The tax rate for the school district is unchanged this year, but income is expected to be higher due to additional mineral valuations. A change in the rate is expected next year when the new property valuations go into effect.

The Budget Hearing will be held in conjunction with the monthly meeting of the School Board. The regular session was postponed from the usual second Tuesday date.

Another Newspaper Added To Woodson Corporation

The sale of the Marlin Democrat to Woodson Newspapers, Inc. was announced this week by J. C. Chatmas, Jr., publisher of the newspaper, and Craig Woodson, president of the Brownwood-based corporation.

The acquisition of the Marlin facilities increases the Woodson Newspaper group holdings to six dailies and six weeklies, according to Woodson.

"Even though Chatmas has asked that a new publisher-manager be appointed to succeed him at which time he will become publisher emeritus," Woodson said, "Chatmas has agreed to manage the paper for us until a replacement can be named."

Although under new ownership, the operation of the business should remain the same, with Chatmas to be retained as consultant with the Woodson group.

"Several groups and individuals considered purchasing the Marlin Democrat since last fall when the decision was made to sell," Chatmas said. "We are pleased the Marlin paper will be a part of the Woodson Group. Their policies and methods of operation are practically the same as ours."

"Each Woodson publisher establishes his own newspaper's policies -- operational and polit-

ical-- and the corporate officers insist that each of the newspapers are community oriented and progressive types of enterprises, Chatmas explained.

The daily newspapers in the Woodson group are Brownwood Bulletin, Waxahachie Daily Light, Stephenville Empire-Tribune, Alice Echo-News, Miami (Oklahoma) Record and Marlin's Daily Democrat.

The Citizen, a semi-weekly published in Baxter Springs, Kan., Brown County Gazette, Santa Anna News, Early American, Red Oak Leaf and the Marlin Weekly Democrat are the non-dailies in the group.

Woodson, current president of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association, grew up in the newspaper business, working in every department of the family-owned business.

Dick Dwelle of Athens and Hy Fortenberry purchased the Marlin Democrat in 1960 from George Buchanan. Chatmas purchased ownership in the newspaper during March 1965 following the death of Fortenberry.

The Marlin Weekly Democrat was first published in 1890 by J. M. Kennedy while the Marlin Daily Democrat was founded in 1901.

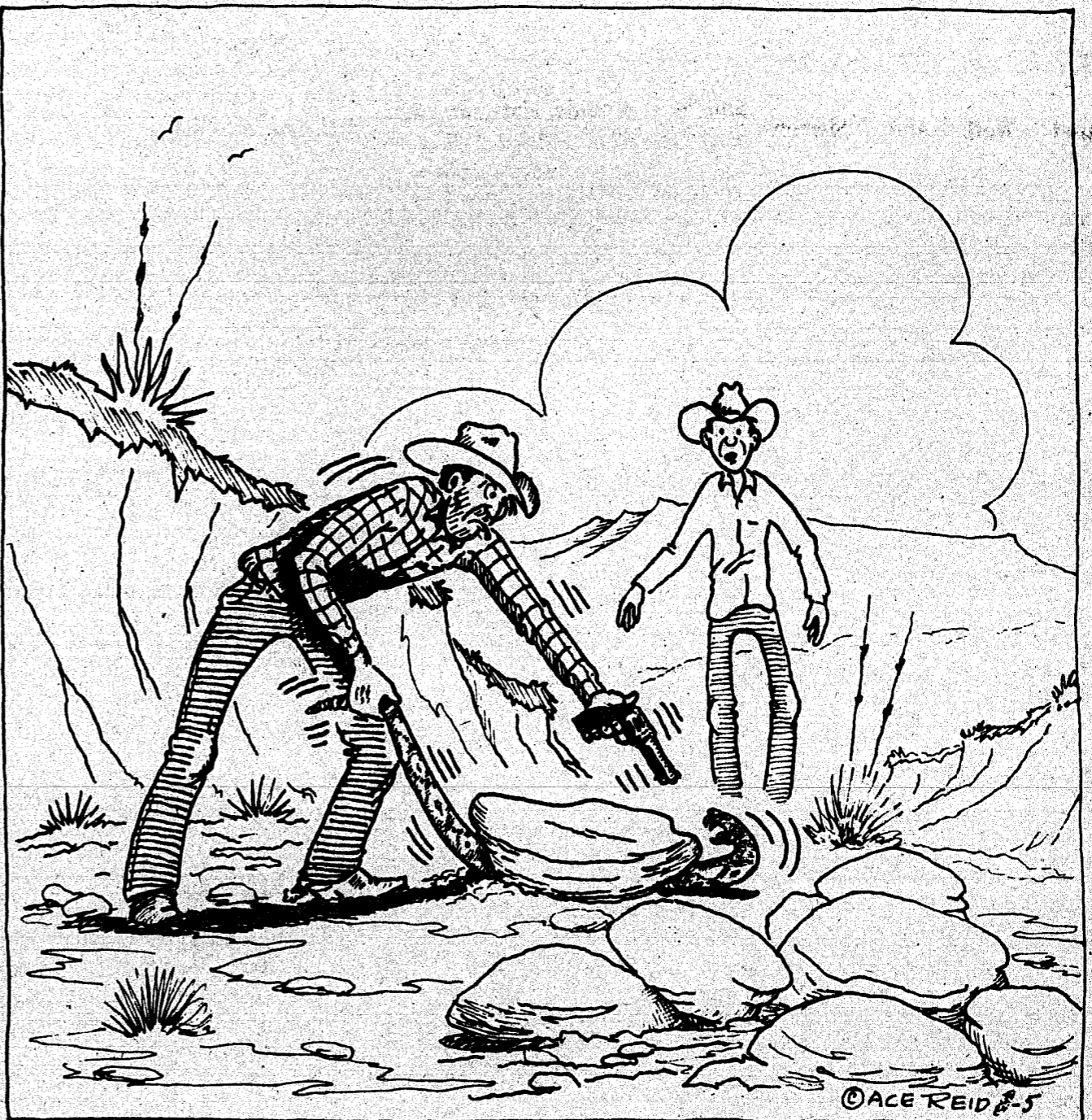

Six Health Steps To Staying Young

Wish you could "stay young" in "health?"

Practice six health steps, and you'll go a long way toward that goal, says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist.

Six habits or practices can significantly influence your health and life expectancy--to the extent that a person who practices all six has the health of a person 30 years younger who ignores all of them, she says.

Here are the six steps she recommends:

- 1) three regular meals a day with few snacks--make sure breakfast is one of the meals
- 2) moderate exercise two or three times a week
- 3) not more than seven or eight hours of sleep every night
- 4) no smoking
- 5) maintaining moderate weight
- 6) little or no alcohol consumption

These are the findings of a study conducted by the California State Department of Health.

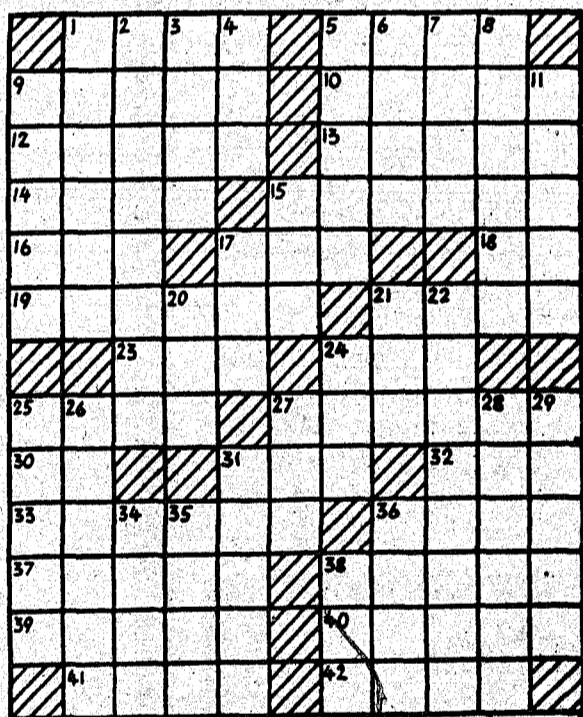
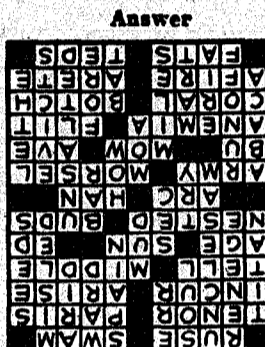

Cool It: Hot Weather Living

The dog days of summer are with us again. As the temperature outside rises, so does our need to keep cool. There are some positive steps you can take to make the heat at least somewhat bearable, says the Texas Medical Association.

Summer heat should not be taken lightly—except when it comes to clothing. Wear light-colored clothes that reflect the light away from the body. Loose-fitting clothes allow air to circulate, deeping your skin cooler. Also, try to choose fabrics that "breathe," such as natural cotton.

Stay out of hte direct sun as much as possible, especially during the middle of the day when the sun's rays are hottest. Do your heavy work, including gardening, either early in the day or in the evening when it's cooler. Strenuous sports also should be

reserved for the cooler times of the day. Cooking, which heats up the house, should be done at these times too.

Cool off whenever you can by taking showers or by going for a dip in the pool

Sweating isn't just normal, it's necessary. Be sure to replace body fluids lost through sweating by drinking lots of liquids. Don't take salt tablets except on advice from your physician.

If you have air-conditioning, keep it set on moderate. Going from the hot outdoors to a freezing home or apartment is hard on the body's own temperature controls. The heat will seem even worse when you go outside again. Gradually increase your heat tolerance by spending more time outdoors

each day, but slow your pace to match the weather. The key to healthy summer activity is moder-

ation. Too much or too sudden activity in the heat can result in heat illness, says TMA.

Heat illness is an extreme rise in body temperature. It is characterized by profuse sweating, fatigue and perhaps muscle cramps. Heat exhaustion includes these symptoms, plus a rapid pulse and nausea. Heat exhaustion can progress rapidly to heat stroke, the main sign being the

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cessation of sweating. All heat illness is potentially dangerous. The ideal treatment for heat illness is prevention. Beat the heat by learning the best ways to live with it.



your home every month, your check or checks are sent directly to your financial organization and you are free to travel or vacation any time of the month, free of worry about your check being stolen.

You save time and transportation costs. You don't have to go any place and stand in long lines to cash or deposit your check.

If you already have a checking or savings account, direct deposit would probably fit right in with the way you now handle money.

If you don't have an account, you might want to consider the benefits of a checking and savings account.

Keeping your money in a checking or savings account is safer than carrying a lot of cash.

A checkbook provides a written record to help you keep track of expenses. Using personal checks to pay a bill is often less expensive than buying money orders and cancelled checks serve as receipts. Also in a savings account arrangement, your money earns interest.

HOW CAN I ARRANGE DIRECT DEPOSIT?

To arrange for direct deposit, all you have to do is take your monthly social security check and/or SSI check to your financial organization for them to complete a direct deposit form. Your financial organization then mails the form to your local social security office for processing. Direct deposit of your checks will start about 30 - 60 days after social security gets the form. Then your days of worrying about your check being stolen from the mailbox will be over.

Almost all social security matters can be handled by phone. For general information or to report a change, call toll free 800-392-1603. Medicare questions or filing of medicare claims can be taken care of by calling toll free 800-442-2620. If you wish to file an application to establish your eligibility you may call collect 915-646-7533 in Brownwood.


