Two Resignations Accepted From S-Anna Teachers

Two teachers in the Santa Anna schools have resigned their positions, the resignations read and accepted at the Tuesday, June 9, session of the Board of Trustees.

Petra Ynostrosa, special education teacher for grades kindergarten through six, and Pam Birdwell, remedial Title I teacher in grades 7 - 12, have resigned their positions. Because of a cut in federal funding, the Title I remedial position will be eliminated from the program. Another special education teacher will be sought to fill Mrs. Ynostrosa's position, the only vacancy in the system at the present time.

Jay Weathers, president, led the June 9 meeting. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts were reviewed for payment.

The Board voted to retain Santa Anna National Bank as the depository bank for the next two years.

Summer improvement projects were discussed, and plans made to install sliding glass windows in the press box and make improvements to the scouting box in the bleachers.

The group approved Phase II of the five-year accreditation plan as required by the state. Supplemental salaries were reviewed for administrators and coaches, and set for the coming year.

The next meeting of the ISD Board will Tuesday, July 14.

One Taxpayer Has Meeting With ISD Tax Group

Only one taxpayer met with the Santa Anna ISD Tax Board of Equalization last Thursday, seeking information and changes in 1981 school taxes. Present were

all members of the Equalization Board, William Brown, Dale Bradley, Dick Longbrake and Ronnie McCarrell.

Although there are no changes in the 1981 school taxes, the entire tax structure will change for the coming year. Valuations will be increased under the new system mandated by the Texas

Legislature, but each taxing entity must set their own tax rate, so rates will be lowered. By law, only a small percent increase in tax income is allowed without an election by voters of the district.

Valuations will be the same for all taxing entities, with each group -- school, city and county -- to set rates for their own taxation purposes.

The valuations of the county property are now being conducted under direction of the County Tax Appraisal District staff.

Abilene Airman Drowning Victim At Lake Coleman

The body of a 45-year-old Dyess Air Force Base senior master sergeant was recovered Monday night from Lake Coleman after a two-day search. Senior Master Sgt. Raymond H. Kiser disappeared while attempting to swim to shore from a boat. Friends of the Abilene airman did not find him upon their return to shore, and the search began about 7:30 Sunday evening.

The Coleman Fire Department, game wardens, sheriff's deputies and volunteer divers from Dyess were at the scene during the two days.

The 27-year veteran of the Air Force had been at Dyess for 4 and one-half years, according to the

Dyess Public Information officer. Funeral services are pending in Abilene.

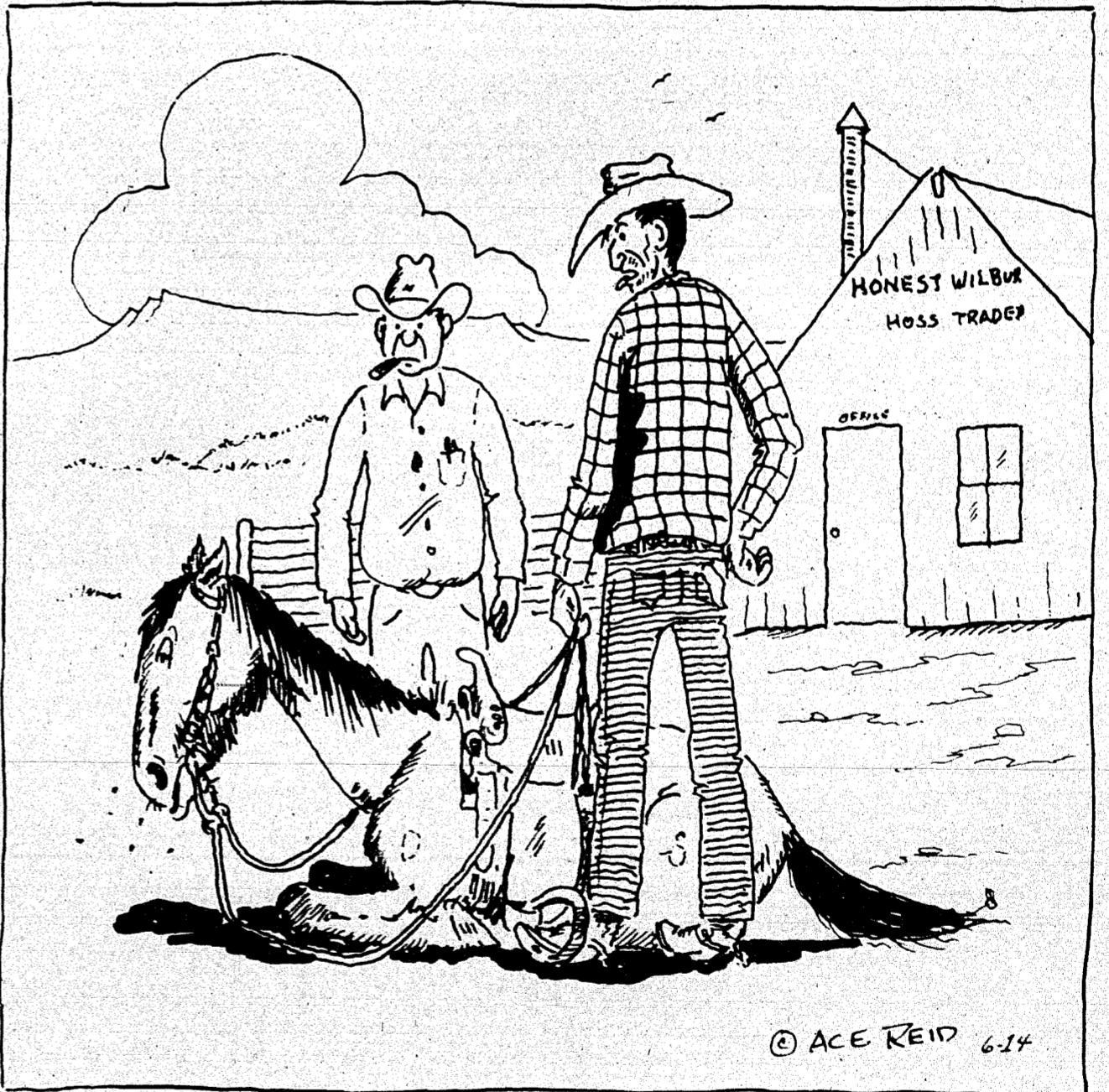
Minor League To Play For Championship

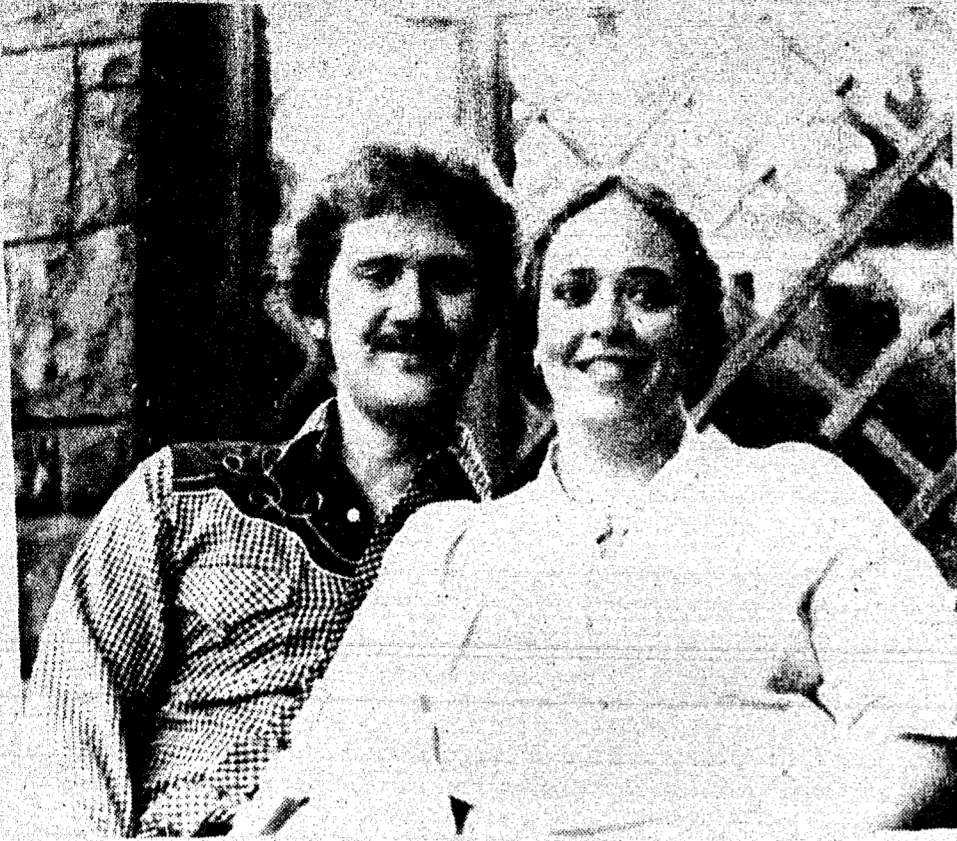

Researchers test interferon to fight children's cancer

COLLEGE STATION — A Texas A&M University medical researcher will soon begin testing interferon, the body's own "wonder drug," to discover if it can successfully fight an often fatal nerve cancer that mainly strikes children under age 5.

The interferon, produced from cattle embryos at Texas A&M's Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Amarillo, will be tested on laboratory mice at the main campus, said Dr. George C.Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology and toxicology at Texas A&M.

The cancer, called neuroblastoma, can spread almost anywhere in the body and is usually fatal in children — the prime targets — if not diagnosed and treated before an infant is a year old, he explained.

Department officials said a minimum of 30 cadets will be selected after thorough investigations and interviews are completed. After completion of 4 1/2 months of intensive training, the graduates may be assigned to duty anywhere in the state.

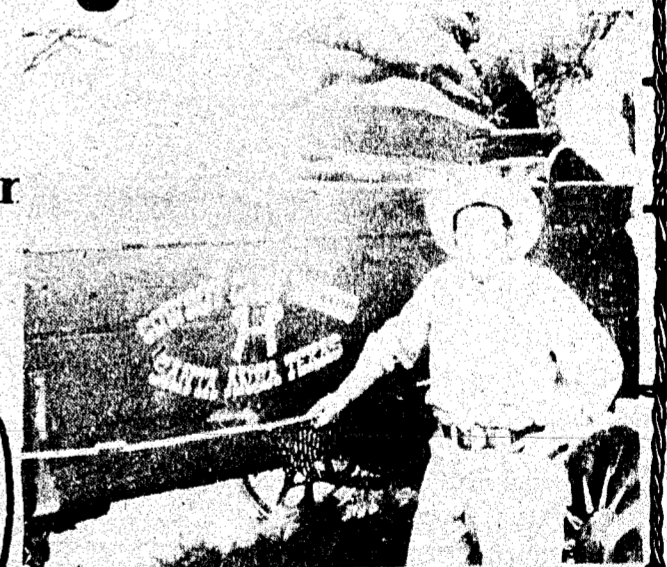

This year a dedication of the reunion to the memory of the late J.L.P. Baker is planned on Sunday morning. He will be remembered as an educator, special class instructor for metal and wood working, terracing, etc. He was instrumental in the consolidation of the three small schools, Buffalo, Cross Tank and Winn Ranch, into the one large

Buffalo School. A few years later three more small schools were brought into the district, Bee Branch, Longview and Liberty-Sand Creek.

The first school built in the "Buffalo Flats" (named in 1861 by Malcom Hunter) was on land now owned by the Byler Ranch about one mile east of the later location of the school. It was also nick-named "Poverty Flat", with two humorous versions of how it received that name.

All that remains of the old Buffalo School is rubble left when the buildings were sold and torn down in 1957, the windmill and rock fence enclosing the old school ground.

Assistance For Elderly Family Home Cooling

Low income families containing members age 65 or older may receive needed assistance in July help in cooling their homes. Under the cooling phase of the federally-funded Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR) proposes to make a one-time-only payment to qualifying Supplemental Security Income, food stamps, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children households.

The program established by Congress in 1980 provided assistance this past winter to approximately 475,000 needy families by distributing 25 million dollars in benefits. Because of the harsh effect of Texas summer heat on elderly persons, participation will be limited to low income households containing elderly persons.

Under TDHR's plan, those households with elderly persons not receiving an automatic payment, may apply between August 3 and August 31, 1981.

A household's resources cannot exceed \$1800 for one person or \$3000 for more than one person. The value of a home, cars, personal, and household belongings will not be considered as resources. All household income must be verified and gross monthly income cannot exceed the following limits: 1 person - \$296; 2 persons - \$446; 3 - \$613; 4 - \$756; 5 - \$893; 6 - \$1044.

Collins Bill Ends Payments To Prisoners

Last year, an estimated 30,000 prisoners received \$60 million in Social Security disability benefits. Calling this a "ridiculous policy," Congressman Jim Collins of Texas has introduced legislation that would end these payments to prisoners.

Collins' bill--H.R. 3274--closes the loophole in the present law that allows inmates to receive disability checks if they can claim they are in a "rehabilitation" program. Collins' bill would stop all Social Security disability payments to prisoners.

"These are tax-free payments to convicted mass murderers, child molesters and other hardened criminals, whose daily needs are already being maintained at the public expense," Collins said in a speech to his colleagues.

"How can we justify to the American people, especially the elderly citizens who are honest and deserving of their Social Security benefits, that we continue to condone criminal acts by paying these Social Security disability payments. Currently, prisoners collecting these checks average \$300 a month. Yet, we are telling the elderly about the financial instability of their Social Security system," he said.

In his speech, Collins cited examples of prisoners who received disability benefits. He

noted a convicted sex offender, whose victim was a six-year-old girl, received \$3,624 in back disability payments because he claimed he had "dizzy spells" from a police beating. Yet, he was apprehended apparently without injury.

Another inmate who was convicted of stabbing a friend 66 times with a hunting knife while under the influence of LSD, received \$214 a month in Social Security disability checks because a psychiatric report found him "unemployable in American society."
