DPS Trooper Assaulted Near S-Anna

Suspect Arrested Saturday Near Ovalo, Taylor County

After a 17-hour manhunt involving a helicopter and law enforcement officers from seven agencies, a 24-year-old Austin man was arrested Saturday afternoon in connection with the Friday night beating of a Department of Public Safety trooper south of Santa Anna.

The man was arrested after he was found hiding in a barn about three miles southeast of Ovalo in Taylor County.

The manhunt began about 9:45 p.m. Friday after trooper Jay Moses of Coleman was beaten into unconsciousness after a he stopped a pickup

truck two miles south of Santa Anna on U.S. Highway 283.

According to DPS officials, Moses had been parked along the highway and stopped the truck when he heard what he thought to be gunshots coming from the vehicle.

Trooper Moses was found lying beside the highway shortly before 10 p.m. by deputies who had been sent to search for him after he failed to check with a DPS dispatcher.

Moses' .357 magnum service revolver which had been taken by the suspect was found the following morning

near the site. The patrol car keys were found along the highway, and the trooper's police radio had been dismantled.

Moses was taken to Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman where he was treated for a slight concussion and facial lacerations.

The search centered on the south Taylor County area after the suspect abandoned his truck near a roadblock at Lawn. A house-to-house search for the suspect failed to net the suspect, but he was arrested the following afternoon in a barn. He offered no resistance when arrested.

Heidelberg was brought to Coleman Monday and was taken before Justice of the Peace Gale Brock at Santa Anna. He will be bound over to the Grand Jury on three charges, controlled substance, namely methamphetamine. Mrs. Brock set bail bond at \$25,000 on each charge.

Dennis Burns, 69, of Bronte, died early Saturday morning in his home after an illness. Graveside services were held Monday, February 2, in Decker Cemetery in Nolan County.

He was born August 30, 1911, in Maryneal, a community near Sweetwater where he was reared and attended school. He ranched in Coke County for the last 35 years and was a U.S. Army Air Corps veteran of World War II.

He is survived by three sisters, Nora Brusenhan of Santa Anna, and Zola and Edna Burns, both of the home and a niece and a nephew.

Santa Anna Club Members To Visit Chinese Exhibit

Most of the members of the Self Culture Club will go to Fort Worth on February 10 to visit a famous display called the Bronze Age of China. Shown at the Kimbell Museum, the priceless Chinese relics will be taken to only three other museums in the United States before returning to China on February 18.

Featured will be the so-called Ming Tombs, where many kings of the Ming Dynasty were buried; the first was Yung Lo, who died in 1409, and for more than 200 years magnificent tombs were built for each ruler and his wives and servants. The great complex is some 30 miles from the city of Peking, and the approach is made through an arch of white marble and along a mile-long avenue bordered by statues of men and animals. The Red Gate, built in 1541, has five graduated arches with carved lions and red tile roofs.

The buildings were protected and revered by succeeding generations, and only in 1957 was a huge buried tomb, the greatest treasure of all, verified. Before Wan Li died, he had an excavation deeper than a seven-story building dug, and the stonework for the underground palace completed. The slave builders were then shot with arrows and buried,

and tunnels were walled with stone, the last luxurious decoration completed. After Wan Li's death in 1600 the bodies of himself and two favorite wives placed in the great chamber. The entire excavation was filled with soil, covering palace and all, and trees planted as a park.

When opened in this century, the Everlasting Lamp, a waist-high porcelain vase, had a flame still burning after more than 300 years, and was surrounded by articles of incredible beauty and craftsmanship. The tomb of Wan Li was between those of his wives, and in the caskets were porcelain vases and jars, jade belts, a crown of pure gold, and much jewelry of precious stones and delicate design. The great rooms have halls and corridors, all of intricate

workmanship and colors. The Santa Anna visitors will go by bus and private car, leaving at 8 a.m. on the 10th, and returning that afternoon.

But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtlety, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ. 2 Cor. 11:3.

He who will observe simplicity in all his habits, restricting the appetite and controlling the passions, may preserve his mental powers strong, active, and vigorous, quick to perceive everything which demands thought or action, keen to discriminate between the holy and the unholy, and ready to engage in every enterprise for the glory of God and the benefit of humanity.

The little ones should be educated in childlike simplicity. They should be trained to be content with the small, helpful duties and the pleasures and experiences natural to their years. Childhood answers to the blade in the parable, and the blade has a beauty maturity, but as long as possible should retain the freshness and grace of their early years. The more quiet and simple the life of the child--the more free from artificial excitement and the more in harmony with nature--the more favorable it is to physical and mental vigor and to spiritual strength.

Parents should by their example encourage the formation of habits of simplicity, and draw their children away from an artificial to a natural life. Those children are most attractive who are natural and unaffected.

The greatest Teacher the world ever knew was admired for His simplicity; for He presented divine truth in such a way that even children could comprehend His words, and at the same time He drew the attention of the best educated and deepest thinkers of the world. By the use of familiar illustrations He made truth plain to the minds of the common people. In simplicity He sowed the seed of the gospel truth in the minds and hearts of His hearers, and it sprang up and yielded a harvest unto everlasting life.

His (Christ's) glory was in His simplicity.

Jamie Lee Morris of Victoria spent the weekend with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Morris, returning to Victoria Monday.

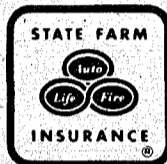

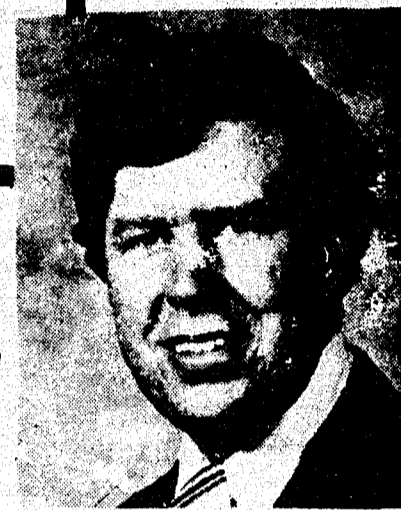

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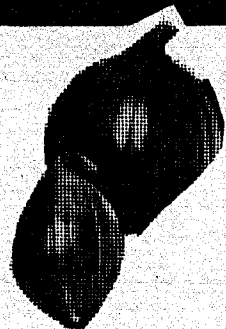
