## Guy Allen to Steer Roping Finals

Defending Champion Enters Finals In Second Place

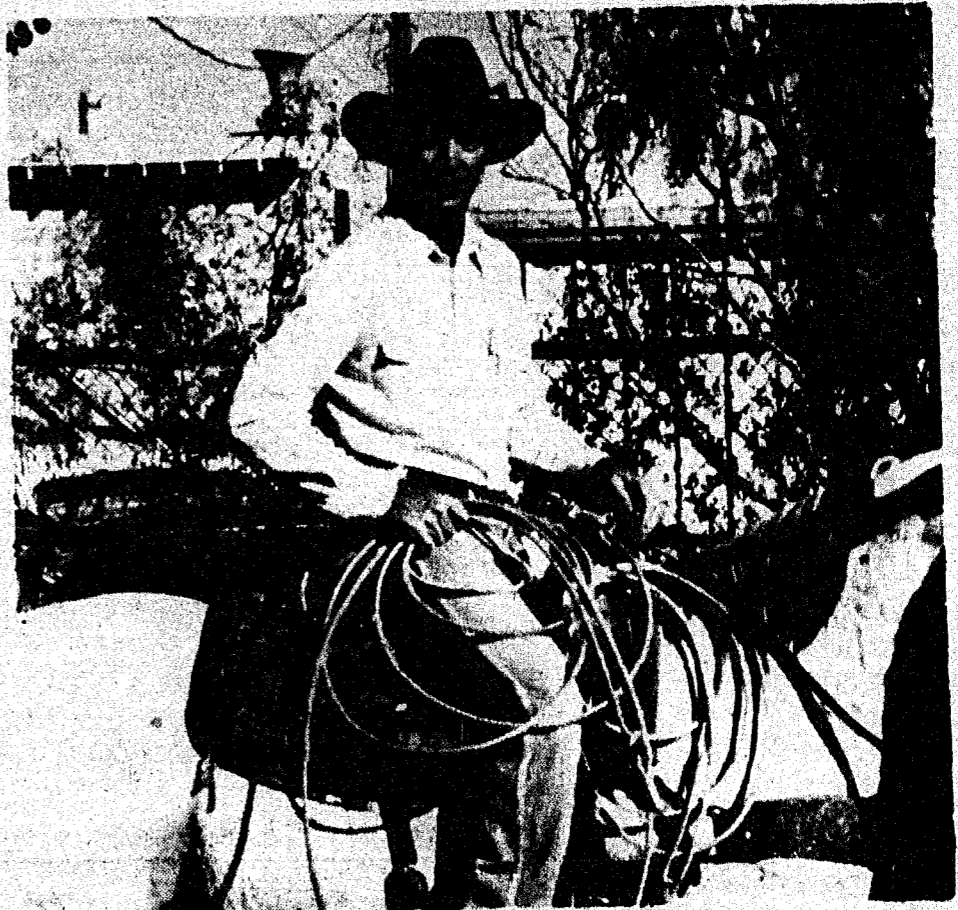
Guy Allen, the 1980 World Champion PRCA Steer Roper, will be in Laramie, Wyoming this weekend for the National Steer Roping Finals and a chance to keep the coveted title.

Allen, son of James and Ann Allen, is entering the contest in second place with a total of \$24,364 in earnings, behind Arnold Felts who has a season tally of \$25,981.

The top 16 steer ropers will be competing for approximately \$10,000 in prize money, with the earnings added to the year's total for the championship rankings.

Gip Allen, Guy's younger brother, just missed qualifying for the Finals, placing 17th as the season ended. He had a total of \$7,532 in winnings this season. James, a top-ranked steer roper for many years, was a few places behind.

Guy closed the gap between he

PRCA Steer Roping Champion Defending Title

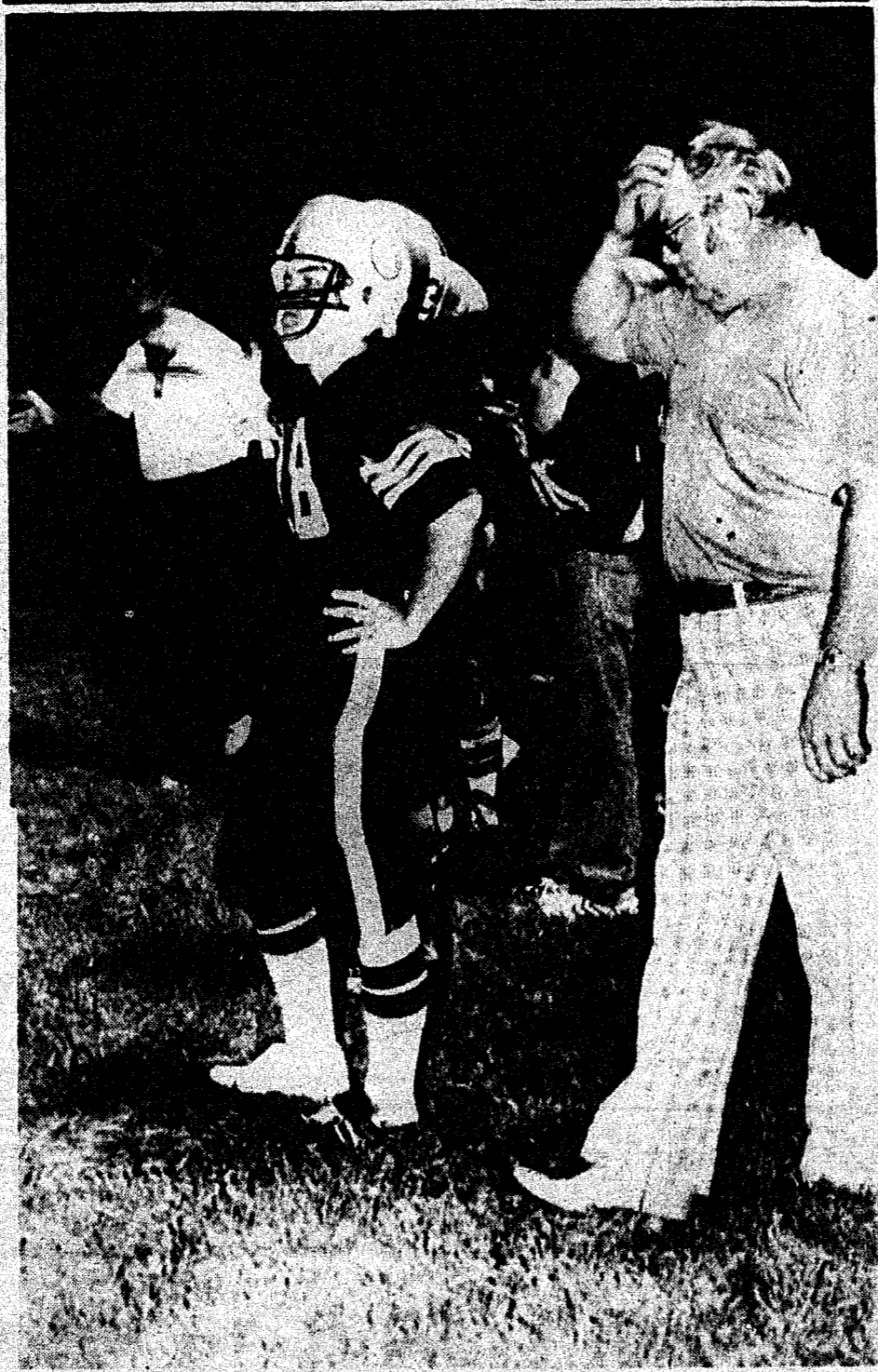
and Felts by winning at Walla Walla, Washington and at McAlister, Oklahoma. He will also enter a roping in Roswell, N. M. enroute to Laramie this week.

Guy is seeking his third championship title, winning the first one in 1977 when only 19 years of age. He has been competing in rodeo events with the Sul Ross State University Rodeo Team the past two years, and will continue on the pro-

fessional rodeo circuit since completing his college eligibility. Gip is returning to Sul Ross this year and will be a member of the Rodeo Team.

James and Ann, Guy and his wife, Crill, and Gip will be in Laramie for the Saturday and Sunday roping.

## Mountaineers Lose 26-12 In Season Opener Friday

The Santa Anna Mountaineers were defeated by the Bangs Dragons Friday night in the season opener at Mountaineer Stadium. The Dragons won by a 26-12 score after coming from a 12-0 deficit in the second quarter.

Santa Anna opened the game by taking the kick-off and marching to the goal line for an early six-point lead. The kick for extra point failed.

Tommy DeLeon scored his second TD of the evening early in the second quarter, and the two-point conversion also failed.

The third major drive late in the second quarter ended when Scotty Walker, a Bangs end, intercepted a Mountaineer pass that took the ball to the 20 yard line. From that point the game belonged to the Dragons, with their first touchdown coming just

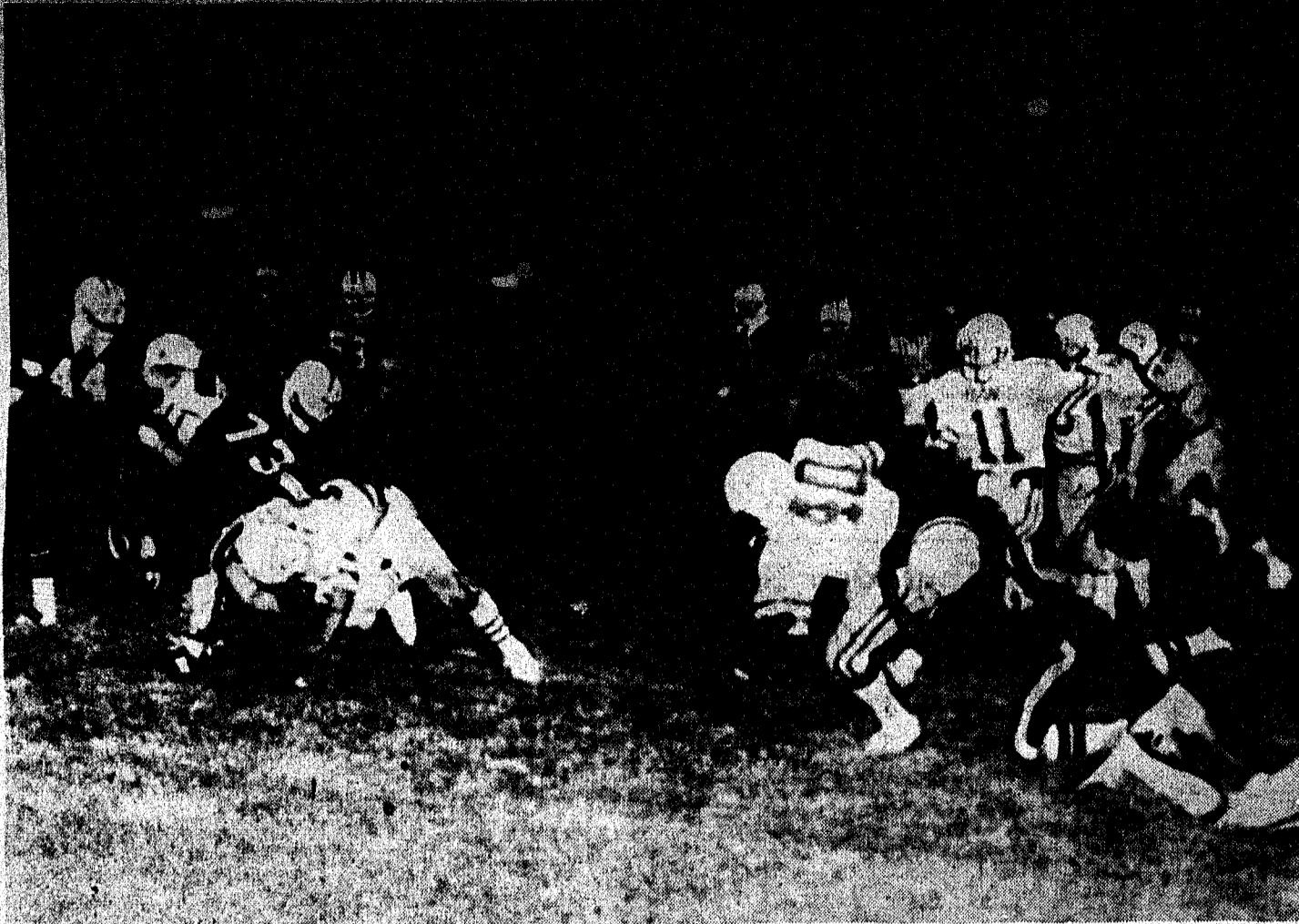
seconds before the halftime whistle.

Bangs scored three more times in the last half with Randy Bernard scoring twice and Aubrey Balfour making the final TD of the game.

Coach Roger Goodwin cited the numerous injuries and the many penalties as a major cause of the defeat. Ernest DeLeon was injured and will be out of action at least two weeks. Albert Collins may be out of action this week also.

The Mountaineers won over the Class AA Dragons by a slim 6-0 score last year, and the Dragons found revenge Friday night. They are under the leadership of a new coach this season.

The Mountaineers will be on the road this week, traveling to Evant for an 8:00 p.m. game.

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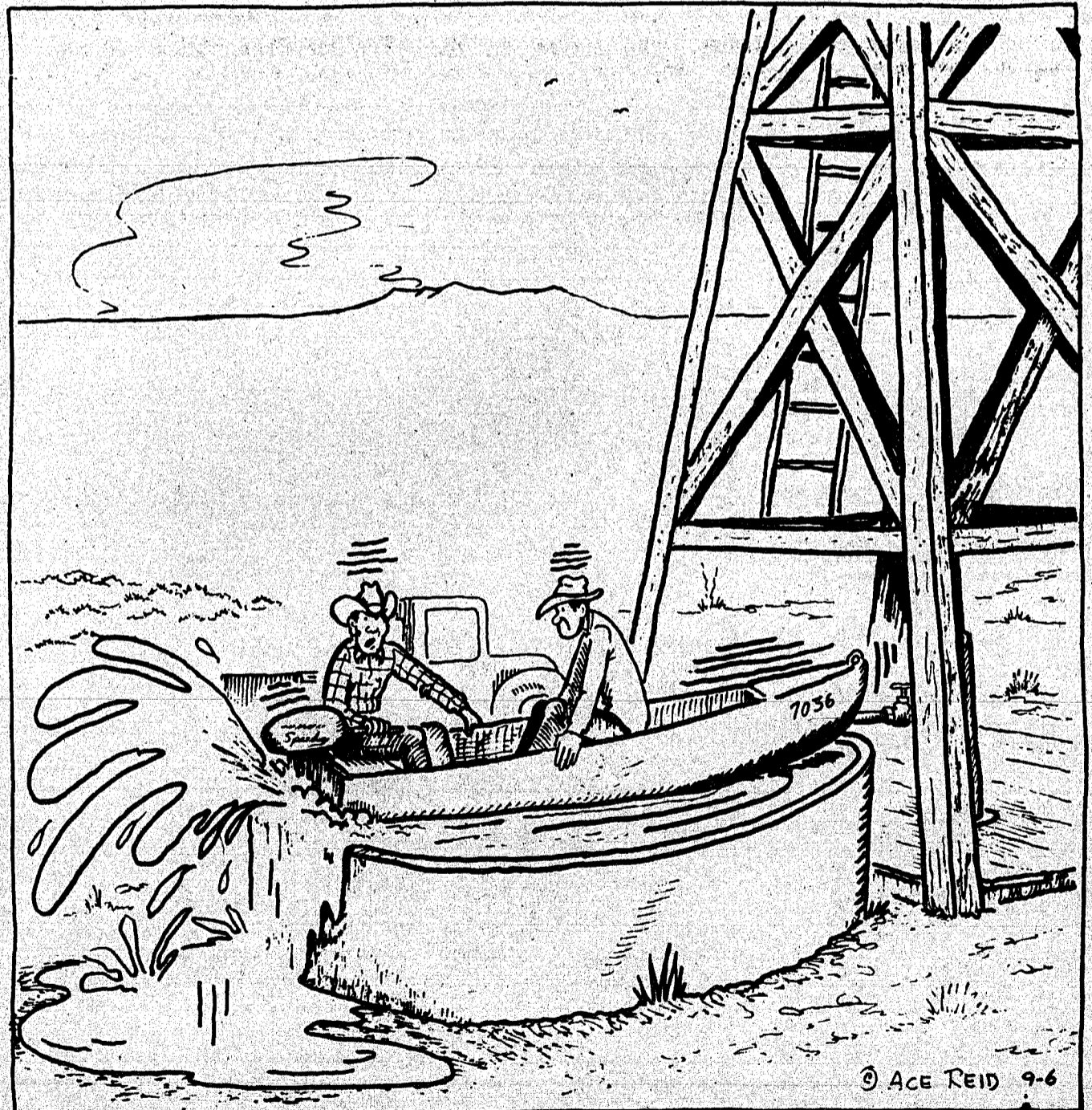

## James Allen and Sons A Steer Roping Trio

(Special from PRCA)

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.— Steer roping is a family affair around the Allen home in Santa Anna, Texas. Three of the world's best professional ropers live under that roof -- father James, a seven-time National Finalist; son Guy, twice world champion; and son Gip, currently ranked 13th among the nation's top money winners. They all excel in an event that was born on the plains of this country a century ago -- and which has become one of the most exacting events in professional rodeo today. And all three hope to be on the roster of qualifiers when the 1981 National Finals Steer Roping (NFSR) opens in Laramie, Wyoming September 12.

"Those boys used to tag along to the National Finals with their dad when they were youngsters," recalls one veteran competitor. "While he was in the arena competing, they'd be out back throwing practice loops at a bale of hay. Now they're showing Dad how it's done." Sure enough, of the three, James has the toughest work cut out to qualify for the '81 championships.

Guy, the defending champion (who won his first title at age 19), already has his spot cinched. With \$15,585 won, he's sitting 2nd in Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association ranks, about \$7,000 behind Oklahoman Arnold Felts.

"Arnold has placed at almost every steer roping this year," 23-year-old Guy says, "and he's got a big lead. There are still several contests to go, however, and I hope to close that money gap before the Finals begin. Then I'll just have to rope the best I know how at Laramie." This year's NFSR winner stands to collect about \$7,000.

Twenty-one-year-old Gip, who stands a good chance of making it

to his first Finals, is happy just to be ranked. Currently sitting 13th with \$6,367, he knows he needs to stay among the top 16 to qualify.

"I've been trying for the Finals since I turned Pro three years ago," he says. "Every year I've been winning a little more money until, finally, this season, I hit the right stride. It looks like it's going to take at least \$8,000 to go to the Finals, though, so I'll have to save the relaxing until later. I might be getting tougher all the time, but so are all the other steer ropers!"

James, who serves as the event's official director on the PRCA's governing board, agrees. "Steer roping has grown tremendously during the last half-decade. Six years ago, \$8,000 would have won the world championship. Now we have a greater number of contests (16 in 1981), and I figure this year's champion will earn about \$30,000. You just about have to enter every steer roping there is to even have a chance at the Finals nowadays; and you have to place at almost all of them for the championship."

James has \$4,219 on his 1981 tally, ranking him 21st right now. After missing out last year because of a broken leg (sustained while loading his horse to go to the Finals), the Allen patriarch is roping 'just a little harder' as the '81 season winds down.

"I enjoy roping steers without going to the Finals, but qualifying for Laramie makes the year much more special. I think the dream of every steer roper is to make the National Finals and, even after seven trips, I still like going. Roping with the best in the world is a special kind of competition. Still, I get just as much enjoyment out of watching Gip and Guy win," he says.

## Changes Our Defiance To Submission

Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves; for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief; for that is unprofitable for you. Heb. 13:17.

There are some young men and women who have no method in doing their work. Though they are always busy, they can present but little results. They have erroneous ideas of work, and think that they are working hard, when if they had practised method in their work, and applied themselves intelligently to what they had to do, they would have accomplished much more in a shorter time. By dallying over the less important matters, they find themselves hurried, perplexed, and confused when they are called upon to do those duties that are more essential.... Under circumstances like these, where young men and women are making such mistakes in their life discipline, it would be sinful not to speak words of advice and counsel.

It is an extremely delicate thing to tell people of their faults. The reprover is likely to find that in those reproved, pride and stubbornness assert themselves, and the will is arrayed in defiance and opposition. But for all this, advice should be given, and faults should be laid bare. Let the young cultivate a teachable spirit, that they may be benefitted by the efforts of those who seek to help them....

It may seem that we are to study our own hearts, and square out our own actions by some standard of our own; but this is not the case. This would but work deform instead of reform. The work must begin in the heart, and then the spirit, the words, the expression of the countenance, and the actions of the life, will make manifest that a change has taken place.

In knowing knowing Christ through the grace that He has shed fourth abundantly, we become changed.... In humility we shall correct every fault and defect of character; because Christ is abiding in the heart, we shall be fitted up for the heavenly family above.

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

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS  
OF PROPOSED  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS  
SPECIAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 3, 1981

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

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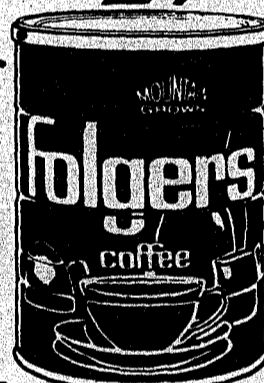
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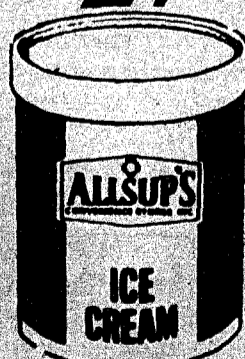
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
