Gayla McIver Sellers of Cleburne, a 1961 graduate of Santa Anna High School, will be honored as 'Coming Home Queen' at the 1981 Ex-Student Homecoming. She will be presented at the halftime ceremonies of the Friday night football game, and introduced at the Saturday program.

Mrs. Sellers is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady McIver of Trickham.

In addition to her academic work attSanta Anna High School, Gayla was a four-year member of the girls basketball team that advanced to Regional play in 1961. She was to the All District team that year.

After graduation from SAHS, she enrolled at McMurry College in Abilene. After one year in college, she married the late Rev. Bruce Hornell, a student pastor serving the Rockwood, Cleveland and Trickham United Methodist Churches.

Gayla delayed her education and was supportive of her husband as he pastored various churches in the Central Texas Conference and earned his degree at TWC and worked on his Master of Divinity degree at TCU.

In an attempt to resuce a family from flood waters near Rio Vista, Hornell lost his life in service to others. Following his untimely and tragic death, Gayla and her two small children, Lori and Allen, moved back to Trickham where she enrolled in Howard Payne University and completed her degree in English and Speech. After graduation she accepted a teaching position with the Oglesby ISD. While teaching

there she married Rev. J. W. Sellers and moved to Waco.

In 1978 Gayla resumed teaching at Mexia as a reading teacher and later in English. While living in Mexia she earned her Masters Degree as a reading specialist from Sam Houston State University in Huntsville.

Gayla and her family now reside in Cleburne where she is a sixth grade reading teacher in the Joshua ISD, and her husband is pastor of St. Mark United Methodist Church. The family now includes Lori, a junior at Cleburne High School; Allen, an eighth grade student; Jorge-Wert Sellers, a second grade student and Ruby Sellers, a first grade student in Joshua Elementary School.

In addition, Gayla is a member of the St. Mark Church United Methodist Women, Association of Professional Teachers and International Reading Association.


At Santa Anna High School, Turner was captain of the Mountaineer football team his senior year.




Buried in Kerrville On Saturday
