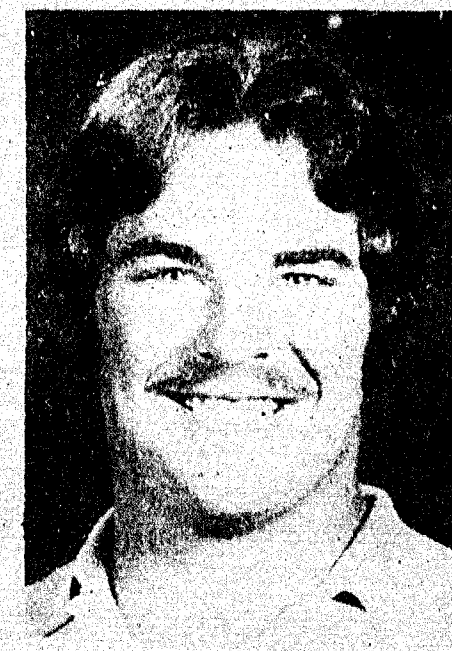
She had surgery to repair the break Friday and is now getting along very well.

### Flying Wing an Unusual Hobby

Many Coleman and Santa Anna area people got their first view of a Mitchell Flying Wing Sunday of last week when a former Santa Anna resident flew his wing from the Coleman airport.

He is Carl Langford of Plano, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude F. Langford who reside three miles north of Santa Anna. He graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1955, and now works for Texas Instruments in Dallas.

Langford built the flying wing from a kit. It took him about a year and he has about \$3,000

invested. The wing is powered by a 10 horsepower motor, and lands and takes off at about 25 miles per hour. Top speed is about 45 miles per hour, and the wing will fly an hour and a half on seven quarts of gasoline.

Langford, who has a private pilot's license, has about 15 hours in the wing. He has crashed once, that being when he had to make an emergency downwind landing. Still, he rates the wing as "relatively" safe to fly. He has made emergency landings a time or two when the motor quit. In fact, he made one here Monday morning in a nearby wheat field, but he set the wing down without

any difficulty.

The wing is the same as used in hang gliding. With the motor and landing gear, the wing has a total weight of 160 pounds. The wing itself folds and is carried atop Langford's station wagon. The landing gear and motor are hauled behind on a motorcycle trailer.

Langford states that the flying wing is strictly a sports hobby, and he is enjoying it. He says that many pilots get the wing up then cut the motor and glide, but he does not intend to try that for a while, until he is sure he can get the motor started again while in flight.

The Nitia Daniell Group of United Methodist Women met Monday, April 27, at the church annex. The invocation was led by Mrs. Mike Alexander.



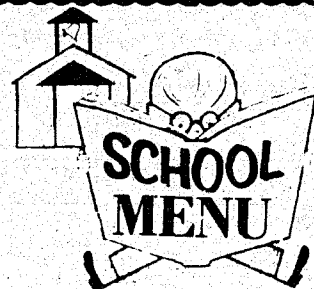
