## SAHS In District Playoff

Mountaineers Lose to Bronte;

Win Coin Toss For Zone Representative

Despite a loss to Bronte in Friday night's football game, The Santa Anna Mountaineers will compete in the District 7-A championship game this week, meeting the Goldthwaite Eagles at Old Lion Stadium in Brownwood at 7:30 p.m.

Friday night's 21 - 0 loss to the Longhorns put the West Zone in a three-way tie with Santa Anna, Bronte and Miles each having one district loss. Santa Anna won the toss of the coin Saturday and the right to represent the Zone in the play-off.

Goldthwaite was undisputed winner of the East Zone title, having a perfect conference record and losing only three games this season in early season play. Goldthwaite was in Class A last year and dropped to the current classification this year.

The Eagles will be seeking revenge after losing in a close 14-13 game to Santa Anna last year in non-conference play.

The Eagles have a strong team, losing few of their starters from last season.

The Bronte team showed their strong defense last week, shutting down Santa Anna offense and picking off three Mountaineer passes. They also performed well on offense, scoring in the first, second and third quarters.

Santa Anna was held to only 35 yards rushing and made 102 yards on five on 22 passes. They also had only seven first downs to 14 for Bronte.

The Longhorns had 259 yards rushing and no passing

yardage.

The Mountaineers were playing without the services of end Jimmy Clifton who was on the injured list. Clifton and Randy Casey, injured Friday night, will be back in action this week, but Steve Hughes will not be able to see action in the game due to an injury last week.

All Santa Anna football fans are urged to go to the game Friday night and support the team. Santa Anna will be the home team in the game at the Coggin Avenue stadium.

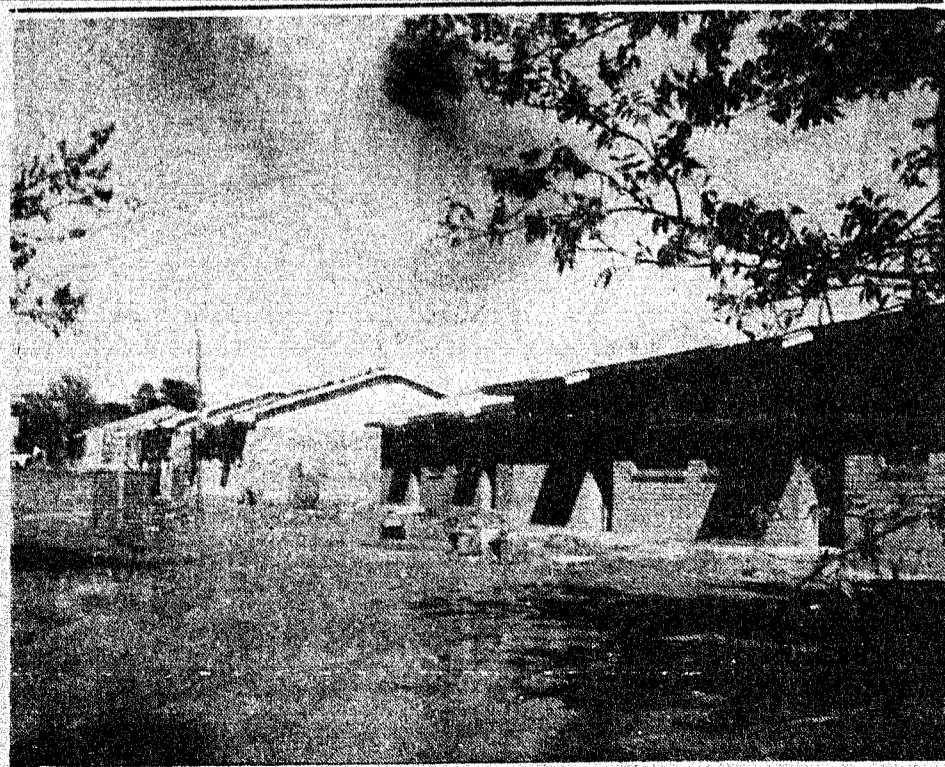
Tara succeeds Sherry Wilson who advanced to the State FFA contest after winning the District and Area IV award.

People here will be interested in the appearance and will want to see the program next Tuesday.

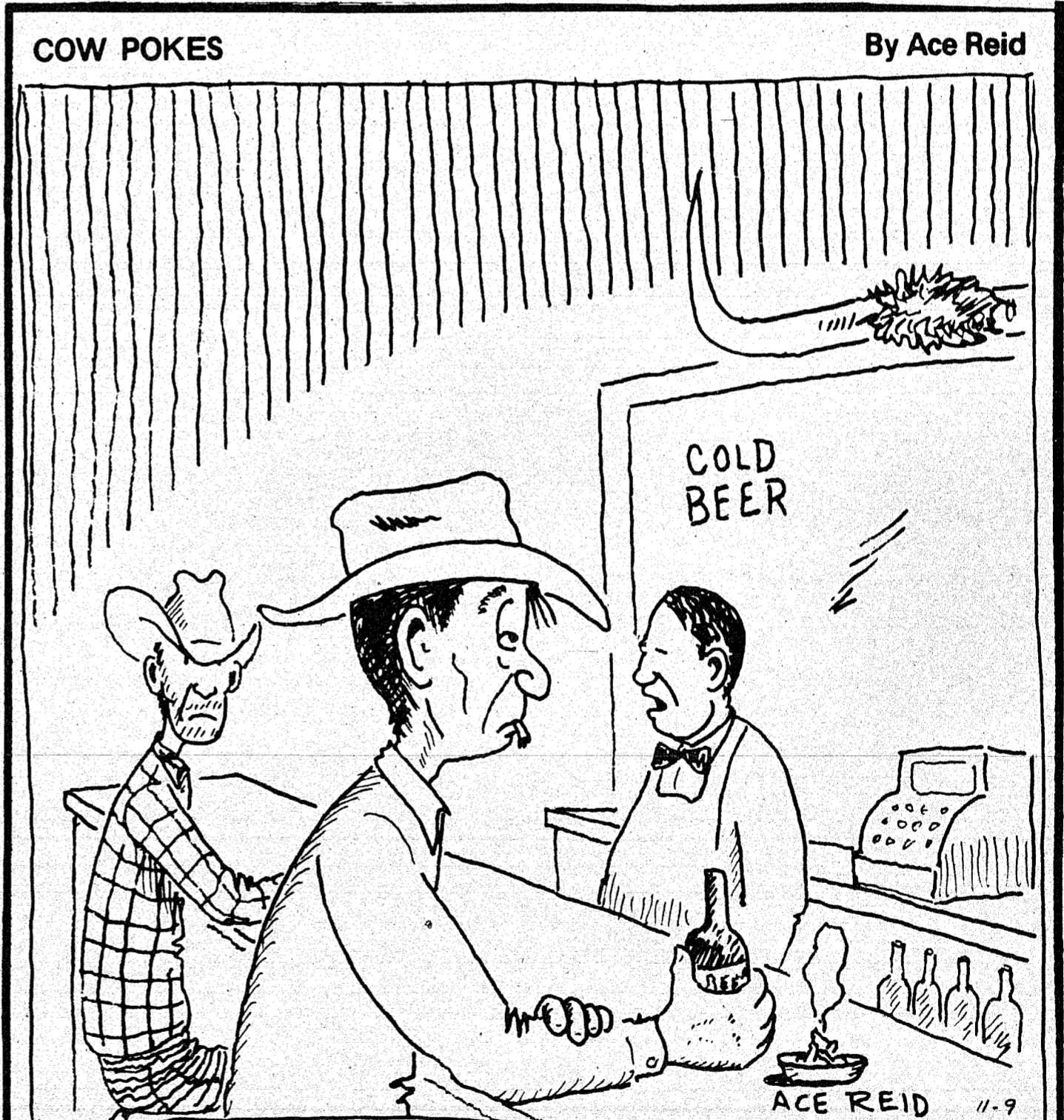
## Roy Stockard To Be Honored

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## Cable System Expanding; New Services to Be Listed

The Brownwood TV Cable System has announced that beginning Monday, December 1, their current customers will enjoy increased viewing with a total of 10 channels. Added by satellite service will be the Christian Broadcasting Network, with talk and music Christian-oriented programming 24 hours a day.

Also added to the basic service currently available will be Channel 17 from Atlanta, featuring movies and sports 24 hours a day.

Another service that will be available on an optional basis will be a channel called Showtime that will feature recently-released motion pictures and entertainment specials and programs, all uncut and without commercial interruption.

Santa Anna customers on the cable lines that have had service can begin signing up for the Showtime channel by calling the Brownwood TV Cable System on their toll-free Enterprise number, 67554. In the last four months, crews from the firm have been installing cable lines in some areas that have not had the service, and the new areas of town should expect to have the service available by February 1. Some delay has occurred in the purchase of electronic parts

due to the increase of cable television installation in the metropolitan areas.

The listings of the new channels and services will be given before December 1. Special introductory prices are being made by the company during the next few weeks, so prospective customers will want to contact the company for more information.

The Cable TV system has been owned and operated by the Brownwood company the past year, purchasing the business from Max Eubank. The system is constantly being improved with new equipment installed to improve signals in Santa Anna.

Santa Anna City Council met in regular session Thursday, November 6, at City Hall with Mayor Thomas Hays presiding.

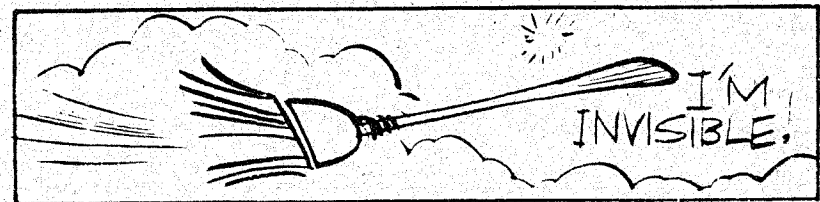
The meeting was held in conjunction with the second hearing on the Community Block Grant that will be available to the City of Santa Anna.

improve 60 local homes, with details of the program and applications to be available soon.

# Agriculture Today

U.S. Department of Agriculture

They say that figures don't lie, but some that a couple of Department reports have put out recently sure give the wrong impression. The first set concerns cash receipts from farming. Those for January through June - the first six months of the year - total \$61 billion. That's not only at a record pace, 4 percent above a year earlier, but about the same as cash receipts from farming for all of 1972. And, more than any full year prior to 1972.

The report shows livestock receipts, at \$33.3 billion, off 3 percent from a year earlier, but receipts from crops, at \$27.7 billion, were up 14 percent from the first six months of 1979.

Another report shows that prices received by farmers are record high for the third

straight month, up nearly 9 percent from a year ago. Soybean prices the highest in more than three years; corn prices at a 5 1/2 year high; wheat, the highest in 10 months!

If you stopped right there, it would appear that everything has turned up roses for the farmer. Trouble is there are more figures in that price report.

Feed prices are up nearly 4 percent in the previous 30 day period, 17 percent higher than they were a year ago. Fuel prices are 25 percent higher than they were a year ago.

Here are some examples on those farm machinery prices. A 5-bottom plow that sold for \$4,890 a year ago, is going for \$5,400 now. A 16-ft. disk har-

row, which sold for \$5,600 just a year ago, now sells for \$6,320. The price on forage harvesters has jumped from \$8,470 to \$10,400 in the past year; combine prices from \$44,900 to \$49,200 during the same time.

What we're trying to say is that it's going to take more than record high prices received by farmers, it's going to take some lower prices paid by farmers to right things.

They show that prices paid by farmers are 12 percent higher than they were a year ago - and still going up. Farm machinery prices are up nearly 4 percent in the previous 30 days, 12 percent higher than they were a year earlier.

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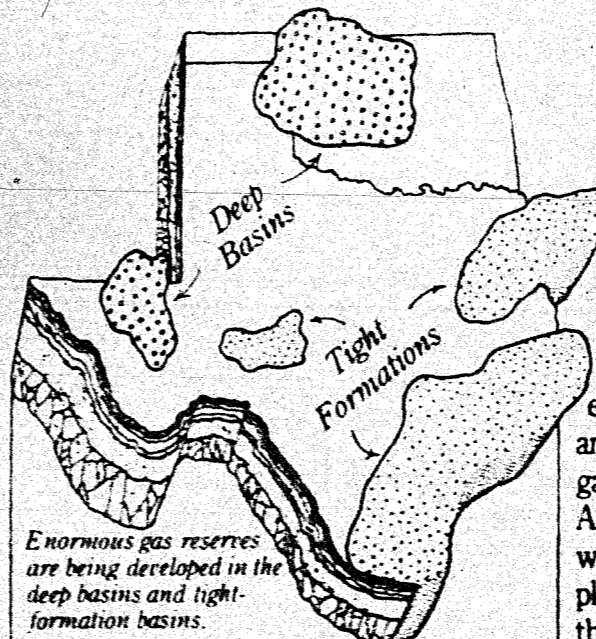

## Fort Worth Newspaper Has Story of Interest

The following article from the October 26 edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram was sent to the Coleman County Chronicle by former Coleman resident Jean Simpson Coulter.

One of a series of suggested weekend tours in the Fort Worth area, the article features the attraction of the lakes in the County.

The newstory is reprinted below for interest of our readers.

If you're looking for lake country, try Coleman, at the junctures of US 84 and 283 and Texas 206.

The county seat of Coleman County in Central Texas is located in an area known as Land of the Lakes.

The reference is understandable. The Coleman area and surrounding region have an abundance of water resources.

Major lakes around Coleman that provide fun and relaxation are Hords Creek Lake, Lake Coleman, Lake Scarborough, Memory Lake and Lake San Tana. In addition, there are more than 70 private lakes throughout the county.

Boating, swimming, water skiing, camping (with electrical hookups provided) and picnicking facilities abound in the area.

And, the Coleman area is just as rich in heritage as in natural resources.

The county itself was named in honor of Robert M. Coleman (aide-de-camp to Gen. Sam Houston), and throughout the county there is documented evidence of life as it was during the early days of settlement.

For example, one of the historical points of interest near Coleman is the town of Santa Anna, located at the south slope of two large hills known as Santa Anna's Peak, named after a Comanche

chief.

Still another is the Outpost of Camp Colorado, a pre-Civil War Cavalry camp located about 8 miles northeast of Coleman on Texas 206.

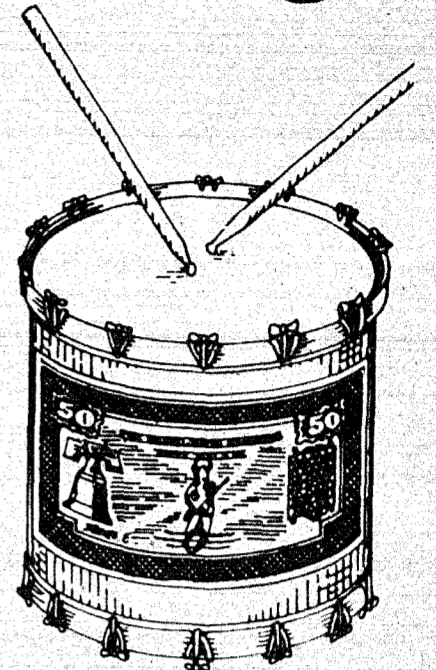
Also of historical interest are the towns of Trickham and Leaday. Trickham is the oldest settlement in the county.

There also are many historical monuments in the area-one commemorates the entry of the first registered Hereford in West Texas.

Coleman, in fact, produces some of the finest purebred cattle, horses, sheep, goats and hogs within the rich grasslands of the Central Texas ranch country. More than 1 million pounds of wool are produced annually, making Coleman the fourth largest wool-producing county in Texas.

Cabins are available at Lake Coleman, and there also is a public camping area at Camp Coleman, although it is not as well developed as the area around Hords Creek Lake.

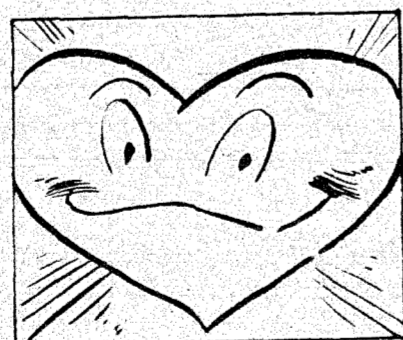

The Novice girls were district winners last year, losing in bi-district to Bronte.

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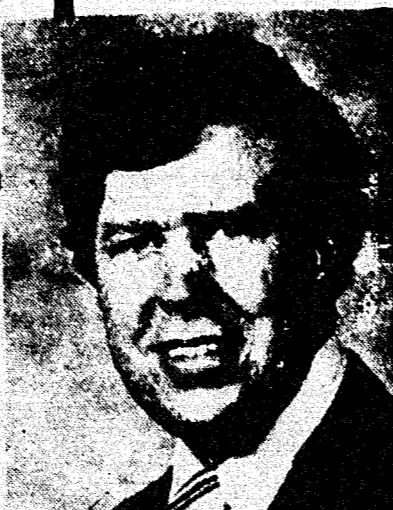

## Know the Times To Contact Social Security

It is important that everyone in the Brownwood area know the proper times to contact social security, Priscilla Tercero social security branch manager in Brownwood said recently.

Knowing the five times action is needed is too important to take for granted, Tercero said. It can mean greater security for local residents and members of their families. A person should contact social security: before he or she gets a first job, because he or she needs a social security number to get proper credit for earning; after a death in the family, to learn if survivor benefits or a lump-sum death payment are payable; when somebody is disabled, to find out if disability benefits are payable; at retirement age; 65 for full cash benefits or as early as 62 for reduced payments; sign up for Medicare 2 or 3 months before 65, even if the person has no plans to stop working; and whenever a person has a question about social security or needs to report a change that will affect monthly benefits.

The people at the Brownwood social security office can tell a person how much work he or she needs to be insured, who can qualify for benefits, how to replace a lost social security or Medicare card, how to get a free statement of his or her earnings record, or what documents are needed when a person applies for benefits.

These and other questions can be answered at the Brownwood social security office at 300 N. Main Bldg. The telephone number is 646-7533.

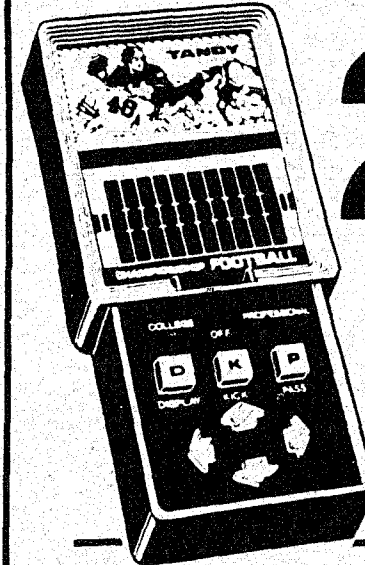

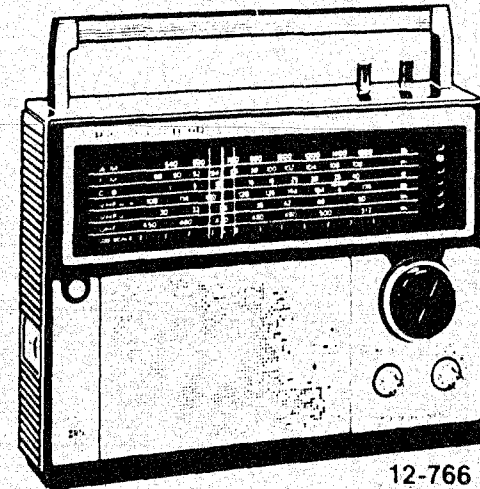
