New Housing Units Nearing Completion

Applications Are Being Taken
For Rental of 24 Apartments

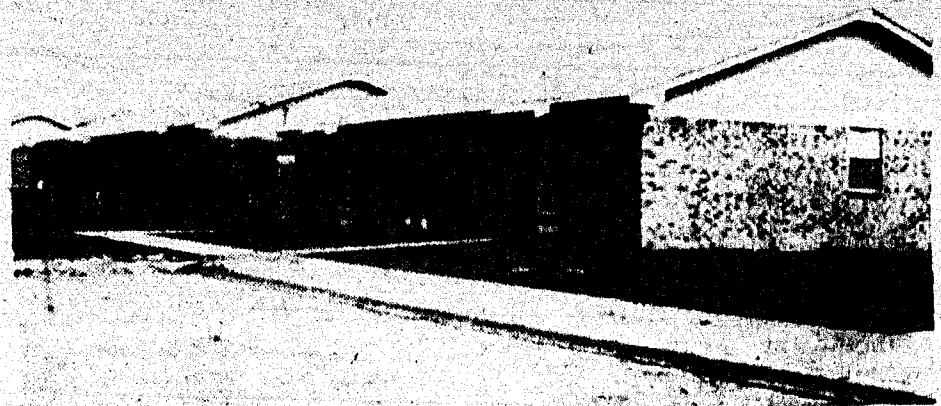
Work is being completed this week on the 24 new duplex apartments located on Jefferson and South Lee Streets in Santa Anna. Representatives from the contractor and architect will conduct inspections in a few days, then representatives from the Office of Housing and Urban Development in Dallas will make an on-site inspection of the new buildings.

Upon acceptance by the federal agency, the units will be rented through the Santa Anna Housing Authority.

Applications for occupancy are being taken by J. L. Sparkman, director of the local agency.

The new units include one-bedroom units for single persons and two-bedroom units for families. The new units bring the number to 86 in Santa Anna, most of which are rented at the present time.

Persons interested in renting the new units should contact Mr. Sparkman within a few weeks to be considered for occupancy.



APPLICATIONS FOR RENTAL of the 24 new housing units are being taken by Santa Anna Housing Authority. The duplex apartments are located on the block east of Elementary School and will be ready for occupancy within a few weeks.

April Election Set For Mayor, Councilmen

The 1981 city election has been called for April 5, with four officials to be elected.

The term of Mayor Thomas M. Hays expires this year, and the two-year term of Councilman Dickie Horner is also expiring. Also to be filled in the 1981 election will be terms of one year now held by Dean Bass, appointed to fill the place of Dale Bradley, and Donald Hosch, appointed to fill the place of Eddie Jones.

Montie Guthrie III will be election judge. Candidates for the positions have until March 6 to file for a place on the ballot.

At the Thursday, February

5, meeting of City Council, Mayor Hays presided, with minutes of the previous meeting read and approved and bills and accounts approved for payment.

A report was given on the cable television expansion, with work almost completed on lines providing service to residents in the west and south parts of town.

Joe Guerrero, a visitor at the session, spoke concerning needed repairs for railroad crossings in town and gave information for securing improvements from Santa Fe Railroad.

The City Council discussed use of the vault at the Civic Center and voted to repair it to be used for storage.

The group voted to take bids on a used pickup truck to be sold and to take bids for the purchase of a dump truck for the city.

S-Anna Rancher Named To State TFB Committee

Donnie Neff, of Santa Anna, has been named as a member of the Texas Farm Bureau Beef Cattle Advisory Committee, according to Victor Cardenas, County Farm Bureau president.

Neff was appointed to the statewide advisory committee by TFB President Carrol Chaloupka.

Some 119 counties have organized to form the Texas Farm Bureau Beef Cattle Division. The state advisory committee has five members and it meets twice each year. In the summer, the committee meets before Farm Bureau's policy development process begins, to help surface beef cattle issues to be considered by county Farm Bureaus. The committee also meets after the state convention in December to review and recommend ways to implement adopted policies.

The Commodity Department of Texas Farm Bureau was created in 1971. Its purpose is to provide a system within Farm Bureau in which mem-

bers can participate in educational commodity programs and activities. There are nine commodity divisions.

Neff attended the annual TFB leadership Conference in Austin January 26-28.

Neff raises commercial cattle, as well as registered longhorn cattle. He produces wheat, oats and feed grains. He has been involved in the Coleman County Farm Bureau for 12 years and has been on the Board of Directors for 8 years. He is the County Beef Chairman and is serving his 2nd year to the State Advisory Committee.

He is a member of the Coleman Rodeo Association, is on the Santa Anna School Board, and serves as the Chairman of the Deacons of the First Baptist Church in Santa Anna.

Neff is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A.R. Neff of Santa Anna and is married to the former Janet McCoy of Midland. They have two children, Kyra, 4, and Darbi Jo, 2.

Solo, Ensemble Winners From Santa Anna Band

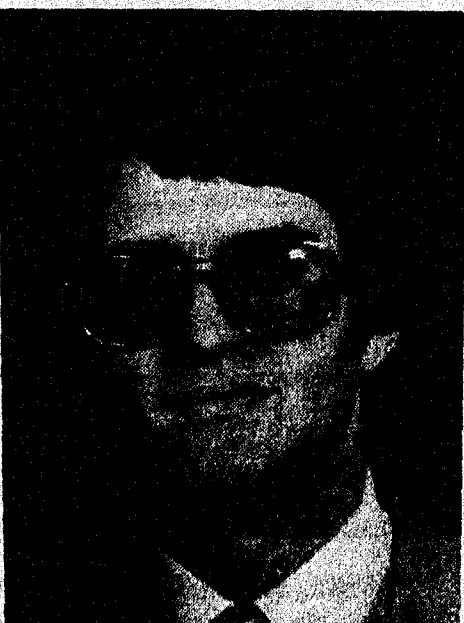
Two Santa Anna band students qualified for the State UIL solo competition last week after winning first division ratings at the area contest in Brownwood, February 4.

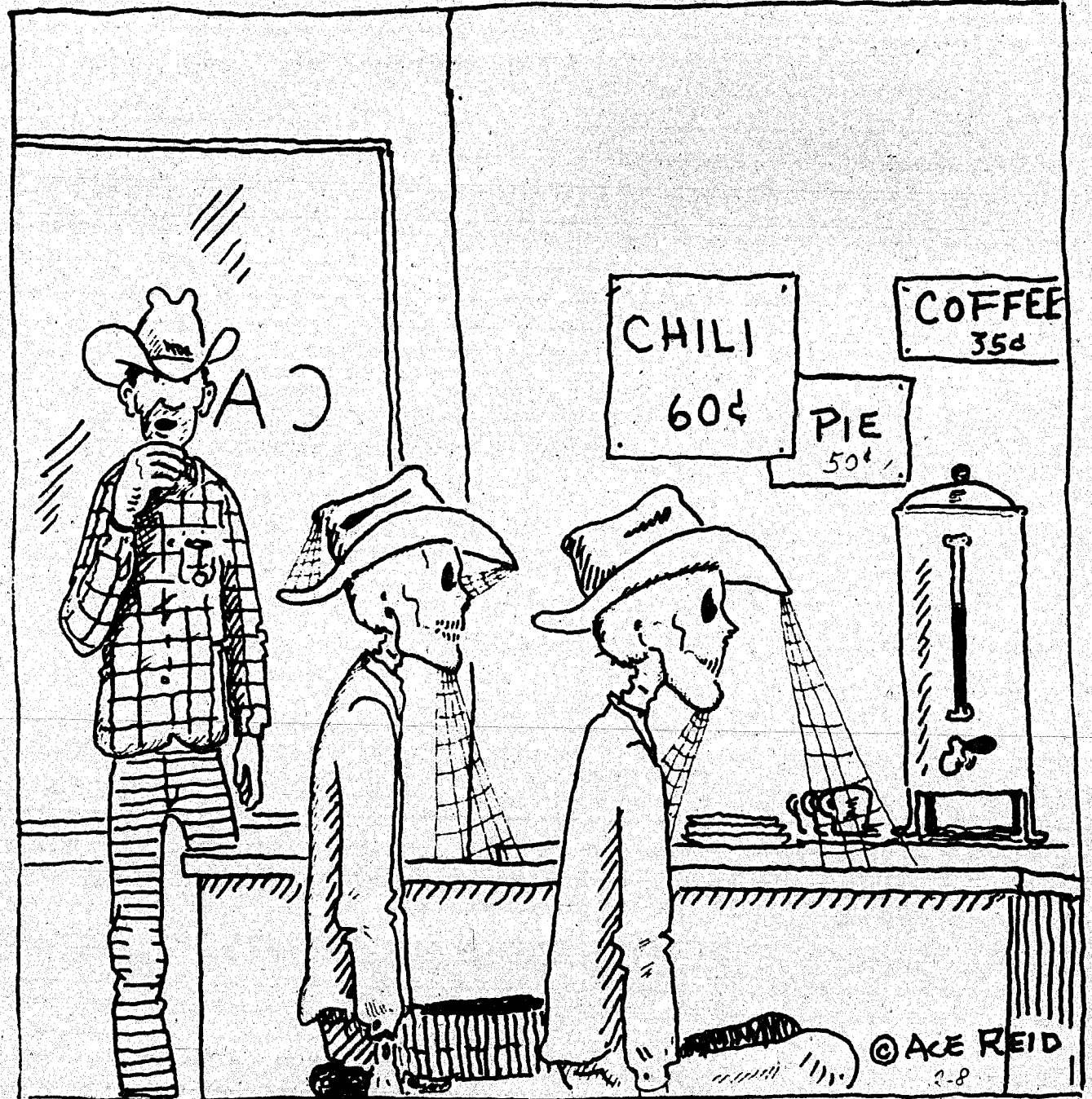

The special will help you evaluate your risk of suffering from the four leading causes of death: heart disease, cancer, stroke and auto accidents.

It will be helpful if you can find out your height, weight, blood pressure, blood chole-

sterol level, family history for diabetes and the age at which your grandparents died before the program. However, you can still take the quiz without this information. Although the quiz is designed for all Americans, there are certain questions that, because of age or gender, will not apply to all viewers.

To obtain copies of the National Health Quiz forms or if you have any questions come by the County Extension Office in Coleman Courthouse.

Scholarships Are Available To Angelo State

Application materials are now available for Angelo State University's Robert G. and Nona K. Carr Academic Scholarships for the 1981-82 academic year. Priority deadline for the 1981 awards is February 15.

One of the most distinctive scholarship programs in the state, the Carr awards will be available to both entering students and students who are currently enrolled at ASU. The

scholarships will range in value from \$500 to \$2,000 with the average award likely to be in the range of \$750 to \$1,000 for undergraduates and \$1,000 to \$2,000 for graduate students. Approximately \$400,000 will be available this first year for the awards.

Fifty-two Coleman County students were enrolled at Angelo State for the 1980 fall semester. This compares with 35 who signed up in 1970. ASU's total enrollment last fall reached 5,705 students.

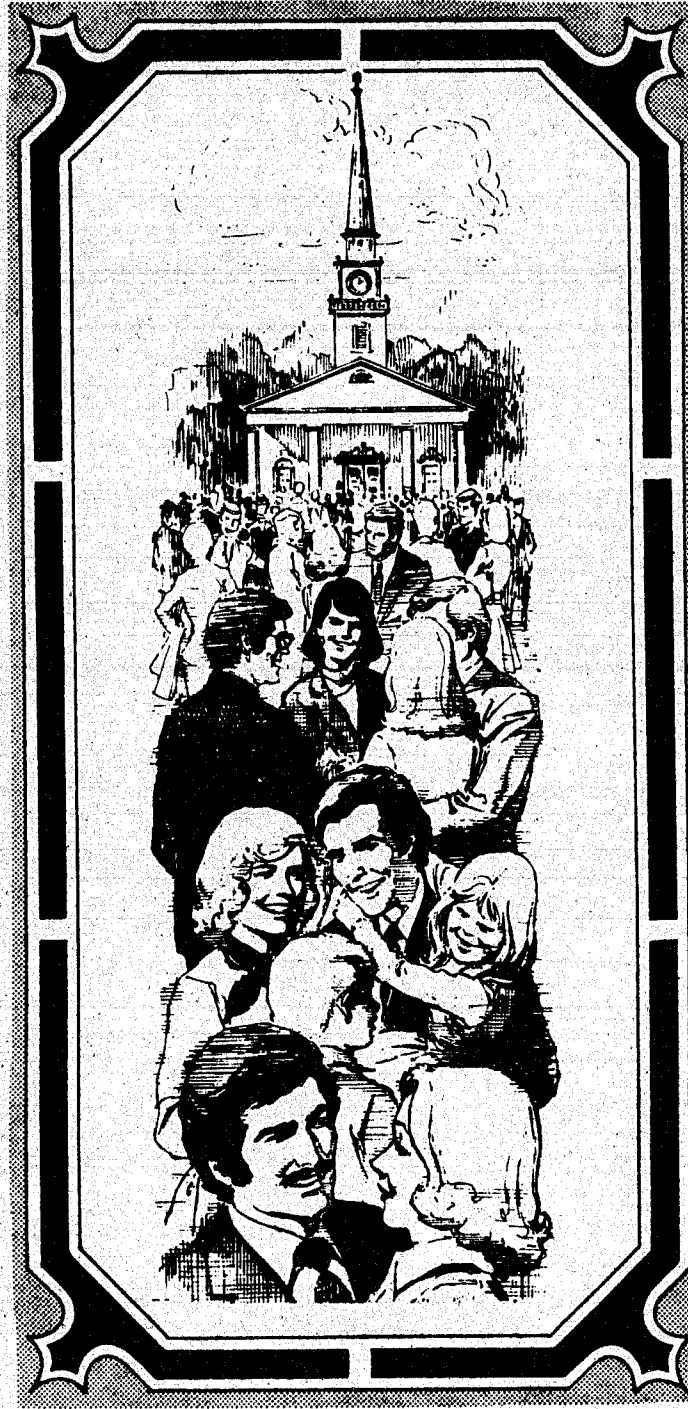

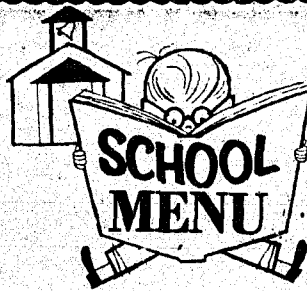

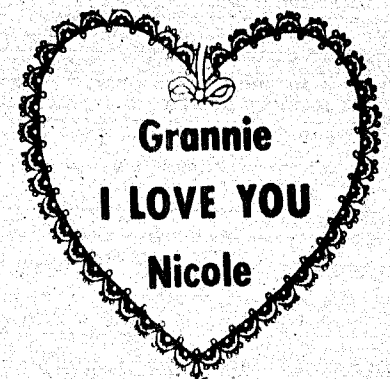

Statement of Nondiscrimination

"COLEMAN COUNTY ELECTRIC COOP, INC. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. Under this Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color, or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications of service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants or the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 180 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."

Social Security Decisions Can Be Appealed Later

Were you turned down for social security or supplemental security income (SSI) benefits? Or were you notified that your benefit checks would stop or there would be a change in the amount? If so, you should be aware of your right to question decisions made on your claims.

If you disagree with a decision, you generally must file an appeal within 60 days. The people at any social security office will be glad to help you complete the appeal forms without charge. You also have a right to be represented by a lawyer or other qualified person of your choice if you wish.

There are four appeal steps, which usually must be taken in order. The first step is a reconsideration. This is a completely independent review of your claim by persons not involved in the original decision. They examine all evidence initially submitted plus any additional evidence which can be obtained.

If your reconsideration is for SSI payments, you have certain additional rights. You can ask to meet with the individual who will be making the reconsideration decision so you can personally present your reasons for disagreement. You may bring a representative as well as witnesses to testify on your behalf. If a decision was made to reduce or stop your SSI checks, you can have the payments continue unchanged or started again during the

reconsideration. But you must request this within 10 days after receiving the notice instead of the usual 60 days.

(NOTE: A hearing is your first appeal step if a decision was made that you are no longer disabled enough to continue getting SSI checks. This is explained below.)

If you disagree with the reconsideration decision, you may request a hearing before an administrative law judge from the Office of Hearings and Appeals of the Social Security Administration. He or she had no part in the initial decision or reconsideration.

At the hearing, the judge reviews what has gone on before, states what issues must be decided, and asks you and

your witnesses questions. All testimony is taken under oath. You may present any new evidence available.

If you prefer, you may request that the administrative law judge review the case without your personal appearance. In that event, a decision will be based on all the evidence in your file.

If you disagree with the administrative law judge's decision, you may ask for a review by the Appeals Council which meets in Washington, D.C. If it decides to review your case, you have a right to file a written statement and to request an appearance to present oral arguments.

If you believe the Appeals Council's decision is not

correct or if it declined to review the administrative law judge's decision, you may bring a suit in a Federal district court. You have 60 days from the date of the Appeals Council's notice to do this.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. For general information or to report a change, call 646-7533.
