Santa Anna Man Injured In Shooting Monday Night

An argument between two young Santa Anna men ended with a shooting Monday night in front of the Alsup's store on Wallis Avenue.

Mark Martin, 18, was shot three times in the abdomen and shoulder with a .22 pistol and is in the Intensive Care Unit at Brownwood Regional Hospital.

Larry Fry, 26, was charged with carrying an illegal weapon, fined and jailed, according to Sheriff H.

F. Fenton. The case will also be referred to the Grand Jury, with other charges expected to be filed against Fry.

According to Fenton, there were several witnesses to the incident that occurred at 10:55 p.m. Martin was taken by Henderson ambulance to Brownwood, and hospital spokesmen listed his condition as 'guarded' Wednesday morning.

SAHS Science Teacher "Teacher of the Year"

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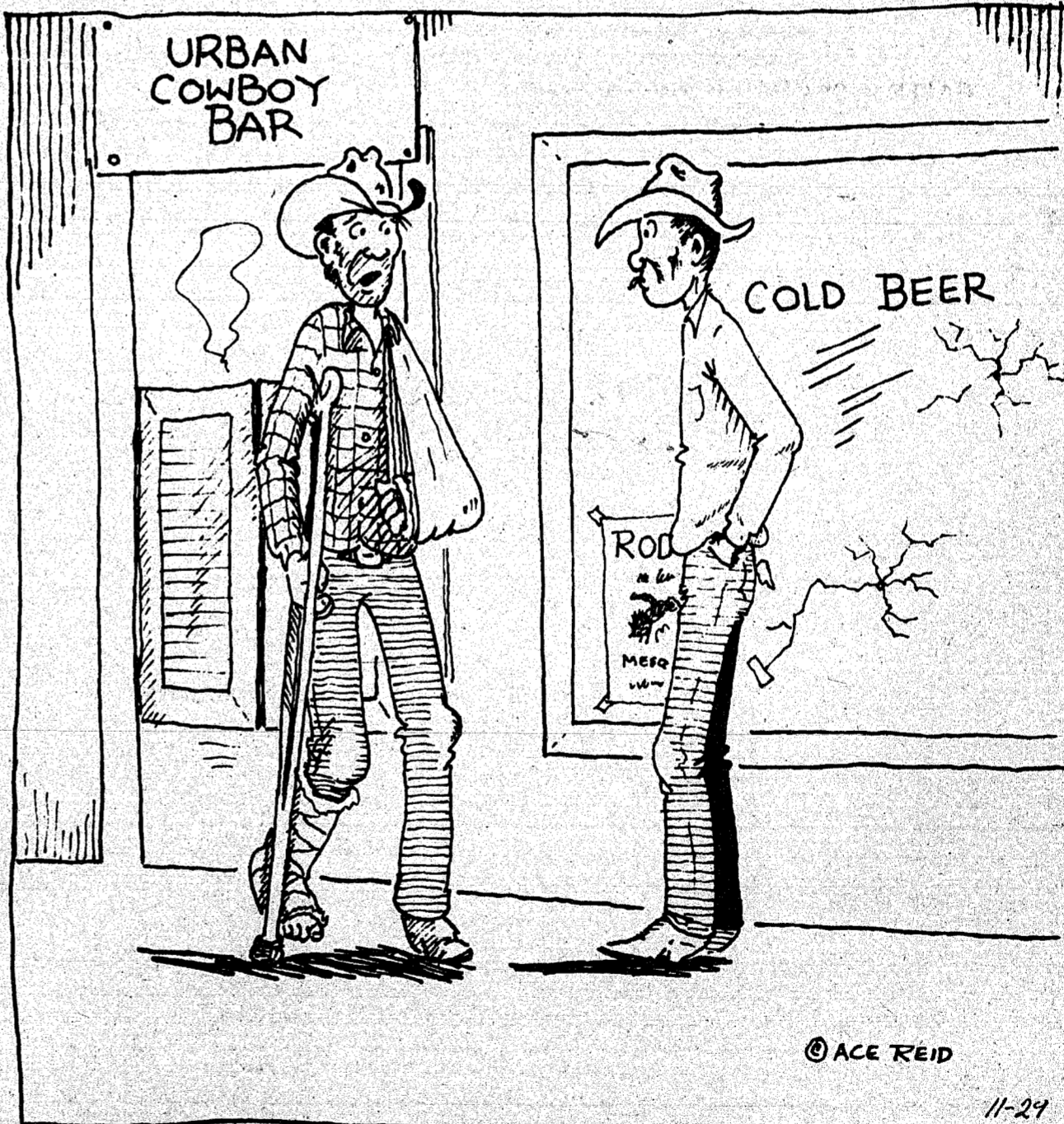

Problems Arise With City Garbage

City officials are still having problems with the garbage pick-up in the town. Local residents are failing to comply with regulations, and those not handling their garbage properly are asked to make note of the requirements.

City sanitation workers will not pick up 55-gallon barrels, either at residences or businesses, so regulation-size garbage containers must be in place. Garbage is still to be placed in plastic bags to assist with the pickup.

Garbage containers that cannot be used or those that are rusted beyond use will be tagged by the city and are to be replaced at the cost of the owner.

People are also reminded that garbage cans are to be placed in a designated area at the street or alley, and not on private property.

Dead animals are to be disposed of in air-tight bags only, and no metal or heavy objects are to be put out with the regular collections.

Rusty Buzzard, SAHS quarterback from last year, was first to score with a field goal. The 3-0 score remained through the first quarter, then the Bangs team recovered a Santa Anna fumble deep in Mountaineer territory and drove across for their only

touchdown. The extra point attempt failed.

With Bangs leading 6-3 for over one quarter, the Santa Anna men scored again, with Dwayne Warnock going over the goal line for a TD. The PAT failed.

A pass from Tommy Harris to Rusty Buzzard brought the final score for Santa Anna, and the PAT was no good.

The next game for the Junior High teams will be Thursday (today) with Rising Star, starting at 4:30 p.m. There will be A and B team games for both boys and girls.

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
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Trickham News

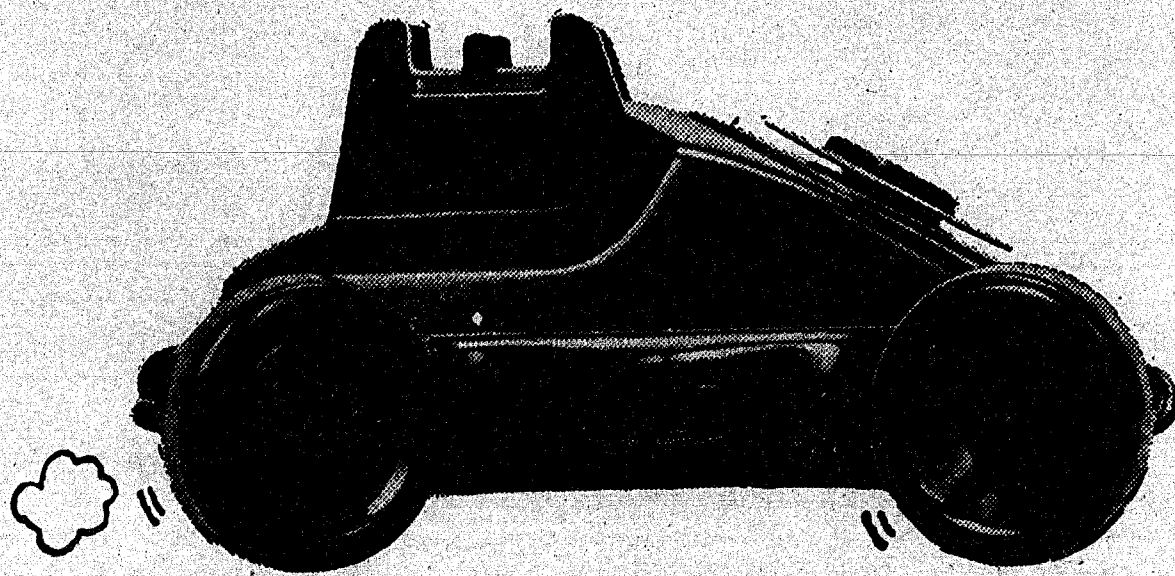

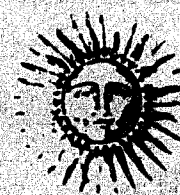

Predation Losses Point Need For Remedy

Predators continue to inflict heavy losses to livestock, poultry and other wildlife, pointing to the need for an effective remedy.

That remedy could come in the use of toxic chemicals, but use of such materials, particularly Compound 1080, is not yet sanctioned by the Environmental Protection Agency.

However, some inroads are being made toward legalizing the use of these chemicals, points out Dr. Dale Wade, a wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Information presented at recent informal hearings may warrant the EPA to open formal hearings before an administrative law judge.

"If such hearings do come about, they would include information on the use of the 1080 toxic collar to protect sheep and goats as well as possible use of 1080-treated baits," notes Wade.

While such hearings might finally lead to an effective predator control technique for ranchers, they likely would not be completed in time to allow use of

toxic chemicals during the coming winter season, adds the specialist.

"Coyotes continue to cause the heaviest losses to livestock and poultry, and their populations are increasing," says Wade. "They have been a problem to sheep and goat producers for many years, but now they also are causing increased losses in cattle. And the problem is no longer confined to western states; several eastern states now report increased coyote populations and significant livestock losses."

In addition to preying on livestock and poultry, coyotes also have inflicted heavy losses in pronghorn antelope, mule deer and other wild species in recent years, adds Wade. This has led some state wildlife agencies to support the use of toxic agents

against predators.

"With ranchers currently operating at low profit margins or even losses due to poor prices, livestock losses to predators are a major concern," points out Wade. "Furthermore, these losses will ultimately be reflected in reduced meat supplies at higher prices."

An added factor is the loss of agricultural land to other uses when small operators can no longer survive production and predator costs. When this happens, producers, consumers and the whole nation suffers, contends the specialist.

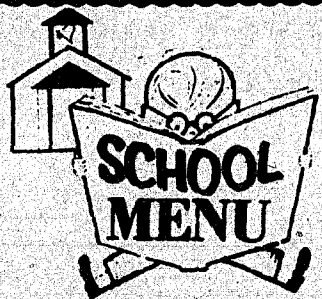

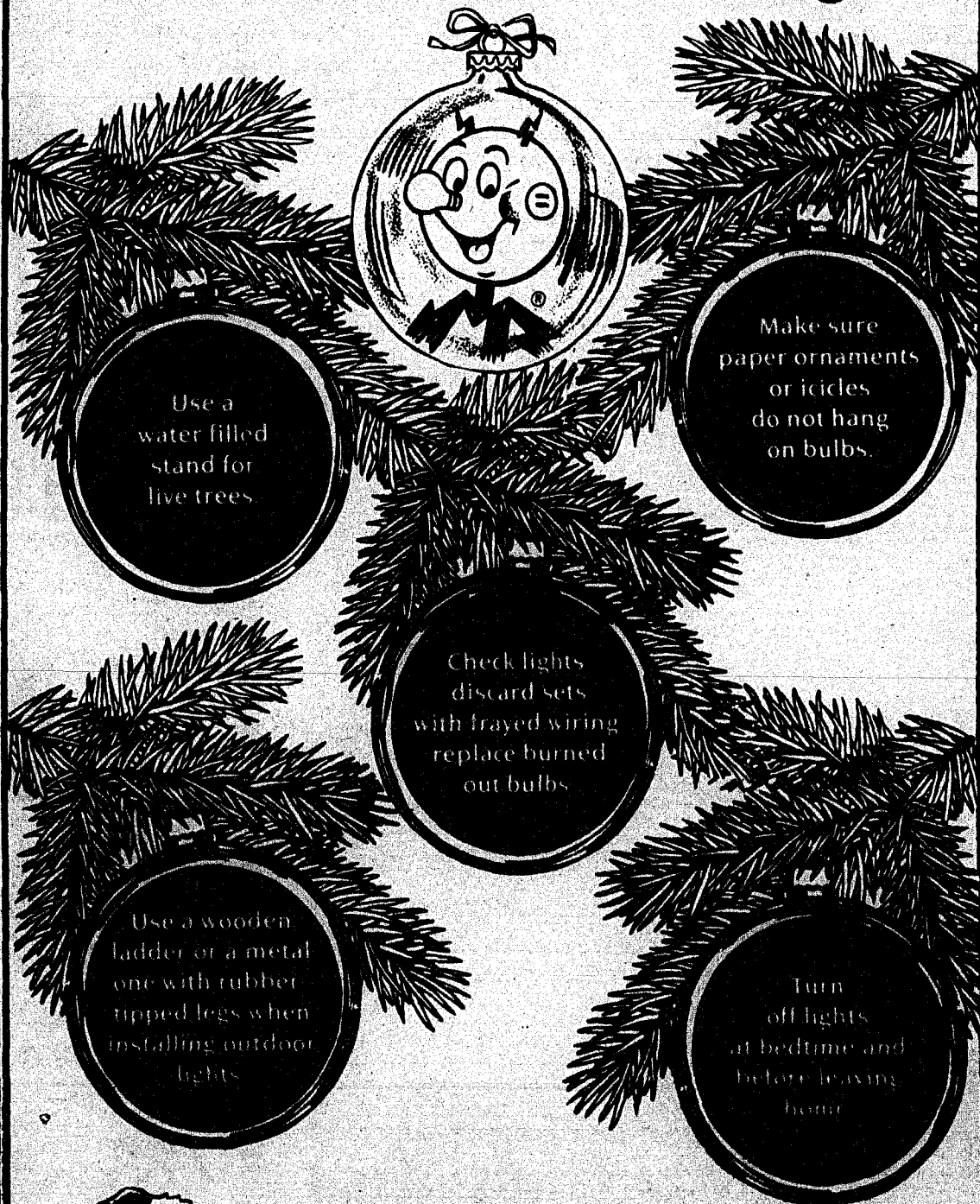

Rent one first, suggests Mary Lou Rowland, a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Rowland is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas & M University System.

Renting gives you an opportunity to try power tools--to learn by first-hand experience if you want such tools for you own, she says.

Even when you're just renting, it pays to keep these things in mind:

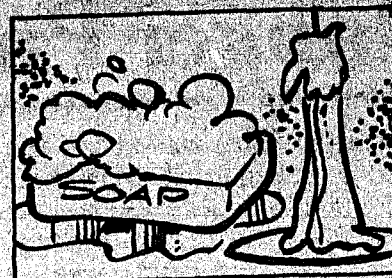
1) Rent a good tool, and see that it's in good condition when you take it. You may be responsible for any damage that shows up when you return it to the dealer. Read the terms of the agreement or contract before you sign to pick up rental equipment.

2) Have the materials you intend to use on hand before you start running up rental charges.

3) Be sure to read instruction manuals or books about the particular tool before you rent. You'll select it with more confidence, get the feel of the tool more quickly and avoid making many mistakes that spoil

material--an important point, since power tools work as fast in the wrong place as in the right. You're the "boss"--the tools only follow orders.

4) Don't get the rental habit. If you rent a tool again and again, you'll soon have "paid" for it--with money you could have put on your own power tool.

Helpful Information From The U.S. Metric Board

Q. Why haven't we converted to the metric system before?



A. Support has existed for using a decimal-based measuring system since Colonial times. However, Americans had no compelling reason to switch because of our geographical isolation and because our principal trade partners were also nonmetric. Times have changed. Virtually all other English-speaking countries now use the metric system extensively. Our growing participation in a competitive world marketplace in which metrics is the most accepted measurement system, makes conversion a commercial consideration for companies doing business abroad.

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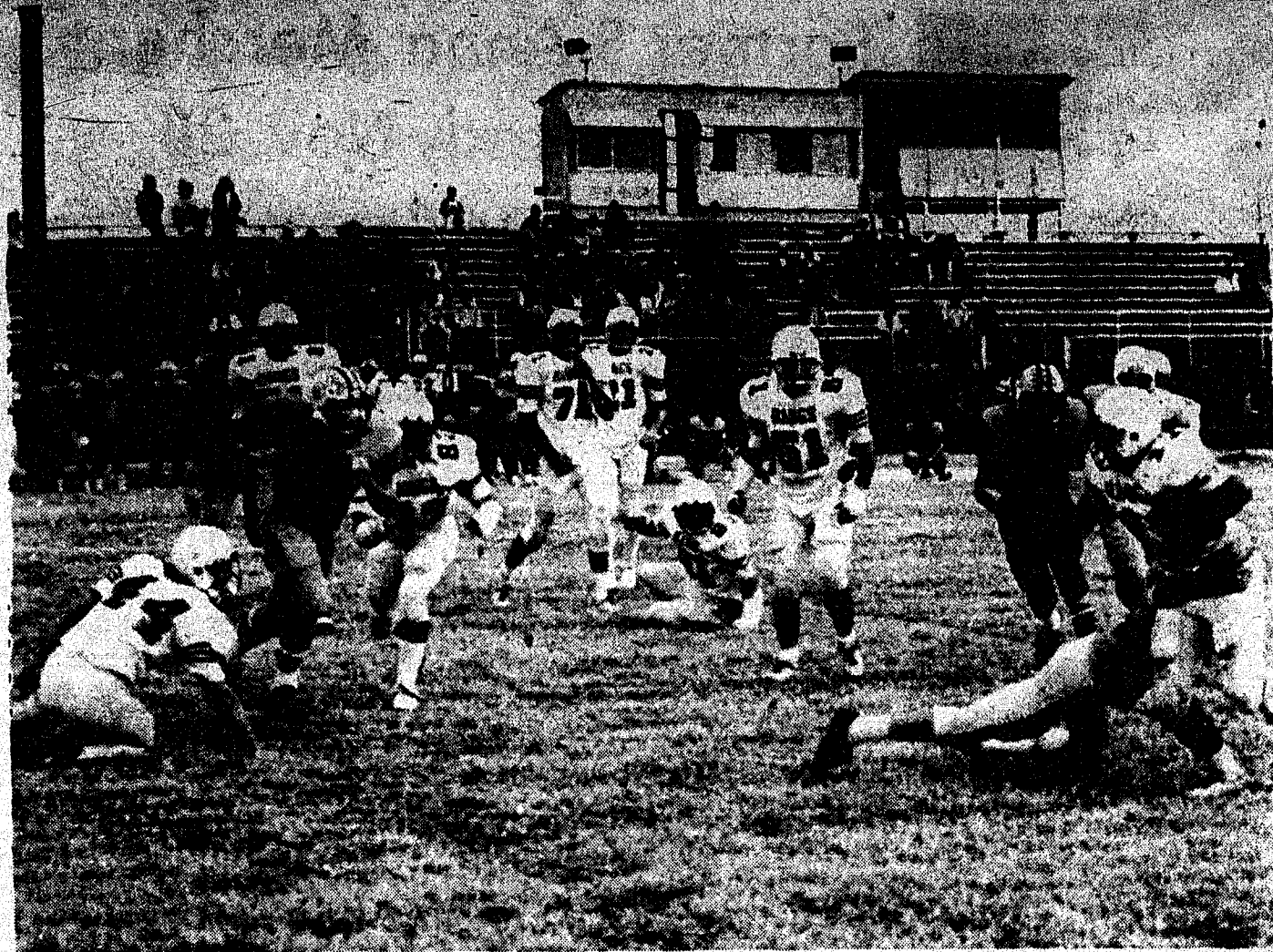

Hunting Safety Is Important

Hunter safety officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department urge the state's hunters to be aware of safety rules when they take to the field for the opening of major hunting seasons this weekend.

Officials recorded 13 fatalities among the 69 hunting accidents reported during 1980, and they believe the next few weeks of 1981 will be vital to improving that record this year. "Most accidents and fatalities occur from mid-November through December, since deer and turkey seasons bring the greatest number of hunters out," said J.D. Peer, assistant hunter safety coordinator.

Peer said several basic rules can go a long way toward making any hunting trip safer:

Always carry your firearm in a manner which allows control of the direction of its muzzle, whether the gun is loaded or not. Even guns in cases should receive this kind of respect.

Be careful when arriving at the hunting site. Many hunters subconsciously relax their regard for safety during the excitement of moving afield.

Be on guard around hunting dogs, as they can jump up and hit the trigger or safety of a gun, unbeknownst to the hunter.
