Guy Allen was winner of the West Texas Boys Ranch benefit steer roping in Post last weekend, receiving the traveling trophy, a trophy saddle, belt buckle and hand-tooled breast collar. He roped and tied four steers in a total time of 73.42 seconds.

His father, James Allen, was third in the roping, having 75.22 on four steers. In second place was Phil Lyne with 73.99.

Guy, the World Champion PRCA Steer Roper in 1977 and 1980, was also entered in the calf roping at the weekend activities, and was second place in the total time combination division for ropers in both events.

Guy was winner of the Post roping in 1978, and if he wins it a third time, will keep the large trophy.

Guy and James will be in Clairmore, Oklahoma this weekend for what is billed as the world's richest steer roping. Gip Allen, a member of the Sul Ross University Rodeo Team, will be competing at the Sul Ross Collegiate Rodeo in Alpine this weekend.

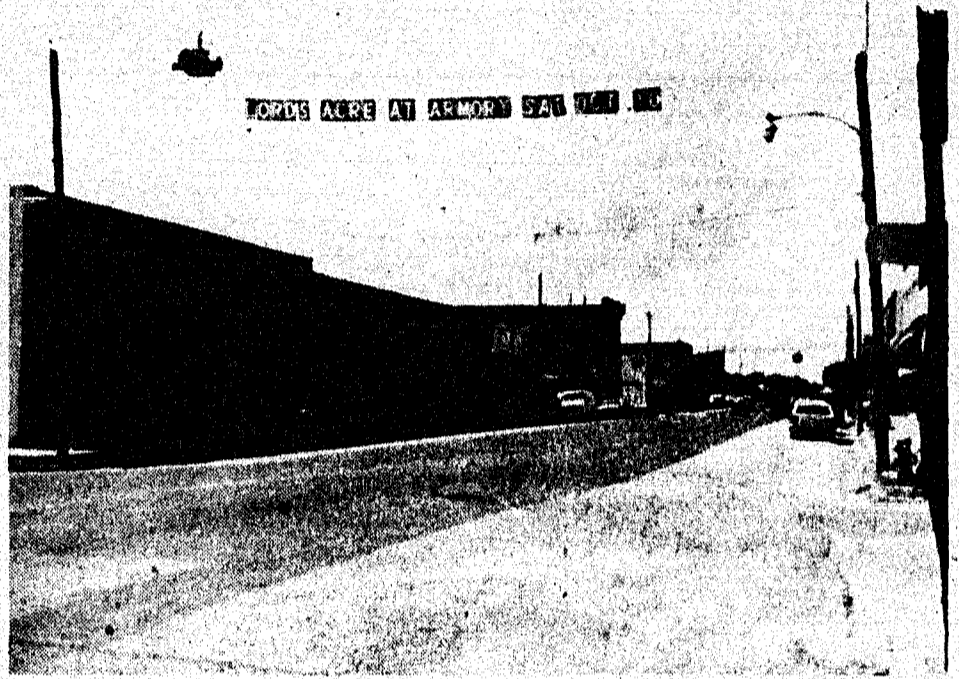

First Cotton of Season Ginned Friday in S-Anna

The Santa Anna community had the first bale of cotton harvested last week, with the Cooperative Gin processing the first bale Friday, October 2. The cotton was from the Charlie Avants farm near Gouldbusk and weighed 505 pounds. The cotton was of very good quality, according to gin employees.

Since the Friday arrival of cotton, two additional bales had been ginned, one from Johnny Steward of Rockwood and the third from Alfred McCrary who farms just north of town.

A good season is expected here, with more cotton to be

harvested than last year. The local gin processed a total of 1460 bales in 1980.

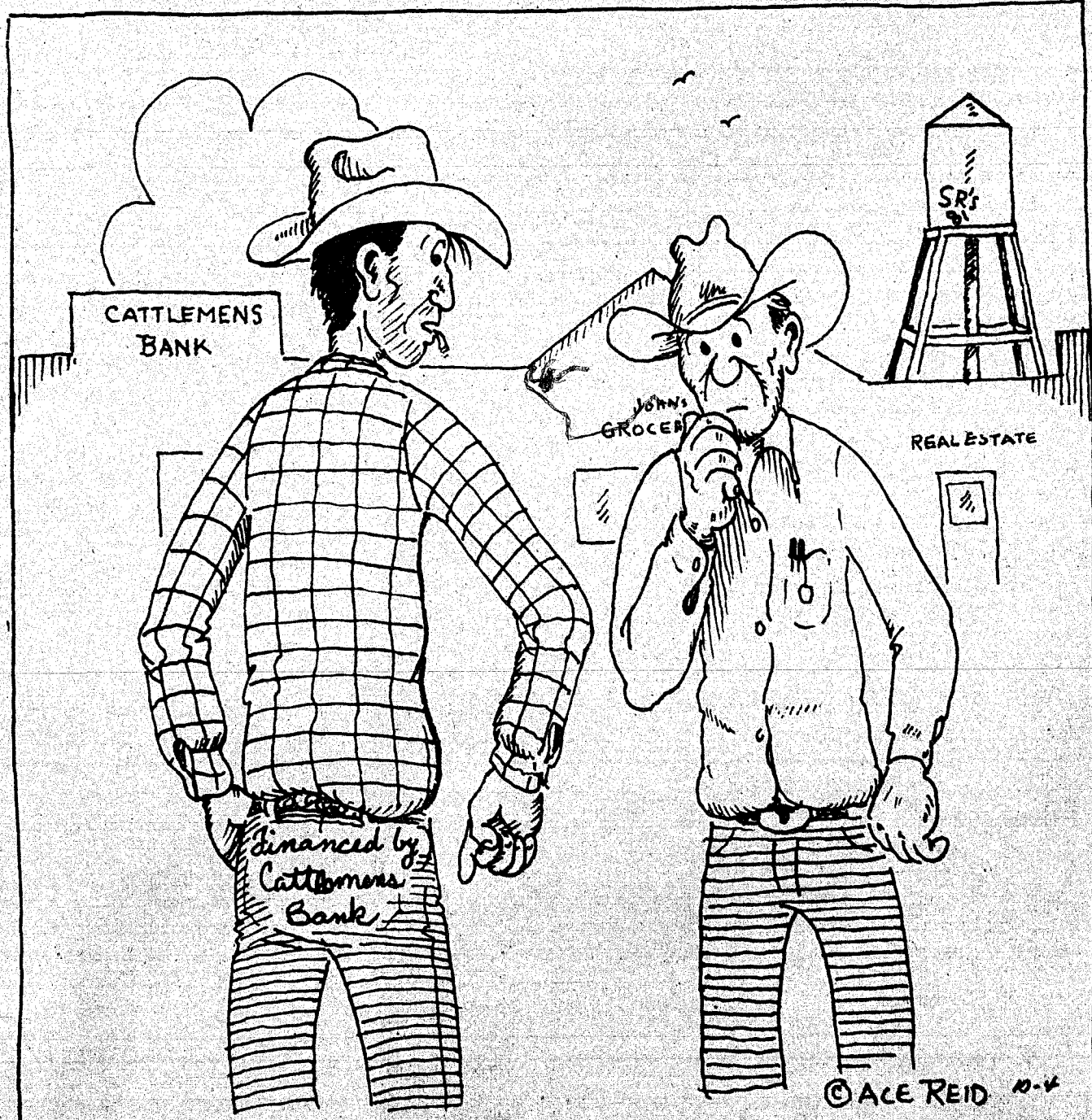

The Mountaineers were first on the board when Ernest DeLeon scored from a yard out early in the fourth quarter. The PAT failed.

Less than a minute later, Rising Star tailback Jon Vaughn found the goal line to tie the score 6-6,

then Thad Chambers kicked the winning point.

The Mountaineers led in rushing and passing yardage, and punted five times for an average of 33 yards. They lost two fumbles and were penalized nine times for a total of 70 yards.

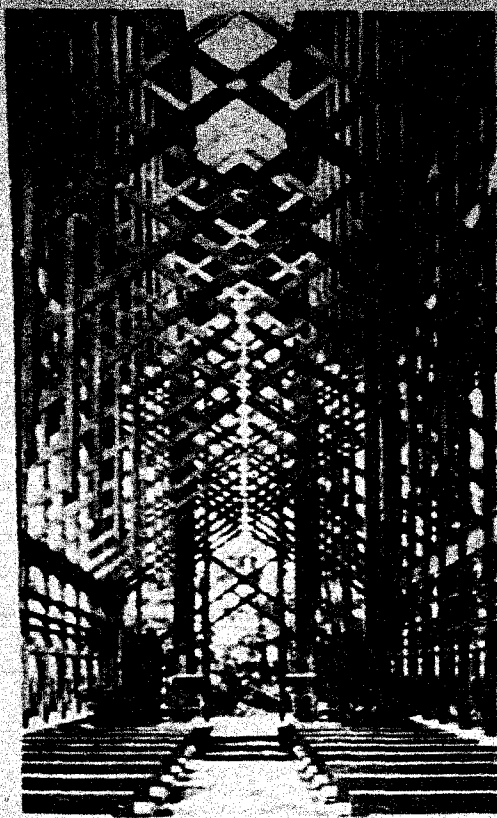

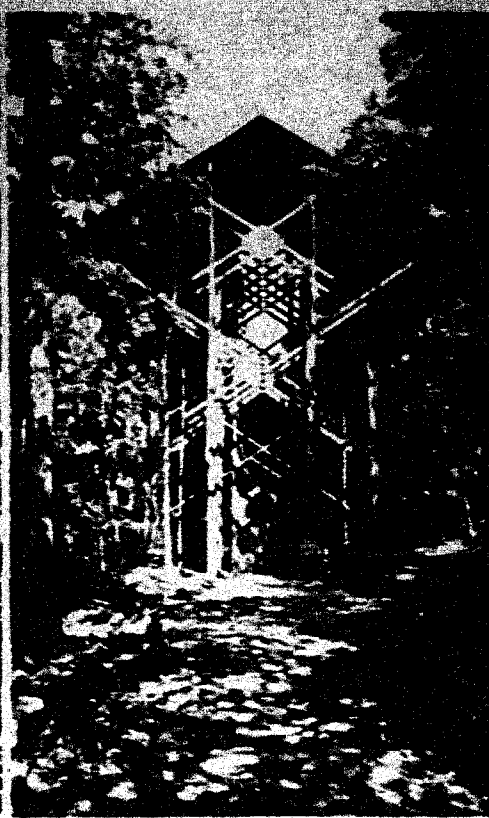

THORNCROWN CHAPEL EUREKA SPRINGS, ARKANSAS

Former Santa Anna Minister on Staff At Unique Arkansas Chapel

A former Santa Anna minister is director of a unique chapel in Eureka Springs, Arkansas. Thousands of persons visit the site each year to see the unusual building and the beautiful site.

Rev. and Mrs. Harry Wigger, who lived in Santa Anna during the 1950s while he pastored First Baptist Church, now live in Eureka Springs, and together they assist with the operation of

the Thorncrown Chapel near Eureka Springs. The building was constructed just a few years ago and is described by authorities as one of the finest religious spaces of modern times.

The chapel was a dream of a Eureka Springs man who had often enjoyed the beauty of nature in the mountains. The chapel was intended to give travelers a place to relax in an inspiring and peaceful way.

'Friends' Group Guidelines Are to Help Others

'Friends' is a non-profit community service organization that is based on the premise that youth, in order to reach their full potential as men and women, need the influence of mature, responsible and responsive examples during their formative years. The relationship between the youth and the volunteer 'Friends' serves to enhance the quality of the youth's life and provides a method for the youth to reach his or her potential.

The absence or limitations of a parent in the home is which the youth is growing up is not in itself indicative of the youth's need for 'Friends' services. There may be resources within the youth's own environment that are providing a satisfactory adult relationship or

the problems that a youth demonstrates may be so severe that they must receive expert professional assistance exclusively.

The qualifications for all 'Friends' volunteers is that they have demonstrated personal stability, compassion, mature judgment, sensitivity, a sense of responsibility, integrity, initiative, a sense of commitment to helping youth, and self-confidence. An objective evaluation of past performances in their school and work history, as well as personal interviews should provide the basic information for judging whether these qualities exist.

The supervisory process is the method through which the organ-

ization provides assurance that the volunteer-child relationship develops. Supervisory process assures volunteers will meet the child regularly, and every effort will be made to develop a relationship which helps the child mature.

Two major division of records in the 'Friends' organization are those concerned with the program and those with the administration of 'Friends'. The fundamental purpose of the case records which reflect programs are to serve the administrative needs of the organization and the service needs of the child. They are described as the following:

a. To reflect whether the management of each individual case has met the quantitative and qualitative goals which the organization has established; and

b. To provide for continuity of service in the event that a different staff person must take over responsibility for the super-

vision of a given case.

The philosophy and service of the organization shall be adequately reported and interpreted to its members, contributors and other appropriate segments of the community.

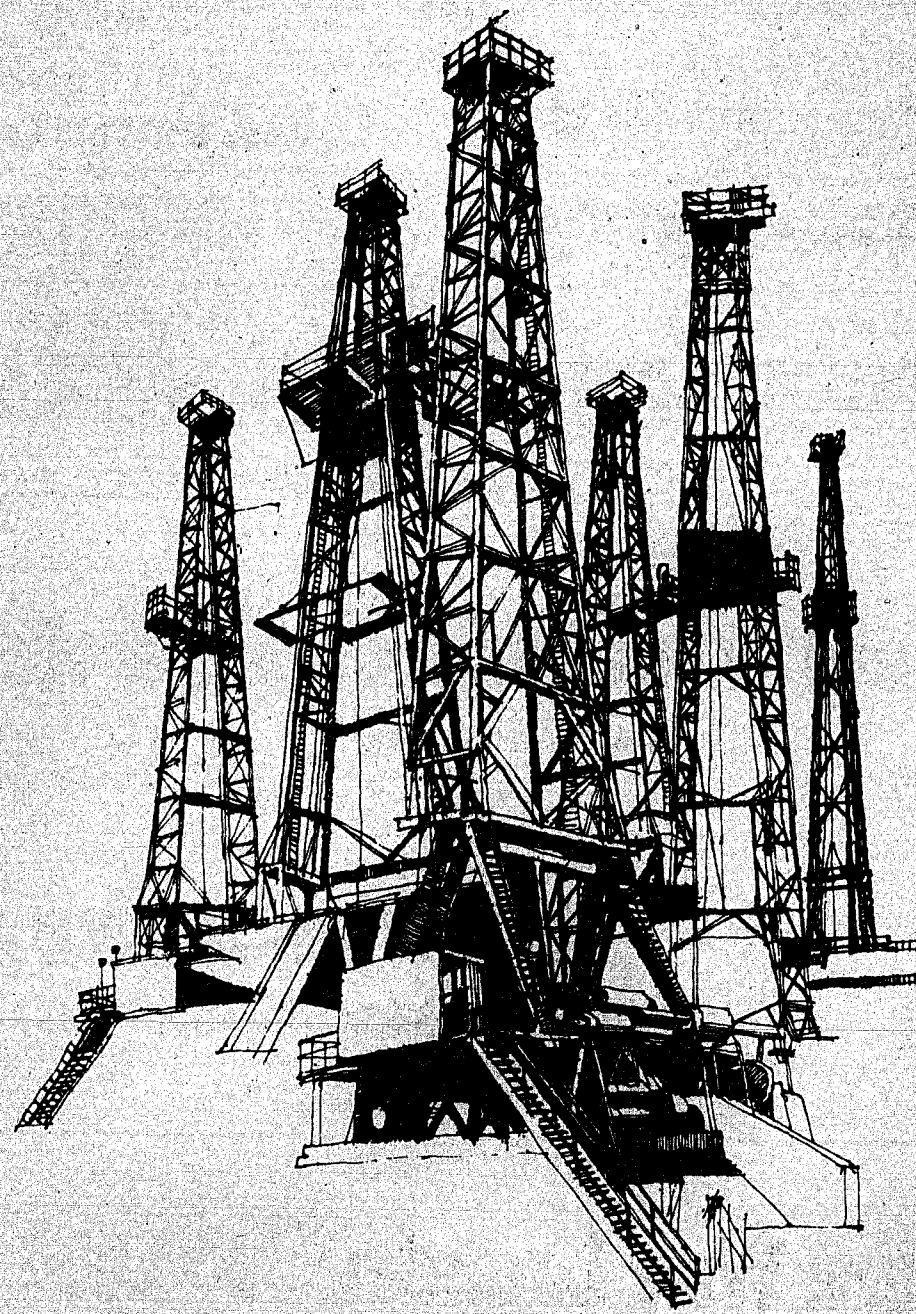

Planning for Retirement? Get S-Security Help Now

As the end of 1981 draws near, many older people think about retirement. They may wonder: Should I stop work now or wait awhile? How much will Social Security pay, and can I work part time and still draw some benefit checks? When will Medicare start and what will it cover?

Answers to these and other questions depend on all the facts in each case. If you are considering retiring soon -- say at the end of the year -- you should 'inquire before you retire.' Call any Social Security office NOW and discuss your situation. This will help you make plans and to be prepared should you decide to apply for retirement checks.

Following is some general information that may aid you in your retirement planning:
WORK CREDITS ARE NEEDED - If you are a worker 62 in 1981, you need at least 30 quarters of coverage credit (or credit for 7 1/2 years of covered work) to be insured for benefits. The required amount is less if you reached 62 before 1981 and will be more if you reach 62 after 1981.

EVIDENCE REQUIRED - You should bring at least the following evidence when you apply for checks: Your Social Security card; your birth certificate or other proof of age; and your W-2 forms or self-employment tax returns for the past two years.

You can find out what additional proofs may be needed by calling the Social Security office. Do not delay filing your claim just because you do not have all your proofs yet.

HOW MUCH YOU WILL RECEIVE - The amount of your retirement check will largely depend on your average reported earnings over the years. The higher the average, the higher the check. Payments to workers retiring at 65 in late 1981 can be as high as \$752.90 per month.

Your checks can start as early as 62 but the amount will be permanently reduced to take account of the longer period you will be getting them. The reduction is 20 percent at 62, 13 1/2 percent at 63, and 6 percent at 64.

BACK BENEFITS - If you apply for benefits after 65, back benefit checks are limited to six months. However, generally no back payments can be made for any month before 65.

CHECKS FOR YOUR FAMILY - When you retire, checks can also be paid to: your unmarried children under 18, or at any age if severely disabled before 22; and your wife or husband 62 or over or at any age if caring for your child (under 16 or disabled) who is getting checks on your record.

INFLATION PROTECTION - Once benefits start, the amount increases automatically each year to help keep up with the rising cost of living. Also payments are not subject to Federal or State tax.

IF YOU WORK - If you are 65 through 69 in 1982, you can earn up to \$6,000 and receive all your retirement checks. If you earn more than this, the basic rule is that \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 earned over \$6,000. Only earnings from working count.

If you are under 65, you can earn up to \$4,080 and receive all benefits before the \$1 for \$2 rule applies. And if you are 72 or older, your earnings will not affect your checks.

DELAYED RETIREMENT - Many older people prefer to continue working full time as long as they can. If you reach 65 before 1982 and work past that age, your retirement check will later be increased by one percent for each year that you do not get a benefit because of your work. If you reach 65 in 1982 or later, that credit will be three percent for each year.

MEDICARE PROTECTION - You can apply for Medicare at 65 even if you do not wish to receive retirement checks yet. Medicare helps pay costly hospital, doctor and other medical bills.

You can get free leaflets explaining retirement benefits and Medicare from any Social Security office. To find the phone number and address, look under Social Security Administration in your phone directory.

Almost all social security

Biologist is Predicting Good Deer Hunting in 1981

UVALDE--The upcoming deer season promises to be everything that last year was not. Good forage and better than normal weather conditions should result in better quality deer than a year ago and more of them, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist based here.

Hunters can even expect better antlered deer from the improved nutrition which is a major contributing factor to their condition.

Last year's drought effectively reduced the deer numbers in overpopulated areas. This year there is more food for the deer which translates into a good antler growth for bucks and higher fawn crops for does.

Dwight Guynn, a wildlife biologist headquartered at the Research and Extension Center in Uvalde, said it is harder each year to predict the type hunting season that hunters can expect.

He said an early frost or scarce food conditions during the season
