Mountaineers In Play-Offs

Bi-District Game Scheduled Tuesday At Brownwood Coliseum

The Santa Anna Mountaineer basketball team will be seeking a berth in the regional tournament when they meet Evant next week for the Bi-District play-off. The game will be at Brownwood Coliseum Tuesday, March 10, at 7:30 p.m.

The Santa Anna boys, coached by Charles Brewster, are defending champions of the district and advanced to the semi-finals in the regional tourney last year under the coaching of Pete Simmons. They also were champions of the district in 1979, losing their bi-district game.

The Mountaineers will have their last practice game Friday night at Perry Gymnasium with the Wall High School team, winners of their Class AA district. Game time will be at 7:30 p.m.

The local team lost to the Wylie team Tuesday night, 59-53. Wylie will be meeting Coleman High School for the bi-district game Monday of next week at Brownwood Coliseum.

Jim Clifton led the team with 29 points and tied as leading rebounder with Rusty Buzzard and Brad Wardlow with eight each. Danny Guerrero scored 11 points; Wardlow scored eight; Buzzard and Mike Simmons had 3 and 2 respectively.

In another practice game last Friday, The Mountaineers defeated the District 10AA champions, Dublin, 75 - 66. Clifton scored 42 points and Guerrero scored 15. Wardlow led with 12 rebounds, and Dwayne Warnock led in steals.

In Abilene earlier in the week, Santa Anna won over

Roscoe 68 - 57. Scoring for the Mountaineers were Clifton, 26; Guerrero, 17; Wardlow, 13; and Buzzard, Randy Casey and Mike Simmons, 5, 4 and 3 respectively.

Santa Anna people are urged to support the team as they continue in the play-offs.

Two candidates had filed for the April School Trustee election Tuesday, with the deadline Wednesday, March 4.

Donnie Neff, the current vice president of the group, filed on Tuesday for re-election, and James Spillman also filed an application for a place on the ballot.

Joe Riley, the other incumbent, is not seeking re-election.

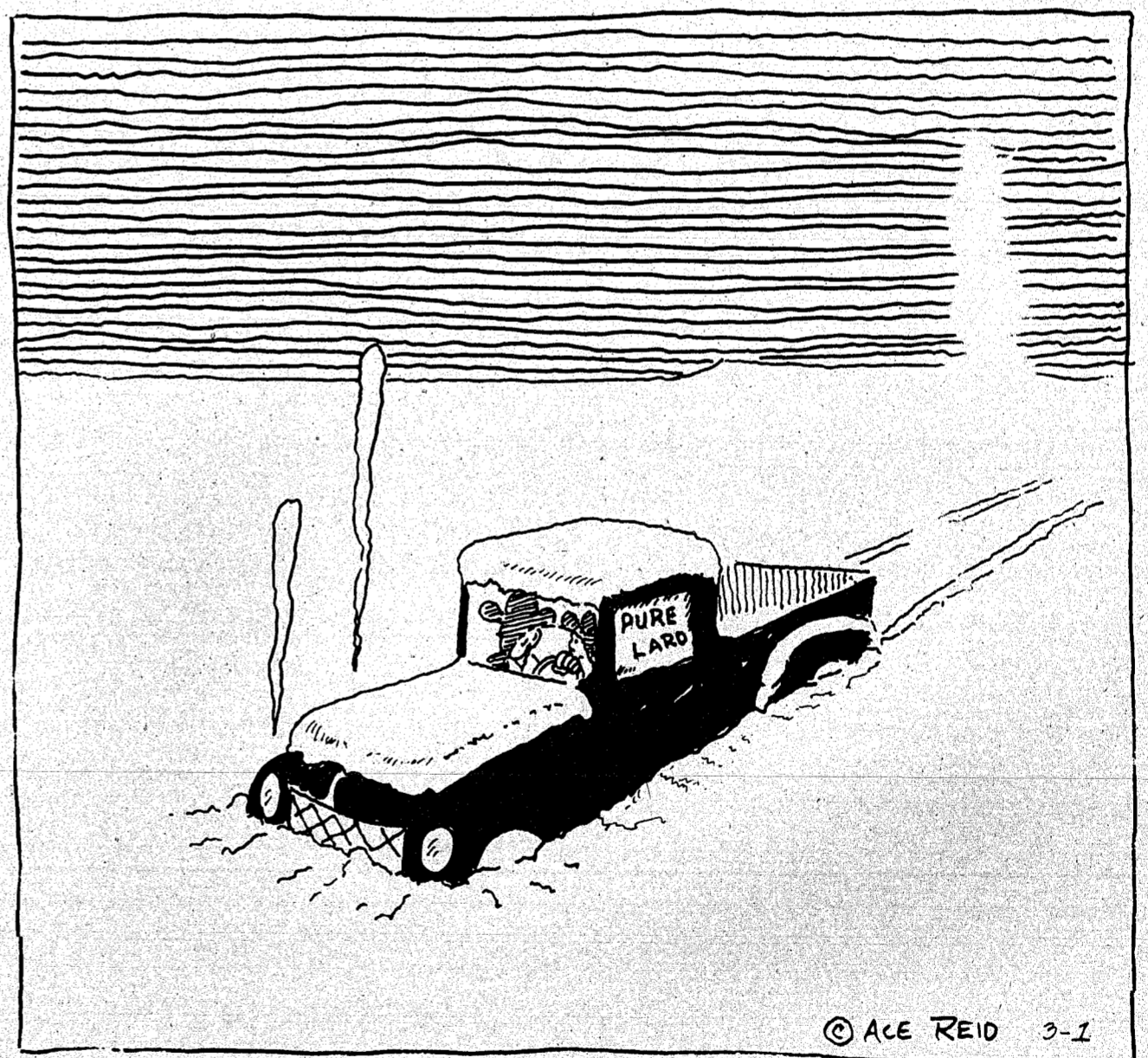

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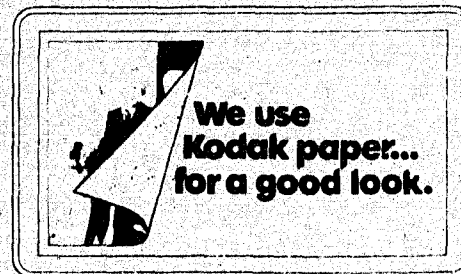

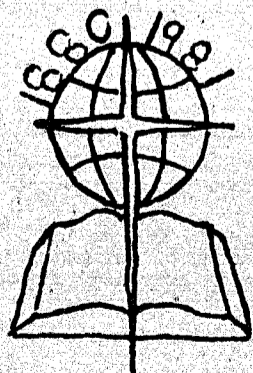

Social Security Office Advises Women of Benefits

Did you know that a divorced wife may draw social security benefits under certain circumstances if her ex-husband retires, becomes disabled or dies? Or that a widow can get benefits as early as age 60 on her deceased husband's work record, even though the earliest retirement age for workers is age 62?

If you don't know the above facts, chances are you don't know enough about social security to assure you won't lose benefits when you need them, especially if you happen to be a woman. Social security publishes a special booklet, "A Woman's Guide to Social Security," which provides a view of how social security may affect women in their various roles as workers, mothers, or widows.

There are a number of ideas being discussed to make the program more equitable and adequate for women and homemakers. However, women still need to know how the present law affects them if they are to get the most out of their social security protection.

The booklet notes that the woman who works earns social security protection for herself, her children, and her spouse. If she retires, dies, or becomes disabled, her work under social security can mean family benefits to the children even if the husband continues to work.

A wife can receive benefits as the mother of minor children who get benefits based on the work record of a retired, deceased, or disabled worker. These benefits to the woman continue until the youngest child turns 18.

At retirement, a woman can retire on her own work record as early as age 62. If she is entitled to a larger benefit on her husband's work record she receives a payment equal to the larger of the benefits based on her own or her spouse's record, but not both.

A widow can receive benefits at age 60 on her deceased husband's record. If she

becomes disabled she may, under certain conditions, qualify disability benefits on her deceased spouse's work as early as age 50.

Ordinarily, a widow loses her social security rights when she remarries, but benefits to a widow who remarries at age 60 or older can continue without reduction. And if the new husband gets social security checks, she can take a wife's benefit on his record if it would be larger than her widows payment and she is 62 or older.

All of the above rules apply equally to widowers. In addition, a divorced wife or husband may qualify for dependent's benefits at 62 if his or her marriage lasted at least 10 years.

The booklet contains other information on how social security affects women. Free copies are available at any social security office.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. For general information or to report a change, call 646-7533. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. If you wish to file an application to establish your eligibility you may call 646-7533.

The Brownwood Social Security office is located in the 300 North Main Building near the traffic circle. The office is open Monday through Friday, except national holidays, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Santa Anna of Years Ago

Dr. William Strozier and Family
Are Remembered in Town, Community

It is pleasant to remember the early doctors and the mark they left on our town. The railroad came through in 1886, and Santa Anna was soon a growing, bustling town, the best market place for miles around to sell butter and eggs, and in the Fall cotton buyers were on every corner.

We are indebted to Dr. W. M. Stozier for one beautiful landmark, now known as the Gipson home. The records reflect most interesting history; showing that the 1200 block on Wallis Avenue was owned by Moses Walters, who had a mule barn under the big oak trees, and was living in a small house on the east side of the block.

He sold the whole block,

No. 1200, to Fred Turner in 1902. Mr. Turner sold the west lot of the block to Dr. W. M. Strozier in 1909, when the beautiful house was built.

Dr. Strozier and his wife lived in a small house where the Texaco Station now stands. His father-in-law, Mr. Enloe, had a lumber mill at Sour Lake, and he hand-picked each piece of lumber for his daughter, Mary's, new home.

A magnificent home of two stories with lots of windows and gables, it has many rooms. A big reception room with connecting living room, two fireplaces, in kitchen and bedroom, and the second floor has three bedrooms, a hall and bath.

Dr. Strozier sold the new home to George Hagelsteen in 1913, who sold to H. W. Turner in 1915. Mr. Turner in

turn sold the home to Walter Ransberger in 1920.

Mrs. Mary Ann Gipson bought the home from Mr. Ransberger in 1921, living there until her death in 1965. Robert Stewardson, the present owner, bought the home from the Gipson Estate in 1970.

The Strozier family belonged to the Methodist Church, and it is remembered they were the parents of three children, known in their childhood as Rosemond, Billo and Little Sis. Dr. A. B. Strozier, a dentist, is remembered living here at the same time. There were eight doctors in Santa Anna at one time during the early years.

1980 Harvest Poor During Dove Season

An extended drought followed by hurricane-spawed floods caused the 1980 white-winged dove harvest in the Rio Grande Valley to be more than 50 percent below the previous year, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Whitewing project leader Gary Waggerman of McAllan said hunters took only about 214,000 whitewings during the four-day 1980 season, compared to 497,000 in 1979.

Waggerman said the poor harvest was not indicative of total whitewing populations but rather that most of the birds left the area early because of a lack of food. "The spring and summer drought cut down the food supply," Waggerman

said, "Then Hurricane Allen came along in August and washed away most of what was left."

Thus most of the whitewings were in Mexico by the time the Texas season opened Sept. 6 he said.

There was a bright side to Waggerman's report, however, as hunters found good numbers of mourning doves to take up the slack. "There were about 393,000 mourning doves taken during the four-day season," Waggerman said, "and when you combine the two species you see that each hunter harvested an average of a little over seven birds per day."

If more mourning doves than

whitewings are harvested during those four days, you know you're having a poor whitewing season," Waggerman continued. "The whitewings simply were leaving the country, and it was obvious there were fewer birds on hand the second weekend of the season than the first."

Despite gloomy forecasts, Waggerman said hunter participation was down only eight percent compared to 1979.

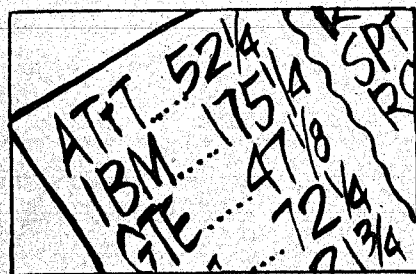

Tree Forest Service Gives Info On Tree Planting

What's the best tree to plant in my yard?

As the tree-planting season approaches this winter, many homeowners are asking foresters and nurserymen that question.

But, before it can be answered, homeowners and others interested in planting trees need to answer other questions, according to Ann Holland, urban forester with the Texas Forest Service in Tyler.

"To get a good match between a site and a tree, people need to know something about the area to be planted and the tree they are considering," she said.

Ms. Holland recommends that people look at the site and determine how much space there is—both above and below the ground. This determines how much space the tree's branches and roots will have to expand and grow.

Are there overhead utility, water or sewer lines, or buried cables? Many tree planting problems can be avoided if these are considered. The more distance between newly planted trees and these lines, the better it is for the tree, the homeowner, and the utility.

Information about an area's soil is helpful in deciding which tree to plant. Soils vary in pH levels, ability to hold water and nutrient levels. Trees also have varying requirements for best growth.

The amount of sun and shade is the main reason a tree does not grow well in a

particular area. Too much or too little sun can cause scorched leaves, wilting, or stunted growth.

Ms. Holland suggests that people ask themselves what they want from a tree. "Do you want shade, landscape accent in a restricted area, spring or fall colors, energy conservation, or a particular shape and size at maturity? Trees vary in all these characteristics as well as in growth rates, overall size at maturity and life expectancy," she said.

Investigating the growth habits of a species will give much information about what to expect initially and in future years.

What conditions of space, sunlight or shade, water, soil temperature are best for the trees? If the site cannot meet these needs, consider another type of tree.

Whether a tree species is native to an area can greatly affect its vitality and growth rates, according to Ms. Holland.

"Native species or those that do well in a region or area have much better track records than those native to other soils or climates. Usually, trees planted off their native sites will be more susceptible to insect and diseases than native species."

The final question is availability. Can the tree be purchased or found locally? Sometimes native species are not available commercially because there's no demand.

Book Publication Notes Town Names:

Long ago in Wichita County, Texas, a man established a blacksmith shop, and his helper put up a sign showing a picture of a pumpkin with the name "Pumpkin Center Blacksmith Shop."

When asked why he chose that particular name, the helper replied that he needed a name, he had only yellow paint and he couldn't draw a horse. Thus did the town of Pumpkin Center, population 70, get its name.

That story and others are related in "1001 Texas Place Names," published recently by the University of Texas Press. Written by Fred Tarpley, professor and head of the department of languages and literatures at East Texas State University, the book is illustrated by Sally Blakemore.

Although Texas has approximately 75,000 place names, only the most unusual and interesting have been included in Mr. Tarpley's book. Each entry gives the official spelling of the name, phonetic pronunciation where necessary, dates of post office operation, and a short narrative about the origin of the name and the history of the place.

Texas place names fall into several categories, the author says. Those include names derived from people, such as Tyler and Daingerfield, geographic features, such as Grand Prairie and Antelope Creek; multiple categories, such as Potters Point (a local name and geographic feature), and names taken from other

places, such as New Waverly and Abilene.

Names also have been derived from cultural sources such as the Bible and other literature, with Pisgah and Tarzan falling into those categories.

Other modes of selection may include whim, an arbitrary selection by the U.S. Post Office, language alteration, company names and brand names.

"Serious research into place names requires the skill, persistence and inductive powers of the shrewdest detective," the author says.

"Playing a guessing game and deciding that Cologne must have been named for the town in Germany led to the embarrassing revelation that

the name Cologne was given ironically to a town that was a "sweet-smelling" cattle-shipping station, Mr. Tarpley explains.

Each of Texas' 254 counties is represented by at least two entries in "1001 Texas Place Names."

The author used many different printed sources in his research, as well as interviews with local residents, postal officials and others familiar with place names.

In desperation, researchers sometimes visited the scene of the name-giving, looking for clues to the name's origin.

However, in at least one case, researchers found many people in agreement on the origin of a town's name. Cut and Shoot, a town of 791

people in Montgomery County, came into being when a preacher became much too popular with the ladies of the town. When charges were made at a church meeting, the men of the town ran to wagons and buggies to get knives and rifles to cut and shoot.

Other Texas place names

listed in the book include Notrees, Scotland, Moscow, Buck Naked, Bald Prairie, Snap, Snook, Nameless, Mutt and Jeff, Heckville and Hashknife.

"1001 Texas Place Names" is available in paperback from The University of Texas Press, Box 7819, Austin, Texas 78712 for \$5.95 plus five percent tax.

At present there is no test to identify these 10 million people who might pass on the gene or the disease to their children. Children born with CF today have a 50 percent chance of reaching their 19th birthday.

Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye. Col. 3:13.

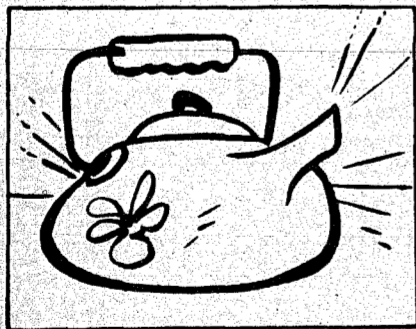

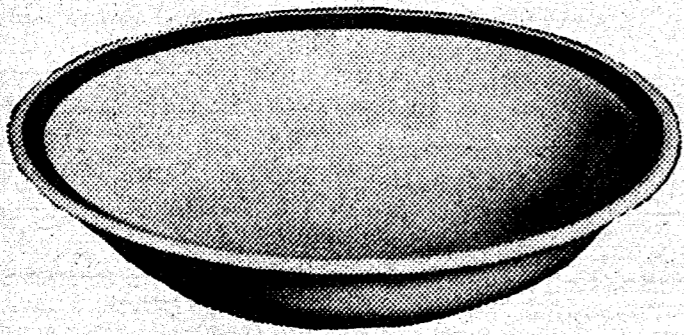

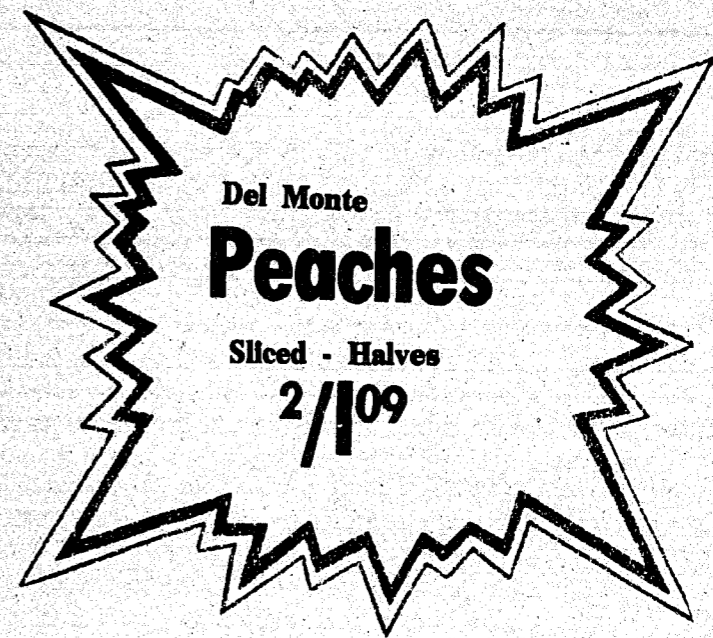
