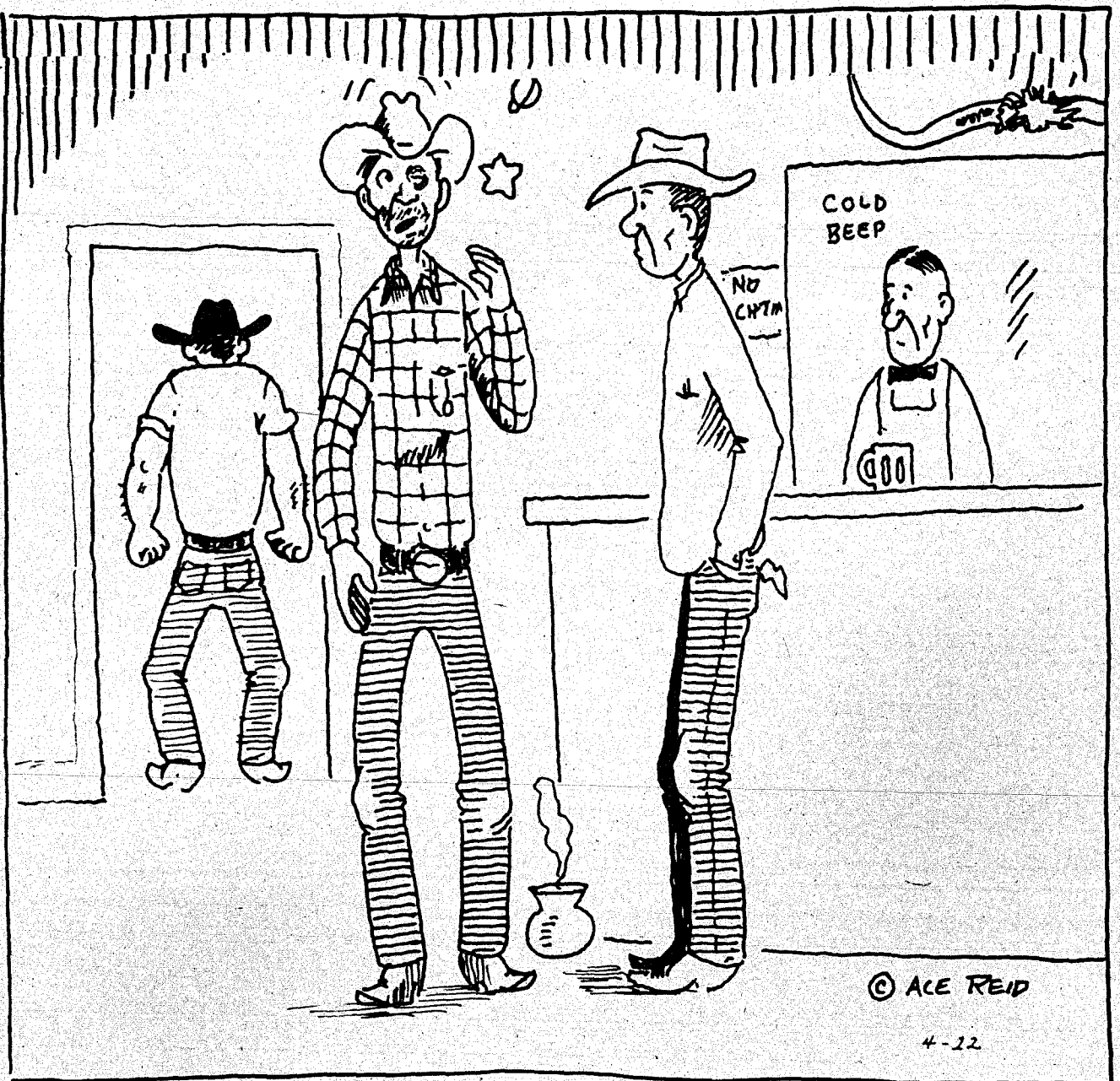
Revival Services Now in Progress

Plans for the all-sports banquet in May will be made by the group and committee assignments made.

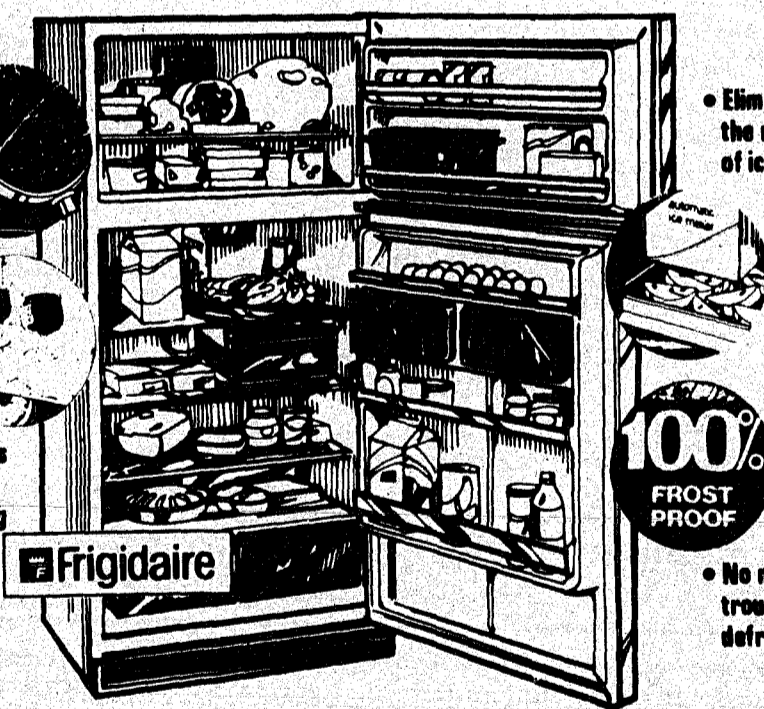

COLLEGE STATION — Although the peak tornado season in Texas traditionally runs April through June, experts at the State Climatologist's Office at Texas A&M University remind Texans that tornadoes are a year-round concern.

The climatologists' reports indicate an average of 109 tornadoes touch Texas soil each year. The state ranks at the top nationally in number of storms sighted — 1,425 of the 8,560

total for the decade occurred here. Because of its size, however, Texas ranks 11th in number of twisters per 10,000 square miles.

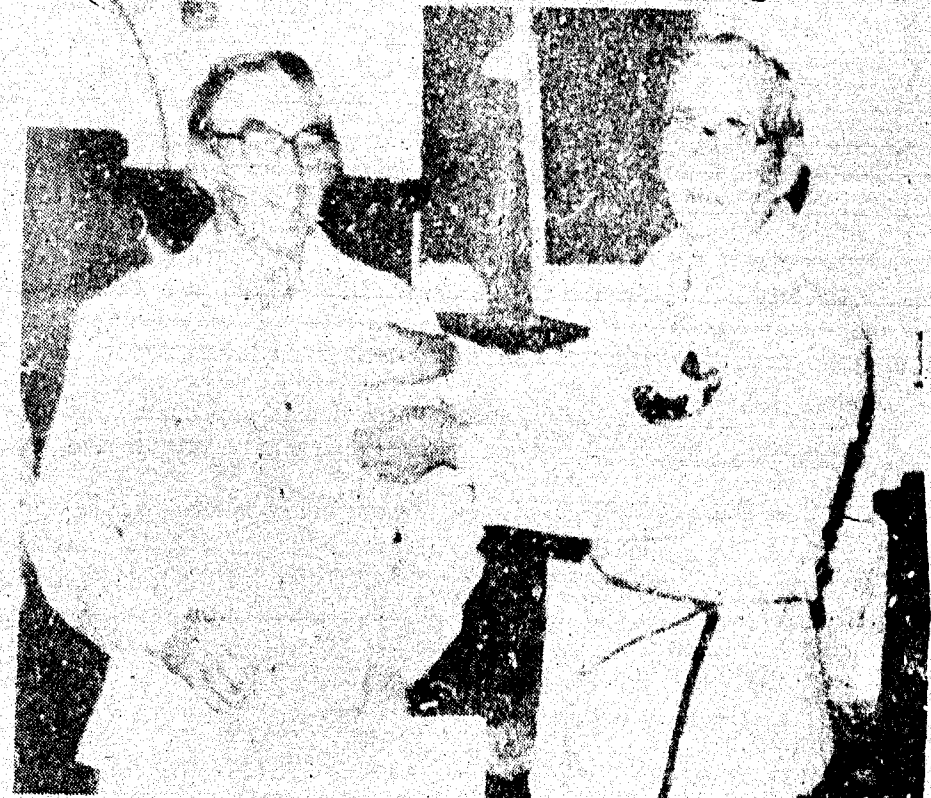

To him also nature's solitudes became a school. To the desert of Arabia he went, there to study the Scriptures and to learn of God. He emptied his soul of the prejudices and traditions that had shaped his life, and received instruction from the Source of truth.

His after-life was inspired by the one principle of self-sacrifice, the ministry of love. "I am debtor," he said, "Both to the Greeks, and to the barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise..."

While he possessed high intellectual endowments, the life of Paul revealed the power of a rarer wisdom. Principles of deepest import, principles concerning which the greatest minds of his time were ignorant, are unfolded in his teachings and exemplified in his life. He had the greatest of all wisdom, which gives quickness of insight and sympathy of heart, which brings man in touch with men, and enables him to arouse their better nature and inspire them to a higher life...

"Being reviled," he said, "we bless; being persecuted, we suffer it; being defamed, we entreat"; "as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing, as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things."

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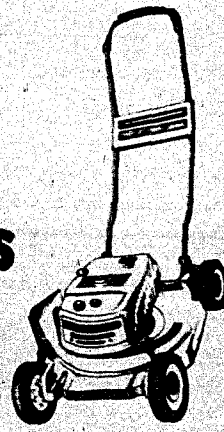
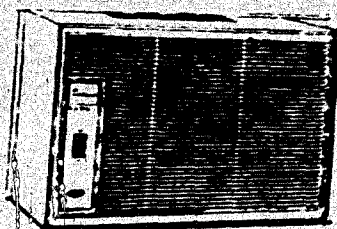
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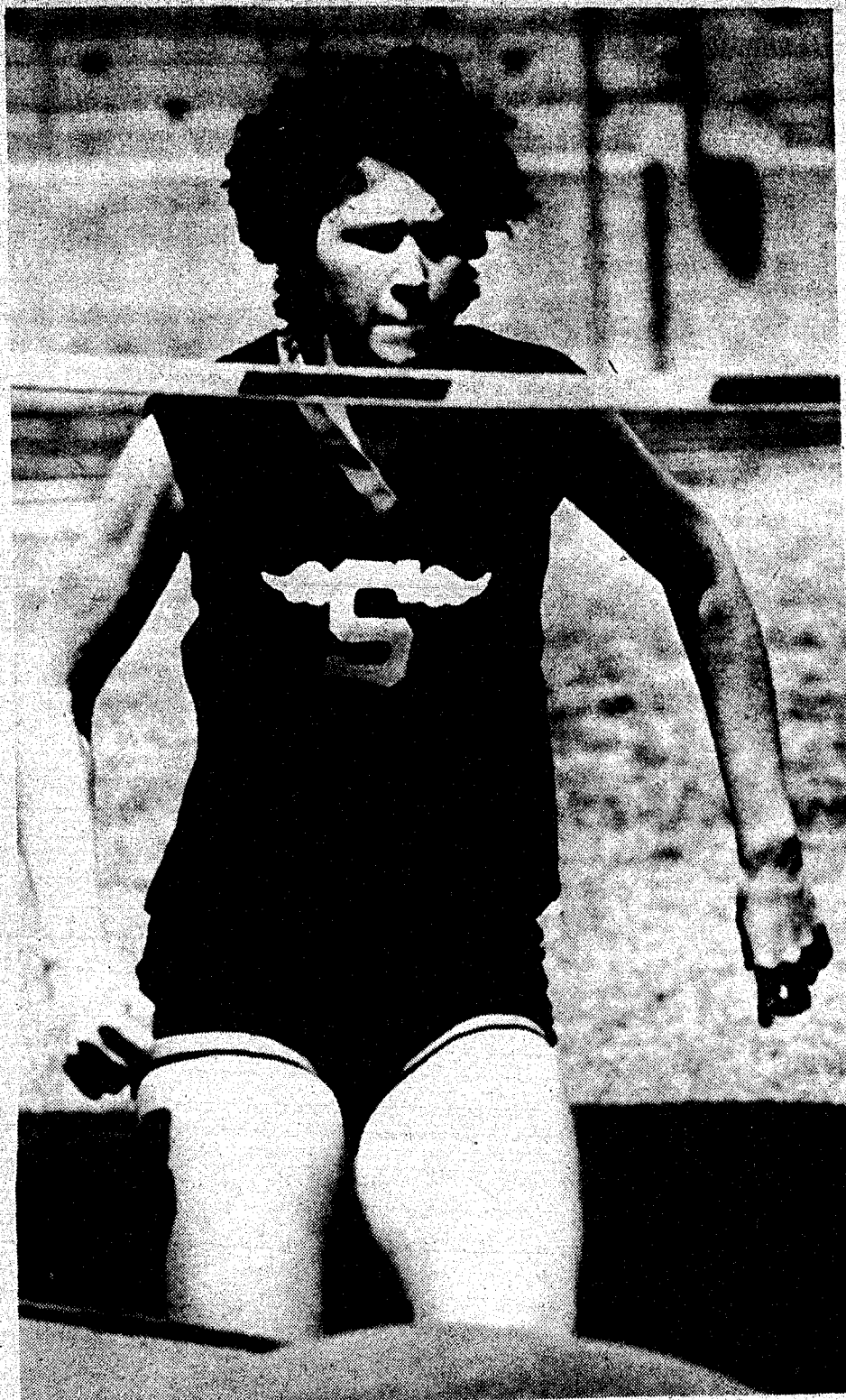

DISABLED AMERICAN VETERANS VAN will visit Brownwood Wednesday, April 22, with personnel available to aid local veterans and their

families. The van will be at the Brownwood Coliseum for those who wish information or assistance.

Special DAV Van In B-wood on Wednesday

Free assistance for local veterans and their families will be available when a Field Service Unit of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) visits Brownwood on Wednesday, April 22. This is the eighth consecutive year that one of these office-equipped vans has traveled to communities throughout the state, bringing free benefits counseling and claim filing assistance to veterans and their families.

The DAV Field Service Unit will be located at Brownwood Coliseum. These units are generally open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A fully qualified and trained DAV veterans' benefits expert will staff the traveling service facility. He can assist veterans and their families in filing claims for such federal and state benefits as disability compensation, pension, employment and job training programs, educational benefits, hospitalization and medical care, Social Security, death claims, and more.

During the past seven years, more than 300,000 veterans and dependents took advantage of this free service when it came to their communities. As a result of these visits, DAV National

Service Officers filed 107,000 claims for disability compensation and pension benefits alone. Thousands of claims for other governments benefits were also filed.

Veterans need not be members of the DAV to take advantage of this free service.

The project is an extension of the 61-year-old, 690,000 member organization's National Service Program, which provides a variety of assistance at no cost to veterans and their families. Under the program, the DAV employs 290 full-time National Service Officers -- more than 90% of whom are disabled veterans of the Vietnam War period -- at Veterans Administration (VA) facilities across the country.

During the most recent full year for which statistics are available, these veterans' benefits specialists handled 212,000 individual cases, winning federal benefits totaling some \$700 million for veterans and their families.

"Special emphasis is placed on

Vietnam era veterans because many of these men and women aren't using the benefits they've earned, some out of sheer distrust of the government that sent them to Southeast Asia to fight an unpopular war," said DAV National Commander Stan Pealer, himself a Vietnam era veteran.

"It's surprising how many people don't even know about benefits they're entitled to by law until they step into one of our mobile offices," said DAV Executive Director Denvel D. Adams. Explaining the need for the program, Adams added, "Many veterans, dependents and widows live some distance from VA facilities where DAV services are available. Our Field Service Unit program carries these services right to the door-steps of these people."

DAV Officials urge veterans of all wars -- particularly disabled veterans -- to take advantage of this free service by visiting the DAV mobile office to discuss any problems or questions they may have concerning veterans' benefits.

Local DAV and DAV Auxiliary members are cooperating with the DAV's National Headquarters to bring this special service program to the area.

Former Santa Annan Has Interesting Life

(The following story is from the April 15, edition of the Brown County Gazette)

Two weeks ago I was called to the Twilight Nursing Home here in Bangs to take a picture of a woman who had just turned 95 years old. I did not know quite what I was expecting but whatever it was, it was wrong.

Her name is Pearl Buse and she is up and going, full of fun and laughter and just a tad bit mischievous. And even though she assured me that there was nothing of interest to tell, I believed that she could be an inspiration to all of us.

Mrs. Buse was born April 4, 1886 in Rockdale, Texas to W.C. and Mary Jackson. She was the youngest of a family of two sons and six daughters. Her father was a farmer and a veteran of the Confederate Army during the Civil War.

One thing she remembers most about her childhood was her parents. When she would come home from school, she used to go out to the field where her father would be plowing with his two horses and remembered the pain and agony written on his face as he tried to survive. "He had bad feet because of the war," she recalls, "Back then soldiers had

to walk everywhere they went. Times were really rough and hard but people were different back then from the way they are now.

"After my father died, my mother used to wash clothes on an old rub board for the neighbors. She never complained or had a bad word to say toward anyone."

Life was not all hard times back then. They would have parties and dances on Saturday nights where all the relatives and neighbors would get together. Mrs. Buse blushed as she mentioned dances and assured me it was nothing like Bodidles. "We just had good clean fun."

Her father died when she was ten. When she was fourteen, she and her family moved nine miles east of Santa Anna.

She only went to school for five years. She had to quit after moving to Coleman County because there were no schools close enough to walk to. She learned how to read and write and considered that enough to get by on.

She was never good in math. She and her sister only had one book to study by and she would cheat by copying from her sister's homework.

She was seventeen when she married John Buse, a man from Santa Anna she had met at a

dance. "One night he wanted to carry me home in his wagon and that's how it started. We went together for about two years before we married."

When they did marry, there were a total of nine couples that went, each couple in a different wagon. She remembers, "It looked like a funeral procession." But it was far from being a sad occasion. When asked what her

husband was like, she replied, "He was the sweetest, kindest man I ever knew. He never got mad at anyone or complained."

After marrying, she moved to Santa Anna and then moved to

Concord in 1906. Here they owned a grocery store and gas station. "Gas was fifteen cents a gallon, but some people couldn't afford it then either. It took a whole dollar to fill up a tank."

I asked her daughter, Fay Dell White what her mother was like. "Well, there's no broom weeds growing in Concord," she laughs "She used them all on us." But Mrs. Buse tells me she never beat her kids and only used the broom weeds when they were needed.

Now, Mrs. Buse lives in Bangs in a nursing home where all of the long work days are over along with all of the other hard times. John Buse has been dead for 35 years and she has outlived all of her brothers and sisters and two of her seven children. How does she feel about life now? "I'm very happy," she answers, "We're all one big family here at the nursing home and everyone treats me real good. I've been here since 1973 and no one fought it as bad as I did but I found out it wasn't so bad after all."

One thing I had to know was her secret for such a long happy life. "I don't know," she said, "I guess it was clean living, hard work and no bad habits."

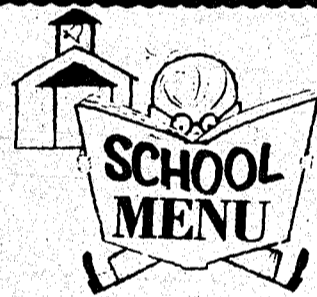
