A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of he Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding cause there will be adequate there immediately after Sec. storage space for everything. thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read as fol-

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Arti le III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Ratirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and chall not cv cced at any time five per centum of the compensation paid o each such person by the State and for school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund of the moneys paid

into the fund. All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Fund, as are rec ived by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retire ment fund shall not be elicible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension




