CofC Essay Contest Starts February 1

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is repeating the scholarship contest among school age students of the Muleshoe business area, according to an announcement made Friday

made Friday.

Last year, the students competed on their grade level with an art entry or essay on the theme "What's Right With Muleshoe."

Members of the Chamber of Commerce awarded \$800 in scholarships to high school students in the form of \$400 in savings bonds, and approximately \$315 in gift certificates. The awards were presented to the students during various awards assemblies at the end of the 1987 school year.

The topic this year will be "The First 70 Years In Bailey County."

As a tribute to the late Roy Farley, and in recognition of his hard work in the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, this year's scholarships will be awarded in his

memory.

The contest will begin on February 1 and all entries must be turned into the principal's office at the student's school no later than March 1.

Students from kindergarten age through fifth grades may choose between an essay, a poster (no larger than 12x24) or a visual project to expand on

the theme.

Students from junior high school through high school should write an essay or provide an art entry. The essays may be either on a historical or literary

A separate category has been added this year for art work in junior high and high school. The winning entry may be selected as a building or window mural so the student is asked to keep this in mind, and keep the art to scale for enlarging for a large

Also, no names on the front of the entry, please. If the teachers or secretaries will help number the entries and provide a sealed master list, the CofC committee said it will be greatly appreciated.

There will be two awards in each grade level. Kindergarten through fifth grade students will receive a \$5 gift certificates for first, and two free Mule Putt miniature golf games for second place.

Sixth grade through eighth grade will receive for first place, a \$20 gift certificate and second place will be one meal at a local

TEAMS Test

Dates Given

H. John Fuller, superintendent of the Muleshoe Independent School System, announces that the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) Tests will be given to students of Muleshoe ISD in grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 on February 9-11.

The TEAMS Tests have been instituted to measure minimum basic skills in mathematics, reading and writing, said the superintendent. This program was mandated by House Bill 72, passed by the Second Called Session of the 68th Texas Legislature in July, 1984.

TEAMS testing is a relatively new concept that school officials now have to assist in program and staff evaluation. The results are being closely monitored by the Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency, added Fuller.

Although student placement is not directly connected to the individual student results, the failure to master the TEAMS objective at any grade level indicates a need for remediation and/or special assistance.

"The Muleshoe School District is committed in providing quality instruction and strong remediation for students needing additional help in achieving mastery," added the superintendent.

Exit level tests are administered twice a year, in October and May, and requires mastery before a diploma can be awarded by any accredited school in Texas.

"Parents of students in these specific grades can really cooperate by encouraging students to be in attendance at school on these dates and to see that students get the proper rest before and during the testing period," Fuller suggested.

Program Date Drawing Near

'Leading Muleshoe,' the leadership program sponsored by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, is still accepting applications, according to the CofC office. Deadline for applications has been set for February 5.

A class enrollment of 12 is needed for the course and space is still available, said the CofC manager, Toni Eagle. 'Leading Muleshoe' is offered at the fee of \$135 per student; and a business, club or individual can sponsor a student.

Mrs. Eagle explained that students in the program will receive instruction in all phases of the county and city, with the actual leaders of the community doing the instructing. One day a month is required by each student; and attendance is important, she added.

Each of the sealed indictments read: "For the delivery of a Controlled Substance."

The officer said the investigation began about September of last year, and as the drug investigation continued, officers were able to 'pin down' several local residents.

Early Friday afternoon, officers from the Muleshoe City Police Department met at the Bailey County Sheriff's office in the Law Enforcement Center to coordinate the arrests

Moving quickly, the officers 'hit' several locations in Mule-shoe almost simultaneously.

Shortly before 5 p.m., the seventh and final suspect had been taken into custody and was at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

This despite several interruptions for two fights, and a burglar alarm or two.

The seven were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jack Bates, who set bonds ranging from \$20,000-\$40,000, as some of the suspects were facing more than one charge of allegedly Delivering a Controlled




Tax Assessor Kathleen Hayes Asks Re-Election


Kathleen Hayes has announced her candidacy for reelection to the office of Tax Assessor/Collector of Bailey County.







Republican Candidate Visits Here Thursday

Wes Gilbreath, Republican candidate for the U. S. Senate, brought his campaign to the Panhandle/South Plains area, January 28-29.

Gilbreath, 58, is said to be a 'conservative' businessman, and is from Houston. He is a longtime activist in the GOP party, both locally and nationally, he said.







• The Texas Republican Party began investigating whether signatures were forged on the petitions of presidential candidates Bob Dole and Alexander Haig.

· Robert Campbell, a leading Democrat on the Texas Supreme Court, resigned from the bench, angering his party's officials by giving the GOP governor another free appointment; meanwhile, the Republicans launched their slate to reform the high court.

• Former state Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, uncloaked his well-veiled candidacy for the Supreme Court and cranked up his organization of liberals.

· In order to avoid a primary fight with Doggett, former Congressman Jack Hightower switched his campaign over to the seat being vacated by Campbell.

· A former head of the Ku Klux Klan filed for president on the Texas Democratic ticket.

Forgeries Suspected

A spot check of petitions by The Dallas Morning News turned up evidence that dozens of names had been forged on the Dole and Haig petitions, including the names of Democrats and one dead person, all from Houston.

Officials in both those campaigns denied knowledge of forgeries, and the Texas Republican Party is seeking out the overzealous worker who may have committed the felony.

The position of those candidates on the Texas ballot could be in jeopardy.

Justice Resigns

While the presidential race will dominate the season, it looks like most of the good action will take place in-of all the unlikely placesthe Texas Supreme Court races.

Campbell's resignation caught Democratic headquarters by surprise, and they blasted him for giving Gov. Bill Clements "another backroom appointment."

Some party faithfuls contend the party is in no position to exhibit self-righteousness about backroom maneuvering, since it's under fire for favoring one presidential candidate while charged with the duty of conducting a fair and impartial primary election.

The surprise resignation of a Republican District Judge in San Antonio left somewhat of a strain on GOP intentions there when it looked like Democrats would be kept off the ballot altogether. in and restored the race to the

The rhubarb over Campbell's departure was somewhat settled on the Democratic side when Hightower used the opportunity to switch targets and avoid a primary fight with Doggett.




