Organizations 'Spotlight' MISD

Muleshoe Independent School District has been selected to participate in the 1988 Spotlight of Small Schools at the American Association of School Administrators Annual Convention in Las Vegas, NV on February 21, and at the Rural and Small District Annual Excellence Fair at the National School Board Association Annual Convention in New Orleans on March 18.

The American Association of School Administrators small school committee invited Muleshoe ISD to display and exhibit the district's school improvement management model, known as the Muleshoe Effective Teaching Program [MET-Pro], and the district's school improvement management model, known as the Outcomes Driven Development Model [ODDM].

The teaching model was developed locally while the management model is an adaptation of a generic model developed by Dr. John Champ- lin, professor at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Both models represent the district's commitment to excellence and an ongoing emphasis on professional growth and development. The Spotlight Exhibit is scheduled for Sunday, February, 21, from 12 to 1:30 p.m. in the Hilton Hotel, Pavilion II, which adjoins the Convention Center, in Las Vegas.

CofC Essay Contest Starts February 1

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is repeating the scholarship contest among school age students of the Muleshoe business area, according to an announcement made Friday.

Last year, the students competed on their grade level with an art entry or essay on the theme "What's Right With Muleshoe."

Members of the Chamber of Commerce awarded \$800 in scholarships to high school students in the form of \$400 in savings bonds, and approximately \$315 in gift certificates. The awards were presented to the students during various awards assemblies at the end of the 1987 school year.

The topic this year will be "The First 70 Years In Bailey County."

As a tribute to the late Roy Farley, and in recognition of his hard work in the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, this year's scholarships will be awarded in his memory.

The contest will begin on February 1 and all entries must be turned into the principal's office at the student's school no later than March 1.

Students from kindergarten age through fifth grades may choose between an essay, a poster (no larger than 12x24) or a visual project to expand on the theme.

Students from junior high school through high school should write an essay or provide an art entry. The essays may be either on a historical or literary topic.

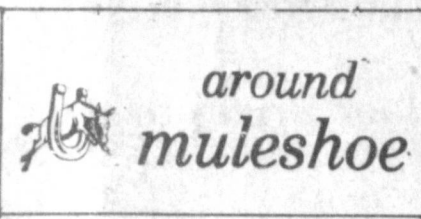
A separate category has been added this year for art work in junior high and high school. The winning entry may be selected as a building or window mural so the student is asked to keep this in mind, and keep the art to scale for enlarging for a large mural.

Also, no names on the front of the entry, please. If the teachers or secretaries will help number the entries and provide a sealed master list, the CofC committee said it will be greatly appreciated.

There will be two awards in each grade level. Kindergarten through fifth grade students will receive a \$5 gift certificates for first, and two free Mule Putt miniature golf games for second place.

Sixth grade through eighth grade will receive for first place, a \$20 gift certificate and second place will be one meal at a local

TEAMS Test Dates Given

H. John Fuller, superintendent of the Muleshoe Independent School System, announces that the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) Tests will be given to students of Muleshoe ISD in grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 on February 9-11.

The TEAMS Tests have been instituted to measure minimum basic skills in mathematics, reading and writing, said the superintendent. This program was mandated by House Bill 72, passed by the Second Called Session of the 68th Texas Legislature in July, 1984.

TEAMS testing is a relatively new concept that school officials now have to assist in program and staff evaluation. The results are being closely monitored by the Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency, added Fuller.

Although student placement is not directly connected to the individual student results, the failure to master the TEAMS objective at any grade level indicates a need for remediation and/or special assistance.

"The Muleshoe School District is committed in providing quality instruction and strong remediation for students needing additional help in achieving mastery," added the superintendent.

Exit level tests are administered twice a year, in October and May, and requires mastery before a diploma can be awarded by any accredited school in Texas.

"Parents of students in these specific grades can really cooperate by encouraging students to be in attendance at school on these dates and to see that students get the proper rest before and during the testing period," Fuller suggested.

Program Date Drawing Near

'Leading Muleshoe,' the leadership program sponsored by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, is still accepting applications, according to the CofC office. Deadline for applications has been set for February 5.

A class enrollment of 12 is needed for the course and space is still available, said the CofC manager, Toni Eagle. 'Leading Muleshoe' is offered at the fee of \$135 per student; and a business, club or individual can sponsor a student.

Mrs. Eagle explained that students in the program will receive instruction in all phases of the county and city, with the actual leaders of the community doing the instructing. One day a month is required by each student; and attendance is important, she added.

Be sure to call immediately to place your name, or that of your representative on the roll sheet of the 'Leading Muleshoe' class of 1988.

City and county officers coordinated efforts and worked in lightning-like fashion to take the seven into custody following action by a Special Grand Jury that had been called for Friday morning.

Each of the sealed indictments read: "For the delivery of a Controlled Substance."

A police spokesperson said the indictments were returned Friday morning in Bailey County as a result of several months of investigation by officers from the Bailey County Sheriff's office and the Muleshoe City Police Department.

The officer said the investigation began about September of last year, and as the drug investigation continued, officers were able to 'pin down' several local residents.

Early Friday afternoon, officers from the Muleshoe City Police Department met at the Bailey County Sheriff's office in the Law Enforcement Center to coordinate the arrests.

Moving quickly, the officers 'hit' several locations in Muleshoe almost simultaneously.

Shortly before 5 p.m., the seventh and final suspect had been taken into custody and was at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

This despite several interruptions for two fights, and a burglar alarm or two.

The seven were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jack Bates, who set bonds ranging from \$20,000-\$40,000, as some of the suspects were facing more than one charge of allegedly Delivering a Controlled Substance.

Charged in the case were Alonzo Ontiveros, Gene Paul Davis, John Carrion, Carmen Vega, Jr., Lee Edward Murphy, Charles Dwayne Chapman and Johnny Pacheco.

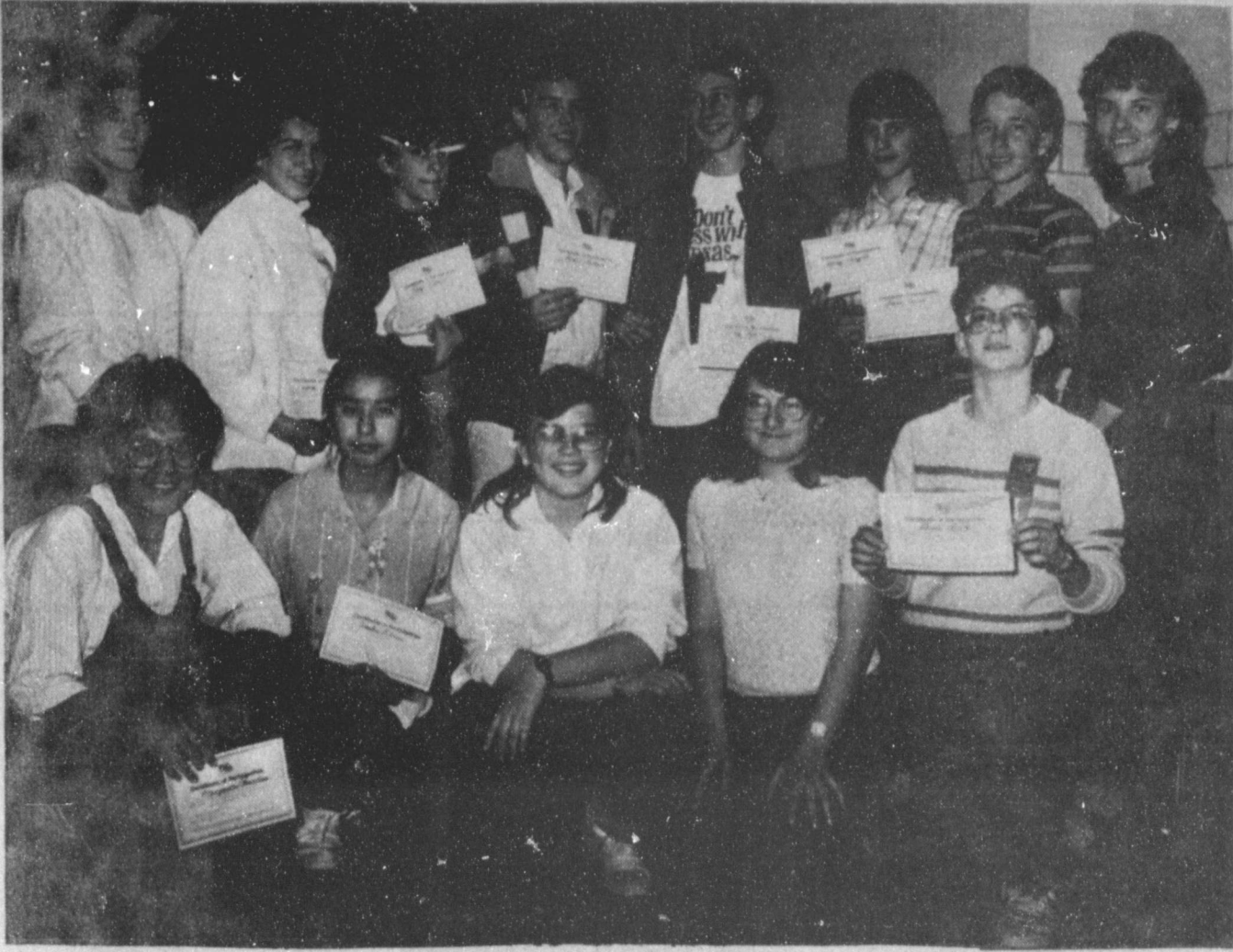
Tax Assessor Kathleen Hayes Asks Re-Election

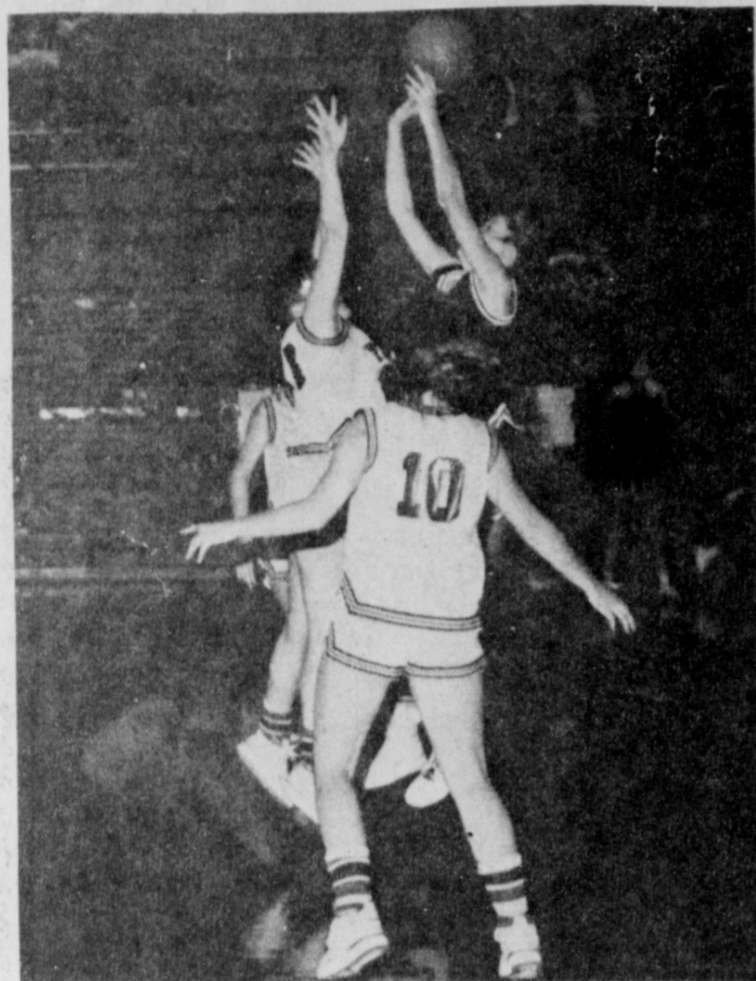

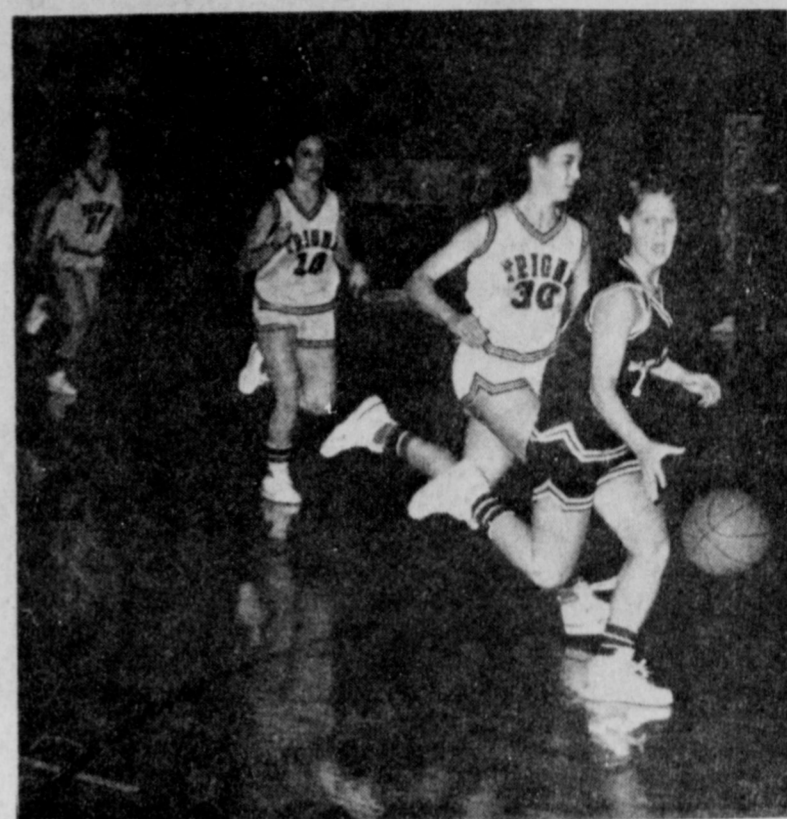

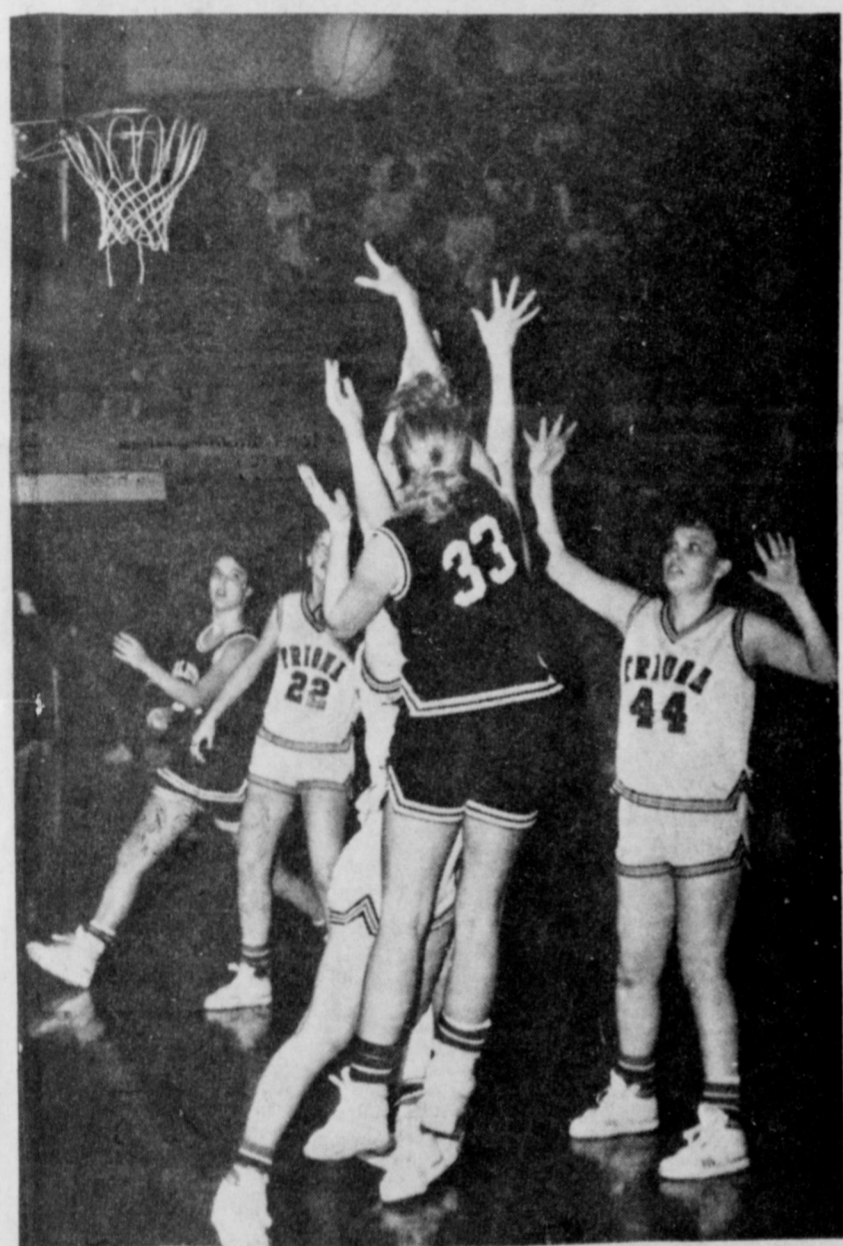

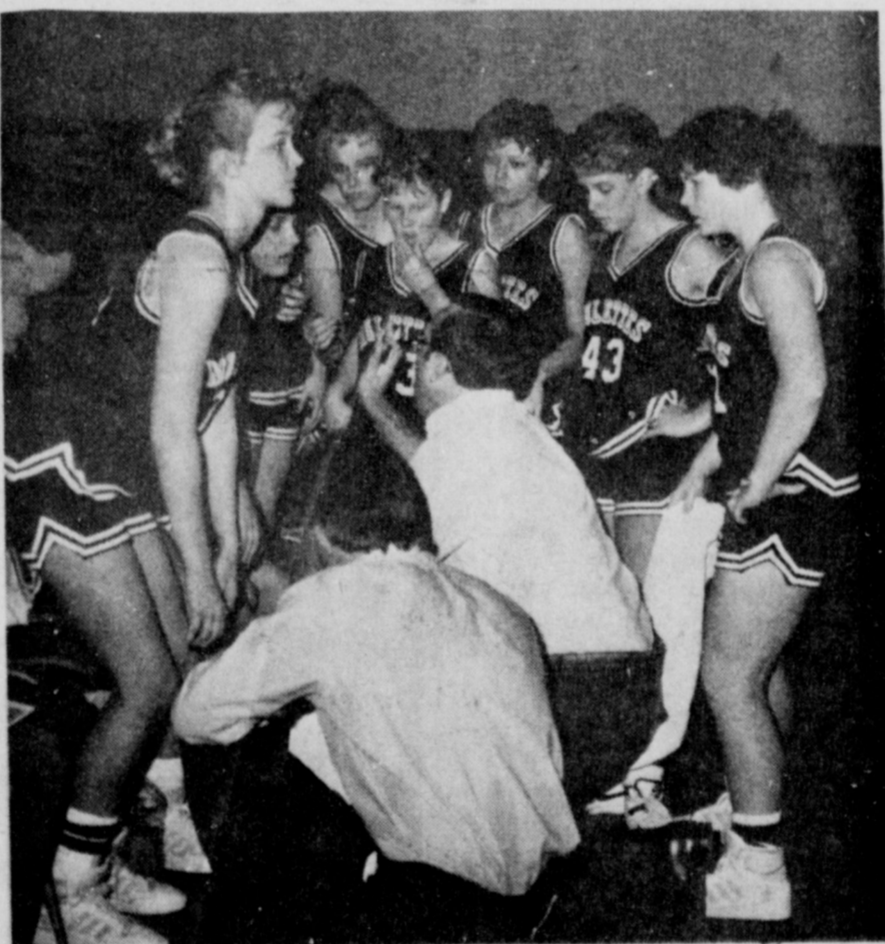

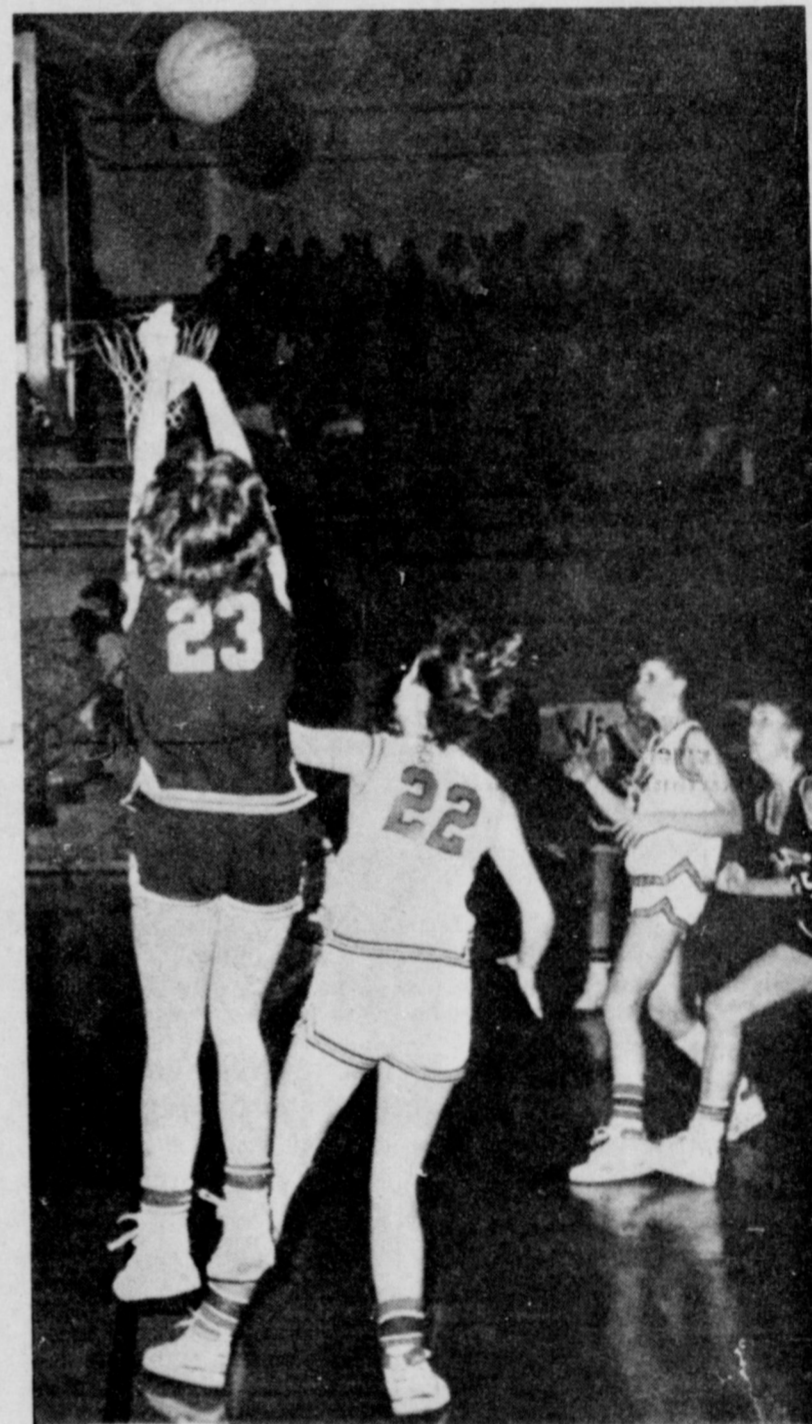

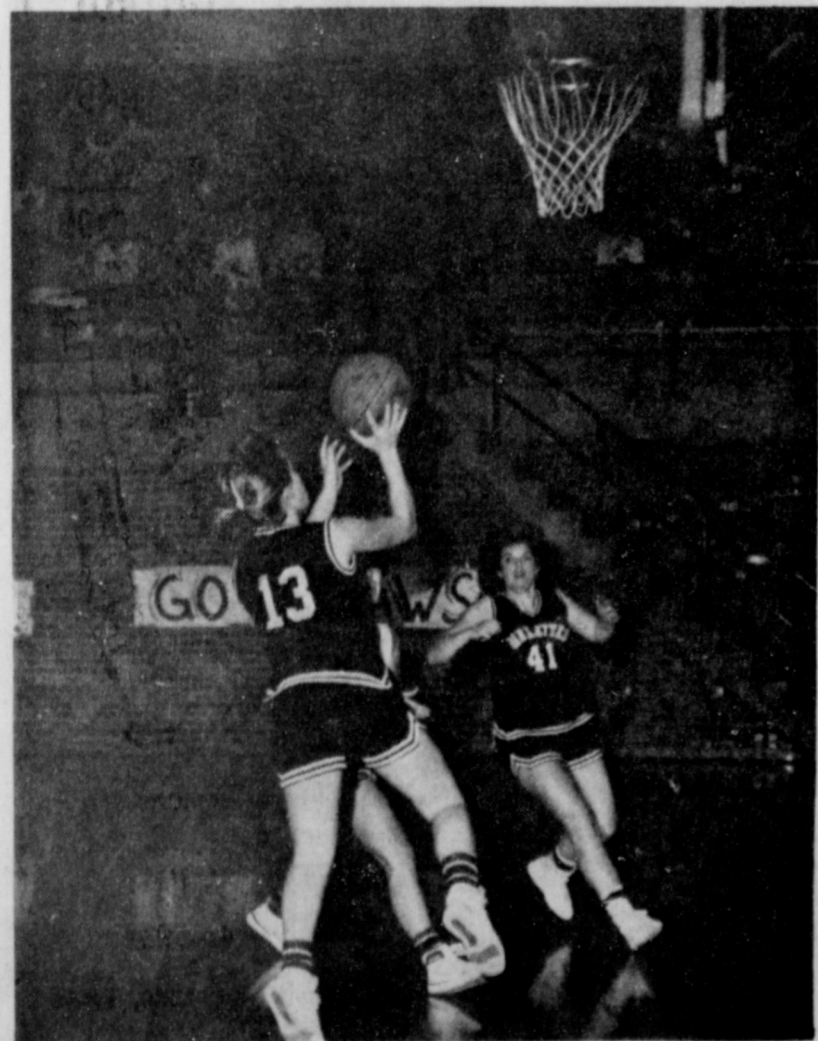

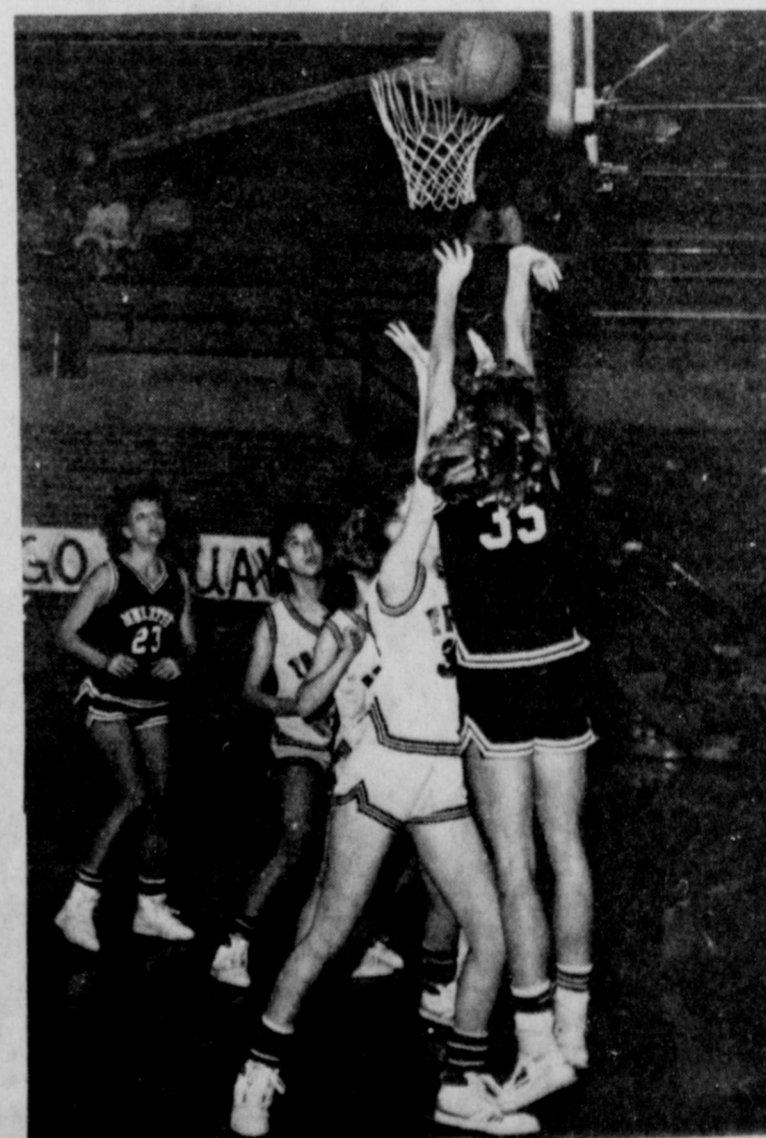

## Republican Candidate Visits Here Thursday

Wes Gilbreath, Republican candidate for the U. S. Senate, brought his campaign to the Panhandle/South Plains area, January 28-29.

Gilbreath, 58, is said to be a 'conservative' businessman, and is from Houston. He is a longtime activist in the GOP party, both locally and nationally, he said.

Thursday afternoon, the candidate, his wife, Pat, and an aide, Robert Bueker, were in Muleshoe for a reception and press conference at Muleshoe State Bank community room.

He told the small group at the bank that he was looking for a challenge, and picked the biggest one in the state -- an attempt to unseat longtime Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

"We cannot stand another six years of Lloyd Bentsen," said Gilbreath. "I don't care if you are Democrat or Republican, we (The State of Texas) cannot stand another six years of Senator Bentsen."

The candidate said one of the greatest needs is to balance the budget, to get down to the nitty gritty, and cut personal taxes.

He reminded that a person works from January to May for the government, "and, that's not my idea of Free Enterprise," he added. Gilbreath also said each child born today, is born owing \$10,000, with people still maintaining a lackadaisical attitude about who is the U. S. Government," said the Republican candidate.

He also said he was not saying that Wes Gilbreath could do it alone. "But, Wes Gilbreath can be a voice -- a viable voice," said the Houston businessman.

He cited his background as an accountant, and being a successful businessman. "I know what it's like to build a business," he continued. "I am familiar with all government forms. Small businesses are failing today because the small businessman does not have the knowledge, or time, to take care of all the government business that goes with it."

The candidate touched on the

His sons manage most of his operations today.

He and his wife, Pat, share 13 children and 18 grandchildren.

**CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME**

**A homestead exemption** lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

**You qualify** for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

**Exemptions are available** to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

**Apply to** your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

**The deadline** for applications is April 30, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

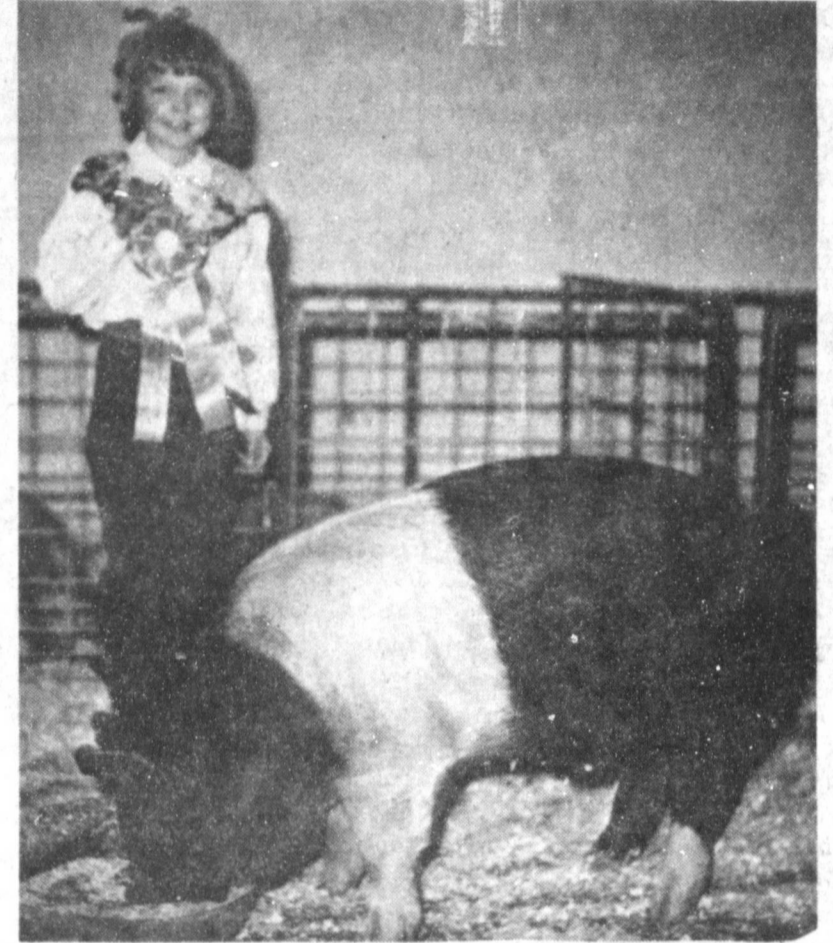

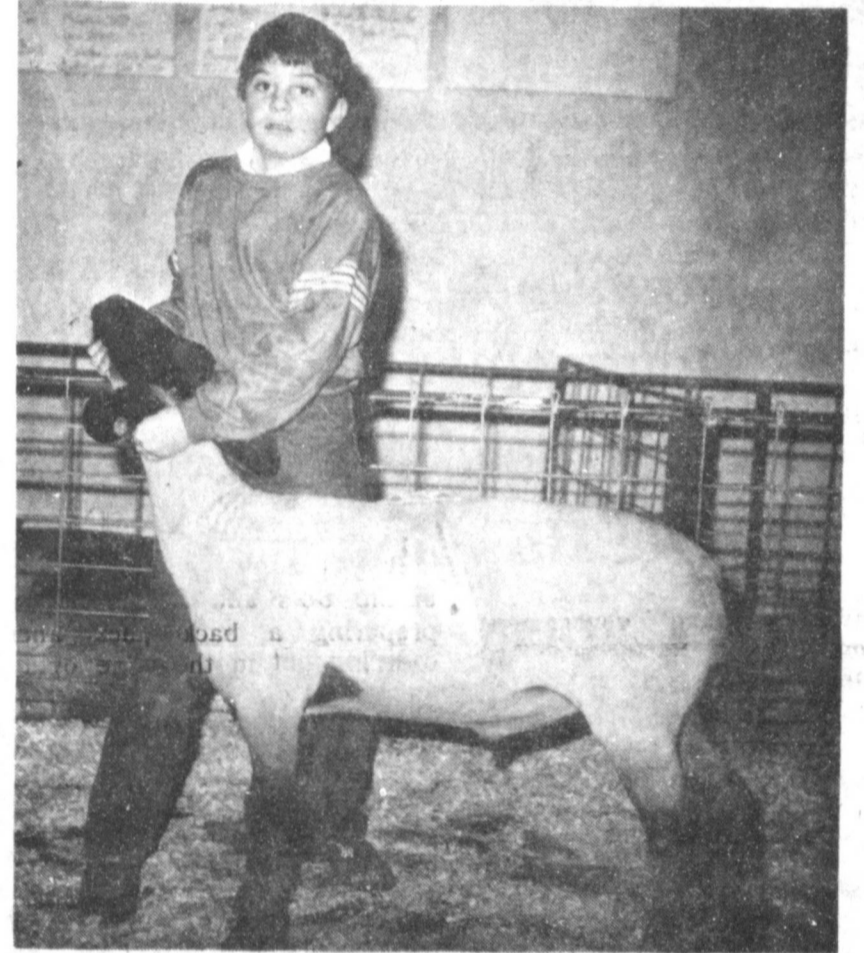

## HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN--In a tumultuous week that can only mean the election campaign season has begun in earnest.

The Texas Republican Party began investigating whether signatures were forged on the petitions of presidential candidates Bob Dole and Alexander Haig.

Robert Campbell, a leading Democrat on the Texas Supreme Court, resigned from the bench, angering his party's officials by giving the GOP governor another free appointment; meanwhile, the Republicans launched their slate to reform the high court.

Former state Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, unmasked his well-veiled candidacy for the Supreme Court and cranked up his organization of liberals.

In order to avoid a primary fight with Doggett, former Congressman Jack Hightower switched his campaign over to the seat being vacated by Campbell.

A former head of the Ku Klux Klan filed for president on the Texas Democratic ticket.

### Forgeries Suspected

A spot check of petitions by *The Dallas Morning News* turned up evidence that dozens of names had been forged on the Dole and Haig petitions, including the names of Democrats and one dead person, all from Houston.

Officials in both those campaigns denied knowledge of forgeries, and the Texas Republican Party is seeking out the overzealous worker who may have committed the felony.

The position of those candidates on the Texas ballot could be in jeopardy.

### Justice Resigns

While the presidential race will dominate the season, it looks like most of the good action will take place in--of all the unlikely places--the Texas Supreme Court races.

Campbell's resignation caught Democratic headquarters by surprise, and they blasted him for giving Gov. Bill Clements "another backroom appointment."

Some party faithfuls contend the party is in no position to exhibit self-righteousness about backroom maneuvering, since it's under fire for favoring one presidential candidate while charged with the duty of conducting a fair and impartial primary election.

The surprise resignation of a Republican District Judge in San Antonio left somewhat of a strain on GOP intentions there when it looked like Democrats would be kept off the ballot altogether. However, Gov. Clements stepped in and restored the race to the voters.

### Season's Top Secret

The rhubarb over Campbell's departure was somewhat settled on the Democratic side when Hightower used the opportunity to switch targets and avoid a primary fight with Doggett.

Controversial Doggett, adored by the liberals and abhorred by the conservatives, should get the prize for the season's best-kept secret. Not until the filing deadline

approached did Doggett reveal his plans to regain public office.

Some saw a basic irony in the initial Doggett-Hightower match-up, for Doggett is closely aligned with Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, to the extent that they share much of the same Austin liberal support.

The irony was that Jack Hightower could be confused with Jim Hightower by uninformed voters--the old name-game snare which is common in Texas.

### High Court Battleground

The struggle for political dominance of this state will be fought in 1988 on the Supreme Court campaign trail. Certainly, the scenario is in dire disarray, and perhaps well-matched.

At issue is whether the court should be left or right, and whether justices should be elected or appointed.

For starters, the majority of justices aren't happy with recently departed Chief Justice John Hill, who quit in mid-term to lobby for an appointed court.

The expose on CBS' "Sixty Minutes" made justices suspect in the eyes of the nation and as Justice Oscar Mauzy implied in remarks last week, it's war.

Then when Campbell quit to campaign to keep elected judges, the other faction got angry.

Presently, it's the most divisive political issue to hit the Supreme Court and legal profession this decade.

Democrats have lost the edge. Gov. Clements is sitting with two appointments and a well-funded reform slate to topple a Democratic court which is at war with itself.

Observers are convinced it's going to be a bitter fight. The issue of wholesale impropriety by some justices is what started

this confrontation, and if the warriors get out of hand during the campaign, Texans may wait a long time before the Supreme Court is again viewed as the hallowed halls of decorum.

## Stopping Smoking

Smart operators all over the country are promoting stop-smoking clinics. They claim they can show weak-willed addicts how they can muster up the gumption to stop smoking.

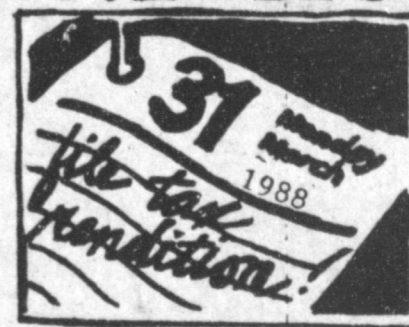

## PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



## HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

### A rendition

is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

### You must file

a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income--such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

### You may want

to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion

of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

### File renditions

with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.

### The new deadline

for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

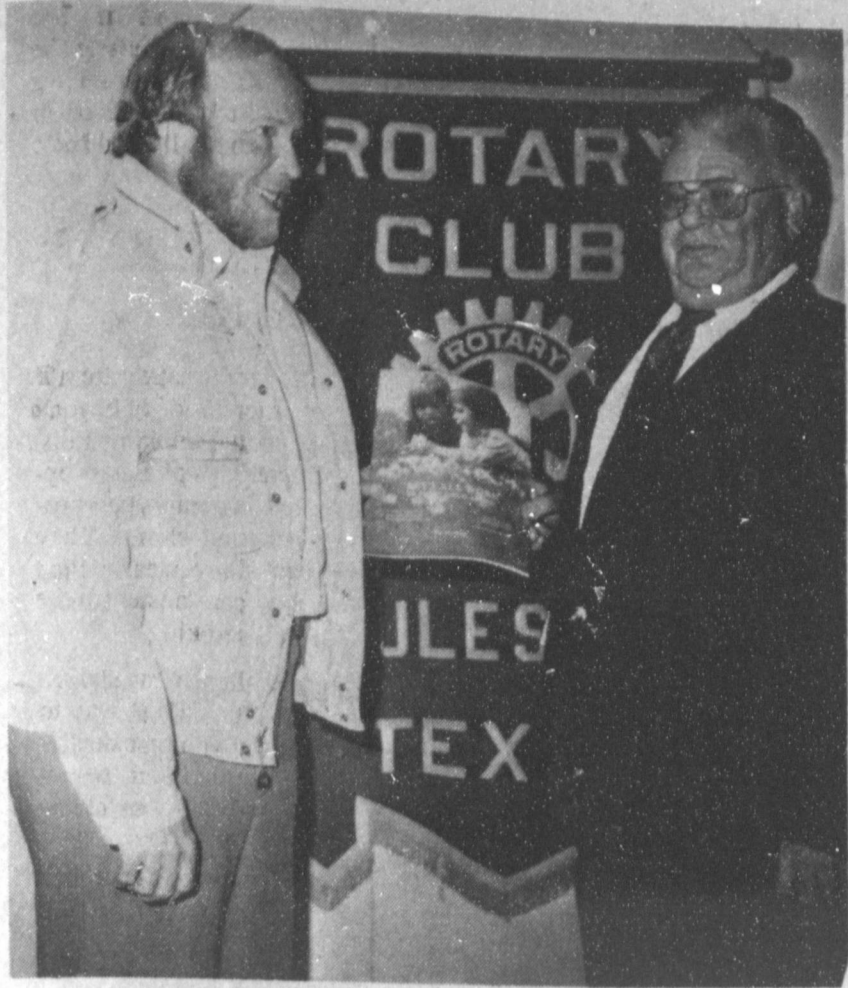

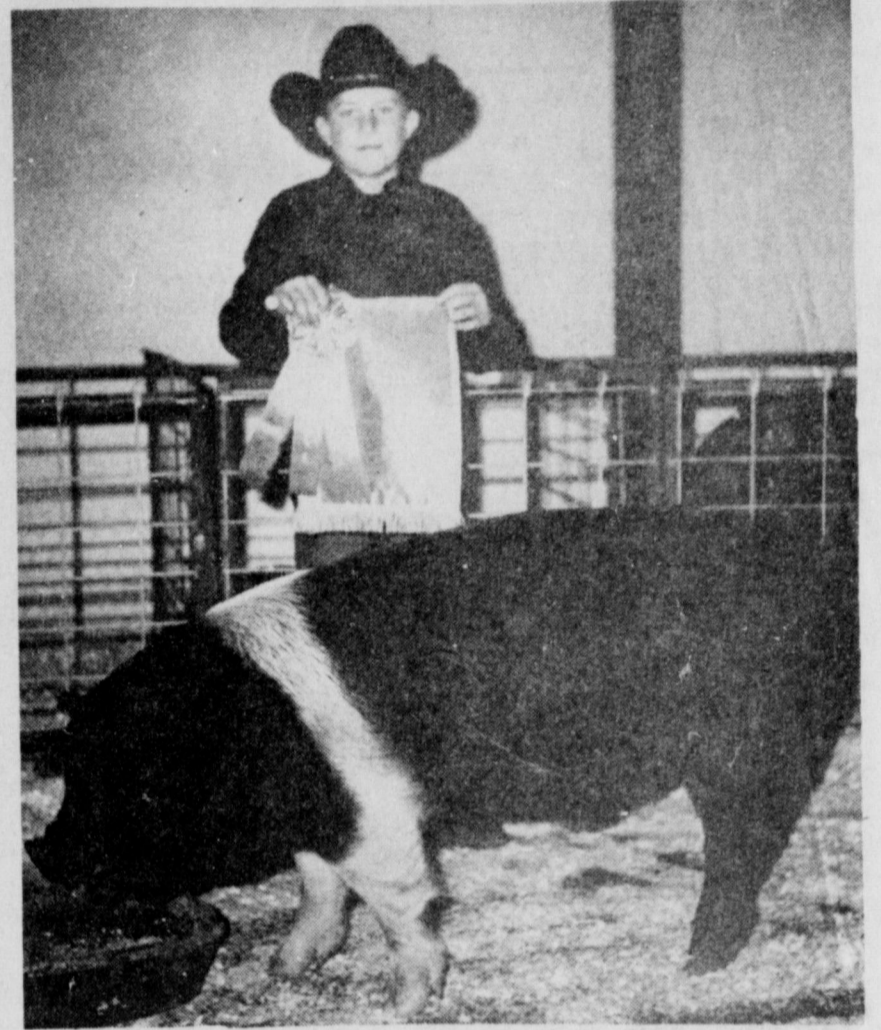

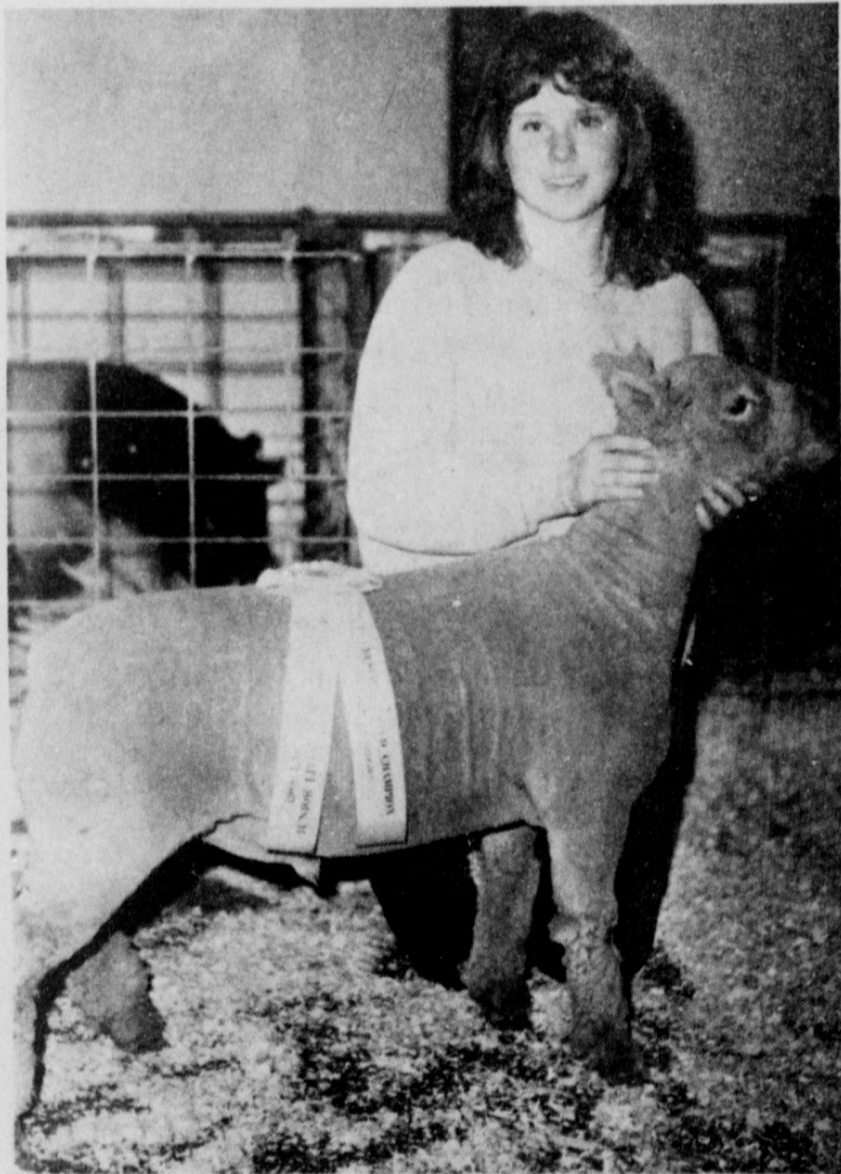

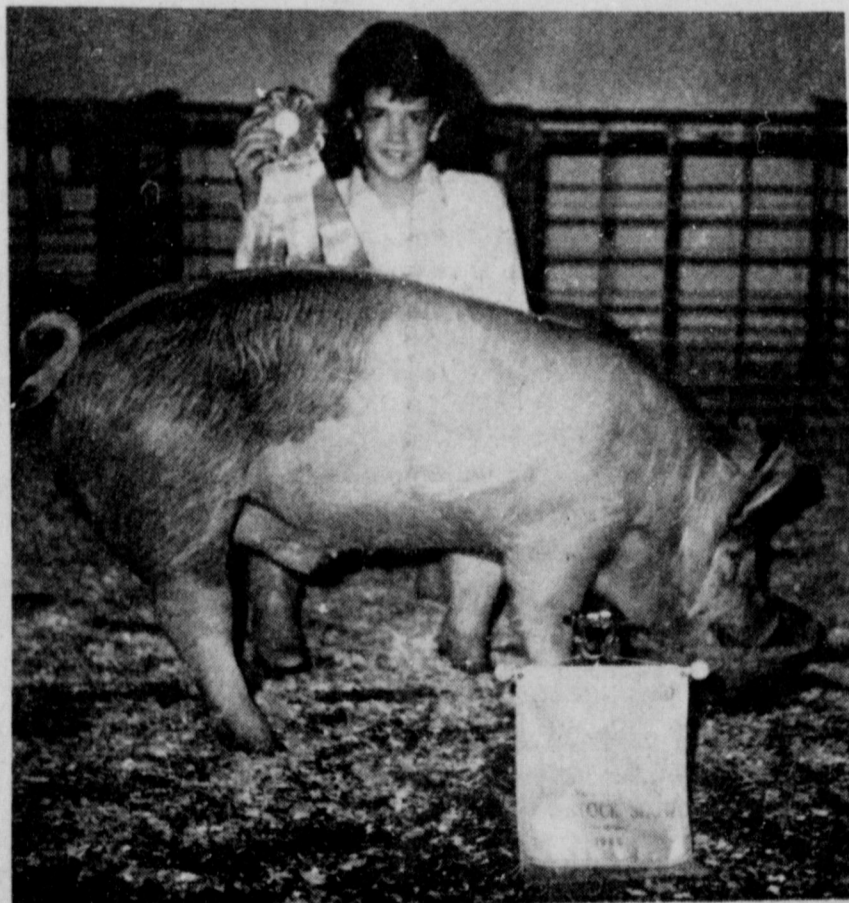

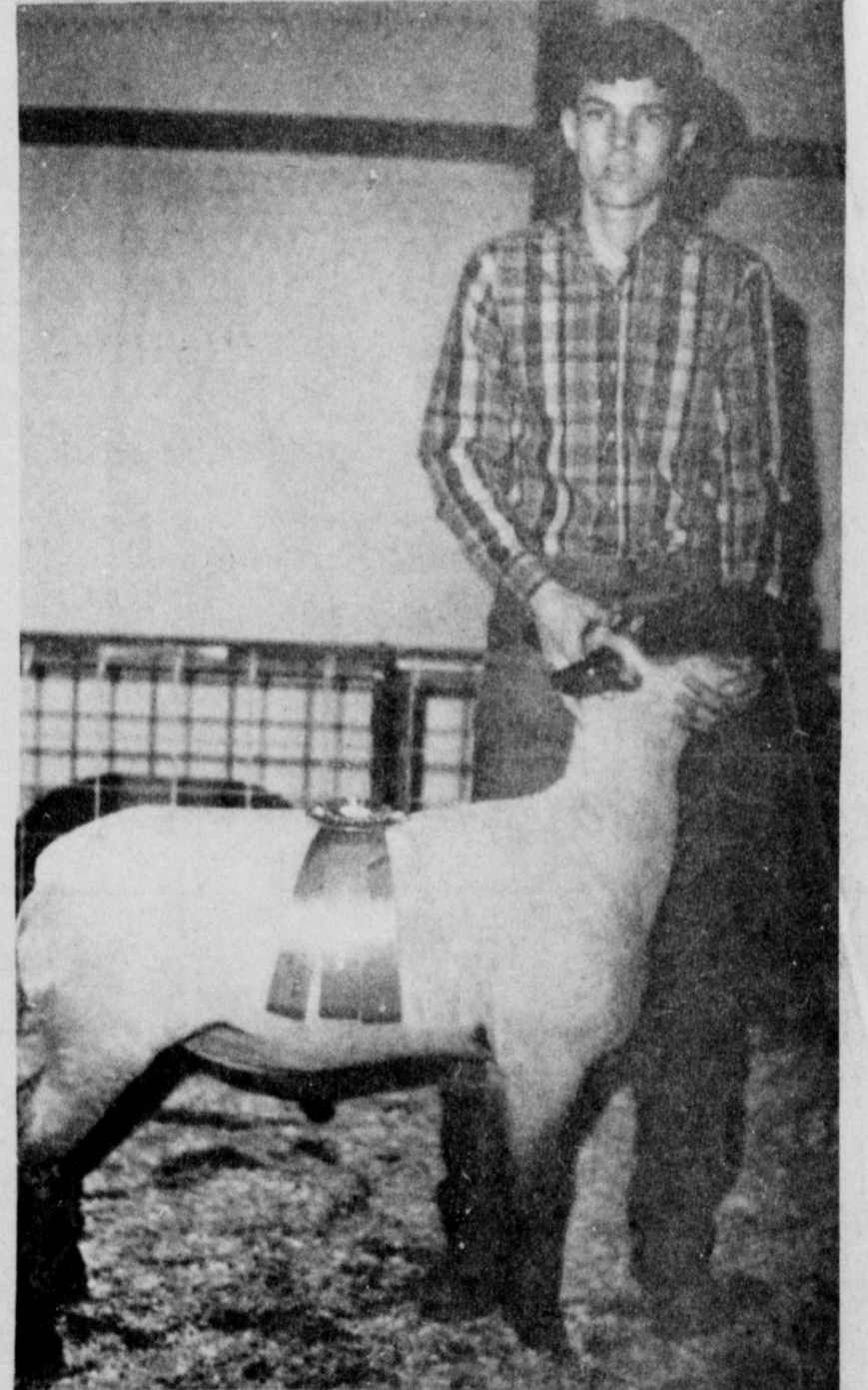
