Judging Team Qualifies For State Contest

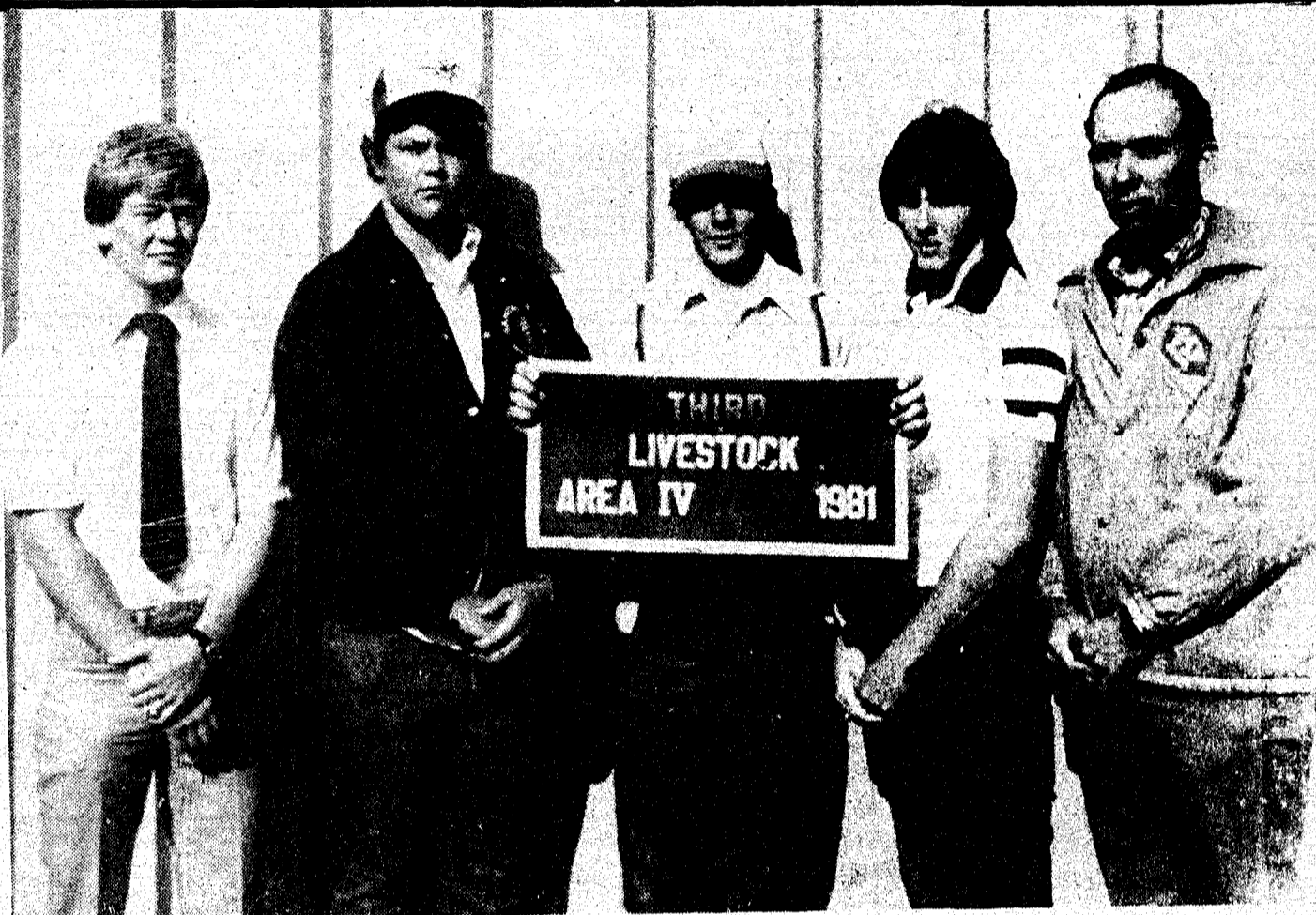
The Santa Anna Future Farmers of America judging teams were among the winners in the Area IV judging contests in Stephenville last Saturday. Coaches of the teams are Scott Patterson, vocational agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, and Bruce Williams, a student teacher from Tarleton State University.

The Livestock Judging Team, composed of Ricky Perry, Len Clawson and Randy Scarborough, placed third in the contest and qualified for the State FFA contest at Texas A & M University April 24 - 25.

The Poultry Judging Team placed sixth in the contest, with Maribee Hoffman, Mike Hartman and Jeannie Radicke on the team.

Gayle McCrary, a member of the Dairy Judging Team, was fourth high individual in that contest, scoring well among the about 185 students. Others on the team were James Bass and James Culpepper.

Also taking part in the Saturday contest were Raymond Castillo, Maurice Castillo, Toby Logan and Paul Bryan, members of the Land Judging Team.

No Contests In Saturday's Elections

Santa Anna has a new mayor, Edd Hartman, who was elected unopposed last Saturday. He will be sworn into office at the Thursday, April 9, meeting of City Council for a two-year term.

Hartman replace Thomas M. Hays who has served on term as Mayor. Prior to that time Hays was a member of the City Council, two terms.

Also elected without opposition Saturday were Dickie Horner, Donald Hosch and M. L. Guthrie Jr., City Councilmen. Horner and Hosch were incumbents, and Guthrie replaced Dean Bass, an appointee who was not seeking election for the new term.

Seventy votes were cast in the Saturday election, with Montie Guthrie III serving as election judge.

There were very few voters at the Saturday, April 4, School Board election as no contests were on the ballot. Only 63 people cast votes in the election, according to Rose Bass, election judge.

Donnie Neff received 58 votes to be re-elected for another term. Mrs. Derriel (Pauline) Warnock polled 56 votes for the second position which was formerly held by Joe Riley.

The newly-elected members

will be sworn into office at the Tuesday, April 14, meeting of the School Board, and officers elected for the new year.

Other members of the ISD Trustees are Eddie Wayne Hartman, Jay Weathers, Montie Guthrie III, Max Eubank and Donald Strickland.

The fifth six weeks period of school ends this week.

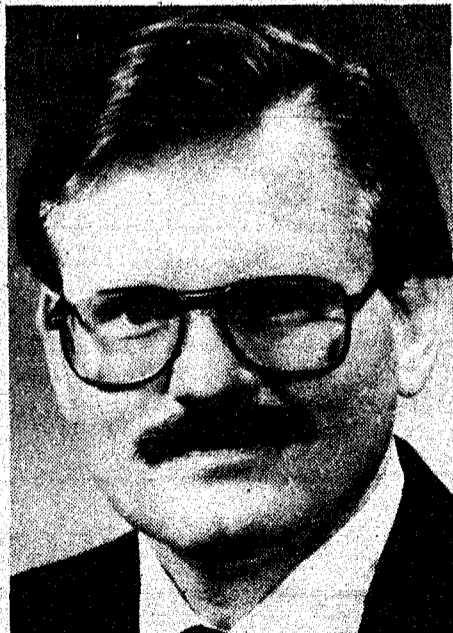
N-side Church of Christ Schedules Revival

Several local ladies were in Dallas last week attending the annual convention of the Texas Procelain Arts Association. The meeting was held Thursday through Sunday.

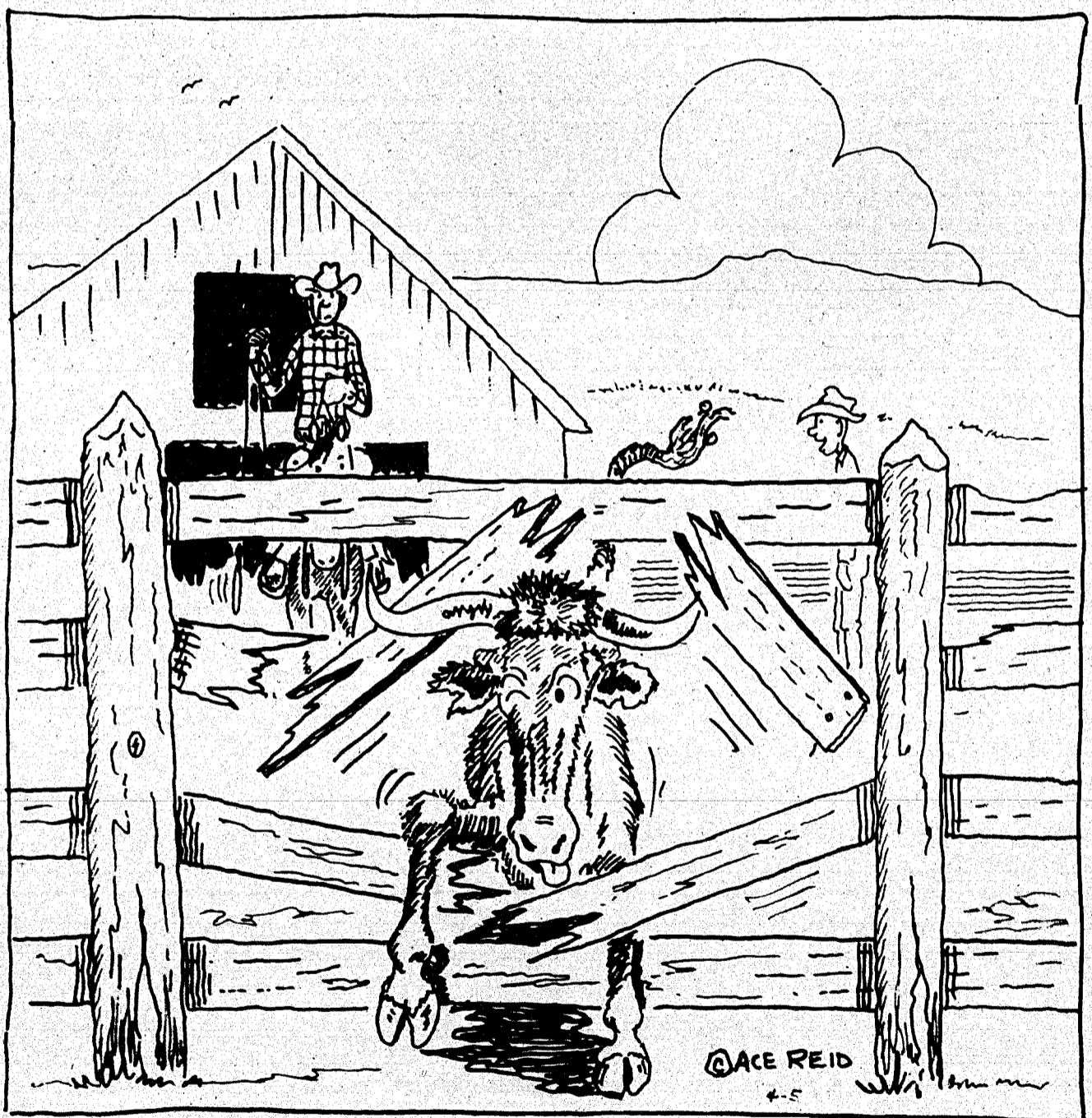

Weathers has held many positions of leadership in the district, currently serving as the Cabinet representative to the Council on Finance and Administration.

In 1953 he was named "Outstanding Rural Minister of the Year" while pastor of the Turnersville Circuit, pastoring the Levita Church.

Earnings to be Reported By S-Security Recipients

Annual reports of 1980 earnings must be filed by April 15 by people receiving social security benefits who earned more than the annual exempt amount in 1980. Priscilla Tercero, social security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

The 1980 annual exempt amounts were \$5,000 for people 65 and over and \$3,720 for people under 65 of last year.

People who received some benefits in 1980 who earned more than the exempt amount are required to file a report of

those earnings by April 15.

Those who received no benefits in 1980 are not required to file a report, but, Tercero said, those people should file a report to make sure that any benefits that might be due for the year are paid.

than anticipated, for example, may be due some benefits. Tercero said the only way these benefits can be paid is if the person files an annual report.

The general rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. A person can have substantial yearly earnings before all benefits are withheld. For example, a 65-year-old person whose monthly benefit rate is \$350 could earn \$13,400 before all benefits for 1980 were withheld, Tercero said.

The 1981 annual exempt amounts are \$5,500 for people 65 or older any part of 1981 and \$4,080 for people under 65 all of 1981.

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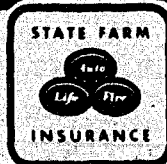

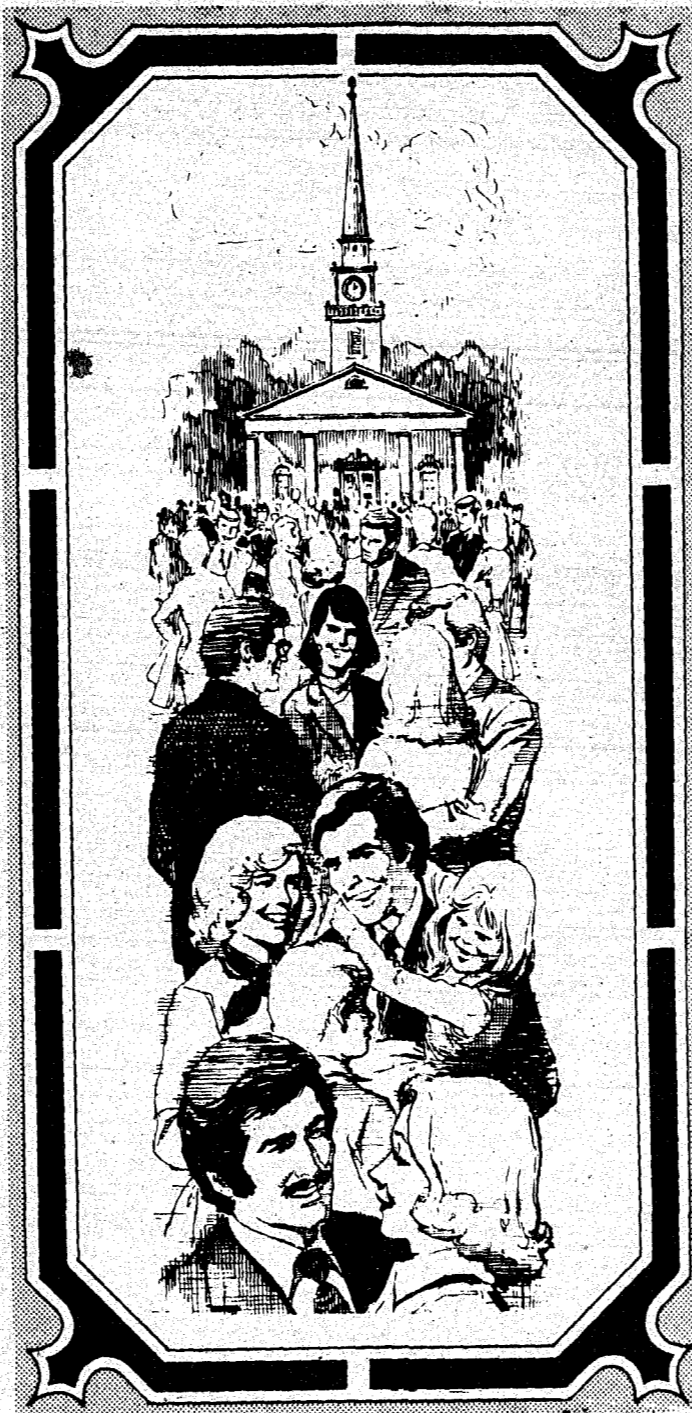

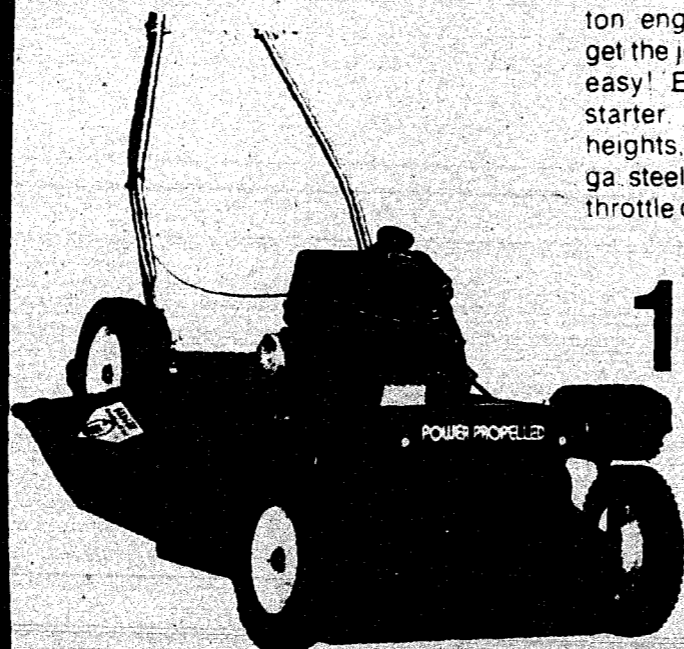

Social Security Cards Essential

Young people planning to work for the first time this summer should be aware that the first step is to get a social security number-- and the time to take that first step is right now.

Many young people may not realize that getting a social security number takes a little longer today than it did for their parents. Mom and dad probably walked into a social security office one day and walked out with a social security number and card. Today many of you can even apply by mail if you wish, but either way it takes about six weeks to receive a social security number and card.

The major reason for the difference is that the application is now more closely scrutinized to assure the applicant's correct identity, citizenship, or lawful alien status, and age. When the social security system first started 45 years ago and in its early years, the concern was to make it as easy as possible for people to get a social security card. Now that the system is a household word -- the Nation's primary means of providing an income to a family at the retirement, death or disability of the breadwinner -- the major concern is that the card and the rights it represents are protected from fraud and abuse.

Moreover, the social security number represents your key to your earnings record and future benefits based on it. Eligibility for benefits is based on your date of birth and the amount is based on your covered annual earnings shown in your record over your working lifetime. Incorrect information on the application for a number could seriously affect your benefit rights later.

Many employers will not hire you unless you can show a social security card because the law requires them to collect and pay social security taxes on the earnings of each person they employ, and they need a correct social security number for this purpose.

People 18 or over must apply for a card in person, but people under 18 may apply by mail or phone.

If you were born in the United States, a birth or baptismal record will be necessary for proof of age and citizenship. For proof of identity, we may accept any document which includes your signature, photograph, or physical description, such as driver's licenses, draft card, voters registration card, marriage record, school identity card, newspaper birth announcement, and similar documents.

If you were born outside the United States but are now a citizen, you will need to submit either a U.S. passport, a naturalization certificate, a U.S. citizen identity card or a certificate of citizenship.

Non-citizens living in the U. S. who want a social security card

need Alien Registration Cards, or other appropriate immigration forms.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. The Brownwood office number is 646-7533, and located at 300 North Main Building near the traffic circle. The office is open Monday through Friday, except national holidays, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

A representative of the Brownwood office visits Santa Anna once a month on the second Thursday from 1:00-2:30 p.m. The representative can be found at the Mountain City Center.

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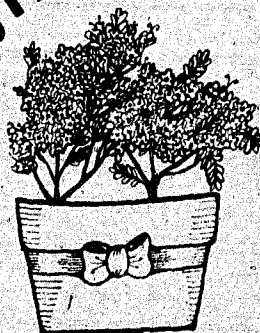
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1981 Basketball Team Has Successful Season

Learn to perform maintenance on such household possessions as the car, appliances and plumbing, and visit the library for publications on consumer-topics.

If you don't know how to repair something, find a book or a friend to show you step-by-step repair techniques. Ask the County Extension Office for publications or help in home and family living -- on topics from home canning to repairing leaky faucets.

If repairs do require experts, first check with trade or technical schools. Some have economical repair-service programs for the public.

Share your talents or skills with others. For example, trade your painting skills for a friend's plumbing know-how. Or ask someone to till your garden for a return payment of fresh tomatoes or vegetables during the summer.

For entertainment, visit local, free or inexpensive attractions; museums, lectures, zoos. Make it a family affair.

Rely on friends and family for other entertainment by organizing round-robin dinner parties, book-review groups or a neighborhood basketball or soccer game.

Get acquainted with neighbors and other community members. One small block of homes can represent hundreds of skills.

Visit in English Home A Memorable Occasion

The last few days of our stay in England were the best. I was a guest in the home of Bert and Brenda Stringer in Barnet, a suburb of London.

Suzanne Kingsbery and I joined Jacqueline Woodward at the Stringer home before flying from London back to Texas last August. Brenda and Jacqueline have been friends since childhood and visit as often as possible. Suzanne and I were graciously included for the long weekend, making a very special end to our European trip.

After several days in downtown London, Suzanne and I -- by now seasoned subway and bus travelers -- took the subway to Barnet -- the last stop on the northbound line from London. The approximately 15 or 20 mile route went through some open country as well as small towns. The town of Barnet is an historic place, and a small city within itself.

The Stringer home is in a lovely residential area where roses and other flowers were blooming in every yard, with enclosed gardens at the back where people were enjoying the delightful summer weather that was following a long, rainy month of July.

Since I am fond of hot tea anyway, the afternoon tea was a special treat -- along with all sorts of delicious desserts and foods. On one evening we had "high tea" that was a bountiful meal of

salads and other goodies, and was our evening meal that day.

Also making our visit enjoyable were the Stringers' sons, Tom, a college freshman, and Ralph, a high school student, who were delightful young men -- friendly and helpful, and very talented musically. Chemical Fertilizer Users Urged to Protect Eyes

Spring time in Texas! It's time to plant and time to fertilize. It's also time - if you work with agriculture chemicals - to protect your eyes. If you don't, warns the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, you risk serious eye injury, even blindness.

Reports from hospital emergency rooms over several years show that chemicals have been responsible for nearly two-thirds of all agricultural eye injuries, says Elvin J. Schofield, Society president. "Yet with eye protection and proper precautions, 90 percent of these eye injuries could have been prevented.

"Anhydrous ammonia is the most powerful and

dangerous of these chemicals," he went on. "In the soil ammonia means abundant crops; in the eye, however, it can mean tragedy for within seconds of contact it begins to destroy the cells and tissues of sight."

For this reason, all who work around such chemicals should wear safety goggles. The goggles should fit snugly around the eye area and have hooded vents that will keep liquids out.

In addition to urging safety eyewear, the Society has other safety tips for those handling agricultural chemicals.

1. Study the product's label for correct use and observe listed precautions.
2. Thoroughly understand how to operate any equipment prior to use.

"Seek medical attention immediately" Shofield stressed. "Delay will only increase the chances of sight loss. Also, never put salves or ointments into chemically injured eyes; they tend to complicate first aid and later

medical treatment."


