## Consultant Is Named For County Tax Appraisal Dist.

Philip A. McCormick of San Angelo has been named senior appraiser and consultant for the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District and will be employed in that capacity during the 1981 year. Mr. McCormick, a native of Eldorado and a graduate of Texas A&M University, has a number of years experience in the appraisal and tax business and will be assisting Chief Appraiser John Skelton in organizing and staffing the county office and planning the procedures for the county-wide appraisal program.

The 1981 budget for the district has been approved,

totaling \$163,085, with approximately \$131,000 to be shared by the ten taxing entities in the county for which the appraisal will be made.

At the Monday, November 17, meeting of the Board, minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and location of the office discussed.

At an earlier meeting, Bill Goad of Thomas Pickett and Co. met with the Board reviewing mineral and utility valuations made by his company and presenting estimates of cost for the service next year.

The Board discussed methods by which taxing entities could share cost and ways of negotiating with the company if the cities do not choose to contract with the company.

The next meeting of the group will be Monday, December 1, at 5 p.m. at the office of John Skelton. Meetings are open to the public and all interested persons are welcome to attend.

Another service that will be on an optional basis is the Showtime channel featuring recently-released motion pictures and other entertainment specials.

Cable Television customers are asked to note there will be no service from 5 - 9 a.m. next Monday as the new switch-over is being made.

The Brownwood Television Cable system also plan extension of service to other parts of town in coming months.

## Mountaineers Lose Play-off; Meridian Into Quarter Finals

The 1980 football season ended for the Mountaineers Friday night when the Meridian Yellowjackets won a close 22 - 21 game in Comanche. The season ended with Santa Anna taking the District 7-A trophy while Meridian advances to the Quarter Final play-off with Rankin this weekend.

Santa Anna gave up one touchdown to Meridian early in the first quarter, then took charge of the game, gaining a 14 - 6 lead after Dwayne Warnock scored two TDs and Rusty Buzzard kicked the PATs.

Meridian scored early in the second half and added two conversion points to tie the game 14 - 14. Santa Anna made their final score in the third quarter when Albert Collins scored on a two-yard drive, and Buzzard's kick put the Mountaineers ahead 21 - 14.

The Yellowjackets started a drive for the goal, but a fumble recovery on the one-yard line gave Santa Anna the ball. On the first play, Buzzard was trapped behind the goal line for a safety, cutting the lead to 21 - 16, and Meridian got the ball back on the free kick and returned to the goal line, scoring the winning touchdown with less than three minutes on the

clock.

Santa Anna's comeback was stopped when Meridian intercepted a pass on the second play of the series and retained control of the ball until the final whistle.

Santa Anna had 13 first downs to 19 for Meridian, and 186 yards rushing to 264 for the Yellowjackets. Meridian also led in passing yardage with 96 to Santa Anna's 4.

The Mountaineers ended the season with a 9-3 record and the first district title since 1972.

The coaching staff is pleased with the performance of the team and felt they represented the school and community very well and have a record of which to be proud.

The Meridian Yellowjackets, coached by Santa Anna native David Horner, will play their Quarter Final game Friday night at Gordon Wood Stadium at Brownwood with the Rankin High School team. The game will be at 7:30 p.m.

The winner of the game will advance to the State Class A semi-finals the following week.

Horner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Horner, is in his second year at Meridian and his first year as head coach of the team.

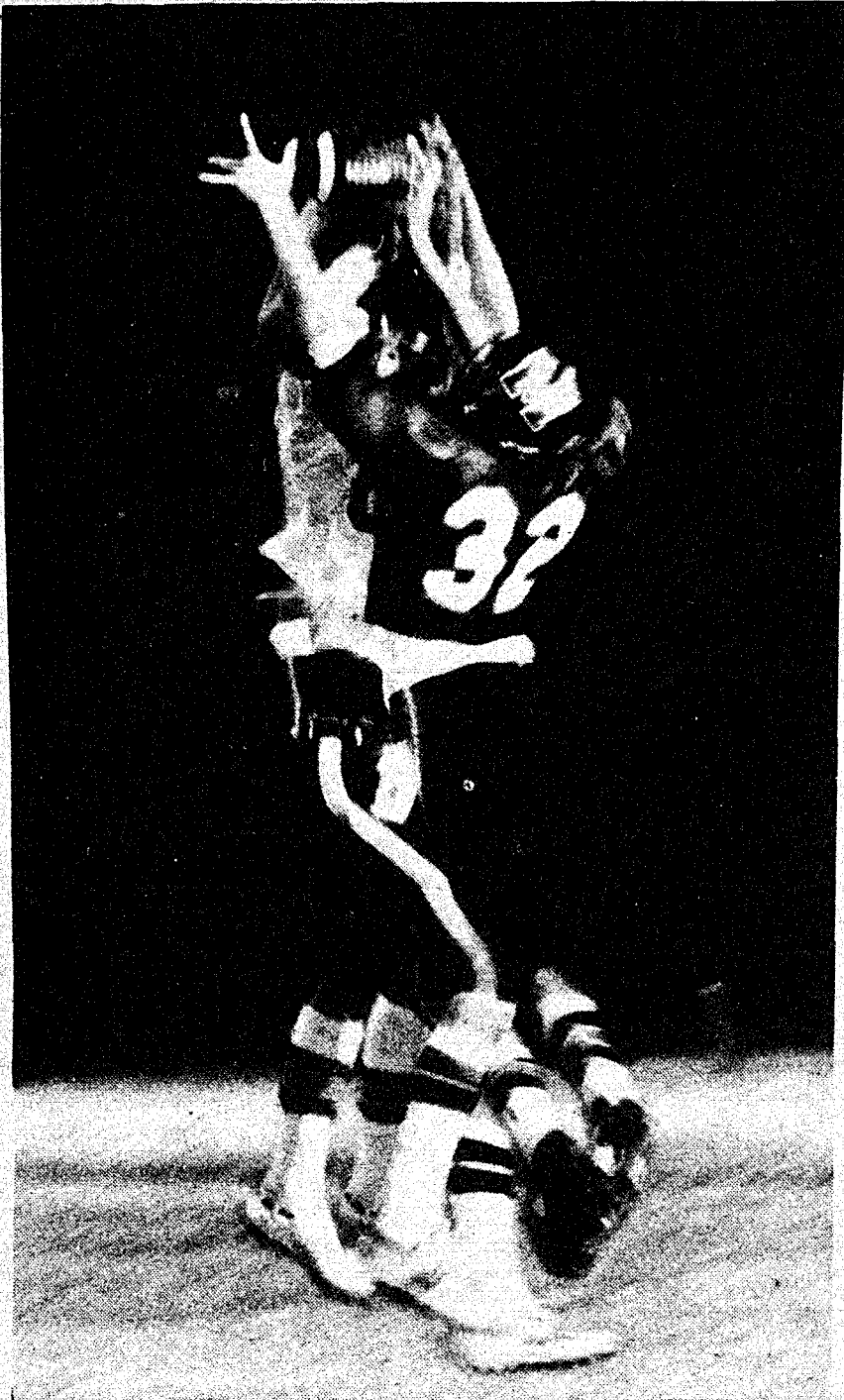

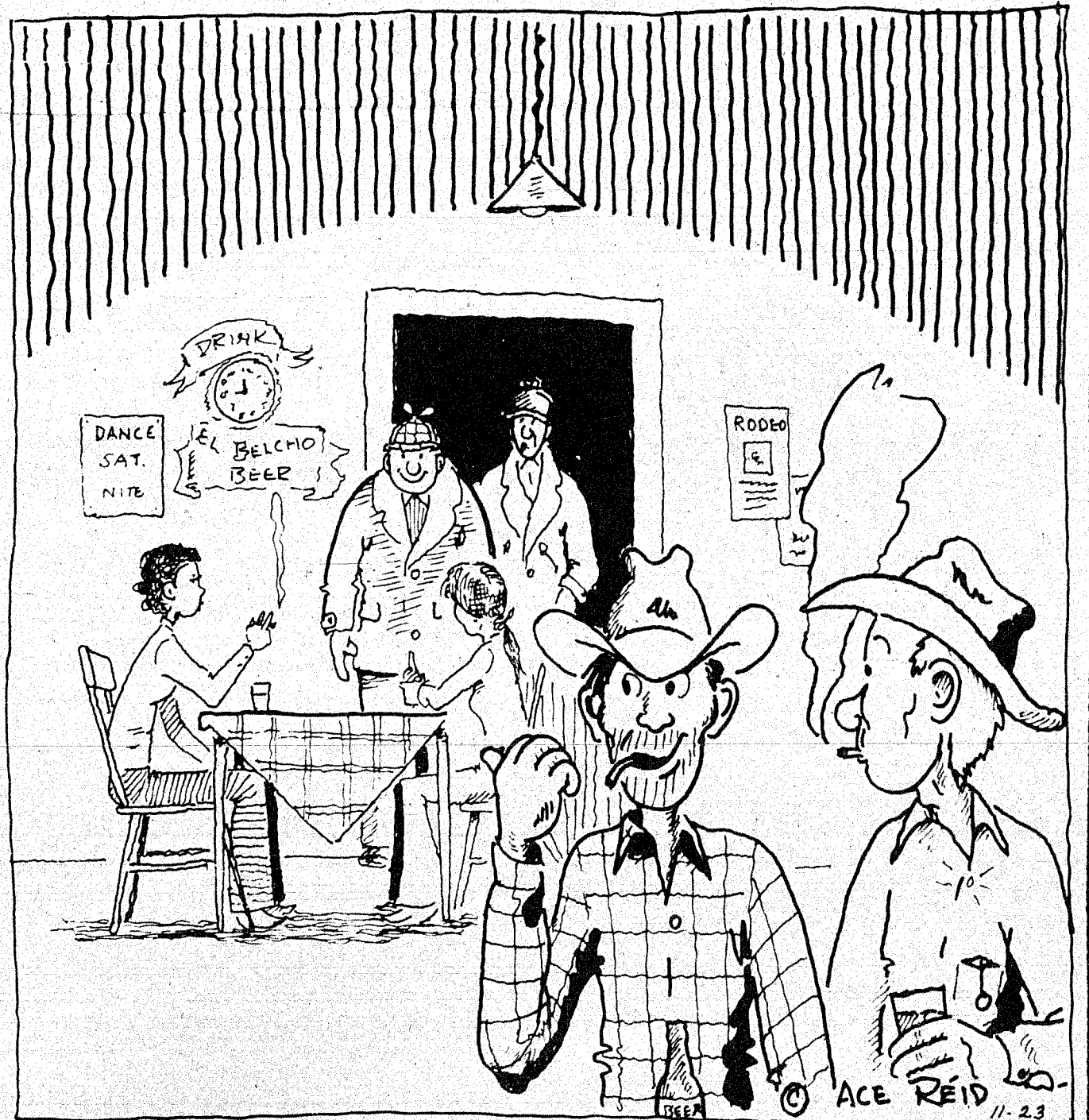

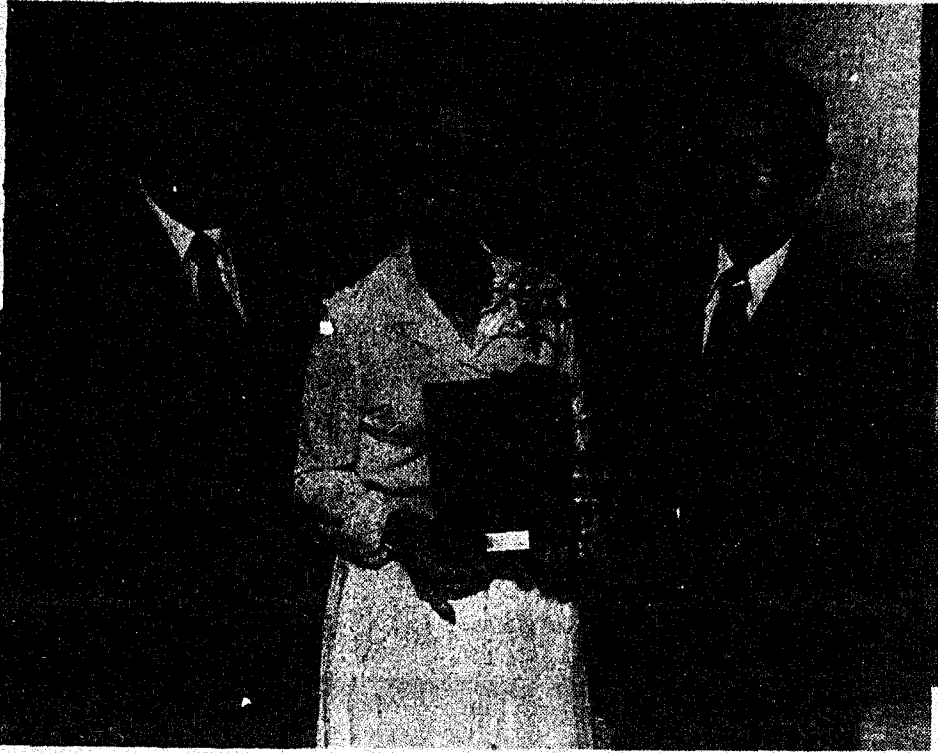

## Water Rate Costs Are Listed For City Residents

Residents of Santa Anna will have a cost increase in city services effective December 1 and to be reflected on the January bill.

The minimum water rate for city residents will increase from \$12.50 per month to \$14.50 for the first 3,000 gallons of water used. Also increased will be the sanitation cost and sewer charge that will each increase from \$3 to \$5 per month.

Charges for additional water will increase in proportion, with the next 3,000 gallons above minimum being \$1.60 per thousand; the next 4,000 gallons will be \$1.30 per thousand; and the next 10,000 at \$1.20 per thousand. Water consumption above 20,000 gallons will cost \$1.00 per thousand.

The increased water rate was caused by the increase in charges from Brown County Municipal Water District from which Santa Anna purchases water from Lake Brownwood. The BCWID rates were increased by about 35 percent in October.

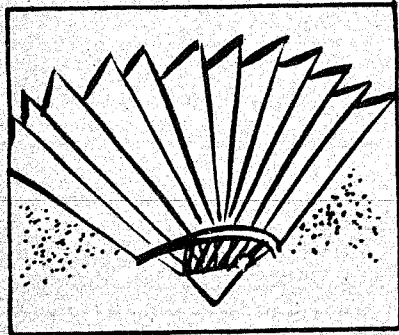

## SS Answers Question From Retirees Who Want to Work

"How much can I earn and still receive social security retirement checks?" This question is asked by many people now retired who wish to return to work and by others who will soon apply for benefits.

The answer depends partly on your age. If you are under 65, you can earn up to \$3,720 in 1980 (\$4,080 in 1981) and receive all benefits due. If you are 65 through 71, the annual exempt amount is \$5,000 for 1980 and \$5,500 for 1981. And if you are 72 or older (70 starting in 1982), there is no limit on how much you can earn.

If you earn substantially more than the annual exempt amount, you still may be able to receive some benefits. The basic rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 you earn above the exempt amount.

In addition, there's a special rule that may help you. It can be applied only once and during the first year your earnings exceed the annual exempt amount and you do little or no work in some months. You can receive a full benefit for any month your wages are not more than the monthly limit or, if you are self-employed, any month you spend little or no time with your business. The 1980 monthly limit is \$417 for people 65 or over and \$310 for people under 65. The 1981 limits are \$458 and \$340. More information on this is available at any social security office.

Generally, only gross wages and net earnings from self-employment count against social security benefits. Income from savings, investments, pensions, and most other sources are not considered

Pinus eldarica which is more tempered to drought conditions.

According to the forester, many trees were lost to drought this past summer, even where intensive management was carried out.

## Keep Tax Records To Support Claims

Taxpayers, especially those who itemize, should begin compiling receipts and other records to support claims on their Federal tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises. These records can be used to back up claims in case the return is examined and also assist taxpayers by reminding them of potentially overlooked deductions.

For easy reference, the records should be sorted into the categories which appear on Schedule A of Form 1040, the IRS says. When itemizing, taxpayers should bear in mind interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible, and frequently overlooked.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly claimed deductions for which IRS examiners often request supporting evidence.

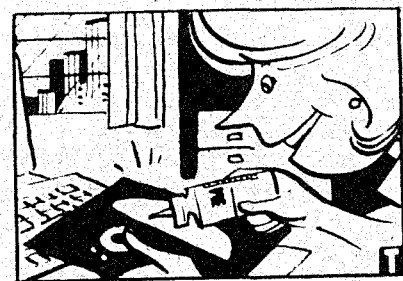

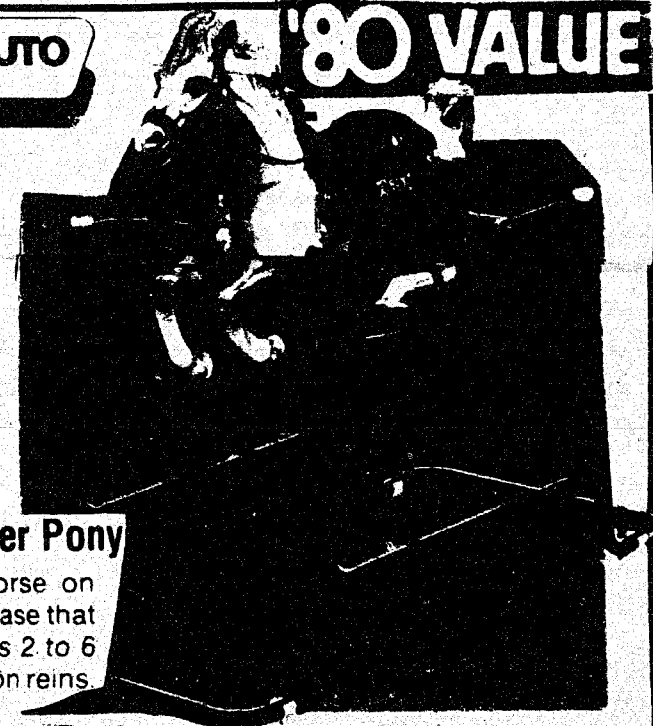

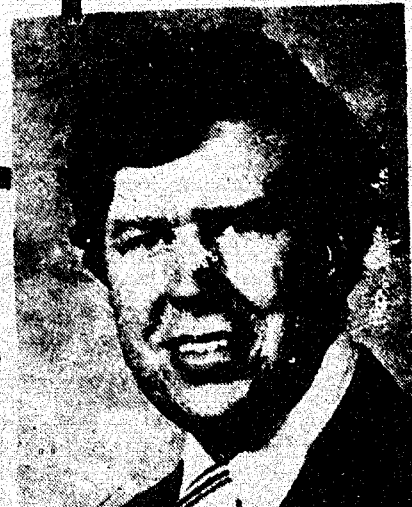

# Field Dressing Important To Successful Deer Hunt

Stalking and shooting a prize buck (or doe) is a big part of the challenge deer hunting offers sportsmen. But there's a lot more to it than just "aim or shoot."

For the beginning or inexperienced hunter, the sequence of events occurring immediately after the kill can well mean the difference between taking home a handsome wall mount or returning with a severely butchered-up carcass and perhaps little else to show for the effort.

Yet, performing this critical function correctly isn't as complicated as one might tend to assume, says Dr. Dwight Guynn, Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist headquartered in Uvalde.

After the deer has been killed, promptly tag and prepare it for field dressing by dropping the animal on its back, using rocks or other available objects.

The initial step, according to Guynn, is to remove external sex organs with a sharp knife. Next, cut down to the pelvic bone. Turning the knife blade up, use your other hand to hold the belly away from the intestinal organs and cut up to the breastbone.

However, avoid cutting the skin any further forward than the middle of the breastbone if the head is to be mounted, Guynn stresses.

Continuing the process, hold intestines to one side while cutting the thin layer of muscle, or diaphragm, which separates the intestines from the chest area. Reach into the windpipe and esophagus as far forward as possible. Grasp the windpipe and esophagus with both hands, pulling those organs out. The intestines can now be pulled free of the pelvic region.

Next, Guynn says to cut the skin and muscles around the anus, being careful not to puncture the bladder. Then pull the intestine forward and free of the carcass.

In these few short minutes, the hunting cycle is complete. The animal has been shot and field dressed and is ready to be hung to cool.

Since the skin can be removed much easier while the carcass is still warm, you may want to consider skinning the animal soon after field dressing.

If the head is to be mounted, Guynn suggests hanging the animal by its hind legs and skinning from the hind legs downward. You may want to consult a local taxidermist on the best method for skinning the head and neck of your trophy.

Guynn advises leaving the skin free of cuts forward of the front legs so the taxidermist will have enough hide to make a good mount. He says it's also a good idea to salt or freeze the head and skin until it is delivered for mounting.

But if the head is not to be mounted, hang the carcass by its head and skin it from the neck downward. The Texas A&M University System specialist says the hide is easier to remove in this position. Next, cut the skin loose from around the neck, around the legs and down the inside of each leg. Grasp the skin in back of the head and pull down firmly with both hands.

Finally, hang the skinned carcass by its hind legs in a cool, dry place. If hanging outside, use a protective covering to keep insects off the carcass.

The carcass can now be cut to preference or it can be commercially processed.

# TSA Advises 'Drive 55' Over Thanksgiving Holiday

Texas Safety Association's executive director, George Gustafson, today reminded Texans to "drive 55" this Thanksgiving in order to significantly lower their chances of having a fatal accident.

He also pointed out various economic benefits of the 55 mph speed limit.

Gustafson emphasized that the risk of a fatal accident at 55 mph is only 1 in 33, while at 70 mph the chance is 50-50, or 1 in 2.

Last year in Texas, 4,229 persons died in traffic accidents, according to Texas Department of Public Safety statistics. Approximately one fourth, or 1,046, of the fatalities resulted from accidents involving speeding.

Gustafson indicated that by slowing down to 55, Texans

have saved an average of 700 lives each year since the 55 mph speed limit went into effect. "Furthermore, on a national level, the 55 mph speed limit has been described as the single most effective means of saving lives ever implemented by the government, even when compared with the massive polio immunizations of the 1960s," he said. In addition to the safety advantages of driving 55, Gustafson also commented on the financial benefits of the slower speed. For example, it saves gasoline.


"Department of Transportation studies show that automobiles get better gas mileage at 55 than 70 mph. For the average car, that translates into approximately 50 more miles per tankful. Smaller, fuel efficient cars get even better savings," he said.

Slower, safer speeds also reduce expenses in other areas besides gasoline costs, the safety official continued. Fewer accidents will mean reduced hospitalization and medical costs for the state's citizens, and less income lost by employees who must miss work to recuperate from injuries. Furthermore, motorists will save money by driving at the slower, legal speed because they will avoid speeding tickets.

On behalf of the Texas Safety Association, Gustafson wished all Texans a happy Thanksgiving and warned them not to jeopardize an enjoyable holiday by speeding.



# Visit in Munich, Germany Reveals Charming City

The countryside in the area of Munich, Germany is of gently rolling hills and a complete change from the Alpine region to the south. We kept seeing signs reading "Munchin" and found it was the German spelling of Munich, an industrial city of 1,500,000 people.

Soon after our arrival in the city, a local guide took our tour group around the city, visiting Wittelsbach Castle, the summer palace of Bavarian Royalty that is very much like Versailles in France. Tall linden trees line the streets and gardens around the 290-room castle and complex that is a few miles from the downtown area.

We drove past Olympic Village built for the 1972 Olympic games. The large area is now a sporting and residential area that has helped relieve the severe housing shortage in the city. Refugees from many nations have flocked to Munich, causing quite a strain on the economy and facilities of the city.

The Olympic village is built on an abandoned airfield that was used as a rubble dump after World War II. An international convention of Jehova's Witnesses was in progress at the huge stadium at the time we were there.

Our tour guide was a German woman who lived in Munich during World War II and described the bombing and havoc in the city. She spoke fluent English and shared and legend, making the tour very interesting. She now lives near Munich on a farm where her family raises potatoes used for the production of alcohol.

A highlight of the tour was a visit to Marienplatz (Maxamillian Square) in downtown Munich where we saw and heard the Glockenspeil, an historic clock that has life-sized figures that "perform" on three levels twice daily. The clock was built in 1506 and is a city landmark.

We also drove down the "royal road"--the street on which all official parades travel and on which the buildings of parliament and the official palace are located. We also passed the home of Adolph Hitler and visited the beautiful

twin-towered cathedral that has been re-built since being heavily damaged during World War II. In returning to our hotel, we passed the Isar Gate, one of the city gates that date to 1320.

After dinner at the hotel, a group of us took the trolley several blocks to the subway station, then rode the subway into the city where we walked around the main square to sightsee. Munich is a bright, clean city, with helpful, friendly people. In the subway station, one friendly young man tried to visit with us--using broken English and many gestures, and managed to make clear his dislikes of President Carter! He also expressed displeasure with his own government leaders.

American newspapers were impossible to buy, so I finally settled for a copy of Time Magazine to learn what was happening in the United States since leaving two weeks before. The drought in Texas was featured in the issue, reminding me of the hot and dry conditions that I left behind.

The weather was delightful in Munich, but the natives were apologetic about the heat--about 85 degrees the afternoon we arrived!

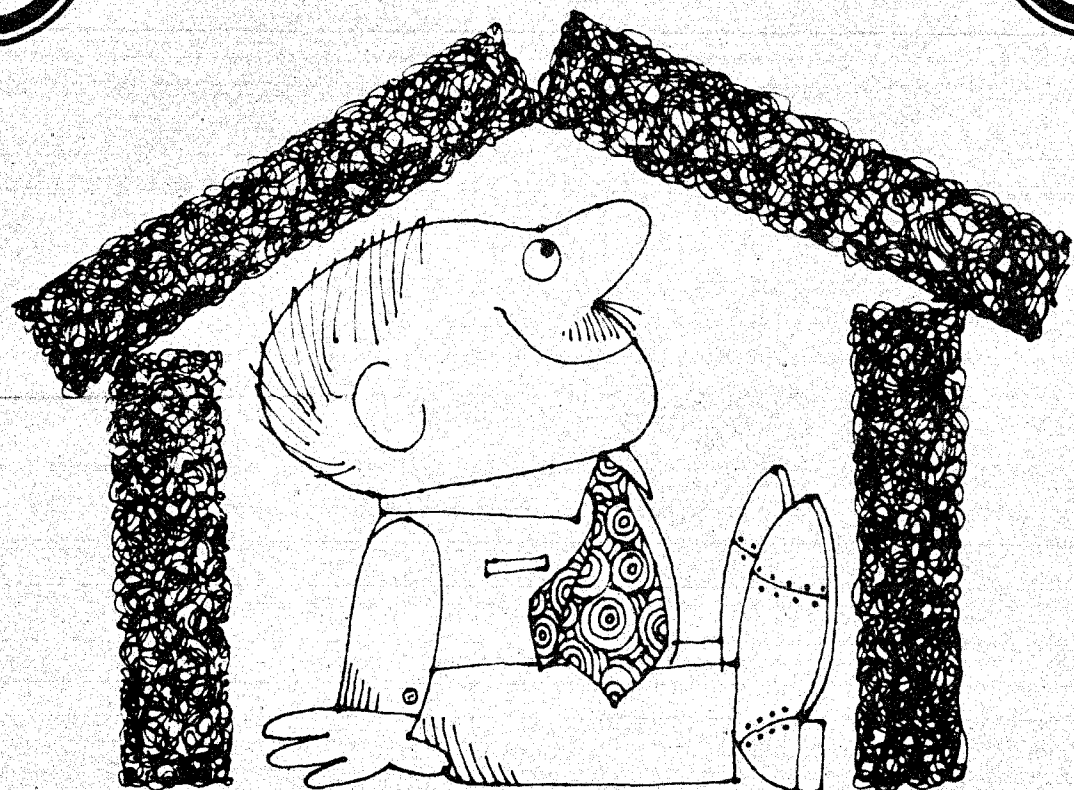

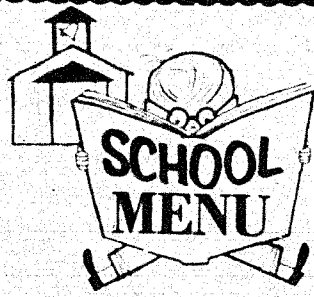

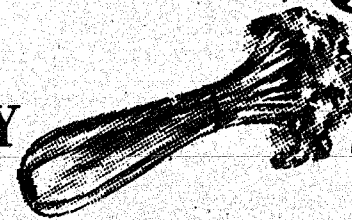
