a drawing for \$50 in groceries.

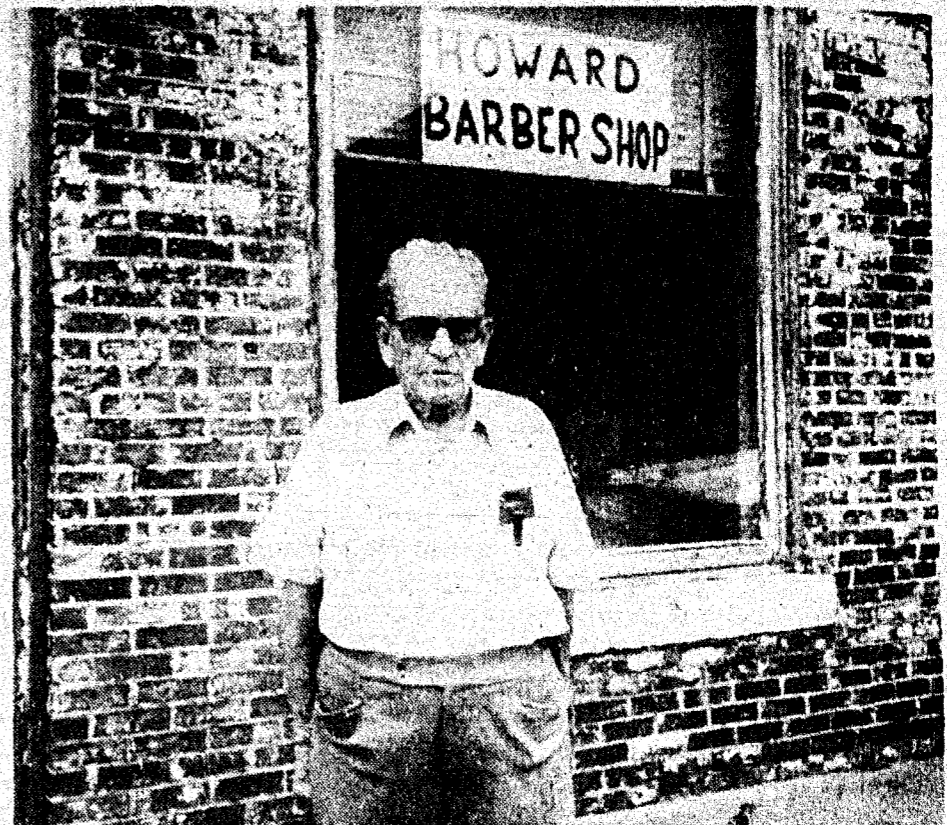
The Adventure group and their parents will have a food concession, serving hamburgers.

Local Business Closing In Downtown S-Anna

A long-time Santa Anna business is closing its doors this month. Jess E. Howard will close his barber shop on Wallis Avenue after being in business here over 50 years.

Equipment and fixtures at the shop have been sold as antiques and will be shipped to Weatherford. The building, located between Hosch Furniture and The Santa Anna News, is owned by Mrs. O. L. Cheaney and will be for sale.

Mr. Howard, a native of Grimes County, came to Coleman County in 1919 where he worked on the J. K. Baker farm in the Red Bank community southwest of town. He met Rainey Duggins on a visit here

in 1917 and they were married here November 3, 1926.

Howard attended Texas Barber College in Fort Worth in 1923, and worked several years with the Hill and Lewis Barber Shop here. For over 35 years he owned and operated a shop near the present Western Auto location, and in later years worked with the late H. D. Speck at the present location, purchasing the shop at Mr. Speck's death. Mr. Howard also was in the livestock and farming business for 28 years.

The local barbershop has been a meeting place for local men for many years, a favorite place to sit and visit with friends and catch up on the community news. No appointment was ever necessary for a haircut, with the price being \$2.50 -- a bargain in this day and time.

The Howards plan to enjoy their home and just take it easy when the shop closes. They are parents of a son, Don, of Coleman, three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Although several months past his 80th birthday, Mr. Howard has continued to keep a full schedule Tuesday through Saturday of each week. He and his convenient downtown shop will be missed by many in the community.

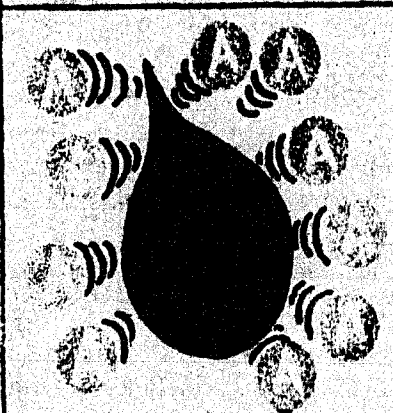

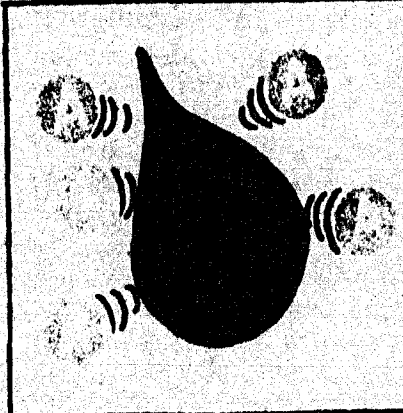

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School Lunchroom Set For Year

The Santa Anna School lunchroom will be open Friday on the first day of school, preparing and serving meals to students and faculty.

The prices for lunches for children from kindergarten to eighth grade will be 55 cents; high school students will pay 65 cents. All faculty lunches will be \$1.20.

Reduced price meals for children from low income families will be 40 cents, and free lunches are available to qualifying families according to an income scale

available at the school office.

Breakfast is also served at the lunchroom, with the cost being 30 cents for high school students and 20 cents for elementary students. Adult breakfasts are 50 cents.

There is no free milk program this year as the federally-funded program has been discontinued.
