

Council Changes Water Deposit, Garbage Rules

In a called session of Santa Anna City Council Tuesday night, the group voted to increase water deposits from \$25 to \$50. The increase for the new connections is effective immediately.

In other action, Council members voted to require trash and garbage on the city routes to be placed in plastic trash bags. This measure was approved in order to help with the garbage collection that is now being done with a pickup truck that has no automatic unloading system.

The old garbage truck "died", according to City Secretary Pat Rutherford, and cannot be repaired. A new truck cannot be purchased until finances are available, so the new regulation will be necessary for the present time. Many towns have long required trash to be placed in bags, and many local people already do so.

City officials will appreciate the cooperation of all residents during this time of emergency.

Barn Burns, Other Damage During July 4 Rainstorm

Lightning that accompanied a heavy rainstorm caused damage in our community late Saturday afternoon. A barn at the Carl Benton place south of Santa Anna
