning will be the Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at College Station and Amarillo, how Texas mohair is measuring up, increasing the productivity of sheep and goats, and the activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assn.

Blackmon said the afternoon program will deal with protected proteins for Angora goats, supplemental protein energy and phosphrus for Angora doe kids, new ideas in shearing, and low-energy as well as low-cost brush and weed control.

COLLEGE STATION — The average price of a previously owned home in a Texas metropolitan area more than doubled from 1973 to 1979, said Dr. Arthur Wright, research economist for the Texas

Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University.

"In 1973 the average price for a used home was \$24,149. By 1979, the price had jumped to \$52,879. This represents an increase of 119 percent in just six years," Wright said.

The increase was blamed on inflation combined with the continued strong demand for single family housing in Texas.

Planting Season For State Flower

Now is the time to plant Bluebonnet seeds--if you can find them.

The crippling drought has reduced the Bluebonnet seed harvest to a fraction of the usual production.

Carroll Abbott of Kerrville-the state's only fulltime wild-flower seed and plant collector-usually sells tons of Bluebonnet seeds each season, but he is now limiting his customers to a maximum of 50 pounds each.

The short supply of seed, however, have an extremely high rate of germination.

"It seems like Mother Nature wanted every seed which was produced to grow," Abbott says. "Our germination rate was tested at the State Seed Laboratory and came out to an amazing 94 per cent."

Despite the shortage, Abbott's mail-order seed firm--Green Horizons--still sells the smaller packages at former prices. A thousand seed, for example, costs \$2.35, including tax and postage. With each order, Abbott sends along cultural notes on how to grow Bluebonnets successfully and a list of nearly 60 other wildflowers which should be planted



Marital Status Often Affects Social Security

Marriages may be made in Heaven, but you may have to have proof of your marriage to get social secutity benefits. If you are already receiving benefits, marriage could reduce or eliminate them altogether.

Knowing how marriage can affect your social security protection can save you a great deal of time and trouble, and perhaps even money. Social security retirement, survivors. and disability benefits are payable to eligible spouses of retired or disabled workers receiving social security. In future financial planning, you should know how much to expect, how to get benefits and how marriage can affect benefits you are already getting.

A spouse is entitled to a benefit amounting to from 31/2 to 50 percent of a retired or disabled partner's full benefit, or from 711/2 to 100 percent of a deceased worker's benefit, depending on the age at which he or she applies.

Widow's or widower's benefits generally are payable beginning at age 60. A disabled widow or widower may get benefits at age 50 provided the disability begins within 7 years after the death of the worker, or within 7 years after mother's or father's benefits stopped.

benefits at age 62 if your spouse gets retirement benefits. A divorced woman may qualify for the same type of benefits on a retired, disabled, or deceased worker's if the marriage lasted

at least 10 years.

In applying for social security benefits as a spouse, you have to prove the marital relationship you have to prove the marital relationship. Generally, this can be done by a marriage certificate or a certified copy of the marriage record.

If there has been no ceremonial marriage, social security follows State law in recognizing common-law marriages. If the State in which you reside recognizes your relationship as legally blinding, we can accept the relationship for social security benefit purposes. Your social security office will tell you what

proofs are required.

Ordinarly, the benefits of a person receiving checks as a dependent or survivor will stop or be reduced if he or she marries or remarries. These include benefits of widows widowers, as wells as children.

Under a relatively new rule. however, benefits to a widow or widower who remarries at age 60 or older can continue without any reduction in the amount.

Also, if a widow or widower remarries a person who is also receiving benefits as a widower or widow, parent, or adult disabled in childhood, the benefits of both parties may continue.

If a higher social security check is possible on the work record of a new spouse, the person may elect to take a social security benefits as a wife or husband.

True Texans are a vanishing breed

COLLEGE STATION — There was a time when to be correctly called a Texan one had to be born in the state.

Those guidelines don't work anymore, says an urban sociologist and state demographer at Texas A&M University.

More than 50 percent of the 2.5 million people added to the state's population during the last decade were "outsiders" who moved to Texas, says Dr. Robert Skrabanek. The remainder of the new residents were born here.

But many old timers wouldn't even consider the newborns true Texans, Skrabanek says, because there is a good chance their parents weren't born in Texas, and that still makes them "newcomers."

Skrabanek estimates that only about 70 percent of Texas' population today could be considered native in the traditional sense.


