City Secretary To Be Named By City Council

Applications for City Secretary were reviewed and applicants interviewed during the past week, and Santa Anna City Council is expected to announce the new employee soon. Mary Lou Jones, City Secretary for nearly four years, has resigned effective December 19.

At the Thursday, December 4, meeting of the Council, Mayor Thomas Hays presided for the session that included approval of minutes, a financial report and approval of bills and accounts for payment.

Four bids were opened for installation of traffic signs, and low bidder was Jerry Phillips with a bid of \$1,570.00 for installation of the 157 new signs in town.

Three bids were opened for the old city trucks, and Raymond Don Cupps was high bidder with \$1,010.00 for the three old vehicles.

Joe Brannon of the Pecan Valley Economic Development District met with the board and reported on progress on the Community Block Grant application.

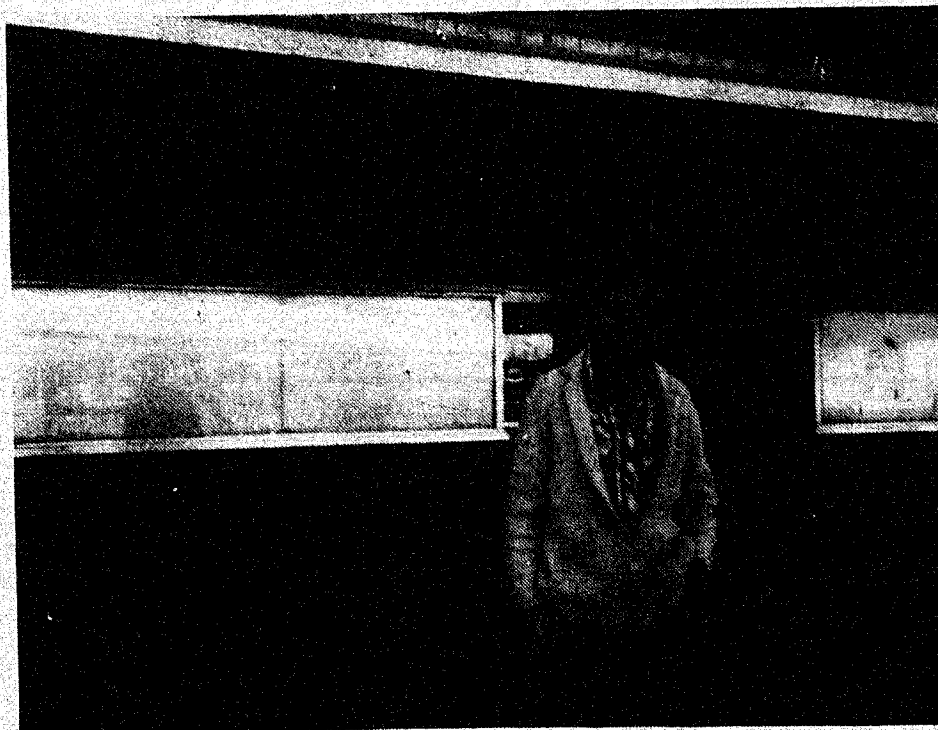

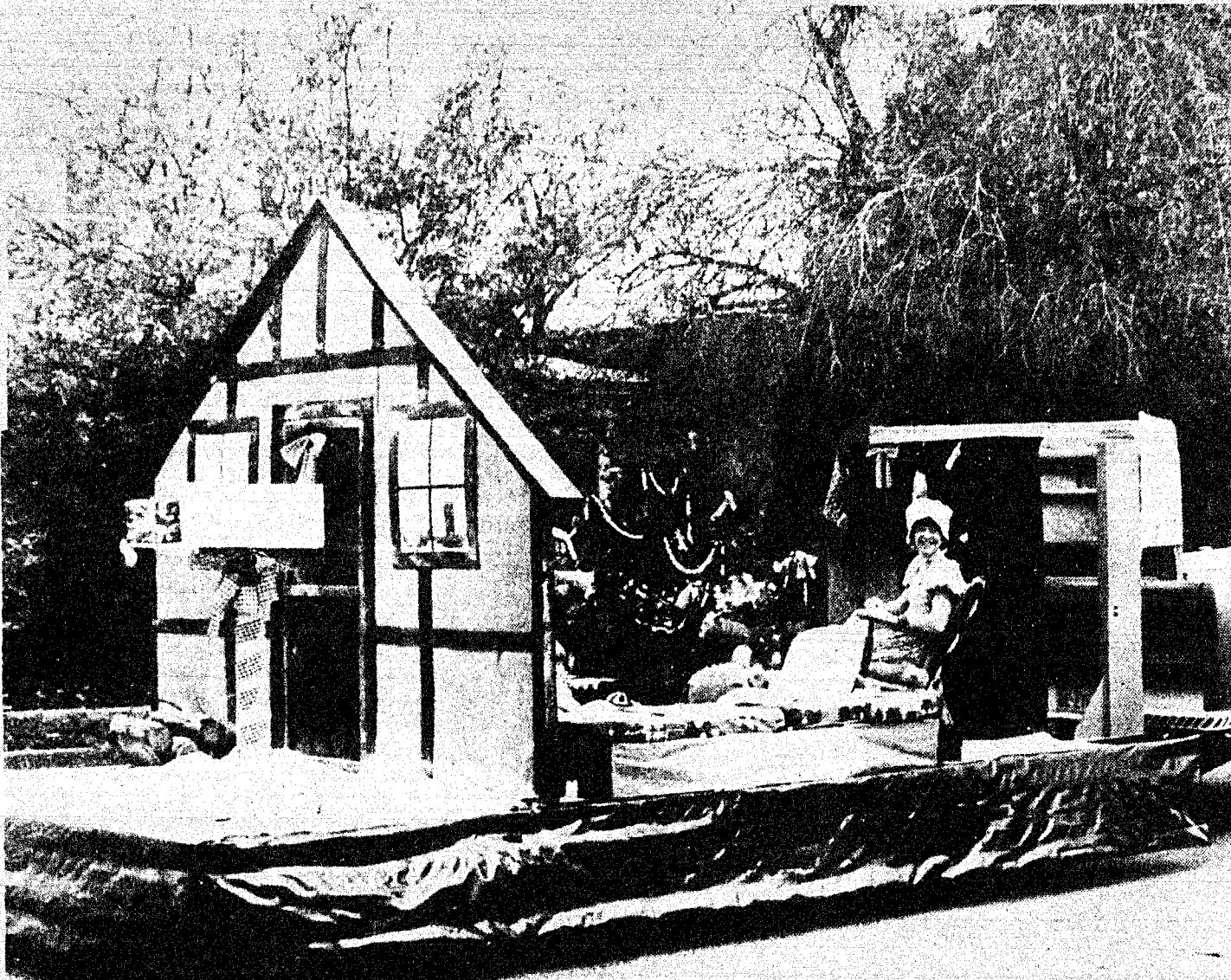

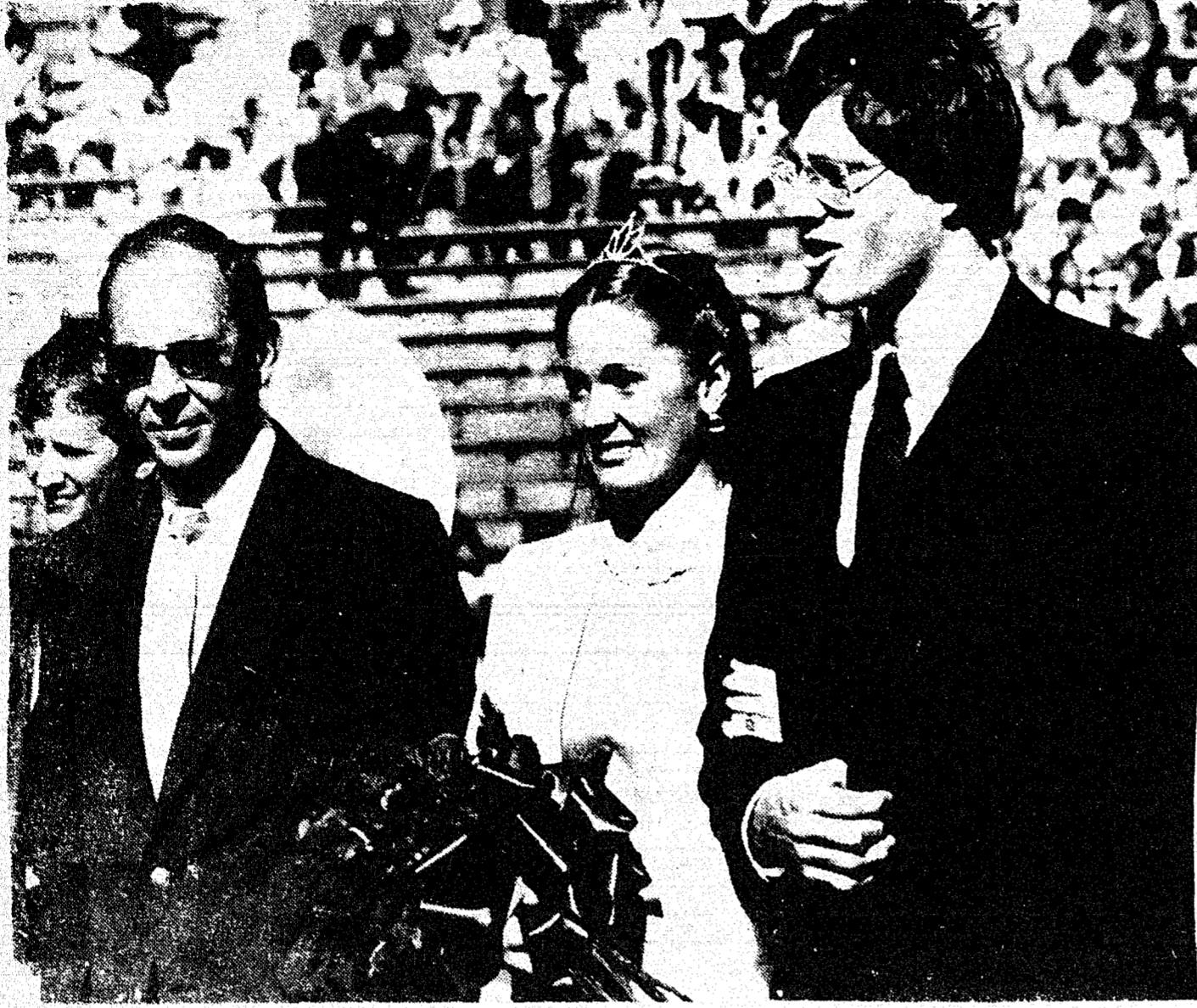

Scientists fear that poor nutrition may hinder vaccine

COLLEGE STATION — Medical researchers at Texas A&M University have begun a new round of tests which may prove the world's only vaccine for tuberculosis loses its punch in poor countries where the disease kills millions of young children and infants each year.

Texas A&M immunologist Dr. David McMurray said previous tests indicate deficiencies in protein, zinc and calorie intake — alone and in combination — greatly hinder the body's defense against infection from TB.

Proceeds from the game were divided by the sponsoring clubs, with each club being over \$250.

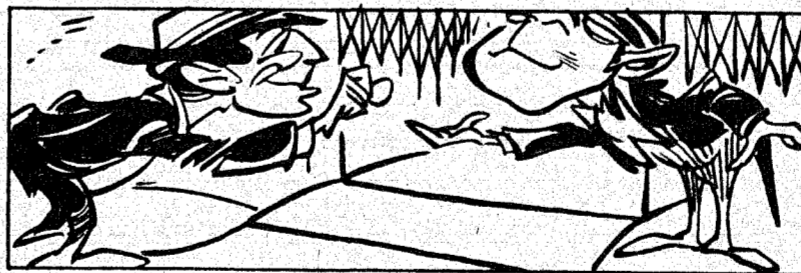

Heidelberg, Germany A Beautiful City

A "continental" breakfast of sweetrolls or rolls and jam or jelly with coffee was the usual fare on our tour, but at Holiday Inn Olympia in Munich, Germany, we were treated to a sumptuous breakfast of meat, cheeses, eggs prepared in several ways, fruits of all kinds, fruit juice, assorted breads and rolls, and the usual strong, strong coffee. What a treat it was--and everyone in our group was pleased with the change. As in much of the trip, we often left one town before we saw even a portion of the interesting sights--and with regret we left Munich after only one day and night.

Our tour bus traveled west from Munich through the gently rolling hills and fertile valleys. Wheat, in all stages of maturity, was interspersed with fields of corn, sugar beets and patches of wooded land.

Our route took us through Ulm, the birthplace of Albert Einstein, which is on the Danube River. The wide divided Autobahn highway--a major route in Europe--was crowded as it was vacation time in Europe and EVERYONE goes somewhere! Our bus had to stop completely a time or two--even out in open country!

We passed through Stuttgart, a city of 150,000 that is only 400 feet above sea level. It is now a major industrial area after being 80 percent destroyed during World War II. We traveled through an edge of the Black Forest near Karlsbrue in the Baden Region.

Our stop that day was Heidelberg, a city that dates to the ninth century. A dominant feature is the Heidelberg Castle which we toured, noting the ornate architecture and decoration.

The imposing structure was built about 1550 for the rulers of the region. It was destroyed by French invaders in the late 1690s and never rebuilt. It has in recent years been restored and is quite a tourist attraction on the hilltop overlooking the town. Acres of landscaped gardens surround the castle, and the view of the Neckar River (that runs into the Rhine) was breath-taking, from the lookout towers surrounding the courtyard.

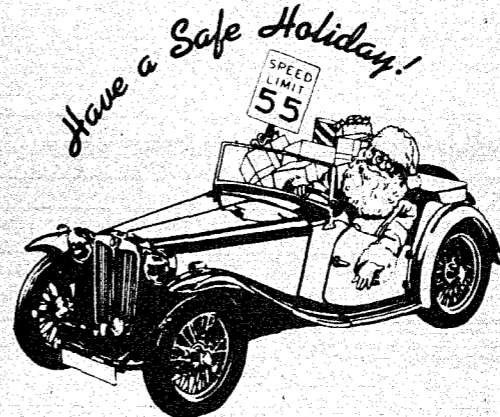
Ancient buildings now house shops and stores of every kind along the narrow cobblestone streets in the city. In the older region, a cathedral centers a large square, and a few blocks

beyond is Heidelberg University, one of the oldest in the world, that now has 18,000 students, a majority studying art and music. Many of the shopkeepers seemed to be college-aged people with very "arty" dress and appearance.

Our tour group spent the night in the village of Grobsachen, twelve miles from Heidelberg, at Krone Hall, a quaint German inn that has been in operation since 1661. Furniture and decorations of wood carvings and antiques

were priceless. It was like stepping into the past as we entered the inn, and after dinner in the large beamed-ceiling dining room, several of our group walked about the village and through the perfectly kept cemetery with ornate head stones and statuary. Neat vegetable and flower gardens stretched right up to the narrow streets, with fruits, vegetables and flowers everywhere.

The weather was quite warm on that day, and it was amusing to see hefty truck-drivers step from their vehicles attired in sandals and swim trunks! The Europeans literally worship the sun, and sun-bathers were everywhere taking advantage of the weather and their vacation time.

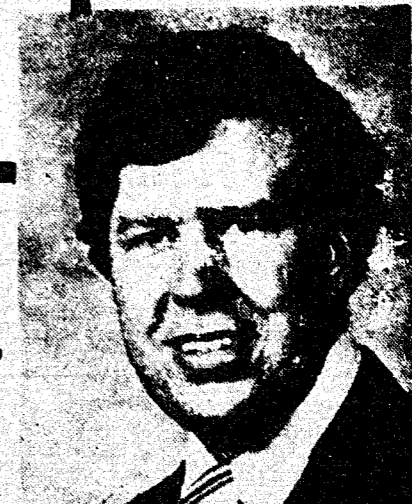

Art of teaching to be focus of two-day conference

COLLEGE STATION — The art of teaching and administrative approaches and strategies to facilitate and encourage superior teaching will be spotlighted here in a two-day conference for faculty and staff from all four academic units of The Texas A&M University System.

Chancellor Frank W. R. Hubert, who initiated the concept for the unprecedented session now set for Jan. 8-9, said the general topic will be "quality in teaching."

In emphasizing the teaching function, Hubert pointed out that TAMUS institutions — Texas A&M University, Prairie View A&M University, Tarleton State University and Texas A&M University at Galveston (Moody College) — combine to have 43,125 students and approximately 2,500 faculty engaged in some 1.2 million semester credit hours at the present time.

"That's a major endeavor, and we simply cannot overemphasize the importance of the teaching function to the students of the four academic institutions," the chancellor said.

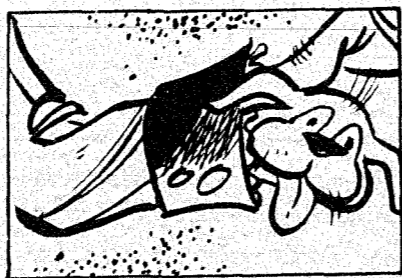

SS Gives Facts Concerning Retirement Planning

There are some people living in retirement who are finding it to be pretty much what they expected, even with the effect of recent inflation on their income. There are others who have found a sharp drop in their incomes in terms of buying power.

The difference is not necessarily how much money they were making when they were working. The difference that accounts for their situations is more likely to be found in their approach to preparing and planning for their retirement.

People who know how social security works as a retirement income program are more likely to find their retirement income at a desirable level. Knowing what social security provides and how it treats income in retirement is absolutely essential to making it work for you.

It is important to know that social security benefits are designed to replace only a portion of your pre-retirement income—to provide a base on which you can build. Depending on your earnings, social security will replace from 30 to 55 percent of your pre-retirement earnings. The lower earner gets the higher rate because of the lesser room for a reduction in income.

Since it replaces only a part of your prior earnings, the social security system expects and encourages people to plan for their retirement income.

For example, the annual earnings test, which is used to determine if a person has actually suffered a reduction in earnings applies only to earnings, not to other forms of retirement income. Income from rent, investments, savings, and other pensions is not subject to the earnings test.

At the same time, people who wish to supplement their retirement income with earnings can do so. A person 65 or over can earn \$5,000 in 1980 (\$5,500 in 1981) without affecting his or her social security check. A person under 65 can earn \$3,780 (\$4,080 in 1981). Earnings over the annual exempt amount cause the social security check to be reduced by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the annual exempt amount. People 72 and over (70 in 1982) are not

subject to the earnings test.

The way it works, a person 65 in 1980 getting the maximum benefit of \$653.80 monthly or \$7,845.60 annually, could have an annual income of \$12,845.60, which would include his or her other social security check plus \$5,000, the maximum amount of money he or she could make without affecting it. A person could earn as much as \$20,691.20 before all benefits would be withheld because of the earnings test.

Another feature of the social security program is the protection it provides against inflation. Benefits are indexed against inflation and increase automatically with the cost of living once a person begins receiving them. Also, social security benefits are not subject to Federal and State income taxes.

It is important to know these facts about social security if you want to have sufficient income in retirement. If you have any questions about future benefits, call your social security office.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. For general information or to report a change, call toll free 800-392-1603. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. If you wish to file an application to establish your eligibility you may call collect 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.

Proper Care Of Christmas Tree

Selecting your Christmas tree wisely and giving it proper care will help it last throughout the holiday season.

First, consider the tree species, says Dr. Michael Walterscheidt, forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Buy your Christmas tree early so you can select the type of tree you want, advises the specialist. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness which indicate that the tree has become too dry. If a tree is too dry when purchased, it will continue to dry out even though it is set in water.

In the home, place the tree away from all heat sources, such as a fireplace or heating unit, cautions Walterscheidt. Check the water level often; a tree may use as much as a pint of water a day. Keep your lighting system in good order

by inspecting and discarding wires with frayed insulation, broken sockets and loose connections. Use only lights and cords that carry the safety seal of Underwriters Laboratory.

As a final reminder, Walterscheidt advises removing gift wrappings and packing materials from around the tree once you have opened Christmas packages.

By selecting a fresh tree and following a few safety rules, everyone can have a safe and happy holiday season.

Art Fabrics, Inc. in Santa Anna

Local Company Enjoying Success In Silk Screen, Reproduction Business

A Santa Anna building that for many years housed the town's "pool hall" now is occupied by an interesting and unusual business. The artistic and creative work at the site is largely unknown to even those who live and work in the community.

Art Fabrics, Inc., owned and operated by Jim Laubhan, is perhaps the only business that manufactures velvet-flocked emblems that are used on caps, tee shirts and wind breakers. The emblems are designed, made and applied to the garments at the one location by a staff of seven full

and part-time employees. In operation here since 1972, Laubhan purchased basic equipment from his father in Odessa to start the business. As demand grew for monograms and insignia on shirts and garments, employees and equipment were added.

With the beginning of the cap "craze", Laubhan added equipment to produce the emblems by electro-static method. The flocking has proved very popular as it is cheaper to produce and the emblems give sharper detail than the usual embroidered

emblems. Equipment at the plant include cameras, printing equipment and machines to apply the emblems to caps or other garments.

Tony Malaer is in charge of art work and camera work, and Frances Richardson is shop supervisor. Others on the staff are Sherry Wilson, shipping clerk, Tammy Dunn, production, Raul Salazar, printing, Kelly Malaer, secretary and office manager, and Robin Chaffin, secretary and clerk.

The old West Texas Utilities Co. building on South Santa Fe Street was purchased by the company in 1976 for storage. Dozens of bolts of fabric and supplies, hundreds of tee shirts and nearly 200,000 caps are on shelves waiting to have emblems or monograms applied. Caps and shirts are purchased from other sources for the final stage of production.

Although the business has a great growth potential, Laubhan is eager to maintain high quality work and chooses to expand slowly. With the present staff, about 3,000 emblems can be produced each day, and from 3,000 to 5,000 finished caps are shipped from the local company each week.

Caps are sold to specialty salesmen, with no fewer than 50 made from one design. The largest single order has been for 5,000 emblems. Files at the business contain thousands of designs used during the eight

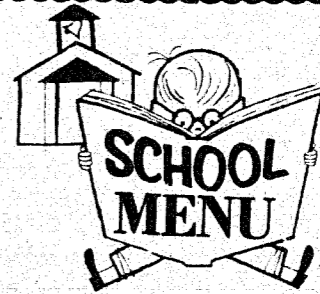
