Gets Underway

Next Wednesday

The 44th Annual Coleman Rodeo will begin next Wednesday, July 8, for a four-night session at the Coleman Rodeo Arena. Performances will be at 8:30 each evening through Saturday, July 11.

Mesquite Championship Rodeo Co. of Mesquite will produce the show this year.

Tom Hadley of Mason will be announcer. The rodeo events will include saddle and bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding, girls barrel race and kids goat scramble.

Quail Dobbs and Rick Chatman will be clowns and bullfighters. Dobbs will also have the specialty act during the show.

Thursday night will be Family Night, with general admission at half price.

A parade will be held Wednesday and Saturday afternoons at 5:30 p.m., and the rodeo dance will be at the open-air pavillion on the rodeo grounds from 9 - 1 each evening. Music will be by the "Heart of Texas Road Gang."

Russian Native, Author, To Speak Here July 10

possible. A Moscow jail, a firing squad, and enemies on every side still proved unable to halt young Jesske on his flight to freedom. His incredible deliverance time and again stuns the imagination, inspires our faith, and reminds us of the great price and value of our blessings in America."

Former Santa Anna Man Given Banking Award

A journey back through 50 years of banking took Roy Richardson from Artesia to Albuquerque, New Mexico recently.

The New Mexico Bankers Association honored Richardson for 50 years of service to banking.

Richardson was the only banker in the state of New Mexico eligible to receive the 50-year award for 1981.

He started his banking career at the First National Bank in

Santa Anna, later named Santa Anna National Bank, as an assistant cashier. He held that position until he joined the Air Force in World War II, when he served in the 9th Air Force Department in England, France, Luxemburg and Germany.

After the war he returned to Santa Anna National Bank as vice president, holding that position until he joined the Western Bank in Artesia, New Mexico in 1950.

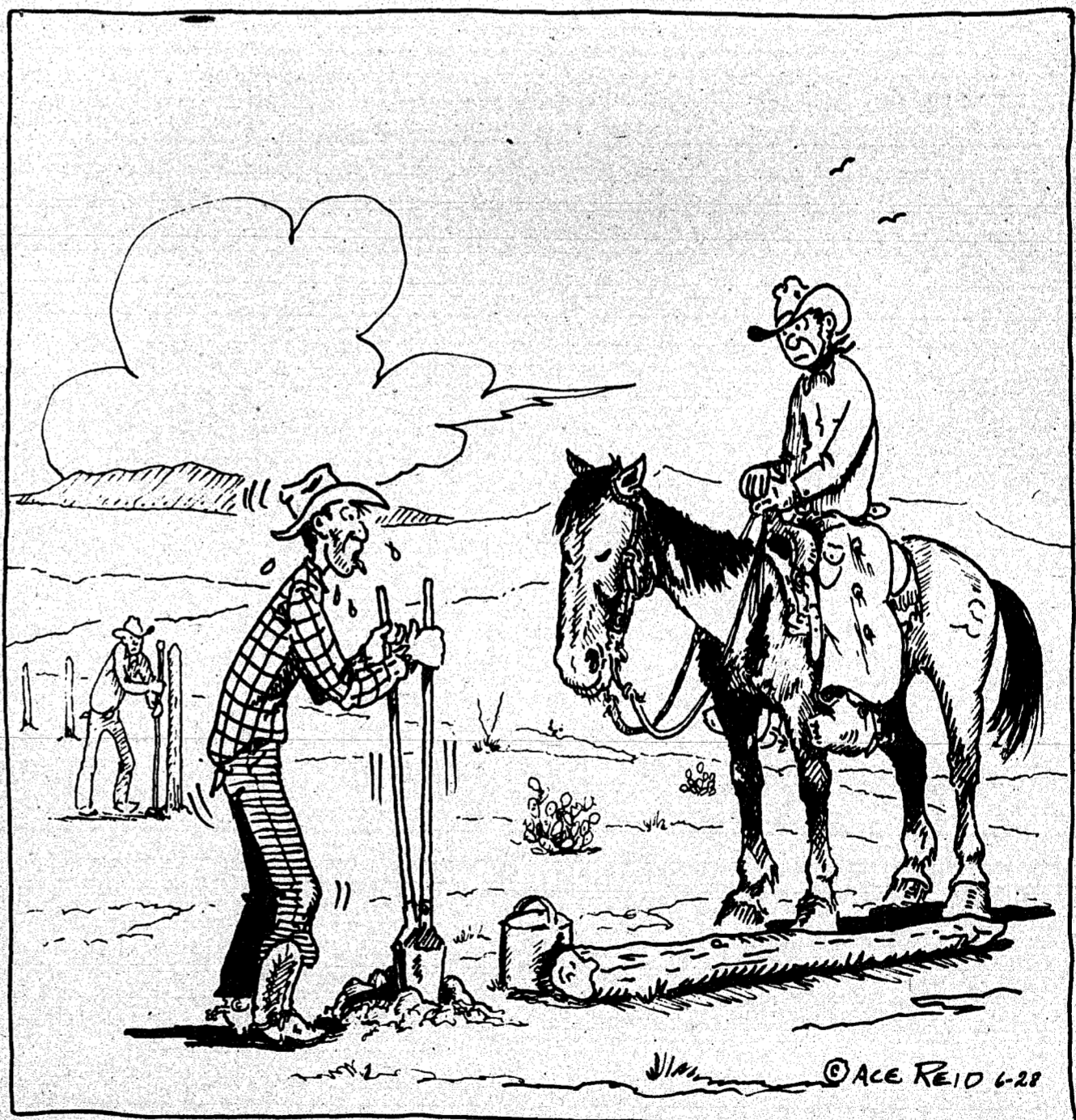

Bangs Woman Killed In Mishap Near S-Anna

Mrs. Claud Lee (Oleta) Frost, 55, of Bangs was killed in an automobile accident Tuesday afternoon at 7 p.m. The late model Buick driven by Mrs. Frost went out of control on Highway 283 six miles south of Santa Anna, veering across the highway and into a field, overturning and coming to rest on its wheels. Mrs. Frost was thrown from the vehicle that was traveling north at the time of the accident.

A passing motorist witnessed the mishap and called an ambulance and DPS troopers. Mrs. Frost was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Gale Brock.

Assisting with the investigation were Sheriff's deputies Mike Powers of Santa Anna and Eddie Odum of Coleman.

Funeral arrangements were pending at Colonial Funeral Home in Brady at press time Wednesday morning.

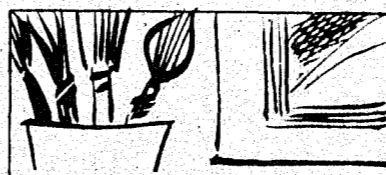

Farm Bureau Endorses Air Act

Farm Bureau is supporting an amendment to the Clean Water Act that would restrict government authority over land use, according to Victor Cardinas, Coleman County Farm Bureau president.

"We are asking Congressman Stenholm to co-sponsor or strongly support legislation to amend Section 404 of the 1972 Federal Water Pollution Control Act," Cardinas said. The change would restrict Corps of Engineer Authority to waters which are navigable for interstate and foreign commerce or which can be made navigable for these purposes with reasonable effort.

Cardinas said that prior to 1972, the Corps' authority was

limited to protection and maintenance of navigable waters. However, Section 404 amendments that year changed the Corps with regulating the discharge of dredged or fill material in U. S. Waters.

"Farmers have found to their sorrow that the Corps now has authority over stock ponds, playa lakes, creek and river bottoms, and even the ditches which have water in them only when it rains," Cardinas said.
