Public Meeting Set Monday For Property Owners

In compliance with Senate Bill 621 and House Bill 1060 which enacted the State Property Tax Code, the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District was created effective January 1, 1980. Members included Harold Pittard, chairman, Barbara Kingsbery, secretary, and Cliff Drinkard, Harold Bragg and Bill Sneed, members. John Skelton was appointed Chief Appraiser.

Basic provisions required taxing jurisdictions to do the following:

1. Agricultural values to be given all owners who apply.
2. Taxing jurisdictions provide a market value and an agricultural value on all agricultural lands.
3. Provide tax maps
4. Require a re-appraisal on all real properties within the countywide district. All taxing entities in the county will use these appraisals in 1982.

The ultimate goal of the State Property Tax Code is the equalization of values on all properties subject to taxation within the district. This has no bearing on the actual tax paid by any taxpayer on any piece of real property.

An example of the equalization concept would suggest that a \$25,000 house be taxed as such, and a \$50,000 house would be taxed accordingly. The basic concept is that all properties will be inspected, measured and appraised from exterior construction details on an equalized basis.

This will apply to all houses, vacant lots, commercial land and buildings, industrial properties, apartments and agricultural properties. All agricultural properties will have an agricultural value and a market value on the land. All rural improvements will be put on at market value. These will include dwellings and major barns, sheds and outbuildings.

The agricultural use provision states that the land will be classified according to use (cropland, pastureland, etc.). The average five-year income is then capitalized at the preceding December Federal Land Bank Rate plus 2 1/2 percent. For 1981 this rate will be 12 1/2 percent.

A tract of land with an average income of \$5 per acre

SAHS Boys Team To Meet Evant March 10

The Santa Anna Mountaineer basketball team will represent District 29-A in the Bi-District playoff next month, meeting Evant in an 8 p.m. game at Brownwood Coliseum Tuesday, March 10.

The Santa Anna team had a perfect 12-0 district record and a 26-3 record for the season.

Coached this year by Charles Brewster, the Mountaineers are seeking their second consecutive Bi-District title.

Several practice games are on the schedule during the next two weeks, including a game at Abilene Cooper Gymnasium Monday night of next week with the Roscoe team, and a game at home Friday, February 27, with the Dublin team.

In the last two games, the Mountaineers won 112-62 over Rochelle with Clifton scoring 33 points and Bradley Wardlow scoring 26. Others in double figures were Danny Guerrero and Ricky Anderson with 12 each. Wardlow led in rebounds and assists with nine each, and Guerrero led with seven steals.

In a practice game with Hamlin last week, Clifton scored 20 points and Guerrero had 12. Buzzard and Wardlow had nine rebounds each, and Buzzard and Dwayne Warnock had two assists each. Guerrero had three steals.

Clifton is leading scorer for the team with 629 points this season, and also leads in rebounds with 253. Buzzard leads in assists with 110, and Guerrero is leading with 95 steals. Clifton has a field goal

average of 60 percent, and Buzzard has a 62 percent average on free throws.

In the final girls game of the season, Santa Anna won over Rochelle 54-37, with Robbie Clifton leading with 16 points and eight rebounds.

Gayla Pape had 14 points

and six rebounds, and Tara Stark scored 12 points and had eight steals. Others scoring were Julie Jones, 8; Holly Smith and Lori Smith, 2.

The final game was one of the best for the local girls, who ended the season as runners-up to the Novice team.

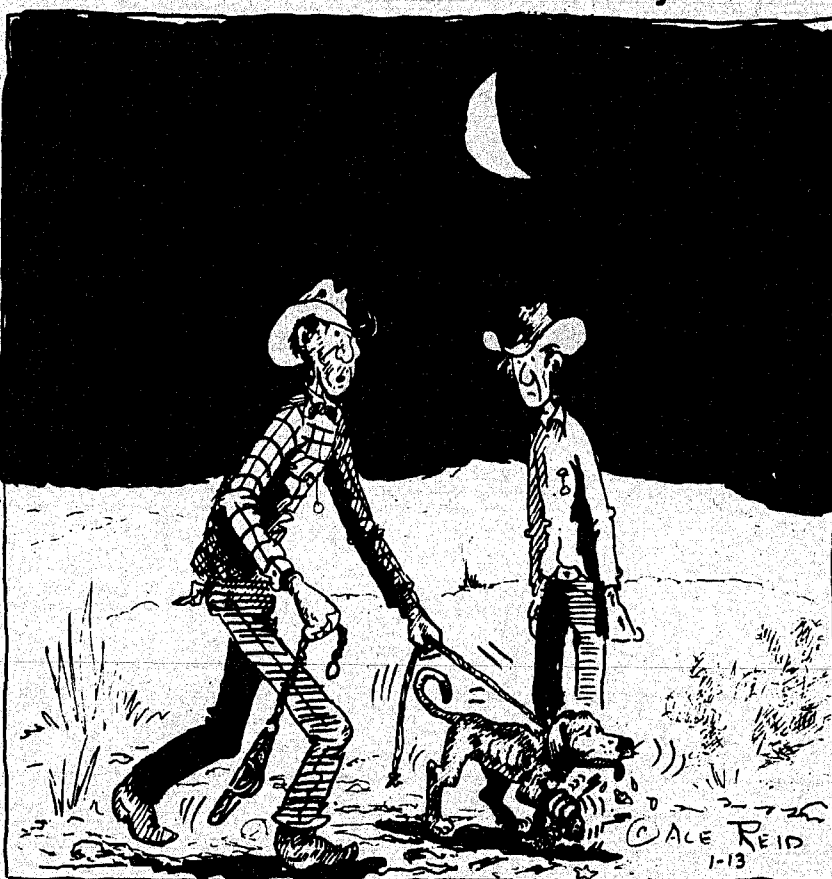
Willie Reveile, 99, also from Santa Anna, had the most total pledges of the event. She has resided at the Inn seven years.

would have an ag use value of \$41 per acre (rounded). The corresponding market value might be \$300 per acre.

An open meeting will be held February 23 at the Coleman County Courthouse in Coleman at 6 p.m. Available to answer questions will be John Skelton, Chief Appraiser, Philip A. McCormick, MAI, ARA, who is consultant to the Tax District, and board members.

Beginning in the next week or so, representatives and employees of the Tax District will begin making inspections of selected properties to check cost schedules and depreciation analysis. An on-site inspection of all properties in the county will follow in the subsequent six to eight months needed to complete the project.

Any person or persons involved in this inspection will knock on your door and identify themselves if you are at home. Their employment can be verified at the Coleman County Tax Appraisal Office at 625-4155 in Coleman.

If you have questions regarding the State Property Tax Code, re-appraisal methods, effect on taxes, exemptions or any related topic, make plans to attend the meeting Monday in Coleman.

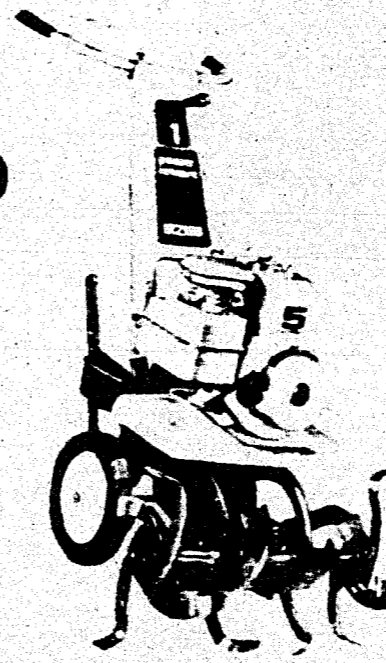


