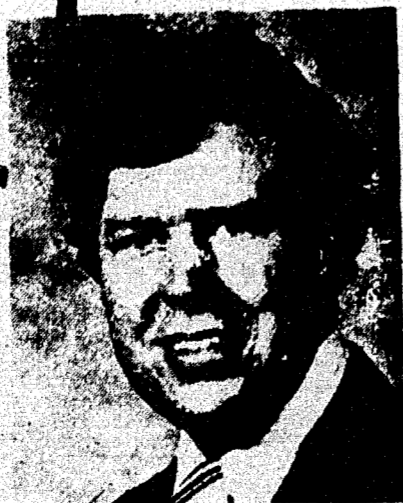

## Extension is Requested For Stacy Dam Permit

Just to play safe, directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District Tuesday instructed the general manager to file for a two-year extension of the district's permit to build the Stacy reservoir.

Regulations call for the beginning of construction within two years of the granting of a permit in order to keep it intact, but the April 10, 1979 permit for Stacy has been hung up in judicial appeals since that time. Presently, it is before the Court of Appeals in Austin, and there is no indication when this tribunal will rule, or if it is favorable to the district, whether the protecting Lower Colorado River Authority and others will persist in an appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas. If the extension is granted, as expected, this will give CRMWD until April 10, 1983 to begin work on the Stacy dam across the Colorado River.

The board also authorized notices of intent to introduce a bill in the 67th Legislature to amend the act by which the 51st Legislature created the district in 1949. Two principal changes will be sought, on to

enlarge the boundaries of the district from the January 1, 1950 corporate limits of the member cities of Odessa, Big Spring and Snyder to the corporate limits as of January 1, 1981. This also would carry a proviso that the district could

annex territory annexed by cities in the future. The second change would be to enable the district to be the sponsoring agency for projects under the Clean Air Financing Act and the Regional Disposal Act. Territorial boundaries for this authority would be the counties within the Colorado River Basin above the east county line of Coleman County, and 1, 1981. This also would carry certain other contiguous counties.

## 1980 Deer Season Is Below Average

As predicted, Texas deer hunters experienced a below-average 1980-81 season.

Reduced success resulted from several factors, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

Dry weather during the spring and summer of 1980 caused an overall 12.86 percent decrease in the statewide deer population. The greatest losses occurred in the major deer ranges--the Edwards Plateau, South Texas and the Cross Timbers and Prairies. Only East Texas experienced an increase in deer numbers.

Unusually good acorn crops in most areas also contributed to poor hunter success, as deer moved less than usual and tended to ignore feeders.

Poor hunting weather prevailed from opening day through Thanksgiving weekend, with rain, fog and cold temperatures. In South Texas, the weather was unseasonably warm throughout the season.

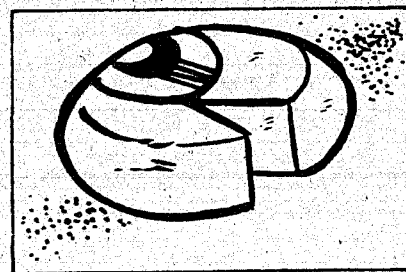

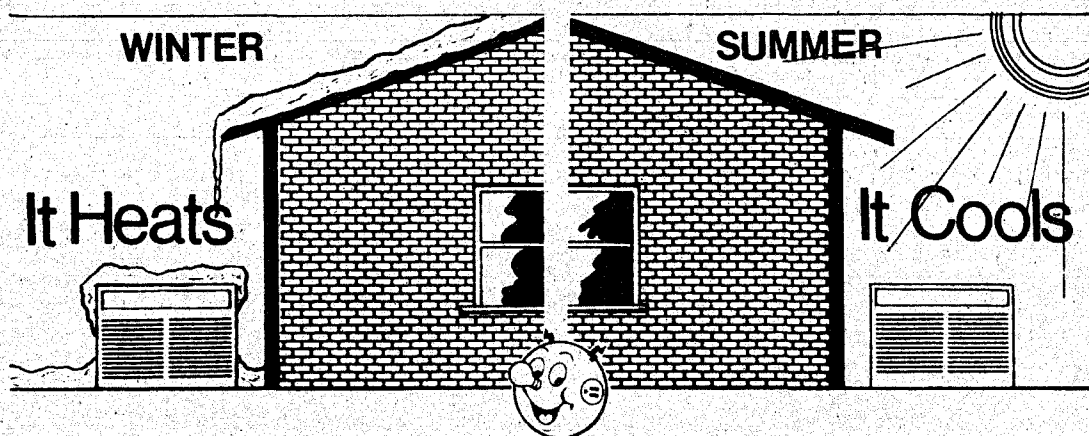

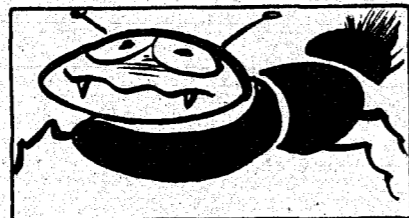

# Texans Observing 'Winter Driving Week'

Winter driving can be a "chilling" experience if car and driver aren't ready for the season, the Texas Safety Association warns Texas motorists.

"Driving in messy winter weather requires skill and concentration," says the non-profit organization's director, George Gustafson, who notes that January 19-24 is Texas Winter Driving Week.

"Safe winter driving is no accident. Stay alert to hazards and know how to avoid them, and you can make it through the next months safely," Gustafson emphasizes.

"Be prepared for cold weather," the association head urges. He suggests checking your car's (1) battery for sufficient power to function in the cold; (2) brakes for equalized stopping action; (3) windshield equipment including wipers, washers and defrosters; and (4) exhaust system for deadly carbon monoxide leaks.

"After your vehicle is ready and you're out on the road, take all precautions possible to travel safely," Gustafson comments. "For instance, it may sound elementary, but make sure that you can see. Keep all windows clear, headlights clean and if driving in fog, sleet or heavy snow, low beam headlights on."

"Know and use correct steering procedures for winter driving, too," he remarks. "Change directions gradually, anticipating turns and slowing

down for them early. If you hit an unexpected patch of ice in the road, ease up on the accelerator, hold the wheel steady and roll through," he adds.

"And if you should go into a skid, never hit the brakes," Gustafson stresses. "Instead take your foot off the gas and steer in the direction the rear of the car is skidding until you feel the car regaining a grip on the road. Then straighten your wheels."

Icy, wet conditions also make it hard to stop, Gustafson says. Therefore, he suggests that motorists keep plenty of distance between themselves

and other automobiles and that drivers anticipate and gradually slow down for stops. "Never slam on the brakes to stop on a slippery surface--you'll lock them and go into a skid. Keep the wheels rolling by pumping and releasing the brakes in short, rapid jabs," he explains.

Alerting Texans to accident prevention will be the National Safety Council, government agencies and private associations, and the Texas Safety Association. Emphasis is on stressing accident prevention at home, play, work or on the road.

Safety Weeks include: January 19-24, Texas Winter Driving Week - February 13-15, National Safety Sabbath - March 15-21, National Poison Prevention Week; April (First Week), Texas Defensive Driving Week - April 20-26, National Bike Safety Week - May (First Week), Texas Motorcycle Awareness Week - June 1-7, National Safe Boating Week - June (Second Week), Texas Highway and Freeway Driving Week - June (Last Week), Safety Belt Use Week; July 25-31, National Farm Safety Week - August (Last Week), Back to School Week - October (First Week), National School Bus Safety Week - October 4-10, National Fire Prevention Week - October (Third Week), Railroad Grade Crossing Week - October 25-31, National Safety on the Streets Week.

## Highway Litter Pick-up Tops \$10 Million Mark

AUSTIN—Picking up litter along Texas roadsides cost over a million dollars more in fiscal 1980 than in 1979.

"Litter pick-up by our maintenance crews cost \$10.3 million from September 1, 1979, through August 31, 1980," said Mark Goode, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "During fiscal 1979, the price tag for cleaning up highway rights-of-way was \$9.2 million. That was a larger cost figure than ever before, but it has been surpassed handily this year."

"Litter costs are spiraling and we want Texas taxpayers to know about it," Goode said. "Littering is an irresponsible, illegal and thoughtless action. It's unbelievable what some of our maintenance crews find lying alongside the roads—old furniture, auto parts, diapers and household garbage."

The department does its best to keep Texas roadsides clear of rubbish, but it is a frustrating and costly task. The agency is in the business of keeping Texas traffic moving, yet its crews must spend many thousands of valuable man-

hours picking up motorists' trash. Litter picked up one day is often replaced by more the next. "It's a disgrace—and littering is so unnecessary," he said.

Highways are just one area where litter presents problems in Texas. Trash along beaches, lakeshores, in parks and other public places upsets tourists and locals alike. City streets share in the litter problem, too.


What's to be done about it? Mark Goode says his department believes education is the key.

"With the help of the media, newspapers, television and radio, and through our own offices, we are trying more intensively than ever before to educate youngsters and adults alike about the costliness, ugliness and needlessness of littering," Goode said.

During 1980, the department sent out several news releases to the press concerning the litter problem. It also produced four film public service announcements for television which have been

provided periodically to all Texas TV stations.

A total of 56,000 colorful folders have been distributed to remind Texans that littering costs everyone hard-earned tax dollars and mars the beauty and grandeur of the state.

Cotton harvest in the community is coming to a close, with only a few more bales expected to be processed at Santa Anna Co-Op Gin. The cotton harvest has been underway since October, with delays due to wet weather.

To date 1,440 bales of cotton have been ginned here, a lower number than last year. Quality of the cotton is not as good as last year due to the drought, early freeze and rains.

The price for the cotton has dropped steadily since the first of the year, with the current medium-quality cotton bringing about 55 cents per pound. Top quality cotton is bringing about 70 cents at the current time.

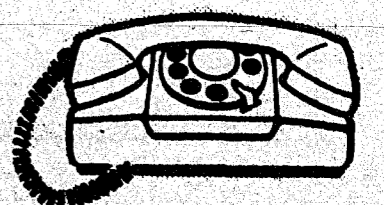

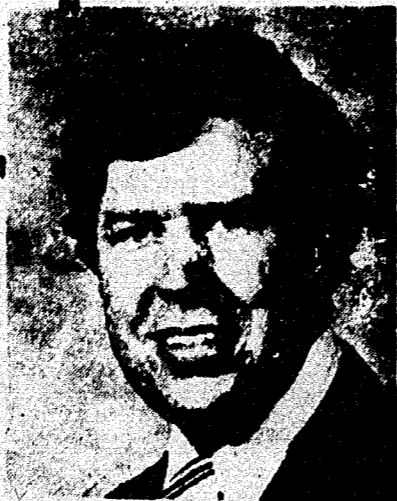

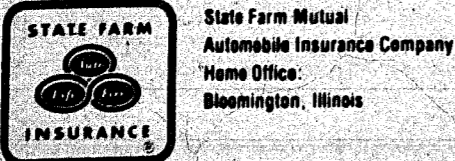

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## SS Recipients to Get Money's Worth

If you're wondering whether you'll get your money's worth from today's Social Security system, the answer is, in general, "yes."

On January 1, 1981, Social Security payroll-tax rates increased from 6.13 percent of earnings to 6.75 percent, and the earnings base upon which workers and employers pay the payroll tax will also rise from \$25,000 to \$29,700. These tax increases were legislated in 1977, in an effort by Congress to strengthen the financing of Social Security.

The rising tax rates have led many people to ask: Will I get back in Social Security benefits the higher amounts that I will pay in taxes? Will Social Security continue to be a good value? The answer, for the most part, is yes!

Let us explain why this is so. Employers and employees each contribute to Social Security in equal amounts. The combined payroll tax really finances four different kinds of social insurance benefits: retirement benefits, survivors and disability benefits and hospital insurance for those age 65 and over and for the long term disabled.

As under any insurance plan, people who suffer the insured risks will receive more than those who do not. For example, if your automobile is never damaged in an accident, or if your house or apartment never catches fire, obviously you will receive less of a return from your automobile and fire insurance than someone who did experience those things. But we buy insurance precisely because we can't predict the future. We don't know if we will live to a very old age, or if the inflation rate will further escalate to erode our savings, or if our paychecks will stop due to disability or death. For example, 42 percent of today's young men will die or become disabled before age 65. For young women the figure is 28 percent. Therefore, we protect ourselves against risks in an affordable way.

That's what Social Security does: it protects you throughout your life against a number of different risks that you could not foresee as a young man or woman.

A person who had high

earnings has usually had opportunities to add to Social Security retirement benefits with private pensions or savings to maintain a certain standard of living in the retirement years. But people who have had low earnings during their work career, usually have not been able to afford to do the same. Many look to Social Security as all or a major part of their income. Therefore, benefits are calculated to take this into account. The benefits for lower paid workers represent a higher rate of replacement of their earnings. This is one of the main differences between social insurance and individually purchased private insurance. Similarly, if you marry and have children to support, you would need relatively higher benefits; and Social Security pays more to workers with dependents than to single individuals.

In other words, different workers, depending upon their circumstances, will receive different benefits from Social Security because it is a social insurance program. Even those workers who, upon reaching retirement age, have always earned the maximum and have never married or become disabled, were potentially protected in ways other than their own retirement benefits, because of the provisions in Social Security that would have benefited them if they had married, earned less, or become disabled.

With relatively few exceptions, workers, including those who just entered the work force, generally can expect to pay. Some people, such as highly paid workers who never marry, may expect benefits that are not worth as much as the taxes they can expect to pay.

Let's focus for the moment solely on the cash benefits payable to retired workers. A worker who retired at the end of 1979 at age 65 paid over his or her working career no more than \$11,203 in Social Security taxes. That same person would recoup those tax payments in a little over 17 months as a Social Security beneficiary. If you consider that the average man age 65 can expect to live until age 79, and the average woman age 65 can expect to live until age 83,

then it is easy for you to see that the average worker retiring now can expect to receive far more in lifetime Social Security benefits than he or she ever paid in taxes, even if you adjust the payments for interest.

But what about average young workers, you may ask? Will they get back what they paid into Social Security? Given the present system, the answer is in general, "yes." In fact, the average young working man with dependents can expect to receive benefits with a value more than three times the value of what he can expect to pay in taxes under a reasonable set of actuarial assumptions. A working woman who never marries, and who has average earnings, can expect to receive benefits worth more than two times the value of her expected taxes.

The issue becomes slightly more complicated, however, if you consider what employers contribute in Social Security taxes. Many reputable authorities believe that the payroll taxes paid by employers should not be considered a contribution that is earmarked for an individual employee's benefit. Rather they view the employer tax as a contribution to the general system of Social Security, which distributes the benefits to individuals according to the different risks I alluded to above. In fact, the 1979 Advisory Council on Social Security tax should be viewed as a general tax available to Social Security rather than as a fringe benefit attributable to a particular employee.

On average, young workers as a group still can expect to receive benefits from Social Security that are worth more than the taxes they and their employers can expect to pay. For example, if we take those in the age group 20-24, they and their dependents can, on average, expect to receive benefits with value roughly 15 percent greater than their payroll taxes and their employers' payroll taxes combined. This calculation includes appropriate adjustment for interest that could be earned elsewhere. And if you consider only the taxes the young workers themselves would pay, then they would get back 130

## Crossing of English Channel Different and Exciting Event

Our European tour was nearing an end as we left Belgium and entered France near Dunkirk, an industrial seaport in the northern portion of the country. Dunkirk was the scene of the evacuation under German fire of the British expeditionary force of over 330,000 men at the beginning of World War II. A few reminders of the war are still visible including concrete bunkers in some of the fields and near the English Channel.

The area was heavily bombed early in the war and again as it ended. Several memorials to foreign troops killed there were along the highway.

Our tour group left our bus at Calais and took the hydrofoil "hovercraft" across the Channel to England.

Although some in our group were slightly seasick during the 30-minute crossing of the choppy channel, I loved it! The craft resembled a two or three story oblong building encased in an enormous rubber tube. It sped across the water, then lumbered up the flat beach. The tube was deflated for passengers and vehicles to enter, then again inflated for the 50-mile-per-hour trip. The craft landing and "hoverport" were much like a small airport

I hope that these numbers will put to rest any concerns that you have about getting your money's worth from Social Security. But I also hope you will remember that your Social Security taxes pay for a lot more than retirement benefits, that the benefits you or your family will receive

from Social Security are indexed to rise with the cost-of-living, and that Social Security benefits are tax-free. Social Security is an investment in your future that's hard to beat.

with a cafeteria, several waiting rooms and a customs area. Just across the parking lot were several of the deserted Nazi bunkers that I would like to see at close range, but had no time.

About 200 persons and 20 vehicles were carried on the crossing, and although we had reservations for the trip, we still waited in line to board. We saw the white cliffs near Ramsgate, about ten miles from Dover.

A British bus and driver were waiting for us on the English side of the channel, and what a ride it was---my first trip in a vehicle that travels on the left side of the road! It was more comfortable to look out the window and not watch the highway ahead! Although our original tour bus could have been transported on the craft, tour drivers and vehicles are not taken into England where vehicles and the style of driving is so different.

The country along the coastline of England was rolling hills somewhat like Coleman County. Wheat and potatoes were in the fields to be harvested, and some fields were being plowed. Flocks of white birds were following the plows and feeding on insects, seeds or something as the land was being tilled.

We saw hedge rows that serve as fences between pastures and fields, but the area of some 30 miles between Ramsgate and London was very open and dotted with farmsteads that look much like ours.

Soon after leaving the coast, we soon stopped at a restaurant and tourist area and exchanged our foreign currency for English pounds. Everyone tried to leave each country with as little currency as possible, since with each exchange a fee or percentage is charged, and over the trip of several countries, we lost money each time!

Again as in each of the countries, the rate of exchange for U.S. currency was poor, and it took many American dollars to get the English pounds.
