### Army Benefits Available For Scholarships

High school graduates in this area are eligible for up to \$20,600 in college benefits through enlistment in the U. S. Army.

The program is eligible for bonafide high school graduates who score 50 or higher on the Armed Forces Qualification test and enlist for two, three or four years in one of the critical military job skills. Further, individuals must be nonprior service.

This means an individual who enlisted in one of the critical job areas could receive a total of \$15,600 following a four-year enlistment. The four-year enlistment may also qualify for a cash enlistment bonus of up to \$5,000. With the cash bonus and educational benefits the total package could yield \$20,600. For more information call your local recruiters.

In other words, a two-year enlistment would qualify for 18

monthly payments totaling \$5,400, three years for 27

payments totaling \$8,100, and four year enlistment for 36 payments totaling \$10,800.

"There are two types of benefits available under this test program," explained Major Larry L. Raab, Commander U. S. Army Dallas District Recruiting Command. "The government will contribute \$1200 in tuition assistance for each year of service. This means \$2400 for a two-year enlistment, \$3600 for three years and \$4800 for a four-year enlistment."

"Additionally, recipients will receive \$300 a month in payments while in school. The number of monthly payments vary depending on the length of enlistment."

"Our goal is simple: To find a cure or control for the inherited disease, Cystic Fibrosis," said Mrs. Pat Hosch, co-chairman of the Spring Walk-A-Thon in Santa Anna.

"We have dedicated volunteers, a national organization, scientists and researchers, and 115 diagnostic and treatment centers," said Mrs. Hosch. "What we don't have is enough money. That is why the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is appealing for support to expand research and care programs through projects such as the Spring Walk-A-Thon."

Funds raised in the event will help support the care, teaching and research centers across the nation, where children with lung diseases are diagnosed and treated with the most modern

techniques and equipment.

Although Cystic Fibrosis is still incurable, the average life expectancy of children affected has been increased from infancy to the teen years, and some to young adulthood.

The Spring Walk-A-Thon in Santa Anna will be Tuesday, May 5, according to Mrs. Hosch. Anyone wishing to take part, especially senior citizens, should be securing sponsors who will donate money for each block walked. Each participant will walk the distance he or she chooses.

The route will start from City Hall and be west along Avenue B, then back to City Hall, starting at 10 a.m. that morning. Last year nearly \$200 was raised for the fund, Mrs. Hosch said.

The show, which is owned by Marcia Luscas Barton of Austin, is being sponsored by the Community Cultural Affairs Commission of Brownwood.



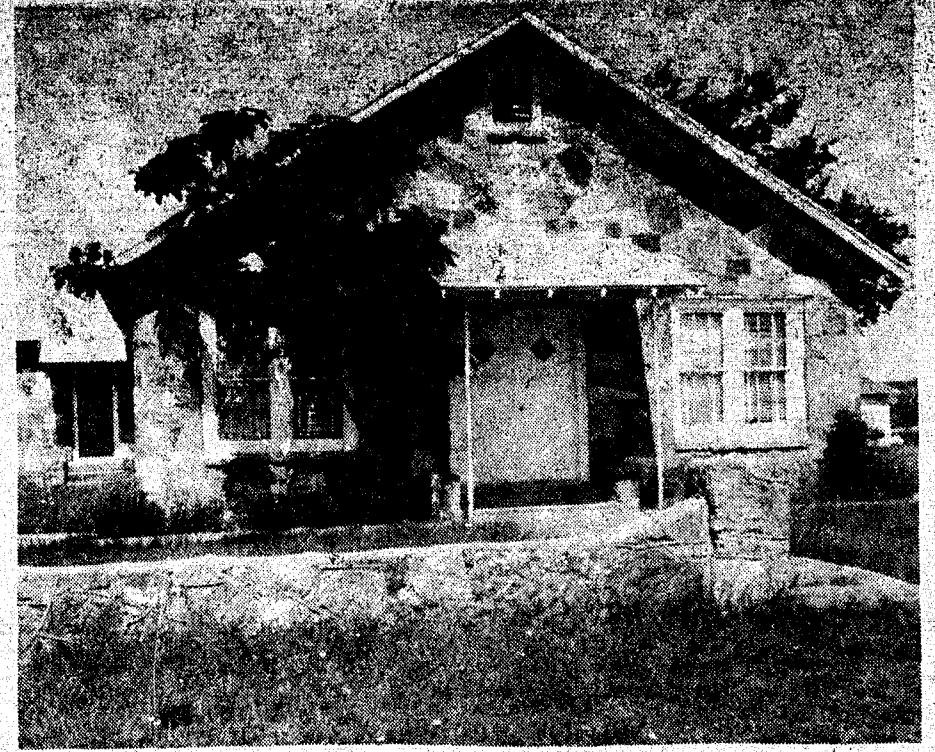
