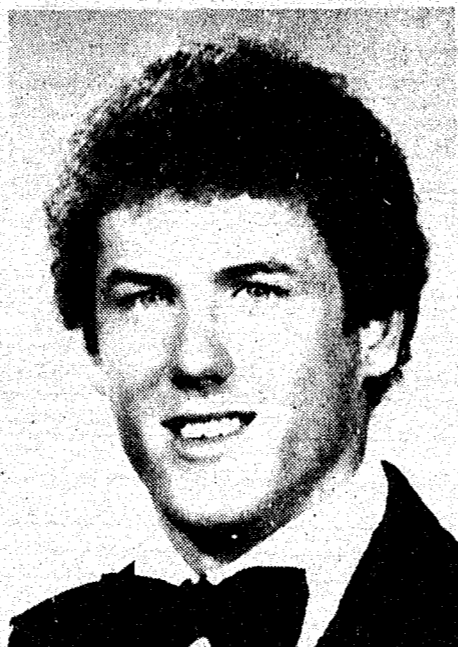
Herbert Seale is director of the Santa Anna band that is composed of students from seventh grade through high school.

Appraisal Schedule Adopted For County

The Coleman County Tax Appraisal Board met Monday, May 20, in Coleman to approve a schedule for appraisals and valuation on open space rural land to be used by all taxing entities in 1982.

The Soil Conservation Service soil survey for production potential for the County will be used, with very few variations, as the Appraisal District is required by law to establish both the market value and productive value of rural land. A large number of confirmed sales and cash leases were obtained for every area of the county, with some 50,000 acres studied and analyzed in arriving at the valuations. The following schedule was adopted unanimously by the group:

CROPLAND:
Class II (Average Productive Value) - \$71.43 per acre; Average Market Value - \$375 per acre.
Class III - Average Productive Value - \$51.02 per acre; Average Market Value - \$300 per acre.

PASTURE LAND:
Class I - Average Productive Value - \$44.90 per acre; Average Market Value - \$300 per acre.
Class II - Average Productive Value - \$36.73 per acre; Average Market Value - \$250 per acre.
Class III - Average Productive

Value - \$26.53 per acre; Average Market Value - \$200 per acre.

All improvements will be measured and classed, to be valued separately.

At an earlier session the following classifications and basic schedule for residential property was adopted as follows:

(Each classification is less accrued depreciation plus any additions such as carports, fireplaces and other additions)
CLASS I - \$32 per square foot
CLASS II - \$28 per square foot
CLASS III - \$24 per square foot
CLASS IV - \$18.50 per square foot
CLASS V - \$15 per square foot

These schedules and procedures will be applied countywide with pluses and minuses applied where applicable, as to location, services and other acceptable valuation procedures.

Other schedules will be given later on commercial, personal property and miscellaneous property as work is completed.

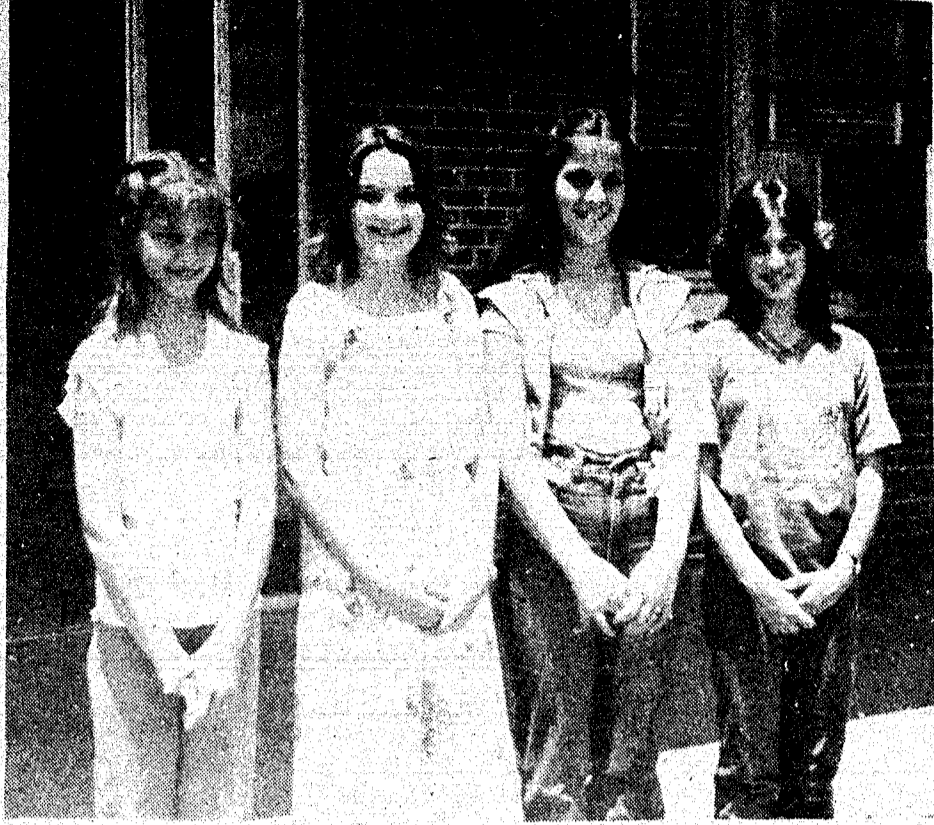

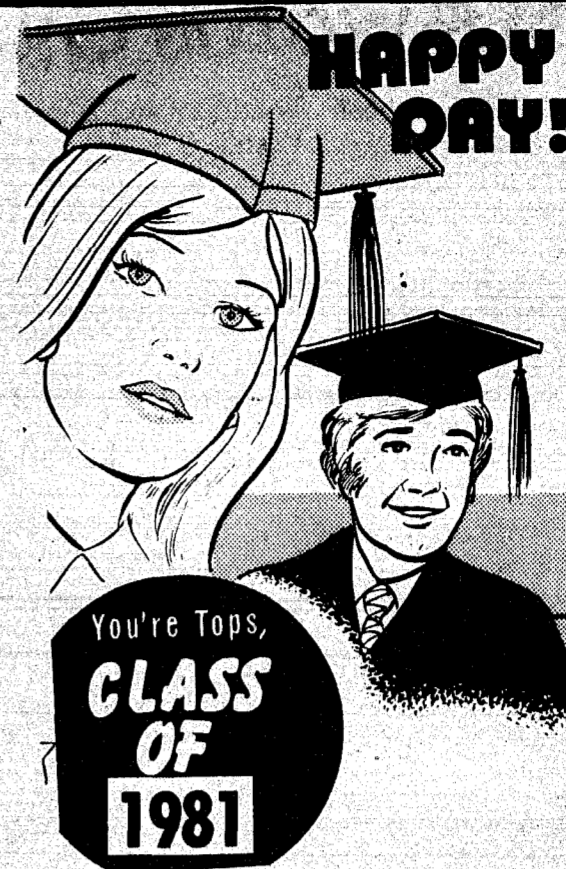

A member of the tennis team three years, he was a regional finalist two years, qualifying for the state tournament in doubles two years.

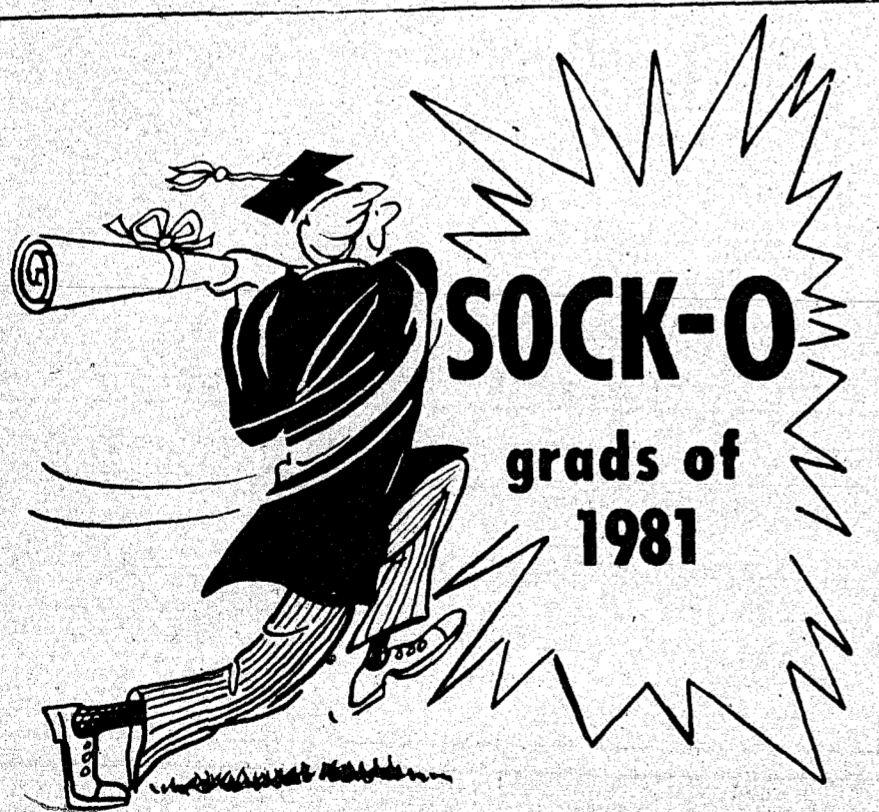
He will attend Tarleton State University where he will play football. He plans to study secondary education and go into coaching in public schools.

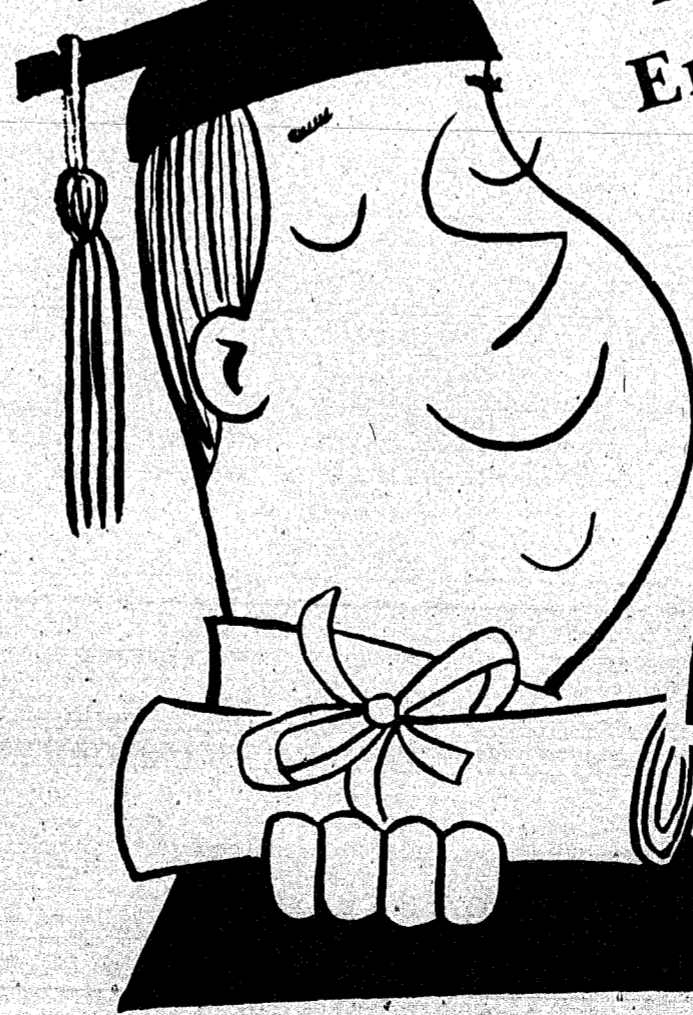

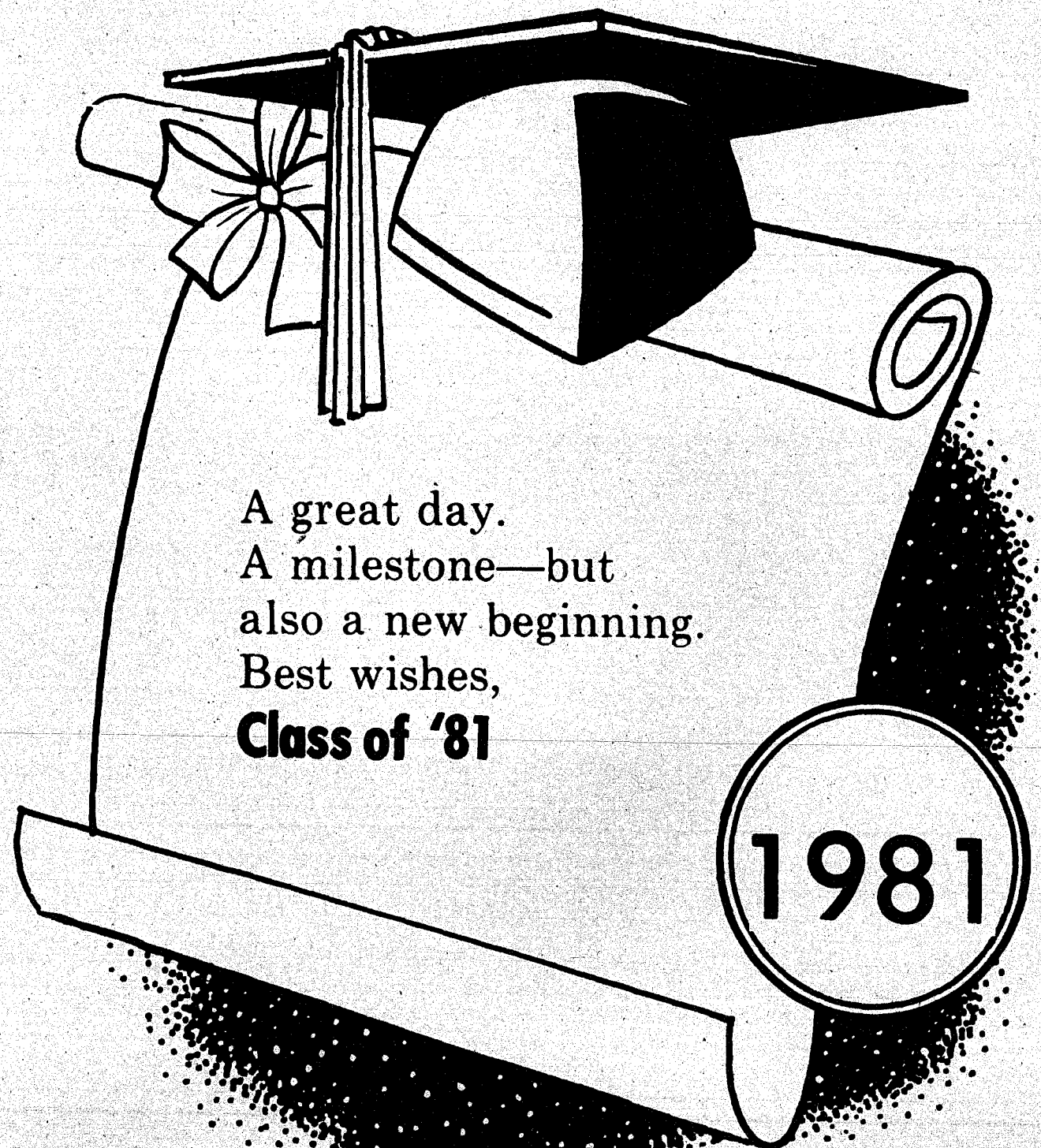

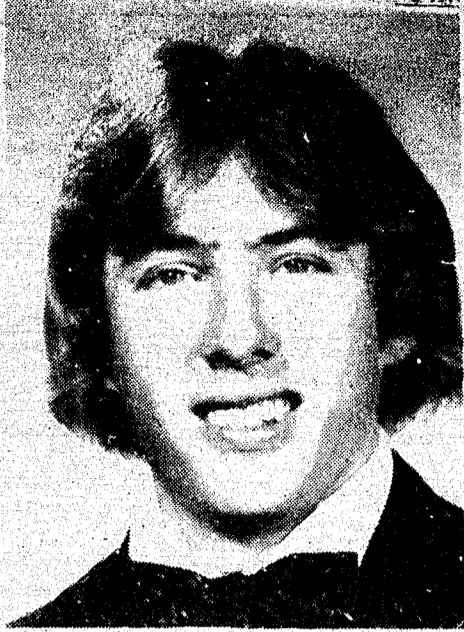

Kaye plans to attend business school and eventually become an accountant.

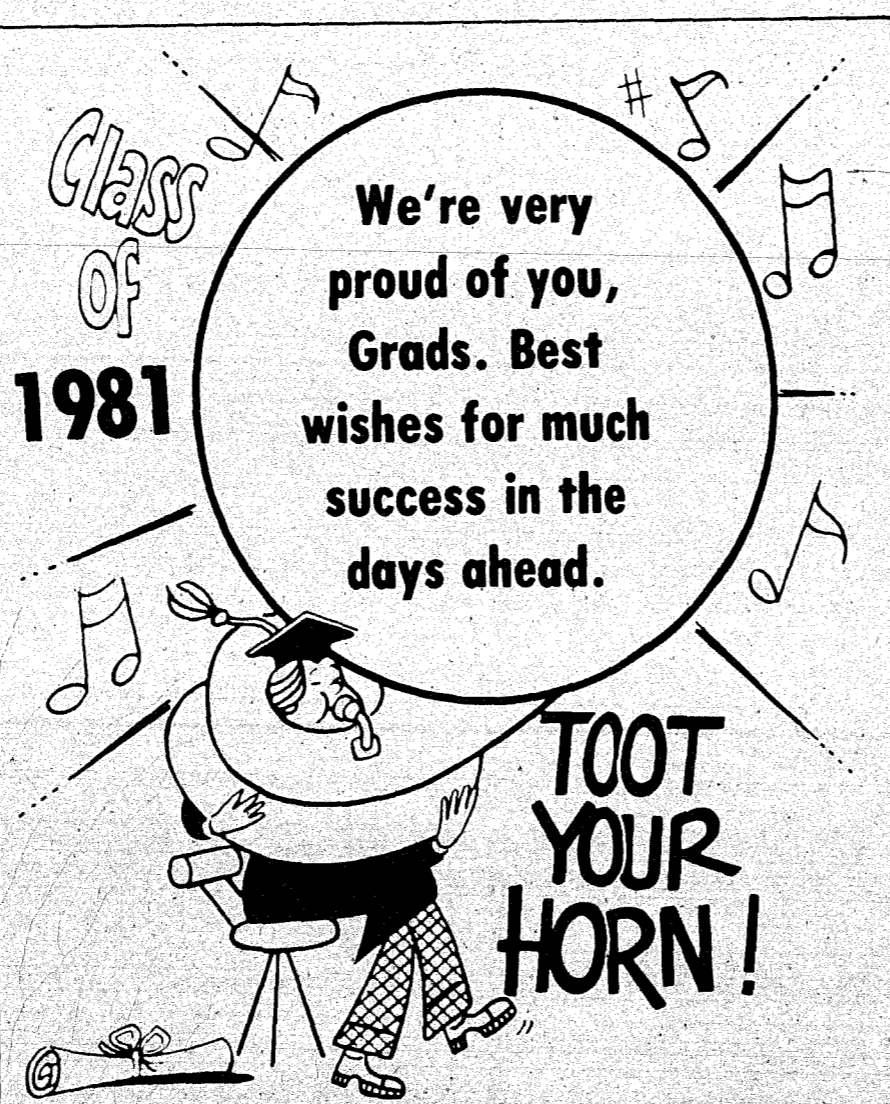

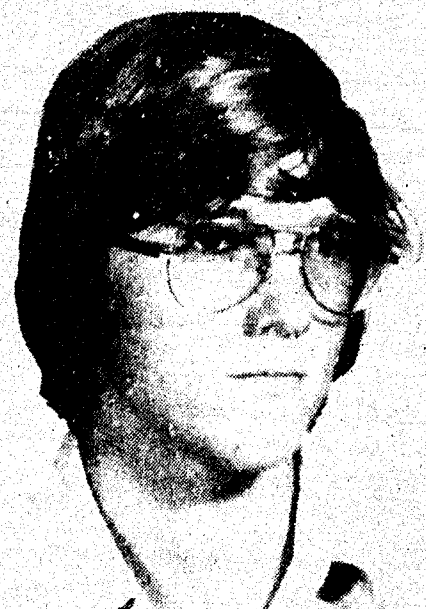


BRENDA CULPEPPER

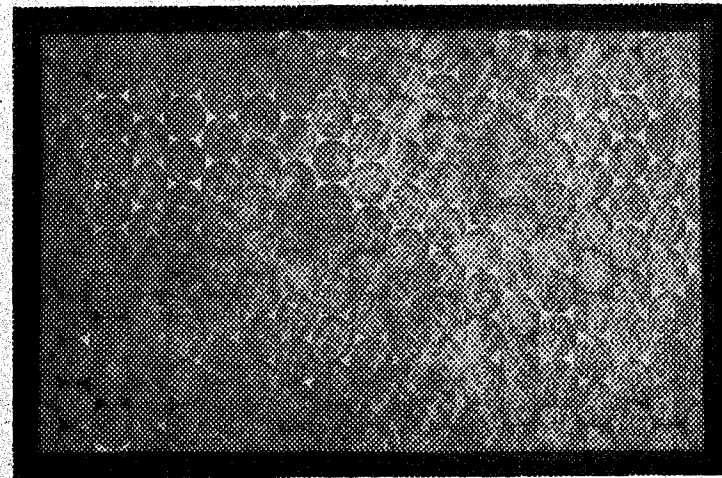

View From The Mountain

(The following story is from the Sunday, April 26, issue of the Brownwood Bulletin)

For many travelers along U.S. Highway 67-84 through Santa Anna, the mountains that rise abruptly from the valley there inspire thoughts and memories of the pioneers who first used the peaks as landmarks on their journey to settle the area.

For others, the Santa Anna Mountains conjure up dreams of summer hikes or hang-gliding expeditions along the steep slopes.

Regardless of the fantasies brought to mind by these remarkable upthrusts of earth and stone, the fact remains that they are stark reminders of the subtle beauty of the Central Texas region in which they are located.

Anyone who has ever climbed the slopes of either peak will agree that the view from the top is probably the best for miles around. Thick, brush, rocky crags, ranging horses, and fresh air all abound on the upper sections of these flat-topped, mesa-like formations. The stoney ridges that crown the rims are peppered with cracks and caves, used by Indians, prospectors, Texas Rangers, runaway slaves and black bears, among others. The history of the mountain is rich in lore and legend.

The natural springs at the base of the mountains and the excellent vantage points at the peaks attracted the Indians of the area centuries before white men came to the region. In fact, the name Santa Anna is derived from the name of an old Kiowa chief, Satanta, whose village was located near springs at the west end of the mountains. The old chief supposedly buried a rich store of treasure 12 miles east of the mountains.

A frontier army post, Camp Colorado, was established in Coleman County in 1856, near the present town of Trickham. It was later moved to the Jim Ned Creek, about eight miles north of the Santa Anna Mountains. On many occasions the soldiers from the camp used the peaks as lookout posts, and antelope, wild horses, buffalo, and black bear were numerous on and around the mountains.

The Texas Rangers also used the mountains as a base of operations in the area, and today a building at the base of the east peak stands as a reminder of the Texas Ranger presence in the area from the 1850's to the present. The stone house was originally built as a meeting hall for the ex-Texas Rangers Association, but has since been renovated and transformed to the Ranger Park Inn, a motel just off of Highway 67-84.

Just off of Highway 84 on the west side of the west peak is an old rock cabin, built in the late 1800's. Alongside the house is a huge petrified log, a fossilized reminder of the age of the earth itself. A Texas state historical marker in front of the cabin gives some interesting information about the house and the mountain.

Ever since the first log cabin was built in the "gap" between the two mountains, youngsters in Santa Anna have climbed and explored the mountains, and all have seen the slow but certain mutilation of the stone giant by miners scraping for the profitable materials that make up the mountains.

Victor Oder is now in a San Antonio nursing home, but as a child he remembers growing up in Santa Anna in the early part of the century.

"I used to roam all over the Santa Anna Mountains," he recalls, and back then, there were a lot of prospectors up there. I came across an old German miner, one time, on the north

ridge of the east mountain. When I asked him what he was digging for, he said, 'Sulphur.' I only wish now that I had allowed for the German accent."

Modern day miners have not found silver on the mountains, but rather silica sand, used in the manufacturing of glass and glass products. The larger western

New Jury Summons Forms Used in Coleman County

Effective with the May call, new jury summons forms are being used for terms of the 35th Judicial District Court in Coleman, according to District Judge Gordon Griffin.

In addition to the new summons form will be a juror reply form and jury information sheet. These forms will replace the double post card as used here for many years.

The new summons form sets out the qualifications for jury service, together with the basis for jury service exemptions. The jury reply form is designed to be signed by a summoned juror, indicating that he will be present or that he claims a legal excuse. It also provides for jurors making requests to be excused for reasons other than enumerated legal excuses; however this area is to some degree discretionary with the Court. Statutes prohibit a judge from excusing prospective jurors in advance on basis of economic reasons. All attorneys involved in the cases set for trial for a given jury must agree before the Court can excuse jurors for economic reasons.

The jury information sheet requests the routine information that virtually all attorneys ask prospective jurors, and having this information available to attorneys, the Court may restrict the repetitious questioning, saving an estimated hour and a half by each attorney in the case.

A self-addressed and stamped envelope is furnished with the forms, so that the summoned juror may complete and return forms to the District Clerk.

It is pointed out that in addition to saving time on each juror and the Court, the new method is also a financial savings to the taxpayer.

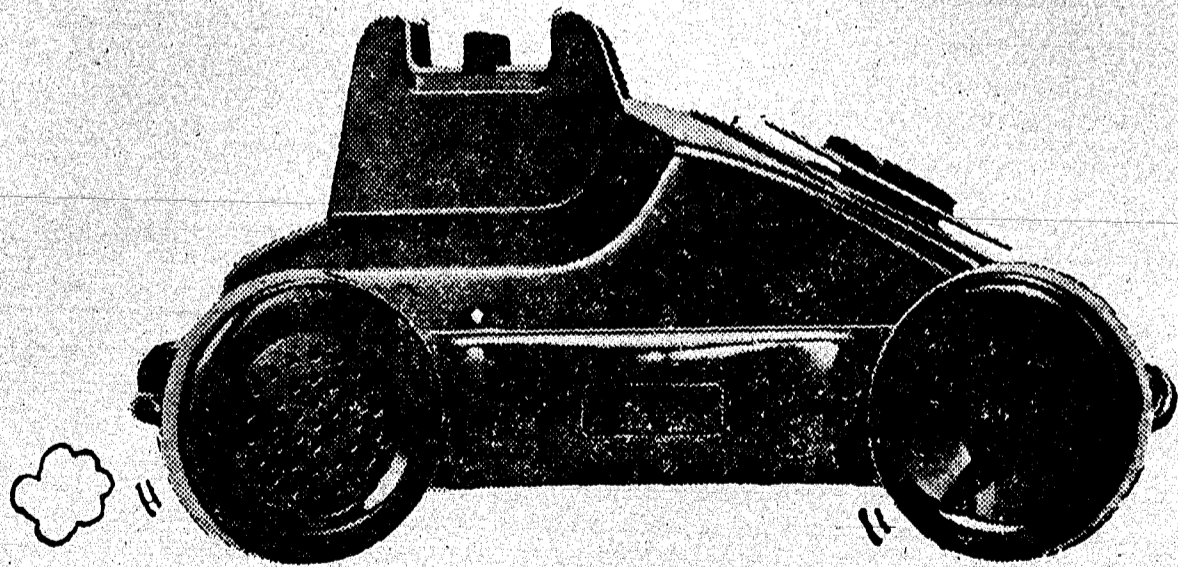
mountain has been reduced to a pile of rubble on its eastern end, and both peaks are still being mined to some degree.

The wildlife on the mountains seems to be little affected by the encroachment of man, as can easily be seen while scaling the slopes. Armadillos, opossums, raccoons, squirrels, and other small mammals, birds, and lots of insects make the mountain their home. Goats and horses also forage on the peaks.

Although these and other animals remain here just as they have for centuries, it is sad to note the disappearance of many species, such as the wild horses, the black bear, antelope, and buffalo. But such is the price of civilization.

The Santa Anna Mountains are a beautiful sight on the rolling plains of Central Texas, and their history is an adventure in discovery.

ORDINANCE NO. 287
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND CHANGING A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ENACTED BY THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, COLEMAN COUNTY, TEXAS, ON OCTOBER 4, 1962 AND BEING PARTLY STYLED, "AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, COLEMAN COUNTY, TEXAS", AND PROVIDING FOR A MODIFICATION OF THE DEFINITION OF THE TERMS "SERVICE LINES" AND "YARD LINES" REFERENCED IN SECTION 4 THEREOF.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY

OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:
Section 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on October 4th, 1962, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:
"SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof)

installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of May 11, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.
