
Bills and accounts were reviewed for payment, and approval given for a donation to the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department.

Resigns at FBC


Leo Oliver Jr., music director at Santa Anna First Baptist Church since last September, has resigned the position effective May 24.

A number of visitors were on hand for the meeting and were welcomed by Mayor Hartman. Patrick 'Hosch was chosen as Mayor Pro-tem for the year.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts were reviewed for payment.

The Council voted to have the commercial water outlet at City Hall open for water sales only during weekday office hours at City Hall.

J. C. Wilkerson of Lone Star Gas Co. of Coleman, met with the Council seeking a change in

New city officials were sworn the company's franchise ordinance. The new ordinance approved by the City Council gives Lone Star Gas Co. authority to maintain gas lines up to the meters rather than to the property lines.

The 1980 city tax funds were prorated, with the use of tax money allocated in the proposed budget. The budget for the coming year was reviewed, and another Budget hearing planned. Revenue for the City is estimated at \$292,000 for the coming year.

Bids on the old pickup truck were opened and all were rejected. A contract with attorney Edwin York was negotiated for collection of the deliquent taxes. Mary Lou Jones and Ethel

Williams were appointed to the Aging Services Committee. The group is being reorganized, and others will be named to the committee at a later date.




Saturday Rainfall In

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Local Dairyman Attends

AMPI Annual Meeting

Feltin Martin of Santa Anna represented local dairymen at the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) Annual Meeting in Minneapolis.

AMPI is the nation's largest dairy cooperative with 30,000 dairy farm families in 22 states. Owned and operated by the dairymen it serves, AMPI collects raw milk from the dairy farm and markets it to dairy processors. In 1980, AMPI members produced approximately 12 percent of all raw milk marketed in the United STates.

The 1200 elected officials at the Minneapolis meeting are reviewMinneapolis, April 9-11, included AMPI's position on: dairy price supports; casein imports; imitation labeling; reconstituted milk; use of dairy products in school foodservice programs; estate taxes; and other national issues which will affect dairymen.

Local dairymen are part of AMPI's Southern Region. The Southern Region, one of the three regions of the cooperative, is made up of 4,500 dairy farm families in Arkansas, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and parts of Colorado, Nebraska, Missouri, Mississippi and Tennessee. In 1980, these farmers marketed 5 billion pounds of milk. Eighty percent was sold to Grade A bottling plants for producing fluid milk, ice cream, sour cream, yogurt, and other fresh dairy products found in local supermarkets and foodservice outlets. The remaining milk was used to manufacture butter, cheese and non-fat dry milk and was processed primarily by AMPI owned plants.

Prevent Blindness Month

April is Prevent Blindness strengthened. Month, an important month to the Jahnke Triplets of Plano. The boys, Craig, Cary and Chad, are six years old and they'll soon have, between them, six good eyes. But if the eye problem that they all share - one called amblyopia - had not been detected and treated early - then each boy might have been blind in his left eye by his seventh

"With amblyopia one eye functions so much better than the other that sight is gradually taken over by the strong eye while the weaker one becomes virtually useless," explains Elvin J. Schofield, President of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. "The problem must be caught early, preferably in the preschool years, if sight is to be saved inthe 'lazy eye'. If treatment isn't started before the age of six or seven, sight is irrerocably lost."

Such blindness was prevented in the Jahnke's boys because their mother Judy noticed about two years ago that Chad seemed to be holding everything uncomfortably close to his eyes. When she had him examined for this, amblyopia was diagnosed. Since the problem tends to be genetic, Craig and Cary were also checked. The result: three identical looking little boys (except for some missing teeth in front) each wearing a big smile and big eye glasses and, covering each good left eye, a surgical patch. The patch is forcing the right "lazy eye" to see and thus be

Having three amblopics in the family is not a norm, but, warns the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, one child in every 20 does have an eye problem that can be best treated if detected in the preschool years. The Society therefore urges all parents to make sure that their children have a vision test early in life, preferably by an eye professional. If this is not possible, the

Society encourages the parents to get the child to a vision screening. Prevent Blindness has trained 55 volunteer groups in Texas to do vision screening and will train other groups who wish to offer this service to their community.

The Society also has a Home Eye Test for Preschoolers that is available without charge for parents who wish to screen their child's vision at home.


Present and former 4-H members may be eligible for \$5,750 in college scholarship grants if they meet requirements set by the Cooperative Extension Service.

All but one of the grants are valued at \$1,000 each, and primarily are for young people planning careers in agriculture, or such related fields as forestry, veterinary medicine or animal science, points out Rhondy Huckabee, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The other scholarship, valued at \$750, has no limits placed on choice of study. These scholarships are provided by private sector donors and arranged by the National 4-H program.

The Warren Scholarship, established this year in memory of Gertrude L. Warren, a pioneer 4-H leader often described as the "Mother of 4-H," is a \$750 grant awarded to one present or former 4-H member matriculating this fall at an accredited college, university, technical or trade school. The recipient can major in any recongnized field of study and must have been influenced by 4-H in selecting a future career. A \$1,000 scholarship, donated by Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho, goes to a current 4-H member who will be enrolled as a college freshman this fall. The recipient must be planning to major in agriculture, forestry, veterinary medicine or a closely-related field.
