City Sales Tax Shows Increase

The Santa Anna City sales tax receipts have been received here, with the payment for the current period being \$3,202.33, according to a report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office. The total is 33 percent above the same period last year, and brings the total for 1981 to \$14,943.42.

The city sales tax is collected with the state sales tax and returned to the city from the state office.

Budget Approved By ISD During Recent Meeting

The 1981-82 budget for Santa Anna Independent School District was approved at the Monday, August 17, meeting of the group, held at the school office. Jay Weathers, president, led the session, with all members present except Donnie Neff.

Bills and accounts for the month were approved for payment, and the 1980-81 budget was amended, completing the fiscal year.

The resignation of Terry Loehr, fourth grade teacher, was accepted, and Ann Fisher of Brownwood was named to fill the position. Mrs. Fisher's husband is on the Howard Payne University staff, and she will reside in Brownwood.

The contract of Rita Ray, math teacher for junior high and high school, was signed.

The next meeting of the School Board will be Tuesday, September 8.

School Enrollment Increase Over First Week of 1980

Enrollment at the Santa Anna schools is higher than the figure on the first day last year. There are 277 students enrolled in elementary school, 15 above the 1980 total, and 99 in high school, one more than this time last year.

Charles Brewster, elementary principal, listed enrollment figures by classes on Monday as follows:

Seventh Grade - 17

The senior class is the largest in high school this year with 33 students. Other class totals, submitted by Gerald Brister, high school principal, include the junior class with 19; sophomores, 18; and freshmen, 29.

A few more students are expected to enroll within a few days or after Labor Day, according to Mr. Brister.

Kent Caperton, State Senator from District 5, was speaker for the program. Also on the program were William W. Bay, Associate Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, John B. Coleman, a member of the Texas A&M University Board of Regents, and Ben Johnson, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

Dr. Fritz, an honor graduate of Santa Anna High School, received her bachelor of science degree from Texas A&M University in 1978. She was member of the Meats Judging Team that won national honors, and also held membership in Block and Bridle.

She has begun work with the Liefeste Veterinary Clinic in Kerrville.

Dam Project Authority Disputes Magazine Story

According to an article in a recent issue of Abilene Reporter News, information about the future of the Stacy Reservoir project was not correct, said O. H. Ivie, general manager of the project's overseer, Colorado River Municipal River Authority.

The article in the August issue of Texas Monthly magazine, stated that an archeological survey conducted by Espey, Huston and Associates of Austin reported 430 significant sites in the proposed reservoir area.

The article stated the archeologists were impressed enough to nominate some of the sites for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places.

"If the designation is granted, that alone could scotch the reservoir," according to the

article.

However, Ivie and H. G. Wooldridge, the project archeologist with the Austin firm, disagreed.

"I don't consider that we have a problem," Ivie said in a telephone interview.

Wooldridge said that inclusion of sites in the National Register of Historic Places would have no effect on the future of Stacy Reservoir.

Recommendations by the firm will be made to the Texas Historical Commission and to the Texas Antiquities Committee about sites to be suggested for inclusion in the Register.

If the recommended sites are chosen for the Register, several alternatives are available, according to Wooldridge.

A structure such as an historic house, for example, could be moved to another location. Or a site could be excavated and the findings placed in a museum.

The magazine article also gave the wrong reason about the reason the archeological survey was made, Ivie believes. He said the survey was made at the request of the U. S. Corps of Engineers because it is a requirement to receive a permit applied for by the water district.

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"Friends" Group Organized in Santa Anna

Young People Concerned About Drug, Alcohol Abuse

(Special to the Santa Anna News)
What are friends? People attached to one another by affection or esteem? Certainly. But there's more to the answer. "Friends" is the name of a group of youth and young adults who have gotten together in Santa Anna to do something to reduce drug and alcohol abuse in our community.

Santa Anna is a farming and ranching community of 1,500 or so persons who live in the shadow of Santa Anna Mountain -- a sprawling mesa which once served as an observation post for Texas Rangers tracking bands of Indians who frequently raided the isolated settlements of West Central Texas. Oil exploration and coal mining are putting new life into the community, located at

the junction of U. S. Highways 67, 84 and 283, 65 miles southeast of Abilene.

Although spared from the pollution and traffic jams of industrialized cities, Santa Anna has not escaped problems associated with the abuse of alcohol beverages, prescription medication and illegal drugs. Alarmed by the possibility that some Santa Annians' minds, bodies and futures are being damaged or destroyed by drugs, 19 young men and women, ranging in age from 15 to 21, decided to do what they could to give the residents of their community some alternatives to drug abuse.

With limited assistance from the consultation and educational staff of the Central Texas MHMR Center, "Friends" has grown from an ideal to an idea to a plan put into action. The ideal which brought "Friends" together is embedded in the phrase, "Being There." To the founding members of "Friends," being there with emotional support and a helping hand when a child loses a parent or a teenager gets into trouble with drugs or human relationships, or even when an older adult hits an emotional crisis, such as divorce, job loss or loneliness, is the goal that has galvanized 19 separate, concerned and caring individuals into a compatible group, with a single purpose: "Promote the emotional

and social well-being of the residents of Santa Anna."

"Friends" has outlined seven specific goals which have drawn the praise and support of the Central Texas MHMR Center: (1.) establish a Big Brother program; (2) establish a Big Sister program; (3) activate a crisis intervention hotline; (4) develop a youth-oriented creative workshop; (5) develop community-based counseling and referral services; (6) develop a community continuing education program; and (7) establish a public information program, which will provide information about drug and alcohol abuse, mental health and social needs to individuals and community organizations.

The group currently meets each Monday evening at 7:30 in the home of one of its members, who at 21 is the "oldest friend of all." The group is continuing in its efforts to locate a building to be used as a regular meeting place which will be named (most appropriately) "Friends House." Hopefully the community will come to the aid of "Friends" by helping the group find a building with little or no rental fee.

At a time when teenagers in general are being labeled "pot-heads" who are only interested in "doing their own thing" and are

too lazy to work, "Friends" is as refreshing as August rain. Nineteen enthusiastic and sensitive young men and women in a rural West Central Texas community are calling on their peers, parents and community leaders to lead, follow or get out of the way as "Friends" challenges drugs, violence and despair for the hearts, minds and souls of Santa Anna's citizens.

The Santa Anna group, calling themselves the "Back Offs," have not chartered a chapter but take part with other central Texas riders and the Abilene chapter. Activities -- or "runs" -- are scheduled almost every weekend, with members loading their gear onto their bikes and taking off to places such as Fort Davis, Lake Belton, New Braunfels, Marble Falls, San Angelo and Brady.

The motorcycle club members enjoy getting together for a weekend of visiting, games, field events and other activities. Most of the group camp out, with the host club preparing and serving meals during the event. Tours and sightseeing are also enjoyed wherever the group meets.

Santa Anna people who regularly attend the runs are Joel and Etta Hamlin, Margaret and Emmett Simmons, Don and Nita West, Paul and Brenda Crossno, David and Kay Cooper, Larry and Diane Gendron and Brent Hamlin.

Admission to the get-togethers is limited to members of the clubs and their guests. The family-oriented activities include a church service on Sunday morning before cyclists depart for their homes.

There are no special requirements for motorcycles or equipment, and some members have sidecars or trailers in which to carry their gear. A few of the members take their children to the rallies. Each member is identified by a club vest, with patches and pins added for each of the meetings attended.

The Fort Davis meeting was the largest of the year, with 800

people attending. Among the group were the "Blue Knights", a group of policemen from Phoenix, Arizona. The trophy for the oldest rider attending went to a gentleman of 96 who rode his motorcycle from Missouri. Other trophies are awarded the youngest person and the one from the farthest distance, as well as winners of the contests.

There are several couples from Brownwood who also take part in the runs, and about 200 from the Abilene chapter. San Antonio has one of the largest chapters in the Texas organization.

In addition to the chapters, there is a group of older members, the "Retreads," who are over 40 years of age. Among this group are Don and Nita West. Don, called the "Granddaddy" of the Santa Anna group, has owned and ridden motorcycles since the 1940s. Others in the group have been enthusiasts for several years.

A monthly magazine lists the runs during the year, along with articles on safety, special activities, and other stories of interest. The organization is safety-oriented, and members are encouraged to wear helmets and proper clothing when riding, and to use caution in all situations. Membership is for all ages, but a license to operate a motorcycle can be obtained after the age of 16.

After the initial expense of purchase of a motorcycle, the sport is very inexpensive, with gasoline consumption very low and tickets for meals and fees at the weekend runs quite inexpensive. However the cost of a new motorcycle with all the equipment can total as much as the cost of a new automobile.

Tax Appraisal District Sets Budget Hearing

The Board of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District has set a public hearing on the district's 1982 budget on Monday, September 10, at 6 p.m. in the County Courtroom. The budget for the coming year has

been studied by the group and copies sent to all the taxing entities in the county. The hearing will be an opportunity for everyone to review the budget before it is approved.

The group met Monday, August 11, in the Coleman office, with Harold Pittard, chairman, presiding. Minutes of the July meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts for the month approved for payment.

Phil McCormick, a consultant for the district, reviewed progress on appraisals in the county, with appraisals on schedule. Coleman commercial property is now being appraised, and rural property almost complete. The final work will be completing the rural area and making appraisals in the City of Coleman.

A contract with the Thomas Y. Pickett Co. was signed for the 1982 year for mineral and utility appraisals. A contract for the 1983 year was also approved. Cost will be \$41,000 per year plus an increase not to exceed \$2,500 for the second year if indicated by the Consumer Price Index. Other bids for the same services were in excess of \$46,000 and \$50,000.

The next meeting of the Board will be Monday, September 10, at 5 p.m. prior to the public hearing. The public is welcome to attend the meetings.

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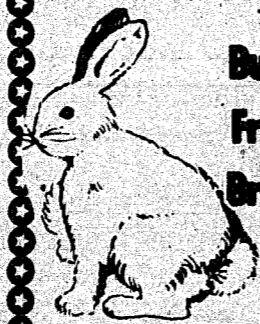

Gas Yard Lights Not Threatened

DALLAS— "Homeowners can continue to enjoy the security of their gas yard lights, following a presidential action which lifts the ban on outdoor gas lighting," Lone Star Gas Company Carol Neaves said last week.

A provision of the budget appropriation bill, signed by President Reagan on August 13, voids part of the Fuel Use Act, which required that all gas yard lights be disconnected by New Year's Day 1982.

"We are gratified by this change, because that portion of the Fuel Use Act was counterproductive," Neaves stated. "The government was making an effort to conserve less than one-quarter of one percent of the natural gas used in the United States while asking homeowners to give up the security provided by their yard lights. This measure should help relieve the anxiety of customers who have told us of their need to have the nighttime security of an operating yard light."

The amendment also relieves Lone Star of the time-consuming and costly effort to locate and disconnect each gas yard light within its 170,000 square mile system.

The new amendment applies to all homeowners who had a gas yard light in operation on or before November 8, 1978. Homeowners who installed a gas yard

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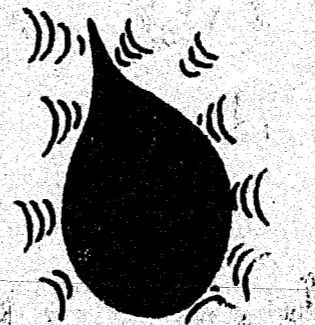
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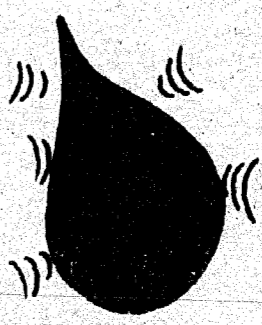

The Tempting Tan

Fashion or Health Hazzard

Fashion being what it is, it is unlikely that a pale summer face will be the rage this year or next. But a healthy glow is not the same thing as a deep tan or sunburn. If you do intend to get a tan, try to satisfy yourself with just enough sun to avoid that pasty I'm-in-the-office-all-day look.

Prolonged exposure to the sun has well-proven bad effects on the skin, says the Texas Medical Association. Studies have shown that over-exposure to the sun can cause premature wrinkling and aging of the skin, and is a major cause of skin cancer. Basically, there is no health value in tanning.

If you are unable to resist the lure of a tan, however, start slowly. Begin with 15 minutes in the sun, gradually increasing to 30 or more minutes per day.

Always protect your eyes and the sensitive skin of the eyelids by wearing sunglasses.

Use a sunscreen preparation that contains PABA, a chemical which blocks the burning ultraviolet rays of the sun while letting the tanning rays come through. Preparations which contain 55 to 75 percent alcohol adhere to the skin best. Never use baby oil or other creams which do not contain PABA. Suntan lotions also lubricate the skin, preventing it from drying out in the sun.

Avoid being out in the sun from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. This is when the sun's rays are strongest--and so are your chances of burning. Don't forget that you can tan or burn on cloudy days and while in the water.

If you do get a sunburn, ointments and wet compresses will help the discomfort. A bland cold cream or a lightweight mineral oil may be applied to the skin. If the pain is severe or if extensive blistering is present, seek medical attention.

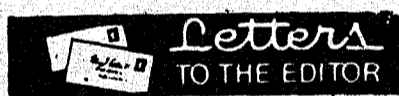

Farm Bureau is Supporting Voluntary Beef Promotion

The Coleman County Farm Bureau supports the cattlemen's statewide voluntary program to finance more aggressive beef promotion.

Under the program, which has been endorsed by five leading livestock organizations in the state, 25 cents per head is collected on cattle and calves sold through participating markets, packers and order buyers. Collected funds are remitted to the Beef Industry Council of the National Livestock and Meat Board.

"Such a program carries out Farm Bureau's policy of having producers voluntarily financing beef consumer education, promotion and research," the county farm leader said. "We emphasize the fact that the program is voluntary. Any cattle producer may elect not to participate by telling the attendant on duty at the market, prior to the sale, not to deduct the 25 cents per head."

The Farm Bureau leader said his organization has expressed appre-

ciation to the Coleman Livestock Auction Commission Co. for agreeing to assist producers with this program.

Joe Pat Hemphill is chairman of the National Beef Board Promotional Effort in Coleman County.

The county FB president said that beef producers were fortunate to have a well-established reputable organization like Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board operating the national promotion and research program. Administrative costs usually run below five percent of contributions received, and the Council has been extremely effective in carrying out consumer education programs in promoting beef, and in research into such things as nutrition.

Manage Brush Rather Than Control It

In dealing with range brush, it's now an issue of management rather than control.

Over the years, both brush eradication and complete control methods have fallen by the wayside because they were ineffective, impractical or cost prohibitive. Changing land uses, with rangeland going into farmland, have caused problems regarding the use of traditional herbicides, which damage crops.

What, then, is the answer?

"A total system concept using various methods of brush control that complement each other and

extend the life of each treatment at lower cost seems to hold promise," points out Dr. Wayne Hanselka of Corpus Christi, range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "In other words, we need to think in terms of an integrated brush management system."

Such a system takes into consideration the use of rangelands as wildlife habitats as well as the fact that rangelands serve as watersheds in many areas, notes Hanselka.

"Brush management should be based on the ecological potential of the range and should be aimed at optimizing production, con-

dering all the potential use," notes the range specialist. "Brush control should be integrated with all other inputs -- especially grazing management -- to achieve the desired results."

Among considerations in setting up a brush management system are the rancher's management objectives, potential of the rangeland, type and kind of grazing management, available alternatives, proportion of ranch to be treated, and economics.

"With the integrated brush management concept, traditional herbicide rates can be reduced in many cases if followed by another treatment. Also, newer herbicides such as picloram and tebuthiuron can work well, and prescribed burning definitely has a place," says Hanselka.

Integrated brush management systems have worked well on macartmey rose and huisache in

the coastal prairie (near Victoria and Sinton) and on whitebrush near Tilden. Also, in-depth studies on running mesquite are under way near Freer.

"Objectives of these studies have been to reduce large, dense stands of brush to encourage the growth of grasses and herbs, to maintain this improved condition, to restore forb production, to remove woody plant debris, and to suppress any resprouting of brush plants," notes Hanselka.

To accomplish these objectives calls for a sequence of treatments: mechanical or chemical brush control, deferred grazing, prescribed fire, application of pelleted herbicides, and a sound deferred rotation grazing system.

"With rising costs of brush control treatments, the rancher must become increasingly skillful in deciding where to put his dollars. A system of integrated

brush management appears defined range management promising in achieving well-defined goals," contends Hanselka.

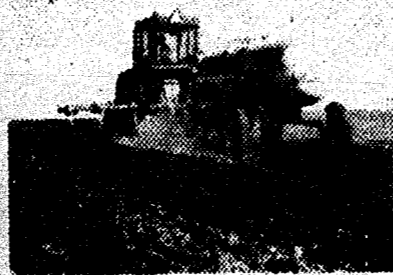

Water Safety Encouraged

AUSTIN— Beware of the S.D.S. this Labor Day weekend.

S.D.S. is a term coined by water safety officials, and it stands for Sudden Drowning Syndrome.

The term is more than just a catch-phrase. The fact is that three-fourths of all boat-related drownings in the U. S. involve a person falling off, or being thrown from, a boat and disappearing within five minutes of entering the water.

Water safety officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said American Red Cross studies have shown that in most cases, drowning nonswimmers go under within 20 to 60 seconds of entering deep water.

There are three main aspects of S.D.S. in boating accidents: cold water and hypothermia; inability to swim or support oneself; and alcohol or drug abuse or overuse.

First, wear a flotation device (life preserver), especially if you are not a strong swimmer or if boating conditions are hazardous because of weather or other reasons. Second, avoid overuse of alcohol or drugs, especially when operating in canoes or other small craft which can be upset easily.

Third, learn to swim. If you cannot become a good swimmer, admit it and wear a PFD. Above all, treat all water as being potentially dangerous, and don't create conditions through carelessness or lack of preparation which might result in tragedy.
