Clint Day, president, is urging everyone interested in the community to attend the meeting and help make plans for the group.

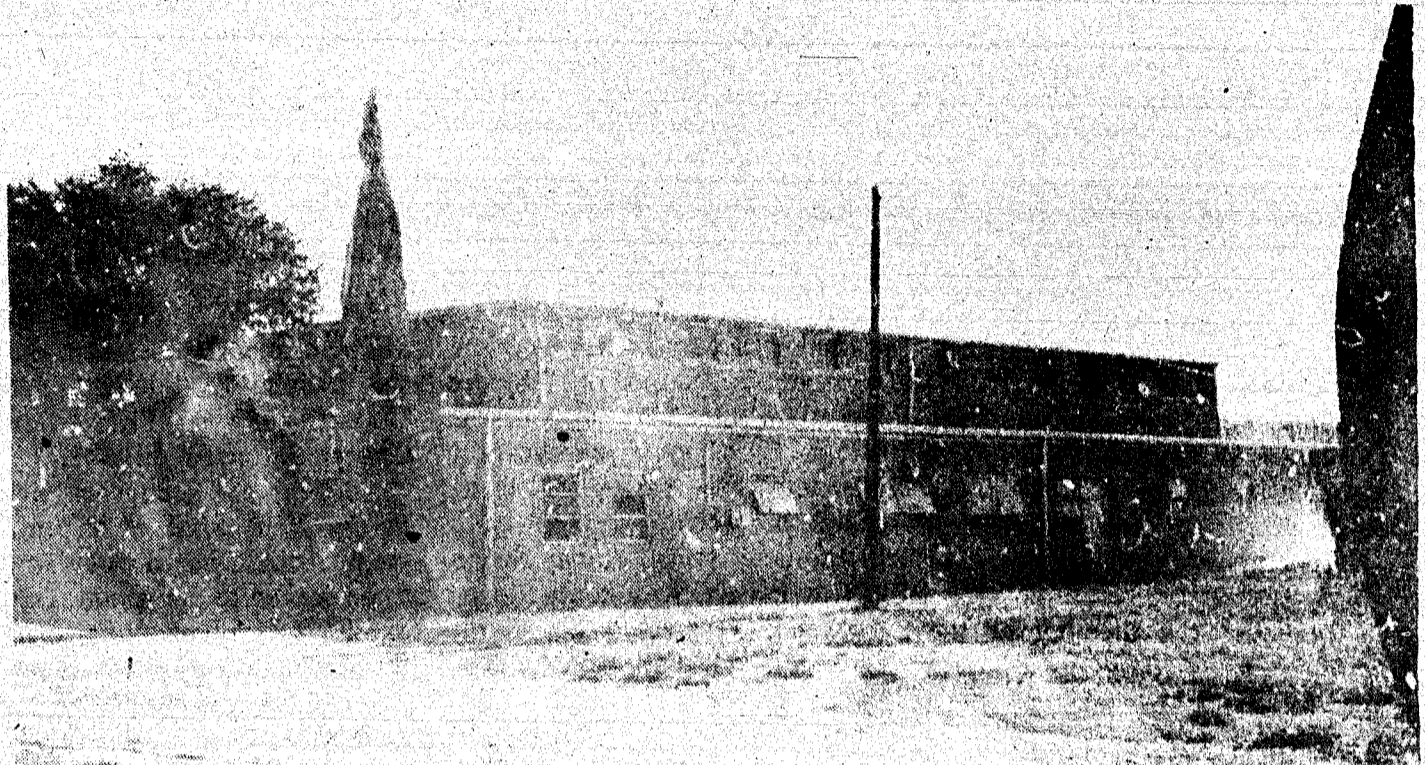

Mrs. Wilson retired in December 1979 as Trickham Postmaster when the branch office closed and rural routes replaced the Trick-

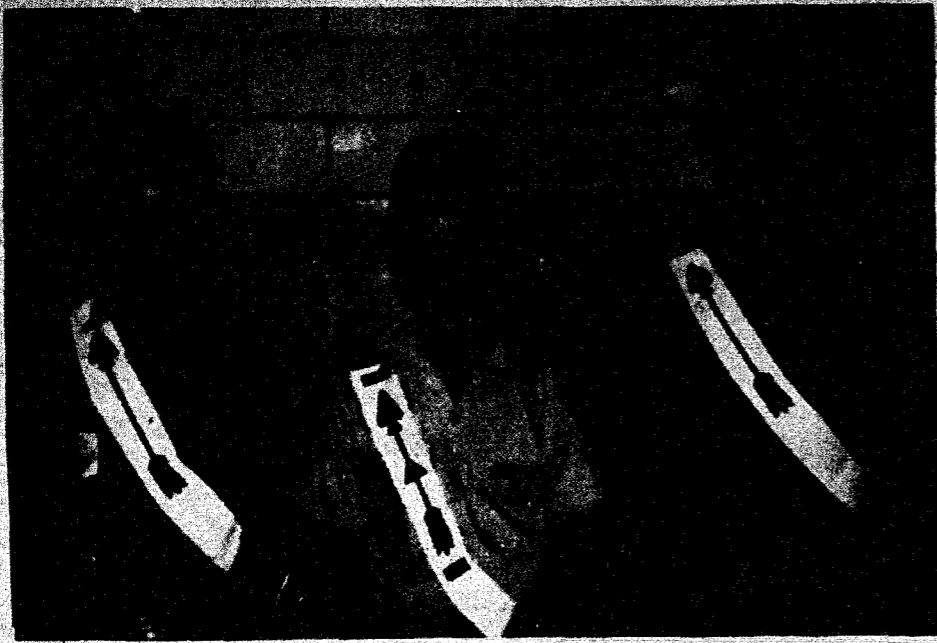
ham office. She had served nearly
