The vaccine must be administered every three months, not annually as most pet diseases.

## ESA Chapter Given Award

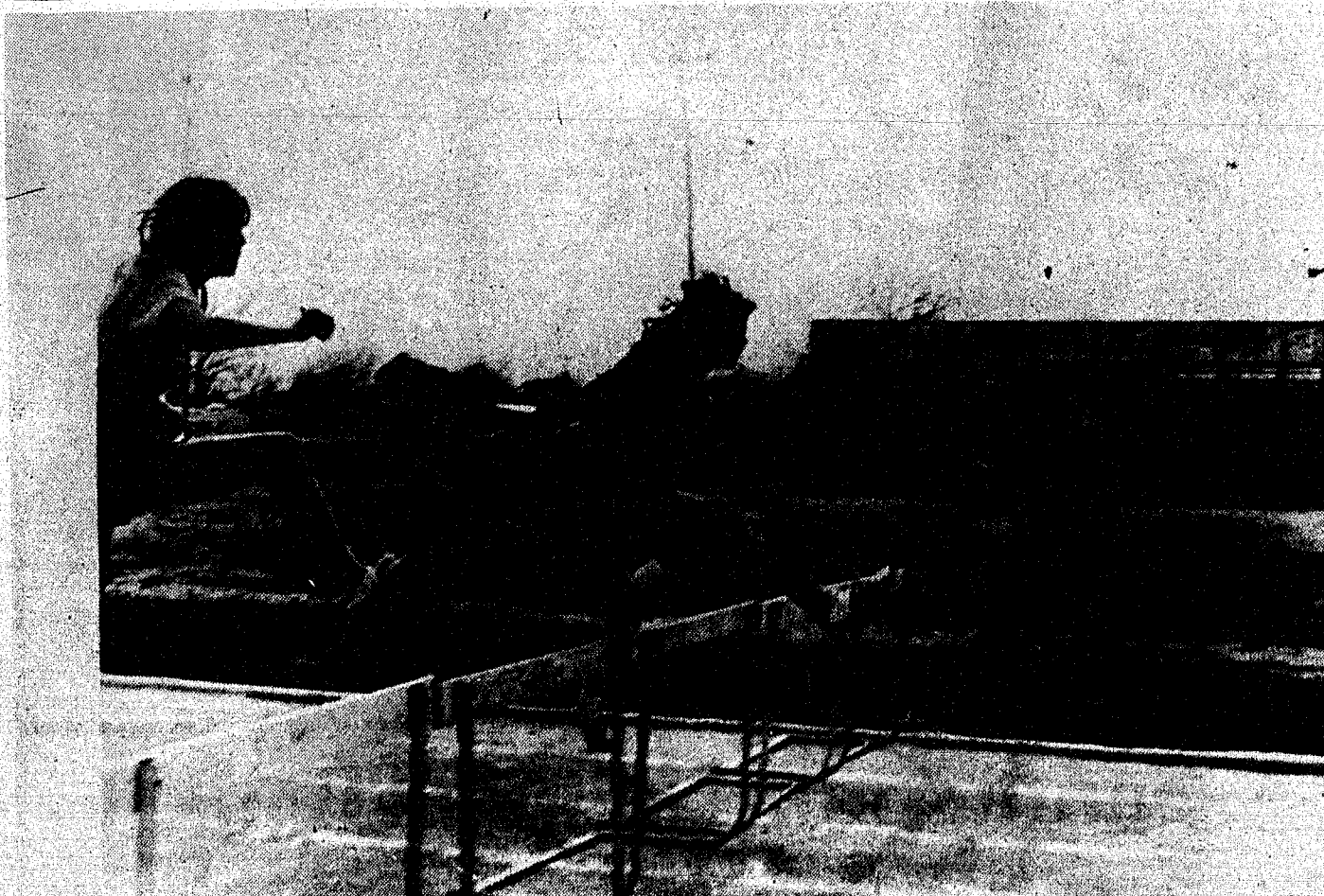

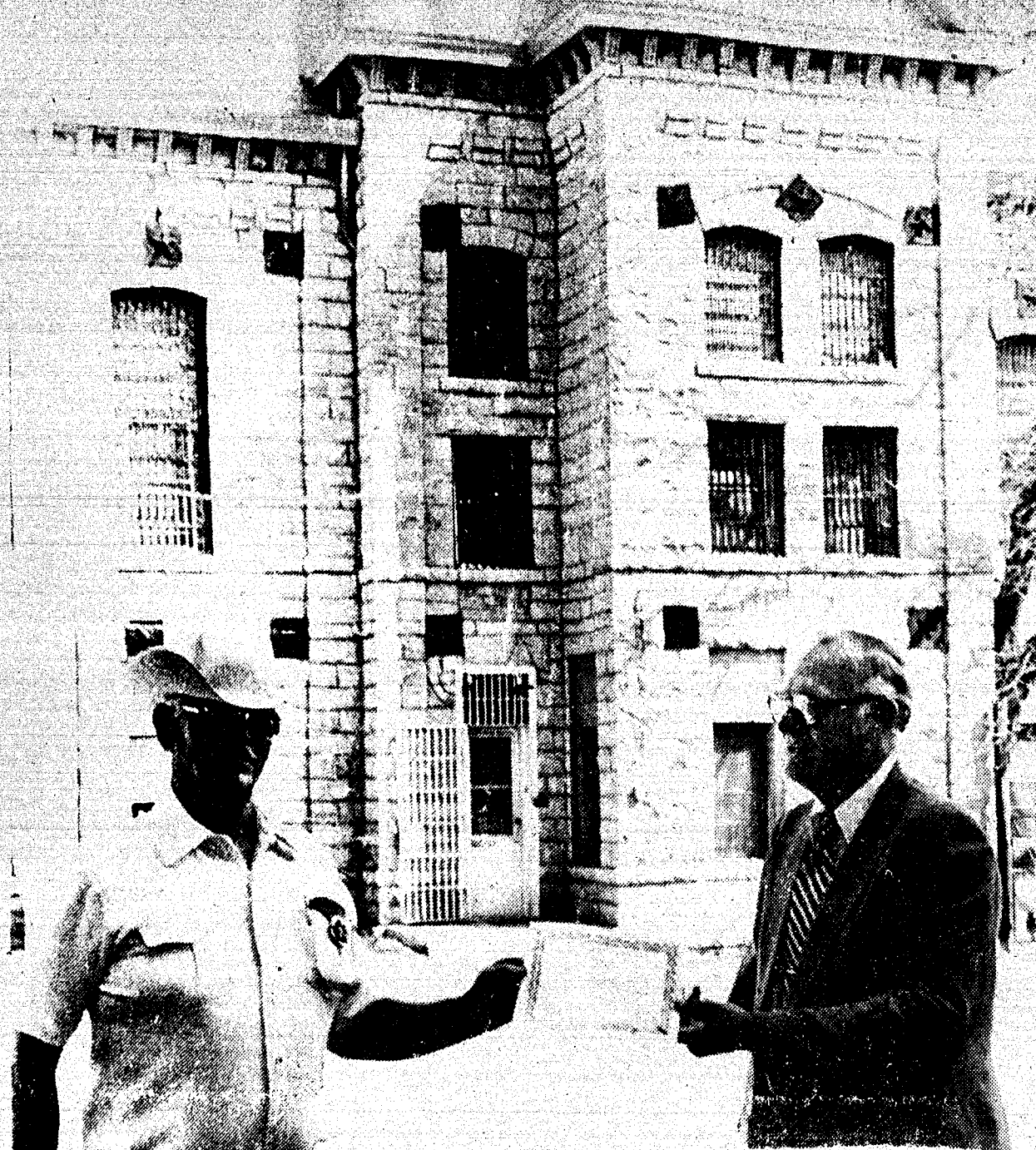


JUNIOR HIGH TRACK MEET WINNER from Santa Anna Friday included Janis Weathers, shown here leading her heat in the high hurdles.

The Coleman County Jail, an historic structure built in 1890, has recently been given certification by the official jail inspector, ending a period of remodeling to bring the facility up to required standard.

Sheriff H. F. Fenton listed some of the improvements, including new bunks, tables, smoke alarms, a new lighting system and alternate lighting

system, thermostat-controlled heating system, and installation of smaller windows in the upper floors. The interior of the old rock building has been completely repainted.

In order for area people to see the remodeling and renovated jail, open house is planned Sunday, March 29, from 2 to 4 p.m. Refreshments will be served during the afternoon, and visitors will be given a tour of the jail.

## More Drilling Sites Staked in Community

Tri Petroleum, Santa Anna, spotted No. 5 Max Eubank in the regular field two miles west of Santa Anna.

Having a proposed depth of 1,990 feet, it spots 330 feet from the north and 930 feet from the east lines of Subdivision 60, Wade H. Bynum Survey 272.

The lease is composed of 179 acres.

\*\*\*\*\*

A wildcat re-entry, producing from the Cross Plains Sand, was completed two miles northwest of Santa Anna.

It is Delta-Gulf Inc. No 1J. W. McClellan, spotting 2,500 feet from the south and 1,200 feet from the west lines of Mund Cross Survey 44.

It had an absolute, open flow of 1,609,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 1,390-97 feet.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 1,483 feet. Total depth was 2,075 feet and plugged back to 1,483 feet.

Another wildcat in the county will be drilled seven miles south of Santa Anna as Charles M. Children, Abilene, No. 1 Hot Spring Ranch.

The proposed 1,650 foot venture is located on a 640-acre lease.

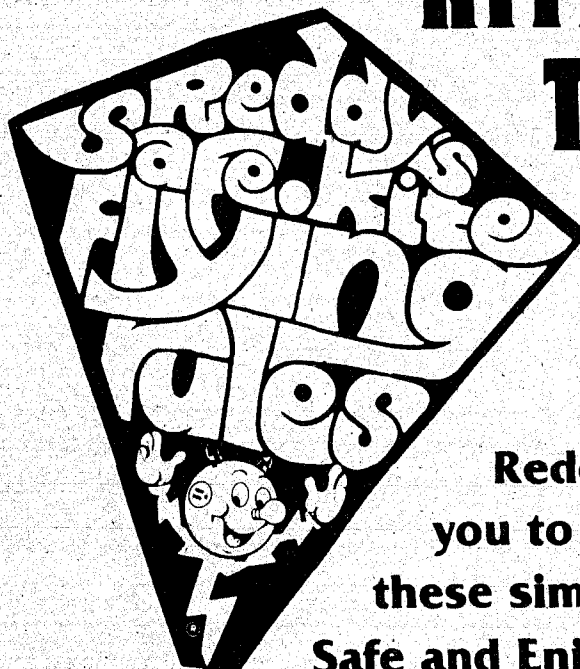

# Farm Product Sales Boost County Economy

The market value of agricultural products sold by the 857 farms in Coleman County amounted to \$16.7 million for 1978 or an average of \$19,530 each, up from \$10.2 million in 1974 with an accompanying increase in production costs, according to a preliminary report of the 1978 Census of Agriculture, released recently by the Bureau of Census, Department of Commerce.

A breakdown of the county's total agricultural sales for 1978 followed that for 1974, and is as follows: Crops, \$2.2 million compared with \$1.8 million; livestock, poultry and their products, \$14.5 and \$8.4 million.

While value of gross sales rose, the farmers' costs also climbed since 1974. For example, expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry for 1978 were \$3.3 million compared to \$2.4 million; costs of gasoline and other petroleum products were \$1.2 million compared to \$758,000 in 1974. Farm energy costs of all types totaled \$1.4 million for 1978. The estimated market value of machinery increased from \$13,552 to \$19,760.

Of the total farms in the county, 100 had gross sales of \$40,000 or more and 498 had sales of under \$10,000. Farms operated by individuals of families represented 87 percent; farms operated by corporations accounted for 2 percent. Some 81 percent of the operators owned all or part of the land they operated.

In 1978 the average age of farm operator was 54.5 years. Since 1974 the proportion of operators listing farming as their principal occupation changed from 60 percent to 40 percent.

Data for acreage and inventories for 1978 and 1974 are generally comparable.

Other results of the census show the 857 farms counted in 1978 had an average size of 865 acres. For 1974, 847 farms were counted with an average size of 882 acres. About 6,000 less acres were in cultivation in 1978. The inventory of cattle and calves changed from 62,702 in 1974 to 52,948 in 1978. The number of pigs and hogs changed from 4,119 to 4,286. Sheep numbers changed from 91,712 to 72,637 in 1978, while the number sold changed from 49,837 to 47,316.

Acreages of almost all crops decreased during the four-year period.

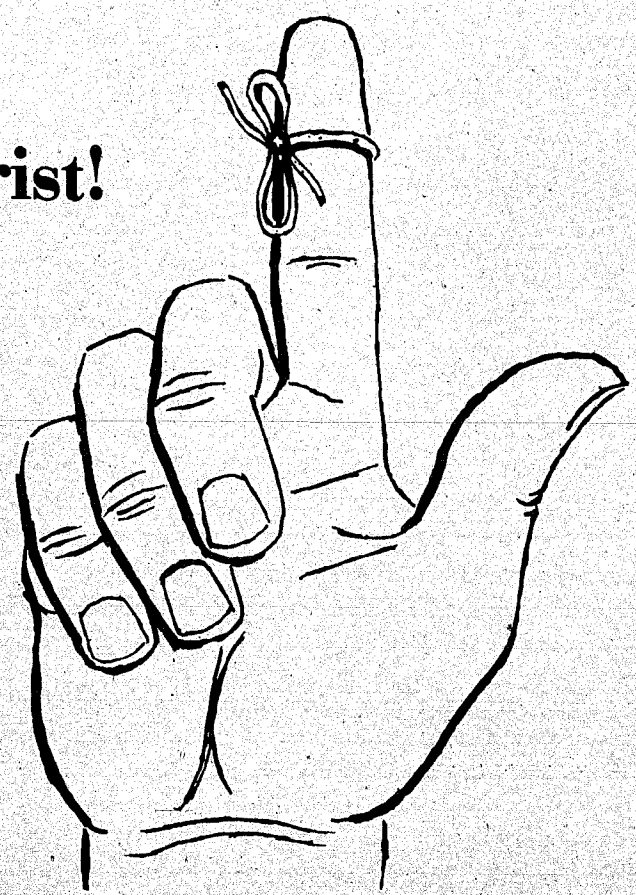

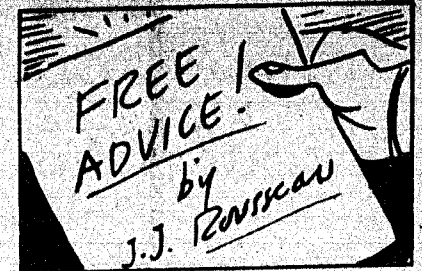

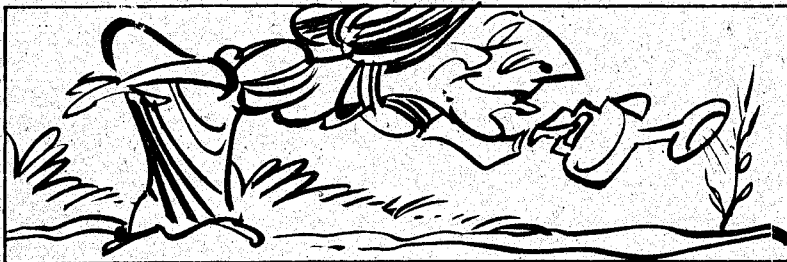

#### PREVENTION

Dear Dr. Pettey: Is there anything I could have done to prevent my children becoming nearsighted? All three had to put on glasses when they were about twelve years old.

You didn't say whether or not you and your spouse are nearsighted but it would be my guess that at least one of you is myopic.

Although it does not hold true in every case, many offspring of nearsighted parents do become myopic themselves. The genes do seem to be involved in such cases.

However, some humans become myopic for other reasons: Long-time, concentrated, intensive eye work.

at close ranges (especially on flat surfaces) can induce myopia. Body chemistry imbalances are strongly suspect as a cause in some instances. Some believe excessively large pupils cause nearsighted blur. Others think the actual length of the eyeball is a factor also. So many cases becoming myopic at about the age of puberty make many of us feel fairly certain that hormonal imbalances are another culprit.

In view of all that, I can't say you could have done anything to prevent your children's nearsightedness. But before the next generation comes along, perhaps some preventive measures may be discovered.

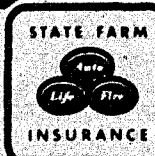

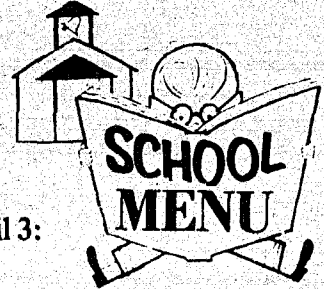

## Vehicle Accidents Kill Many Children

Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death and a major cause of epilepsy and paraplegia for children under the age of five. In fact, after the critical early weeks of life, a child is more likely to die in an automobile crash than from all of the common childhood diseases combined, diseases which parents protect their children from through immunization.

There is an effective immunization against this epidemic - the crash-tested child restraint (or car safety seat.)

A recent study showed that proper use of these safety seats can reduce deaths up to 90 percent and injuries from 50 to 75 percent. The tragedy is that over 90 percent of all child passengers ride in cars completely unprotected.

In a crash, an unrestrained child becomes a missile, projected forward until stopped by something, usually the dashboard or windshield. It doesn't take an accident to injure a child. Even more children are injured being thrown around when the driver has to brake suddenly or swerve to avoid an accident.

Contrary to what many parents believe, they cannot safely hold and protect a child on their lap. This is often more dangerous than letting a child

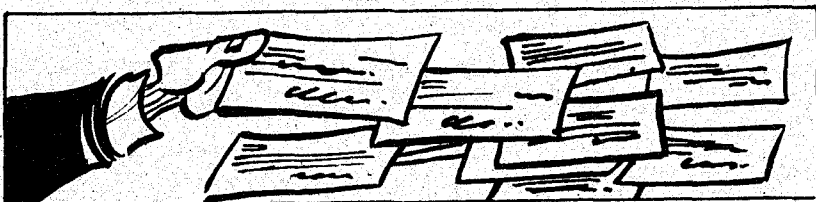
ride unrestrained. In a 30 mph crash, a ten pound baby becomes a 300 pound force. If the adult is restrained, the child can be torn from their grasp; if the adult is not restrained, the child can be crushed between the dashboard and the adult.

A new federal standard requiring all child restraint systems intended for use in motor vehicles to meet certain strength and performance standards went into effect January 1. All car safety seats manufactured after December 31 must pass dynamic tests that show they can provide adequate protection for children in actual crashes.

A crash-tested child restraint spreads the crash forces evenly over a child's fragile body. The seat is fastened to the car by the seat belt already in the car and the child is secured in the seat by a built-in five-point safety harness (with two shoulder straps, two waist straps and one crotch strap) and or a protective shield. Lightweight, plastic feeder seats and baby carriers are not designed to protect an infant in an automobile and should be used only in the
