Gardens and orchards are producing well this year with all the good moisture. Among the good gardeners is Weldon Priest, who came by the office Monday with a fig the size of a small orange! The fruit is from a young fig bush that has few figs, but of exceptionally large size. A few that size will go a long way, too.

Not all of us are having such good luck, however. Grasshoppers are still thick in many parts of the rural area, eating their way through gardens and yards.

Among interesting facts about grasshoppers, they consume green forage roughly eight times as fast in proportion to their weight as beef animals, eating their own weight in green food in about 16 hours.

The Extension Service has estimated that seven grasshoppers per square yard over ten acres of rangeland can eat the equivalent amount of one cow.

McCrary Station Sold Recently

A Santa Anna business has changed ownership recently. McCrary Fina Station, owned and operated by Luther McCrary the past 25 years, has been sold to Alton (Buddy) Benge and Timmy Benge. The change in operation was effective Wednesday, June 17.

Timmy Benge, an employee at the station for several years, will be managing the business. His father will be associated with the station operation in addition to be employed with 3-M Corporation in Brownwood.

McCrary, who has farming and livestock interests north of Santa Anna, will continue working at the station on a part time basis for awhile. The station is located in the east part of town, adjacent to the McCrary home at the corner of Wallis and North Houston Street.

Rural Accident

Mail service on Santa Anna's Route One was delayed Monday when carrier Leland Thompson was in a collision.

Thompson, driving a 1977 Dodge pickup, was in the collision with a foreign-made pickup truck driven by Malcom Laing of Fort Worth, an employee of an oil company. The mishap occurred on a county road at a "blind curve."

According to Butch Wampler of the Department of Public Safety, both vehicles were severely damaged and had to be towed from the scene. No one was injured in the accident.

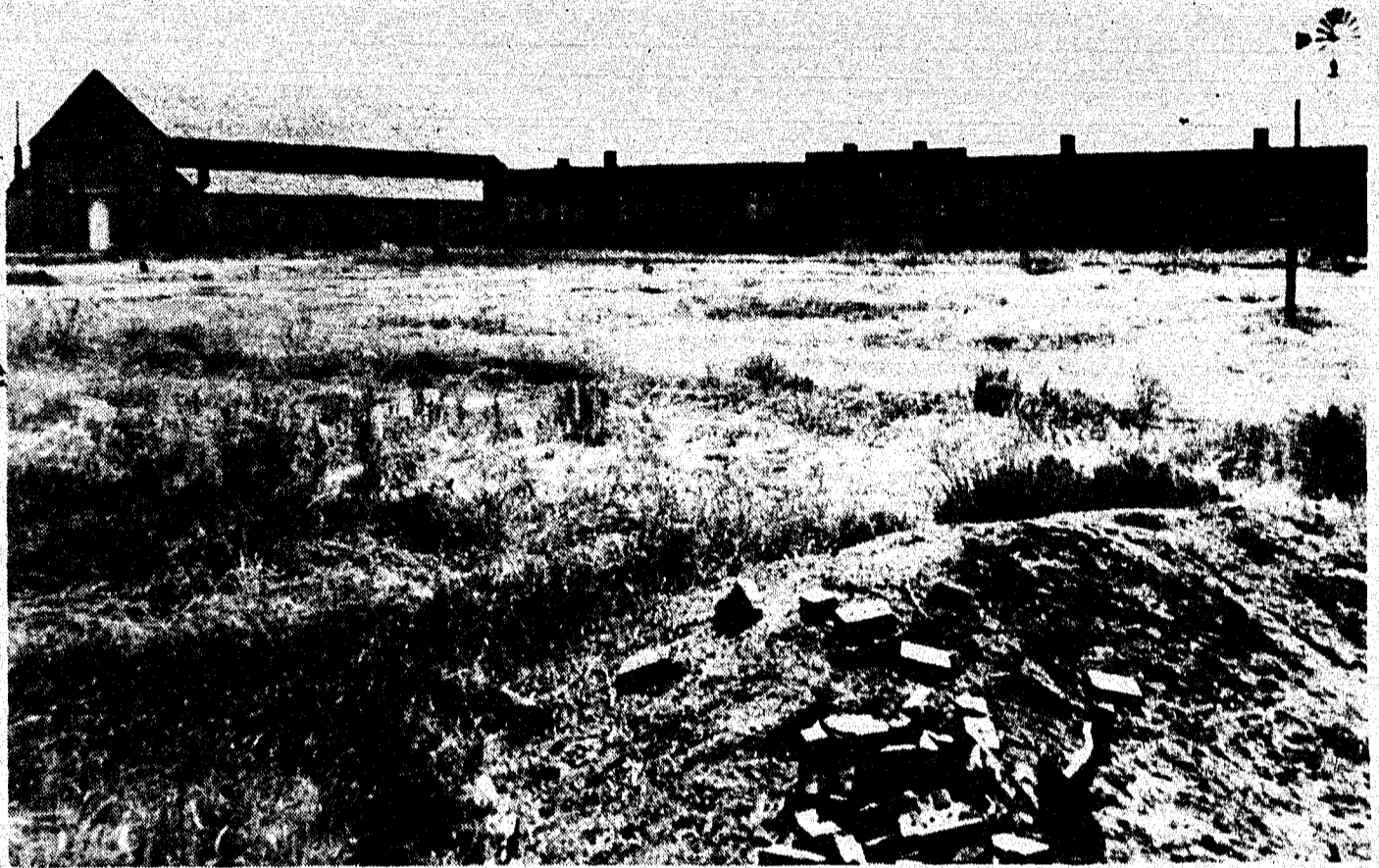
Thompson was taken to Santa Anna following the mishap and got his auto to continue the mail route.

Campfire Girls To Assist With Buffalo Reunion

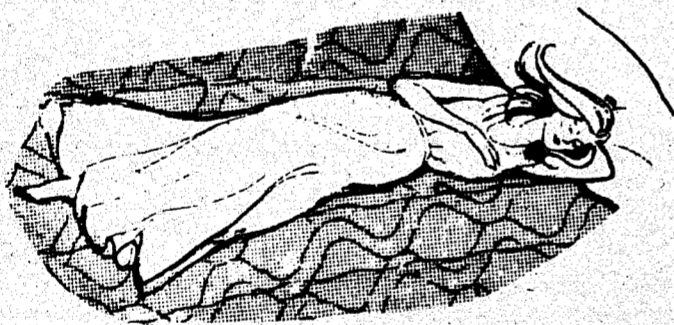
The Adventure Group of Campfire Girls will be helping with the Buffalo Homecoming and Reunion this weekend. Their project will also help raise funds for the group.

At noon Saturday the girls will serve sandwiches, chips, cupcakes, cold drinks and coffee, and that evening will be serving cold drinks to visitors attending.

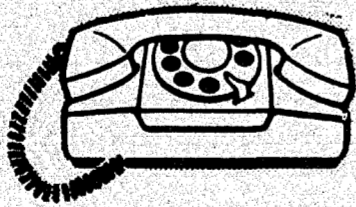
A decorated cake, made and donated by Billie Perry, will be given away during the weekend by the girls group.

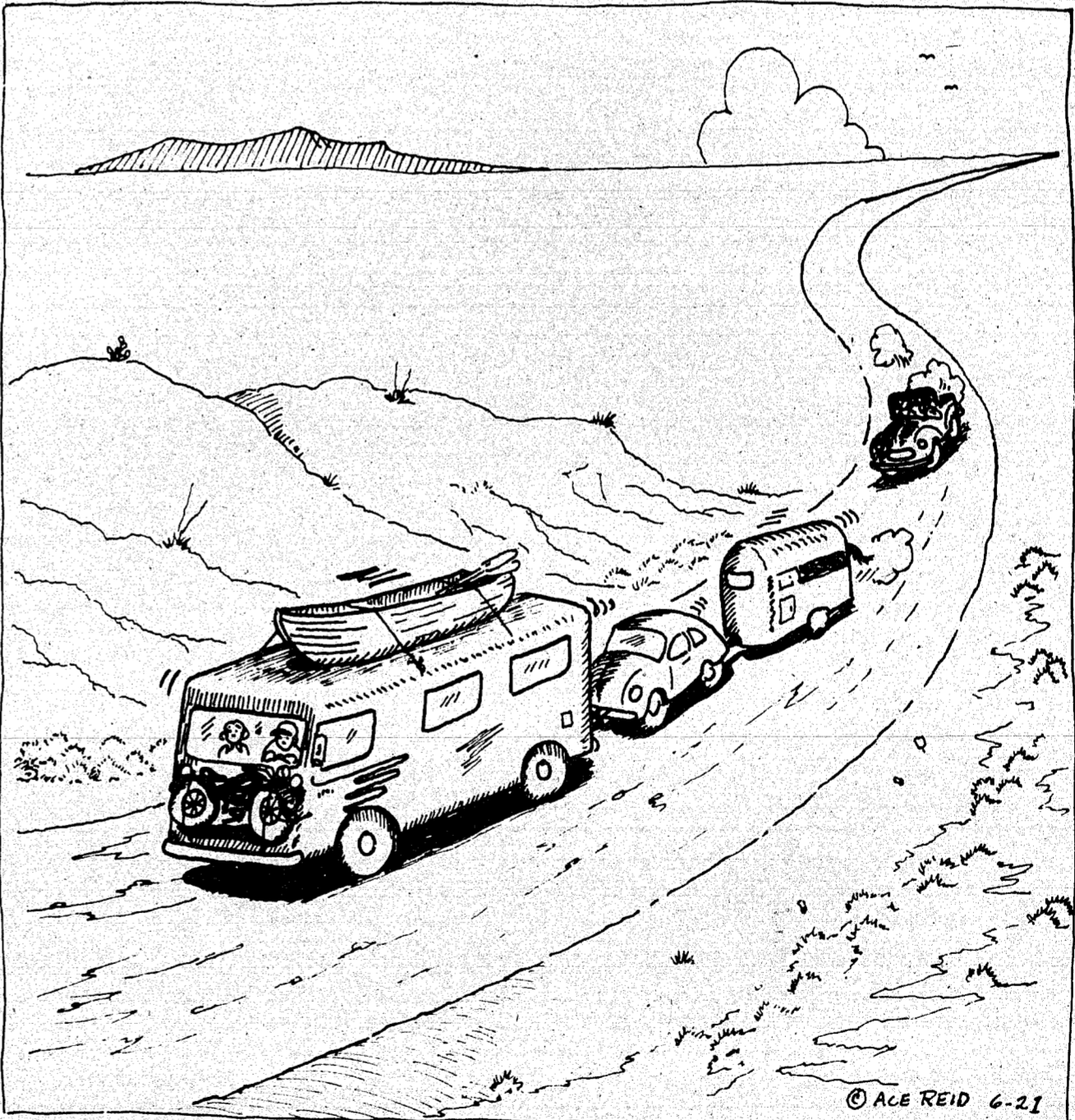
