Coleman County is expected to remain in the district of which Lynn Nabers of Brownwood is representative, with the addition of two adjoining counties.

Some people in our county are in several different voting districts, with the U. S. Congressional District line dividing Coleman County, and County Precinct lines crossing school district boundaries in many cases.

Bettie June Duus has been named Postmaster at Rockwood effective Sunday, May 30. The appointment was announced by D. E. Holster of Midland, Sectional Center Manager/Postmaster.

Mrs. Duus, 44, was born at Coleman and is married to Roland Duus. She has served as acting postmaster at Rockwood since the retirement of Vivian Steward in December 1980. Prior to that she served as substitute rural

carrier in the Santa Anna Post Office for two and one-half years.

She is active in community projects. She and her husband are parents of three children, Tracy Maedgen and Rodney Duus, both Santa Anna High School graduates, and Robert, a student in the Santa Anna elementary school.

Postmaster selections for offices of this size are made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Sectional Center Manager at Midland. He selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to each vacancy.

Will Enforce

Traffic Laws Here

Santa Anna's new deputy sheriff, Mike Bowers, will be enforcing traffic laws in Santa Anna, as recommended by the City Council.

According to City officials, local motorists have become lax in obeying traffic laws here, and the enforcement is to help our town become a safer place.

New traffic signs have recently been installed in the community, and local motorists are urged to obey them to avoid being issued a ticket. Also to be cited will be unlicensed motorcycles and other violations.

Aging Program

Offers Screening For Disease 'Risk'

The Aging Services of our community provides a twice-monthly blood pressure clinic, held at the Chamber of Commerce office each first and third Thursday from 9 to 11 a.m. A nurse conducts the screening free of charge.

As a further aid to the health of local and area residents, Ranger Park Hospital and the Aging Services are jointly conducting a Blood Pressure and Heart Attack Risk Screening Program and a Cancer Risk Profile.

According to information compiled by David Moxley of Ranger Park Hospital, about one and one-half million persons will suffer heart attacks this year in the United States, with nearly half of these dying. The second most common cause of heart attacks is high blood pressure, with only 25 percent of persons with high blood pressure under adequate care.

As a service of the two agencies, forms listing symptoms or possible risk factors for heart attacks and cancer are available at the Chamber of Commerce office. Persons finding themselves among the high risk group may wish to seek medical attention or have regular check-ups with their family doctor.

The blood pressure clinic will be held Thursday (today), with the forms available upon request.

Summer Swimming Classes Underway for Local Kids

About 40 Santa Anna children are taking part in the summer swimming program at the Coleman City Pool. The lessons are for children who have completed the first grade in school or older, beginners and advanced beginners. The series of lessons will continue through June 12. Cost is 70 cents per day that covers transportation and instruction.

The bus leaves Santa Anna school at 10:30 each morning,

remaining for two class sessions, beginners from 11 - 12 noon, and advanced beginners from 12 until 1 p.m.

Classes will be held June 15 - 26 for kindergarten children and toddlers (accompanied by an adult), but no transportation will be provided locally.

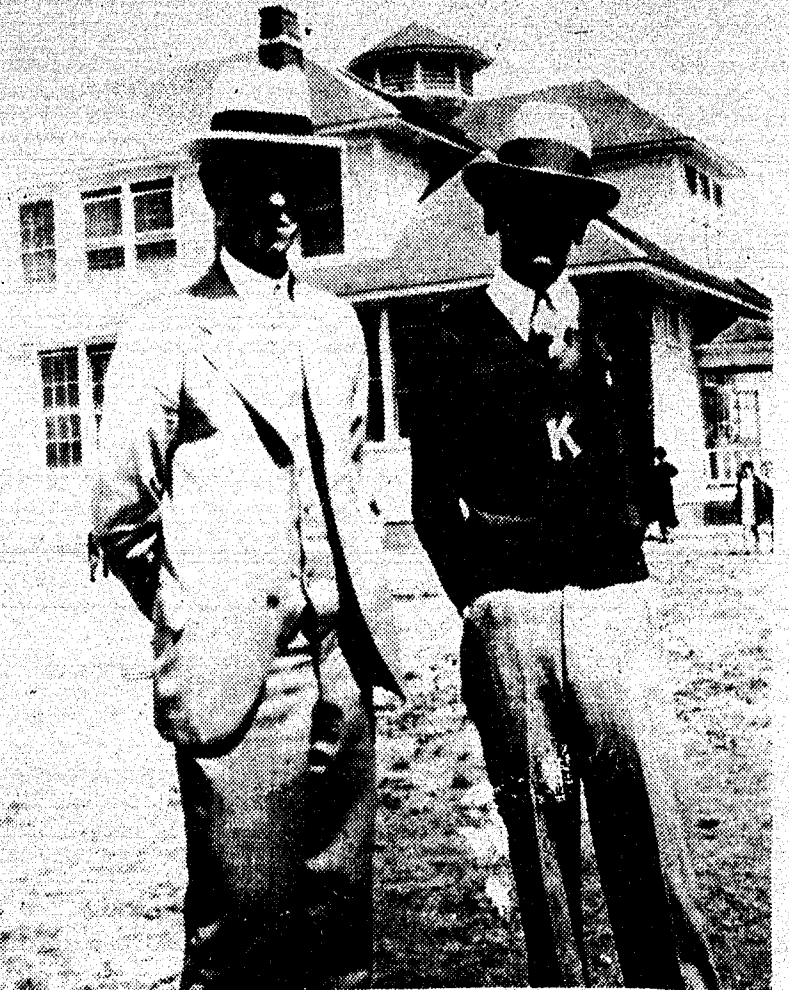

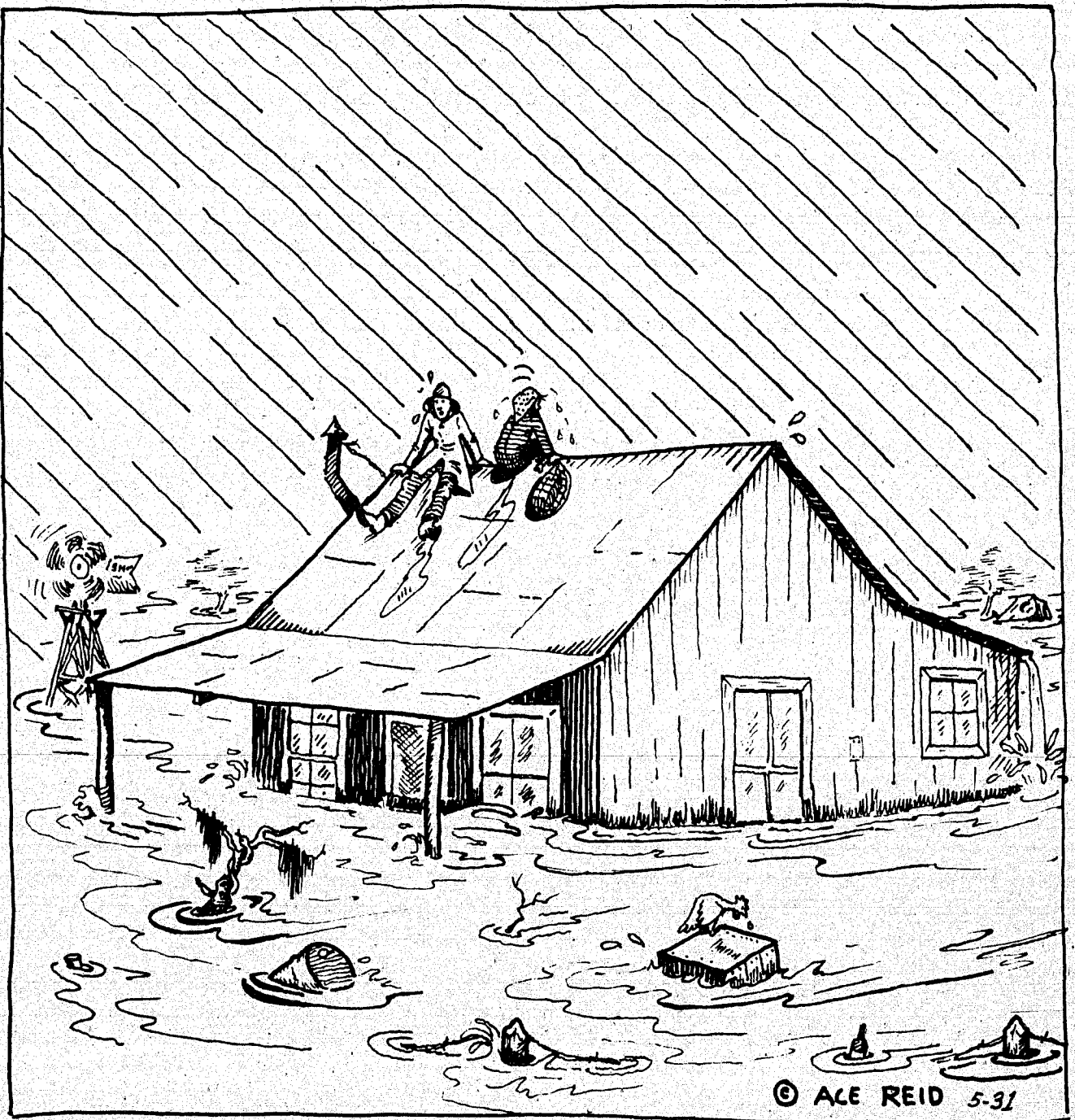

Beef Promotion System To Begin on July 1

On July 1, 1981, the Texas cattle industry will implement a voluntary 25-cent-per-head beef promotion investment program.

Under the new system, 25 cents will be collected on cattle and calves sold through participating markets, packers, dealers and order buyers. The funds will be remitted entirely to the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board for use in national programs of research, education and promotion.

Endorsed recently by five

Texas organizations, the investment plan is designed to generate additional funding needed for aggressive beef market development.

The organizations initiating the 25-cent investment are the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., Texas Cattle Feeders Assn., Texas Farm Bureau, the Independent Cattlemen's Assn. and the Livestock Marketing Assn. of Texas.

At a meeting May 6 in Irving, Tex., these groups agreed to put the investment program in motion and also to form a beef promotion coordinating committee which will oversee the implementation of the entire effort.

South African Visitor Enjoying Texas

Very few world travelers find their way to our community -- or stay for long periods. However one young woman is spending several weeks here, coming from South Africa.

Kaye Leisegang of Park Rynie, Natal, South Africa, arrived here May 15, a guest in the homes of Felton and Bill Martin and their families at Trickham. She is a cousin of friends with whom the Felton Martins visited recently in South Africa.

Kaye took a leave of absence from her teaching position in Durban, South Africa at the end of the winter term and left on her trip February 5, touring South America, Argentina, Brazil and Peru. She will be joined here June 9 by a friend, Nola Brokensha, and the two young women will continue their American tour until December.

Kaye bought a station wagon last week so they may travel where they choose on their route to Colorado, California, Oregon, Washington and Canada. They plan to also tour the east coast and New England states, Nova Scotia, Quebec, and Washington, D. C. They will fly from New York as they return home.

Kaye, the daughter of a sugar plantation owner, now deceased, was reared in the "midlands," 25 miles inland from the sub-tropical coastal area where her mother now resides. She attended school at Ixopo (a Zulu tribal word), graduating with a class of 26. She attended college near Durban to receive her teaching certification, then has taken other work at UNISA, the international university. She has taught seven years in primary school, the last five

years near Durban, a popular tourist area.

Also in her family are three brothers and one sister. Her cousin, with whom the Martins visited, lives at Selbourne Park where he operates a Jersey dairy farm.

Kaye arrived in the United States April 15, touring Florida and visiting in the home of a retired couple in Lake Worth, and at Largo with relatives. She met a French girl in New Orleans, and they spent several days in that area sightseeing.

A seasoned traveler, Miss Leisegang spent six months backpacking in Europe in 1977 and has made two ski trips to Austria. She enjoys meeting people and makes friends where ever she goes, making the trips interesting and educational.

South Africa is nearly 438,000 square miles in size, nearly twice the size of Texas. It leads the world in production of diamonds, gold, platinum, chrome and uranium. Most of the area is in

agricultural use, with the country being second only to Australia in the production of wool. The climate is warm the year around, giving a long growing season. Their seasons are opposite those here, with the hottest months being in January and February. Their climate is much like Texas except more humid.

Afrikaans is the language spoken by 60 percent of the population. She speaks English -- as 40 percent of South Africans do -- with a British accent, indicating the influence on the country under British rule until gaining independence in 1961. She also speaks Afrikaans and Zulu, one of the most prevalent of the tribal languages in Natal Province

Most Inquiries At TP&W Office Are About Snakes

Snakes are animals people apparently love to hate.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said the recent announcement of a free non-illustrated leaflet on poisonous snakes brought more than 7,000 requests in one month period.

Many of the requests came from people who recently moved to Texas and who were unfamiliar with the state's four kinds of dangerous snakes -- the copperhead, rattlesnake, cottonmouth moccasin and coral snake.

Rural rodents could spread plague, worried officials say

COLLEGE STATION — With public health officials already worried over an outbreak of rabies among domestic animals, experts at Texas A&M University are now concerned with the spread of bubonic plague from field rodents to domestic rats in West Texas.

Scientists say a danger to humans exists when plague carriers such as ground squirrels and prairie dogs shift their disease-carrying load of fleas to the massive numbers of rats in urban areas.

To date, there have been no reported cases of disease-infected rats in Texas, but a few cases of plague-infected wild animals have been reported in more desolate parts of West Texas and New Mexico.

Jets Ski Boats Cause Hazards

AUSTIN— Water safety officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department warn that the growing popularity of tiny jet ski boats is creating a new set of hazards on Texas lakes.

The boats, manufactured mainly by motorcycle companies, are little more than motorcycle engines mounted on oversized surfboards.

The craft are highly popular with youngsters who ride them in areas of heavy boat traffic, jumping the wakes of larger vessels.

Game Warden Joe Wallace, who patrols Lake Lyndon B. Johnson in Central Texas, said

there are several reasons why the diminutive boats can be dangerous. "They are low on the water and not easily seen; also the noise of the motor tends to drown out the sound of other boats for the operator," said Wallace.

Another potential danger is built into some of the boats, which keep running after the rider has fallen off. They can run over the downed rider under some circumstances.

Wallace advised jet ski riders to try to avoid these hazards, and to wear a personal flotation device (life preserver) of the type which can turn a person's body face upward in the water if he or she is unconscious.

S-Security Cases Reviewed To Insure Eligibility

Many people receiving social security payments will have their cases re-examined in the near future to make sure they continue to be eligible for benefits, Priscilla Tercero, social security district manager in Brownwood, said recently.

Social security is required to review most disability cases at least once every three years starting in 1982 because of the 1980 disability amendments. The reviews are conducted to determine if a person is still disabled, Tercero said.

As an important first step in making the required reviews, social security is significantly increasing the number of continuing disability investigations it makes. About 350,000 cases will be reviewed during the remainder

of this fiscal year. Next year, over 500,000 cases will be reviewed.

The initial cases to be reviewed will be selected based on studies which show those cases most

likely to result in recovery, Tercero said. These first investigations will provide more data which should indicate other types of cases that should be reviewed soon.

Social security disability benefits can only be made to people who have a severe physical or mental impairment expected to prevent them from working for at least 12 months or more or to result in death.

People found no longer disabled during the case reviews will have the opportunity to appeal the decision, Tercero said.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. For general information or to report a change, call toll free 800-392-1603. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. If you wish to file an application to establish your eligibility you may call collect 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.

Farm Bureau Gives Views On Economic Status

Farm Bureau is supporting bi-partisan efforts to bring about economic recovery and reduce over-regulation by government, according to Victor Cardinas of Coleman, president of the Coleman County Farm Bureau.

Cardinas said Texas Farm

Bureau leaders have personally contacted members of the Texas delegation in Congress to inform them of Farm Bureau's policies on economic recovery and regulatory reform.

He said Farm Bureau's policies call for (1) budget reductions leading to a balanced budget, (2)

tax reform, (3) regulatory reform, and (4) monetary restraint.

At meetings a year ago to discuss the farm income crisis, most Farm Bureau participants thought agriculture could not long survive unless inflation was stopped, regulations reduced, income taxes lowered, and government interference in markets stopped, such as the grain embargo. Farm Bureau leaders feel these reforms would be beneficial to the entire nation.

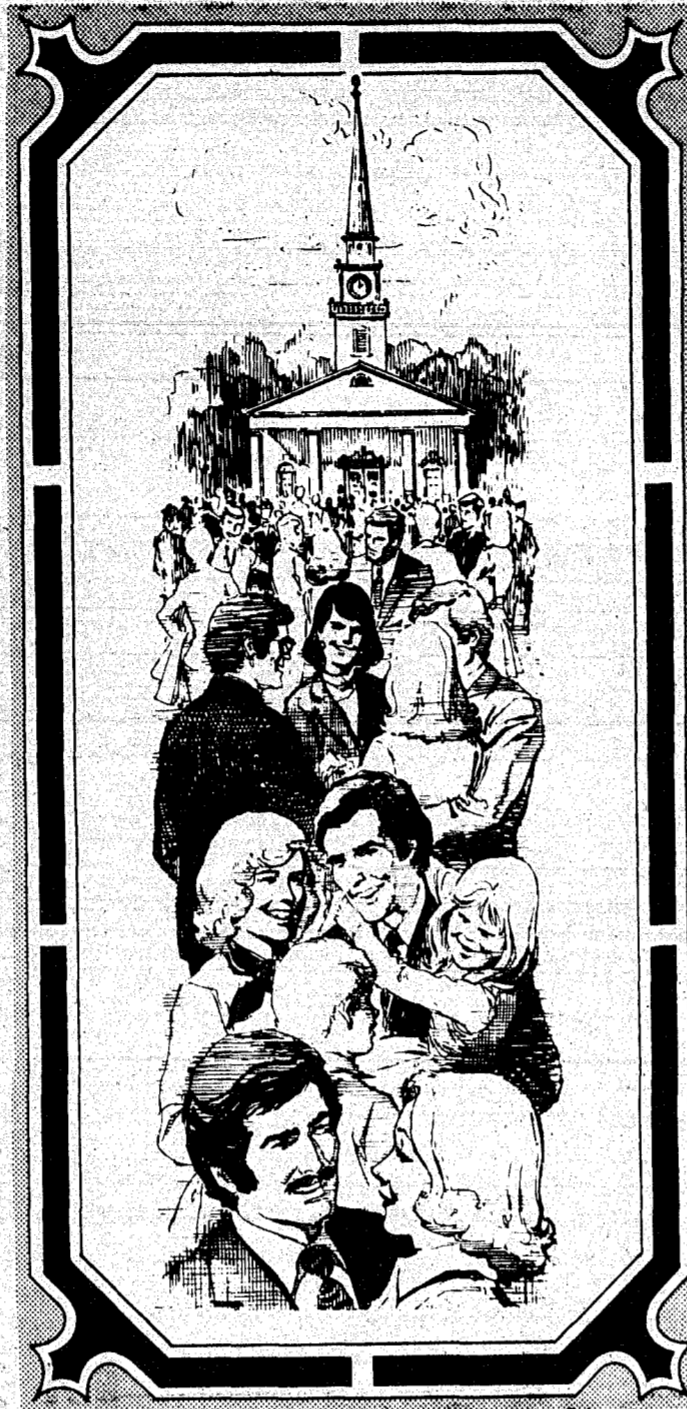
