According to most recent reports, Coleman County will remain in the legislative district of Lynn Nabers of Brownwood, and the senatorial district of Grant Jones.

What might have been a routine redistricting of the state has turned into quite a hassle -- with one plan vetoed by the Governor and the present plans by the Legislative Redistricting Board expected to be appealed.

In the new 65th District, Eastland and Erath counties have been added, and Callahan County has been moved to the district represented by Joe Hannah of Breckenridge.

The new 24th District of Grant Jones has added Bell County (Killeen-Temple) and lost McLennan County (Waco).

S-Anna in New District For '82 Football Season

The 1982 Santa Anna football schedule will have some new names as a result of the reassignment of the Class A districts in the area. The new assignment will be effective two years.

In the district with Santa Anna will be Rochelle, Lometa, Cross Plains, Blanket, Evant, Goldthwaite, Gorman and Rising Star. Several of these schools have

been in the East Zone of our present district. Rochelle will field an 11-man football team next year after having played six-man football.

Representatives of the nine schools were to meet Monday night to arrange the 1982 football schedule. Santa Anna will be in a different district for basketball, with that group of schools to be named next spring.

Santa Anna Native Purchases Weekly Newspaper at Columbus

Jerry Scarbrough, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Scarbrough of Santa Anna, has recently purchased the Colorado County Citizen, a weekly newspaper at Columbus. He and his wife, Nancy, assumed management of the publication last week.

Scarbrough, a native of Santa Anna and a 1956 graduate of Santa Anna High School, has been the chief political writer for the Associated Press in Oklahoma since 1966. He joined the Associated Press in 1963 and worked on sports and general assignments before becoming a political writer.

The Oklahoma Trial Lawyers

Association voted him the state's journalist of the year in 1981.

After completing his journalism education at the University of Texas in 1961, Scarbrough worked on daily newspapers in Galveston and Abilene. Mrs. Scarbrough, a Galveston native, also has worked in newspaper publication, but quit work after their marriage to stay home and raise their daughter, Sherrie, 19, a junior at Oklahoma State University.

The Scarbroughs have long wished to own a weekly Texas newspaper, and are beginning with the 4,000-circulation paper in Columbus, about 65 miles from Houston.

Blood Pressure Clinic Set This Morning

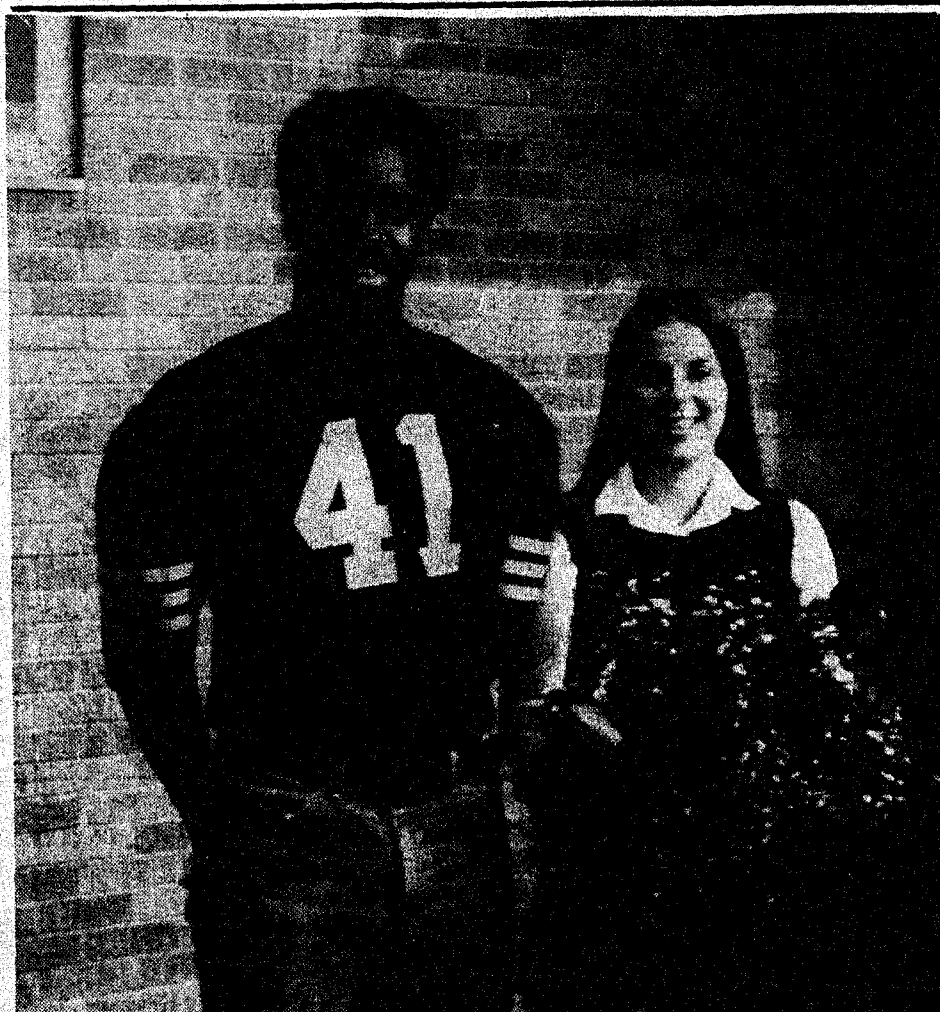
The twice-monthly blood pressure clinic will be held Thursday (today) at the Chamber of Commerce building from 9 - 11 a.m.

Mountaineers Win Game; Final Game This Week

The Santa Anna Mountaineers were led by senior Albert Collins to a 23 - 6 victory over Cross Plains Friday night in the final home game of the season. It was the second zone victory for the Santa Anna varsity team.

Halfback Tommy DeLeon was first to score for the Mountaineers on a two-yard run in the first period, but from that time it was Collins who scored the points.

Albert booted the PAT after DeLeon's touchdown, then ran eight yards for a touchdown in the second quarter, topping it off with the PAT. The scoring drive covered 68 yards in seven plays.

With only seven seconds left in the first half, Collins kicked a 23-yard field goal to give the Mountaineers a 17 - 0 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, Collins scored from the one-yard line, climaxing a 61-yard drive in 12 plays.

The Buffaloes lone score was in the last six seconds of the game when Quarterback Richard Clark went over from the one yard line. The PAT failed.

The Mountaineers will travel to Bronte Friday night for the last

game of the season starting at 7:30 p.m.

The West Zone championship is down to the line, with Miles and Eden playing Friday night for the crown. Both are undefeated in district play. The winner will meet the Gorman team that has already won the East Zone title.

The Mountaineers now stand 2-2 in district play and 3-6 for the season.

After three weeks our little minus can finally stand up by herself, and she's learned all about this plus business. She likes a bucket of ground maize, plus a bucket of oats, plus a bucket of cotton seed served up with a few kind words if you please.

Yes sir, now that we've got the experts working for us, things should begin to look up around here.

WTU, Others Form System For Transmission

West Texas Utilities Company and its three sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation have received approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to interconnect with each other across state lines and operate as an integrated system.

The FERC in Washington authorized a proposal which will result in construction of electric transmission lines connecting the Southwest Power Pool with the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, which historically has operated strictly as an intra-state electric grid.

The proposal filed with the FERC for decision had been agreed to by all utilities affected, including Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting & Power Co. and Texas Utilities Company.

Central and South West officials said the interconnection would be accomplished with construction of direct current facilities near Vernon in North Texas and near Victoria in Southeast Texas. Construction activities are to begin soon, with completion to be made in 1985.

The CSW companies have sought for several years to integrate the system, but were unable to do so because WTU and Central Power and Light Co. of Corpus Christi are not members of ERCOT and have not been allowed to operate in interstate commerce.

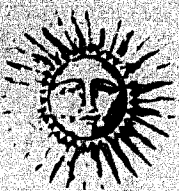

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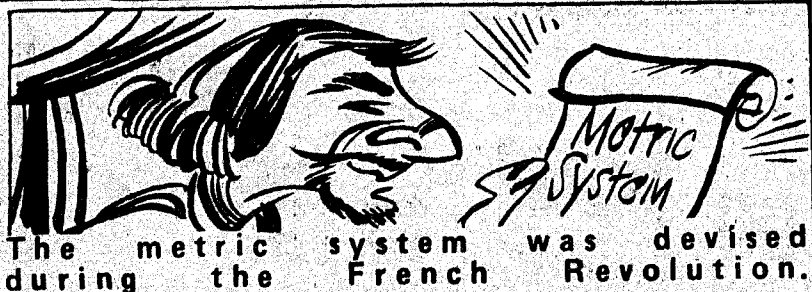
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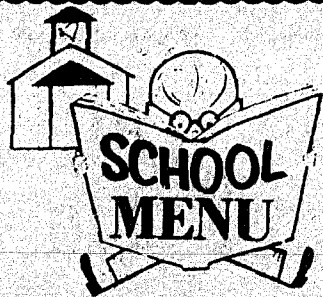
