Guy Allen Sets Record In Roping

Guy Allen of Santa Anna, world champion steer roper in 1977 and 1980, set a new fastest-time record in the professional steer roping event at the Wyoming State Fair Rodeo in Douglas, Wyoming August 20 - 22. Guy already held the fastest-time record for the National Finals Steer Roping with an 11-second flat made at Laramie, Wyo. in 1980.

At the Douglas roping, Guy roped and tied a steer in 9.5 seconds which also won first place in the first go-around of the roping. Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Allen, is currently in second place in the event, with the roping championship coming up in mid-September in Laramie.

Guy, a graduate of Santa Anna High School, competed in the collegiate rodeo circuit with Ranger Junior College and Sul Ross State University, and has been rodeoing professionally for four years along with his father and brother, Gip. He also competes in calf roping and team roping events.

Although there are no official fast-time records because arena sizes and conditions vary so greatly, but the PRCA keeps "unofficial" records on all events.
