Parvovirus Booster May Be Needed in Area Dogs

Parvovirus sent dogowners. scurrying for a newly-developed vaccine to protect their dogs earlier this year. While vaccines are credited with curbing the Texas epidemic, field experience indicates that immunity to the virus may be shorter than researchers had hoped. "Recent reports from veterinarians throughout the state indicate that the new viral disease is still endemic (consistently present in a given area) and boosters are being called for," said Dr. Emmett of Houston. "Parvovirus conbe tinues to a deadly problem."

"The need for immunization for all dogs in imperative,' stressed Emmett. The initial immunization program consists of two properly-spaced immunizations, with booster vaccines as directed by a veterinarian. Puppies should start immunizations from five to eight weeks of age. "Conditions of the animal and intensity of the disease in various areas determine when the dog should receive another vaccination," said Emmett.

Parvovirus is a new disease-a viral enteritis that was unknown before 1978. The disease reached epidemic proportions in 1980. Symptoms are depression and loss of appetite, followed by vomiting and diarrhea. Dehydration is the main concern. Death can sometimes come in a day because of the loss of body fluids.

"Prompt treatment at the very first sign of any of the symptoms means many dogs can be treated successfully,' said Emmett. "Waiting to see if the dog gets better may mean the dog won't receive the treatment in time to survive."

Treatment involves intravenous fluids to combat dehydration, intestinal relaxants to reduce the vomiting, and administration of electrolytes and antibiotics.

Vaccine was in short supply earlier this year, but Dr. Emmett said the supply now appears to be adequate. Research is underway to develop a vaccine to provide a longer lasting immunity.

Dr. Emmett urged dogowners to consult their veterinarian immediately for more

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

Colorsounds aids reading, spelling

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — What helps squirmy junior high students improve in reading and spelling? Colorsounds.

It uses songs to teach sight words and the 16 common vowel sounds of English. Color-coding the dictionary markings of the sounds is part of the program devised by Mike Bell, University of Texas doctoral student.

Youngsters first learn vowel sounds and their colors. Then, given the words to a song which is played in class, they identify the sounds in the song and color-code them. At home, students reinforce their learning by counting how many times each sound occurs in the song and by writing source words in a notebook.



Brussels, Belgium A Tourist's Delight

From Holland our tour traveled to Belgium, where farms and countryside were neat and clean like we had seen in most other countries of Europe. Belgium has been an independent nation since 1813 and now has a population of 1,300,000 people. The Flemish language is most widely spoken, and the land is very flat with farms mostly stocked with cattle.

We arrived in Brussels in mid-afternoon and were awestruck by the beauty of the architecture and historical significance of the city. We passed the Royal country palace that appeared to be 50 or so heavily wooded acres surrounded by a high wall. Across the road from the palace is the Chinese Pavillion that is quite a tourist attraction, with a large pagoda building surrounded by Oriental gardens.

On into the city we passed the Botanical Gardens and the near-by Royal Palace where armed guards were standing at attention. Brussels is head-quarters for NATO and the Common Market.

The city has narrow cobblestone streets with old and new buildings crowded along the downtown area. Most of the old buildings were completely blackened by pollution from vehicle exhaust fumes.

Our tour group had dinner at our hotel, then went on a sightseeing tour to the Hall of Justice and the famous St.

Michael's Square.

The buildings in the square were some of the most ornate I saw on the tour, with much gold leaf and other decorations. The Hall of Justice was one of the few sites that was being cleaned by sand-blasting, and I wished to see the beautiful buildings in their original state.

Shops had lavish displays of the beautiful Brussels lace and other handwork, along with the usual souvenirs that were in shops all over Europe. We walked around the large square among hundreds of other tourists, where in the carnival-like atmosphere vendors were selling all sorts of tasty-looking things to eat and drink.

After spending the night in Brussels, we drove to the town of Bruges in the Flanders Region of Belgium. We stopped in the town square where we spent about an hour sightseeing among the buildings and statues that date to the 12th century. Featured at the town square is a huge market place that houses a carrilion in the clock tower.

My only purchase that morning was a bag of delicious chocolate candy, chosen from dozens of kinds in a candy shop. Belgium is famous for its chocolate. Bruges is not as

crowded as most of the other places we visited, and we walked leisurely about the downtown area.

As we left the city, we traveled southwest through the low farmland, our highway parallel to a large canal where barges were anchored. People were enjoying the sunshine that day and fishing or picnicing along the canal.

For the first time on the tour, there was an American channel on television at our hotel and some American music on the radio.

I keenly missed hearing news from the United States-and Santa Anna--and had to "make do" with skimpy news in some international news-papers and the Time Magazine or an occasional telephone call to Tom.


The Texas drought and heat wave were featured in the Time edition in early August, and those on the tour were relieved to know cattle weren't dying all over the state from lack of feed and water as had been reported in the mid-west and north.

CONSERVING ENERGY

Reducing the temperature of the hot water delivered to the washer will cause a too-cool "warm" water cycle for soil removal, says Bonnie Piernot, a family resource management specialist.

Instead, save energy by rinsing in cold water and adjusting the water level setting to match the load size, she says.

Mrs. Piernot is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Scholarship Funds Available For Many

Most students, regardless of scholastic achievement or financial need, can and do qualify for various forms and amounts of financial aid. The problem, according to Student College Aid, a nationwide computerized scholarship locator service, located at 3641 Deal Street, Houston, Texas, is that the students just don't know that they qualify. That is why last year alone one hundred thirty-five million dollars of student financial aid went unused.

Eight person years were spent developing this data base for Student College Aid. The data base contains \$500,000,000 worth of non-federal and non-state aid along with approximately 2½ billion dollars worth of federal and state aid for undergraduate college students.

Student College Aid uses a computer to match students with available scholarships. The student fills out a data form requesting information about religion, ethnic background, special interests, etc. This data is read into a large computer crammed with information about a quarter of a million possible sources of financial aid. This aid comes from unions, philanthropic organizations, corporations, colleges and other public and private organizations. The student then receives a computer print out listing up to 25 potential scholarships, grants or loans.

In fact, Student College Aid is so sure that it can find

sources of funds for students ready to enter college or students in undergraduate college that it makes a money back guarantee. They guarantee to find at least five sources of financial aid for which the student is eligible to apply. Otherwise, their payment is refunded along with any sources of funds discovered for the student. Most students receive 10 to 15 listings valued at \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The computer print out that the student receives lists the names and addresses of the donors, the amount and length of time of the awards, matching qualifications, etc.—everything the student needs to know in order to apply for the funds

Students should allow themselves ample time to correspond with the donors of the awards according to Student College Aid. Different awards have different cut off dates. The important thing is to apply early. An applicant is never turned down for applying too early, but he is rejected for

applying too late.


Reminder Given On Aliens Report

Itemized Bill Needed For Medicare Reimbursement

Many people in the Brownwood area undergo needless delay in receiving reimburse-ment under Medicare medical insurance because they do not include an itemized bill when they submit their Request for Medicare Payment form, Priscilla Tercero, social security branch manager in Brownwood said recently.

An itemized bill must accompany the form if Part II of the form is not completed by the doctor or supplier. If the bill is not acceptable, the Medicare carrier will return the form to the person and an extensive delay in payment may result.

To be acceptable, a bill for services must include: a complete description of each

service or supply received; the date each service or supply was received; the place each service or supply was received; the charge for each service or supply; the name of the doctor or supplier who provided each




