City water patrons have a change in billing, starting this month, according to a plan adopted by City Council at the Thursday, August 6, meeting.

Water meters will be read nearer the actual billing date, with readings to be made earlier each month until readings are on the 20th of the month instead of the 10th as previously done.

City officials were complimentary of local residents for their cooperation with the new garbage pickup regulations, and also for the prompt payment of water bills.

The repair of the garbage truck

was discussed but no decision reached.

The above events will be jackpotted.

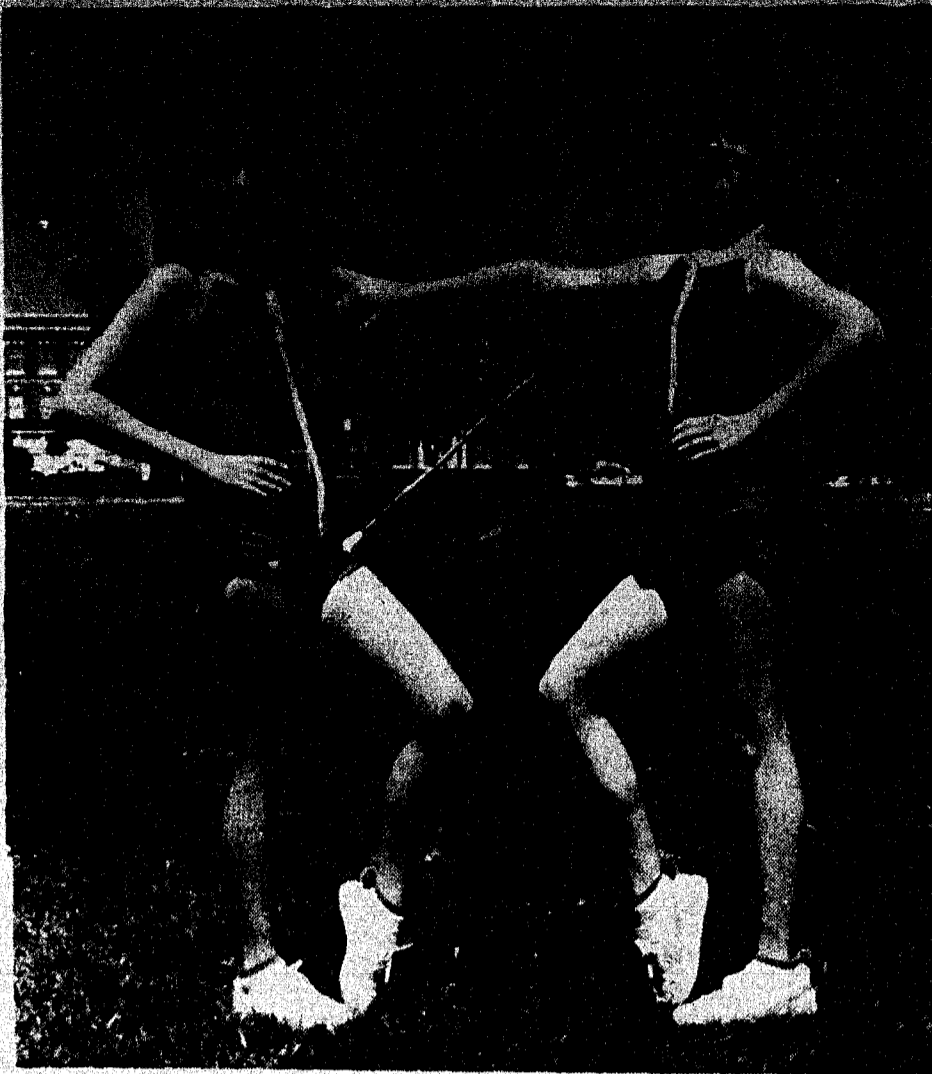
Other events for youths 14 and under there will be break-away roping, barrel racing, steer riding and pole bending.

Larger Limit For Hunters Of Mourning Doves

AUSTIN—Mourning dove hunters will be allowed to harvest 12 birds per day during the upcoming hunting seasons, an increase of two over last year.

Possession limit on mourning doves will be 24 for the 1981-82 seasons.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a meeting in Austin last week also modified the proposed South Zone dove hunting dates which will be Sunday, September 20 - November 2, and from January 2 - 17, 1982.

The North Zone season, of which central Texas is a part, will be Tuesday, September 1 - October 30. There will be no spring season for mourning doves in the North Zone.

Other early seasons migratory bird hunting season dates and bag limits were also approved at the recent meeting.

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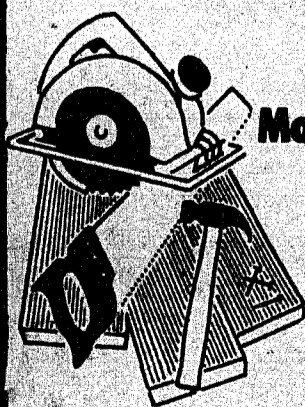
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Mrs. John Hunter Leads Program For UMW Group

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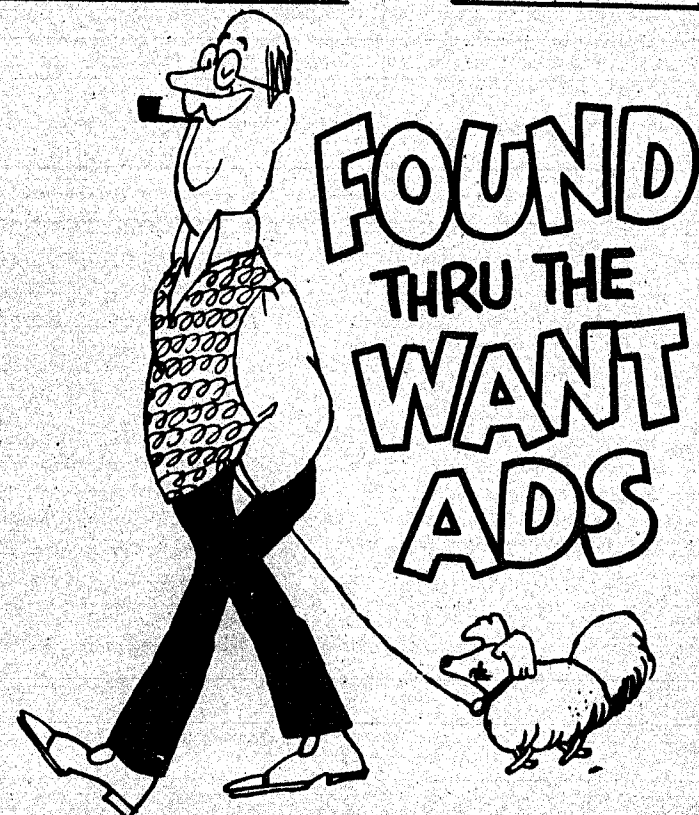
