Very Little Water Is Impounded In City Lakes

Despite the good rainfall in the Santa Anna area, very little water has been impounded in the city lakes. Heavy vegetation and small run-off area keeps the lakes from catching large amounts of water, according to Johnny Williams, City Superintendent.

Residents of Santa Anna use approximately 335,000 gallons of water daily, with about half of that purchased from Lake Brownwood and the other half from the city lakes. Usage is down at the present time because lawns and gardens have had enough rainfall, but as hot weather continues, the usage will increase rapidly.

The pressure sustaining valves have been installed at the city storage tank, and all parts of town should have good pressure. City crews are still working on the water system, correcting problems that occurred during construction.

Delinquent Water Bills Cause City Concern

The Santa Anna City Council voted Thursday to enforce the city policy that discontinues water service to customers with overdue bills. Although the policy has been on the City records for many years, it has not been enforced, and there is now over \$4,000 in overdue water and services accounts.

According to the policy, any water and city service bill not paid by the due date of the tenth of the month, will be considered over-

due, and if not paid by the 20th of the month, water service will be discontinued.

At the Thursday meeting, Mayor Edd Hartman presided, with all members of the Council present. Minutes of the past meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts for the month were approved for payment.

A guest at the meeting was Mike Bowers, the new Deputy Sheriff in Santa Anna.

The next regular meeting of the Council will be Thursday, July 2.

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Farm Bureau Urges Tax Cuts

The Farm Bureau is supporting a multi-year tax reduction to stimulate productivity and thus help fight inflation, according to Victor Cardinas of Coleman, president of the Coleman County Farm Bureau.

The county leader said his organization is contacting Congressman Charles Stenholm and Senators Tower and Bentsen in support of the tax cut bill now before Congress.

Farm Bureau supported the bi-partisan Gramm-Latta Budget bill which has been approved by Congress.

"The first step in a national recovery program is to achieve a balance budget," the farm leader said. "The Gramm-Latta Bill moves in that direction. It was necessary to begin cutting down on federal spending because deficit spending is the primary cause of inflation.

"The next step is to cut taxes so that individuals, businesses and industry will again have the incentive to increase productivity. Those same dollars sent to the government in the form of taxes would simply lead to more non-productive government spending. Tax revenues may even be increased through increased economic activity resulting from a tax cut," he said.

Cardinas said farmers and ranchers are not contributing to inflation, but are more vulnerable to increased costs than most other sectors of the economy because they cannot automatically pass along cost increases. If their cost become prohibitive, they simply go out of business, he said.

Cardinas said the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that only about one-third of consumers' foodstore spending goes back to farmers as farm value. Thus, the 5.3 percent increase in farm value last year contributed a mere 1.6 percent to the overall 8-percent rise in foodstore prices, he said.

"Farmers are actually holding down inflation," the county farm leader said.

"We have proved by our success in foreign markets that we are productive and competitive," he added. "But we cannot continue to exist in an inflated economy where the taxes are made even more confiscatory by inflation. We must have some relief."

Human Aging Process Studied With Animals

A field mouse in the wild is lucky to live to be a year old. Yet, its cousin, the pocket mouse may live to five years of age. Why do some animals live longer than other? And how do different animal species regard their elders?

According to International Wildlife magazine, scientists are studying senescence, or aging, in wildlife to find out the answers to these questions, and in turn, to better understand the processes involved in human aging.

The answer to the mouse mystery is simple. "Some small mammals may live longer than others of similar size because they spend part of their lives in hibernation or in dormancy, their bodies barely functioning," explains the National Wildlife Federation's bi monthly publication. Thus the pocket mouse, which spends the hot desert season in a state of torpor, will live much longer than the on-the-go field mouse.

Until recently, almost everything we knew about animals that live to be old come from zoos. Longevity records for zoo animals, says International Wildlife, include: a 77-year-old elephant; a 65-year-old vulture; a 49-year-old hippopotamus; a 38-year-old zebra. Cold-blooded animals last even longer, with tortoises reaching 150 years; sturgeon, 100; carp, 50; and toads, 36.

Unfortunately, zoo records can be misleading since animals tend to live longer in the security of a zoo than they do in the wild. However, such records do give us an appreciation for some species' potential life spans.

"Animals that are most likely to live to be old in the wild are those which, as adults, have no predators except man," says International Wildlife. Most of these are large-elephants, hippos, rhinos, lions, tigers and wolves. But some, such as the Galapagos tortoise, survive not only because of their large size, but also because of their isolated habitat.

Scientists have found that a wild animal's age can be estimated in many ways, such as by inspecting the lens from a rabbit's eye, the thickness of baleen plates in the mouths of whales, the annual rings in the horns of sheep and antelope, and tooth wear, or in some species, "rings" in a tooth. Teeth are, in fact, one of the most important considerations for life in the wild; research shows that most wild animals live only as long as their teeth hold out.

After spending years living among some species in the wild, animal behaviorists have observed that in the "social" species--those animals that live and travel in groups--older males and females are treated quite differently. "Males are generally of prime importance to a social group only when they are dominant," says International Wildlife. Eventually, older males are driven from a group by younger males when their strength and breeding capacity have been reduced by age.

Older females, in contrast, do not seem to suffer this loss of social status. Among most species, old females usually continue to reproduce, although they have fewer offspring than the younger females. Female elephants up to fifty years of age continue to function as "matriarchs" in their social group, and even the feeblest lionesses are allowed to share the kills of other pride members.

Establishing Credit Important For Women

COLLEGE STATION— Her own credit record is a "must" for the woman who is widowed or divorced, so it's important to establish one early, advises Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

"Because some women have no independent credit history, they may find credit accounts they've shared for years with their husbands suddenly terminated upon death or a divorce," the specialist explains.

"This sudden loss of credit, often when they need it most, can create a tremendous strain on the budget and the emotions," she adds.

Mrs. McCormack is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

BUILDING CREDIT RECORD

Here are her suggestions for building a credit record:

Start your credit history in your own name -- for example, Carol Bryan White, rather than Mrs. William White or just Carol White.

Open a savings account and a checking account in your own name. Add to the savings account regularly, and don't overdraw your checking account. These two steps will demonstrate your ability to manage money.

Apply for a charge account at a local store. Pay bills promptly and in full so no finance charge will be assessed.

In addition, apply for a gasoline or national credit card and use other accounts and references.

KNOW CREDIT HISTORY

Your credit history is a record of your payments on credit cards, charge accounts, installment loans and mortgages. It's important to keep all payments current so your credit history will show you to be a responsible financial manager.

In most cases, a local credit bureau gathers credit information about you and sends it to creditors who ask for it.

Here's another step to protect yourself: ask your creditors to

report credit information in both spouses' names. Ask your credit bureau for a form requesting this be done on accounts opened before June 1, 1977.

Accounts opened after that date usually are reported in both names, although it's a good idea to check with your credit bureau occasionally to make sure this is being done.

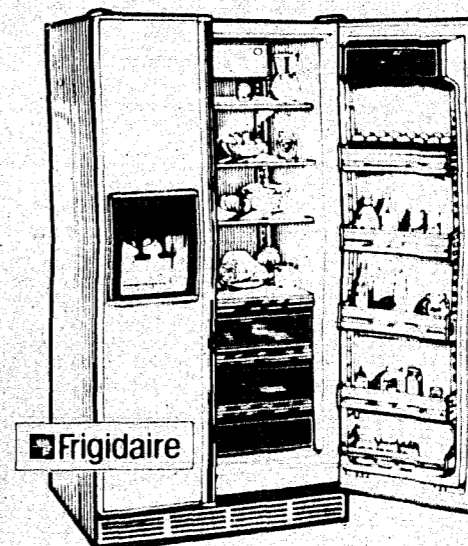

WTU Files Application For Coal-fired Plant

An application has been filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for a coal-fired generating plant to be built in North Texas by West Texas Utilities Company and two other operating companies in the Central and South West Corporation.

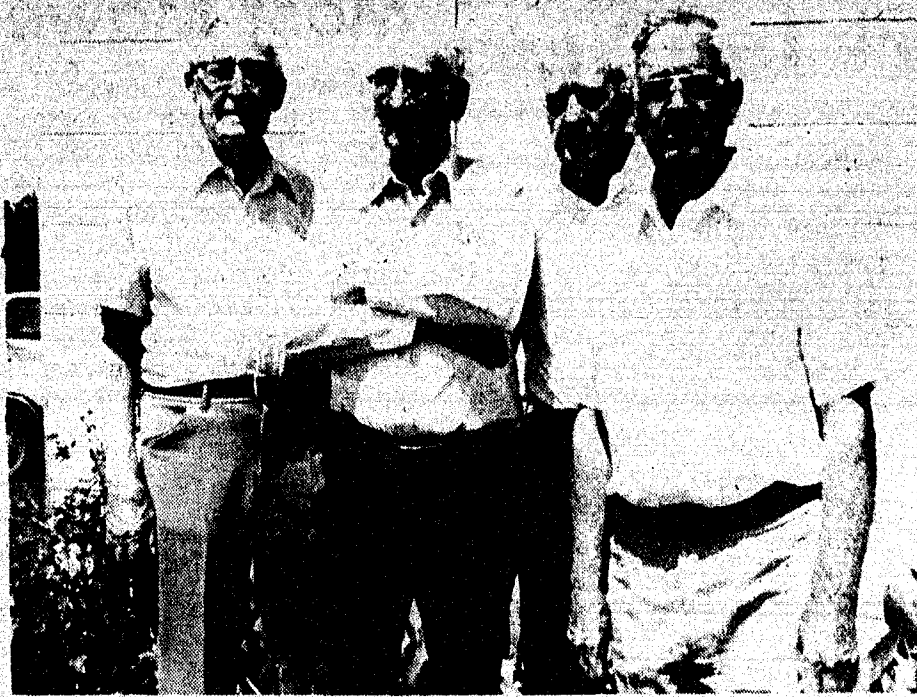
The certificate is required before actual construction can start on the plant, which will be built on a 1,937-acre tract which WTU purchased from the fabled Waggoner Ranch eight miles southeast of Oklaunion. The application is for Oklaunion Power Station Unit No. 1, which will have net capacity of 640 megawatts. Ultimately, three units with a total capacity of 1,920 megawatts are planned.

Cooling water will come from Lake Diversion, 20 miles south of the site. WTU purchased water rights in 1977 from Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and the City of Wichita Falls. Boiler fuel will be low sulphur western coal, probably from Wyoming mines.

Oklaunion will be the first power plant to be jointly owned

by CSW operating companies. WTU, the managing partner, will own 350 megawatts, Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatt, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, will not participate. PSO's participation hinges on a favorable ruling by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regarding an agreement between the CSW System and members of the intrastate Texas Intercon the intrastate Texas Interconnected System to install direct current interconnections across state lines.

The application state that the plant is needed to satisfy load growth of the companies and to reduce dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel. Unit One is scheduled for commercial operation by December, 1986. Total cost is estimated at \$675,104,000.

Summer Lawn Care To Conserve Water

Energy-conscious homeowners can take steps to reduce the energy demands of lawn care without lowering lawn standards. "While lawns offer many aesthetic and recreational benefits, these may be offset by energy requirements of lawn care," says Dr. Richard Duble, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

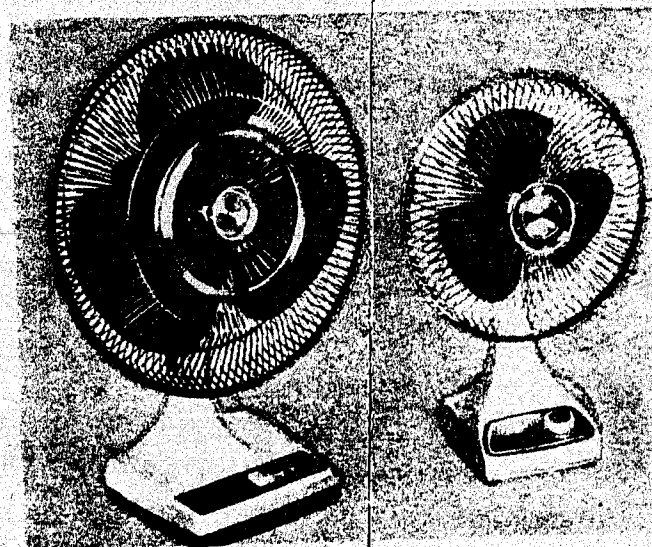
"Mowing, watering, fertilizing, controlling pests and disposing of leaf energy-consuming requirements of lawn care. During spring and summer months, watering the lawn and collecting and disposing of grass clippings place a heavy burden on cities for these services. Grass clippings account for more than 30 percent of total trash collections in some cities during spring and early summer," notes Dr. Duble.

He offers several lawn maintenance practices to help homeowners reduce these energy demands. Reducing fertilizer applications to maintenance levels -- 2 to 3 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of

lawn per year -- will go a long way toward reducing energy demands. (That's 20 pounds of fertilizer containing 10 percent nitrogen). Applying only maintenance levels of nitrogen to lawns can reduce mowing requirements, water use, insect and disease problems, and grass clippings.

"Excessive fertilization is the single most important factor contributing to high energy demands for lawn care," says Duble.

Other lawn care practices to reduce energy demands include returning or composting grass clippings. Using a mulching mower can be beneficial if grass



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

Most Mower Accidents Prevented

Some lawn mowers just can't cut it when it comes to safety. But even mowers with safety features can be dangerous if operators are careless, tired or in too much of a hurry. Working within inches of a blade whirling at approximately 230 miles per hour is no time to be careless, the Texas Medical Association says.

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission says good lawn mower design can help prevent accidents that cost about \$253 million and about 77,000 amputated fingers and toes, cuts and broken bones yearly. Among its

recommendations, the commission says a walk-behind lawn mower should have a foot guard in back and a deflector shield to shoot debris downward when a grass-catching bag is not being used.

To further prevent injuries, TMA urges mower users to take special care to avoid injuries to hands, feet and legs, which the CPSC says are the most common places hurt. These precautions include shutting off the mower completely before unclogging the discharge chute or blades and making sure that feet and hands are clear of the blade

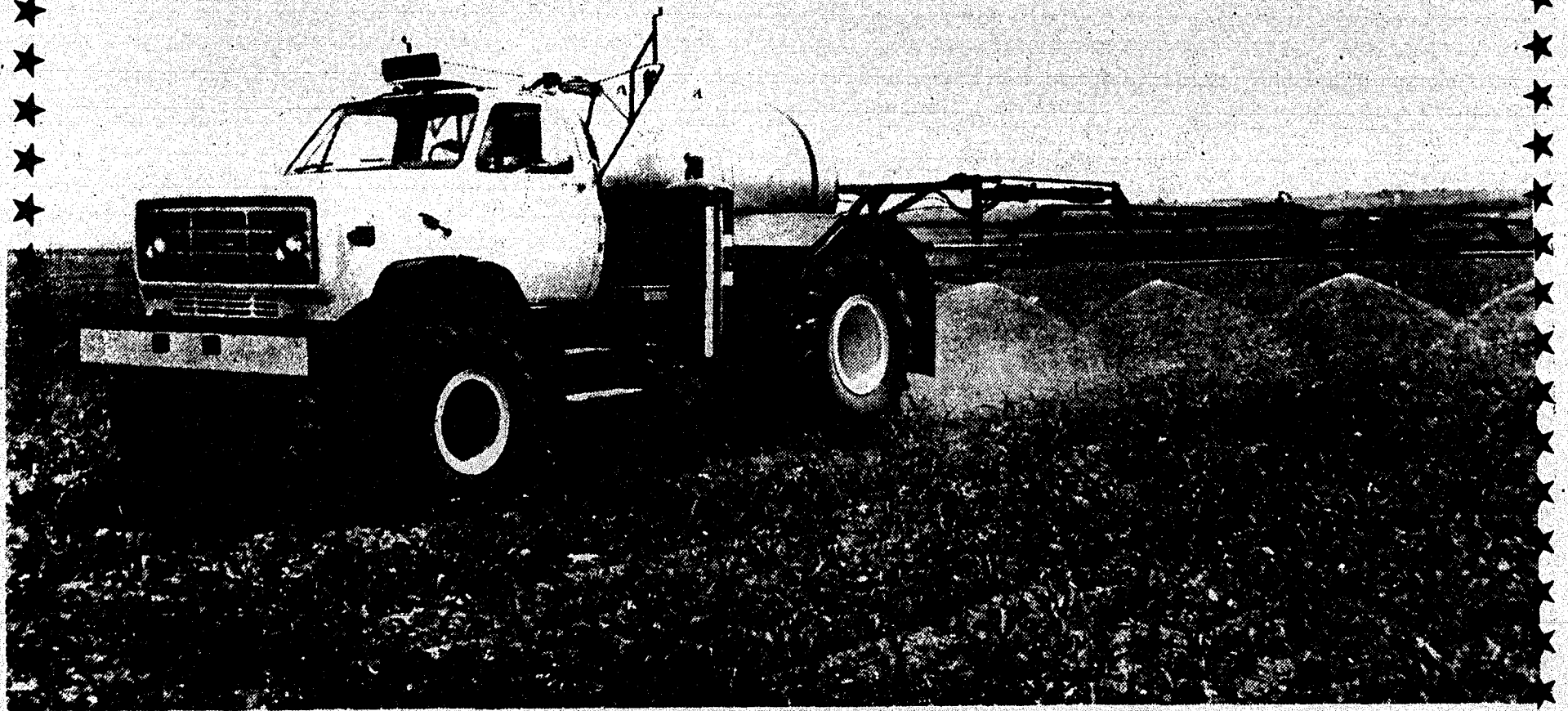
area before starting the motor.

TMA says injuries to other parts of the body often occur when small objects hidden in the grass suddenly are hurled with deadly force by a mower. An iron bolt hitting a pregnant woman in the stomach, a piece of wire puncturing a man's gallbladder and an object cutting a boy's neck artery are just a few of the cases doctors have treated.

Making sure people and pets are far away from the mower is a good way to avoid such accidents. This precaution is necessary because a mower, even with a grass catcher, can sling objects from any side.
