West Texas Utilities Rate Request Referred to Public Utilities Commission

The Santa Anna City Council denied the West Texas Utilities Company rate increase request last week. The action came at the Thursday, December 10, meeting of City Council.

West Texas Utilities Co. had shrubbery. filed for a rate increase with a area. 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

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

am writing to you today asking for your help in building a National Memorial in Washington, D. C. in honor of the Veterans and the dead of the Vietnam War. This is a way to give every American the opportunity to pay grateful tribute to all Americans who served in the Vietnam War, especially those who gave their lives in service to their country. We need to show the Veterans of Vietnam that America cares.

The reception given the hostages from Iran shows that Americans still respect the values and dignity of service to their country overseas. It is up to all of us to see that the Veterans of Vietnam are recognized at long last. We must take the time now to remember our 57,692 boys who died in Vietnam, the 300,000 who were wounded and the 100,000 veterans who were left handicapped or seriously disabled.

# Don'f Spoil Holidays With Spoiled Food!

One of the more popular events during the Christmas festivities is usually the traditional meal. As enjoyable as it is, there are precautions that both the cook and the diners should take to make sure it is healthy

Foodborne illness is a common problem when large amounts of food are prepared in the home, says the Texas Medical Association. The most common, avoidable errors made in food preparation relate to time-temperature abuse. The amount of time foods are left at medium temperatures (between cooking and refrigeration) should be kept at a minimum to avoid multiplication of bacteria that may cause disease. Always keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold and return unused portions of food that have been refrigerated promptly so they will stay cold.

Many food infections are caused by salmonella germs. Almost all species of salmonella organisims grow rapidly in such foods as eggs, meat and milk from infected animals. The germs can survive for long periods outside the animal body but proper cooking renders most foods safe.

Frozen, prestuffed turkeys should not be defrosted before cooking. Read the label to find out the ingredients and the cooking instructions.

To prevent the growth of bacteria when preparing stuffing, stuff the bird loosely just before cooking and remove the stuffing as soon as the bird is done. Better yet, cook the stuffing separately so it cooks fast enough to keep bacteria from having a chance to

If you suspect food poisoning (rapidly apparent symptoms are fever, headaches, nausea, vomiting, cramps and diarrhea), seek medical attention immediately.

# Thousands In United States Suffer From Juvenile Arthritis

HOUSTON-At first glance, Jane is a vivacious young girl on the threshold of adolescence. But Jane gets out of physical education class--"by pretending to be sick," some of her classmates contend. "Anybody can see there's nothing wrong with her." What they don't see is the young girl's struggle to get dressed each morning...hands wracked with pain from juvenile rheumatoid arthritis as she tries to button her fashionable jeans.

Arthritis has long been considered the disease of old age, but it can also strike the young, often with devastating results.

Baylor College of Medicine, in affiliation with Texas Children's Hospital in Houston, has been asked to develop a pilot program for a regional center devoted to the treatment of children's rheumatic and muscular diseases. It is one of three such programs funded through the Office of Maternal and Child Health, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Other pilot centers are in Los Angeles and Philadelphia.

The Texas Department of Health's one-year grant of \$50,000 to the Rheumatology Department at Texas Children's and the rheumatology section of Baylor's Department of Pediatrics will be used to expand services to patients in the south Texas area. Between 50 and 100 patients are now seen in the Houston center alone each week.

There are no hard statistics that identify the extent of rheumatic disease in children, but many thousands of youngsters in the United States may suffer from juvenile rheumatoid arthritis (JRA), the most common of about 50 crippling diseases of joints, bones and connective tissue. Rheumatic disease in the young generally occurs after injury or an infection, but symptoms are so common that a physician can easily overlook the cause.

A nurse corrdinator has been

added to the staff to help parents and children better understand and cope with the problems of chronic illness. The project team includes rheumatologist, physical thereapists, and patient educators who will hold clinic sessions with the physicians and parents of patients in outlying communities.

"We'll be going through a planned program oriented towards the care of the child, but also toward the education of health professionals in that area," said Earl J. Brewer, JR., M.D., chief of the pediatric rheumatology section.

"We try to protect the joint, increase motion, and relieve pain. We also try to have the child raised as normally as possible. If we are unable to persuade a parent that this is the thing to do, the whole system fails."

Brewer said it is important for both parents and children to understand that a diagnosis of rheumatic disease need not doom a child to a lifetime in a wheelchair. He said the school

situation is especially important.

Alert teachers can divert these students into physical activities like swimming where they can still compete and develop self-esteem.

Three-fourths of the children with JRA will recover by the time they are adults, but in the interim, they must learn to live with their disease physically and emotionally.

"Often the children who have the worst times are those who show little visible signs of their disease," Brewer said. "They have lots of pain, but little swelling of joints. The tendency is to see that child as using disease to get out of activities. The potential damage to the self-estem of those youngsters is greater than for the child with obvious

Brewer said this is where patient education becomes an essential part of treatment.


"You's be surprised how frequently we overlook something as simple as advising a parent about velcro fasheners to aid the child in dressing himself."

# Public employees forfeit vacation time

COLLEGE STATION —
The director of a state agency says he has heard enough complaints about lazy public employees — more than half his professional staff lost a total of 16 weeks of annual leave because they were too busy to take it.

Dr. Konrad Eugster, executive director of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University, said 17 of his workers lost a total of 650 hours of paid leave because they were unable to take off from their jobs before Aug. 31.

Under state policy, employees are allowed to carry only a limited number of accrued vacation hours over from one fiscal year to the next. Any amount over that limit is simply lost, or as Eugster prefers to put it, "donated" to the people of Texas.

These staff members were advised by written memoranda and numerous oral communications that they would lose some of their leave time if they did not take it before Aug. 31," said Eugster. "They decided instead to place the state's interest ahead of their personal convenience."

# RRC Closes Buildings After Gas Leaks

AUSTIN- Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent said today that RRC safety inspectors have recommended the immediate evacuation of public buildings in the cities of Junction and Eldorado because of natural gas leaks throught to pose imminent danger to the public.

In making the announcement, Nugent said, "This is in line with what we feared, but expected, when we asked the Legislature to give us the ability to seek out these danger points."

The public school in Eldorado was evacuated December 10 after inspectors found gas concentrations of 25 to 60 percent under the slab foundation of the building. Natural gas was also detected in the school building. Earlier last week, high gas concentrations were found under and around two public buildings in the town of Junction. One building housed

Farm Bureau and the other was a commercial laundry and dry cleaners.

The inspections were part of the Railroad Commission's expanded safety investigation program authorized by the last session of the state legislature. According to program director Milton Fegenbush, a system has been set up to get inspectors to suspected trouble spots on a priority basis. Eldorado and

Junction were both on the priority

In 1980, Eldorado reported 46 percent of its gas as lost and unaccounted for. The Junction figure was 38 percent. Lost and unaccounted-for gas is one of the factors considered in establishing the priority investigation list.

The Commission's Gas Utilities Division is continuing its investigation of the Junction and Eldorado systems to determine the sources of the leaks and the appropriate remedies.


# City Sales Tax Increases Again For Santa Anna

The City of Santa Anna received their check for the City Sales Tax for the month of November, with the amount being \$1,327.17. The local tax is collected along with the state sales tax, then returned by the State Comptroller's office.

Santa Anna merchants have collected a total of \$21,322.37 during 1981, a 38 percent increase the same period last year when only \$15,431 had been collected.

The large amount received this month is actually a two-month total, as the October sales tax was less than \$500 and held over until the following month.

The state's total sales tax showed a 17 percent increase over the previous year as checks for \$41.4 million was distributed to 802 cities in December.

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



### Inexpensive test can prevent equine "blue baby" deaths

COLLEGE STATION — A \$10 blood serum test that could prevent the death of a potential Secretariat or Man o' War due to a "blue baby" syndrome in horses is now available through the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University.

Scientists hope the beginning of the 1981-82 foaling season which begins in December will bring more requests for the test, which has only been available since early this year and is still widely unknown, said Dr. Bruce Abbitt of the TVMDL, a branch of the Texas A&M University System.

Blue babies in horses, referred to by researchers as NI (neonatal isoerythrolysis), occurs in only 1 percent of all foals.

But NI syndrome — triggered in the first few days of the foal's life by antibodies produced by the pregnant mare in her colostrum (the

nutrient-rich fluid that begins to flow just prior to the milk in nursing mothers) — is often fatal, explained Abbitt.

The test is designed to detect the presence of the antibodies in the mare before the foal is born, said Abbitt, who developed the procedure with technician Leigh Ann Smith.

The foal can then be placed on a substitute source of nutrition, avoiding those mother's antibodies that cause red blood cells in the colt to burst apart.



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## If You Itemize 1981 Is 'Good Year'

If you "itemize" (use the "long form") on your tax return, 1981 is a "good" year for deductions, recommends Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist.

The Economic Recovery Act of

1981 will lower tax rates for 1982, so it behooves taxpayers to take deductions before January 1, 1982, she advises.

Granovsky is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agriccultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

For example, if you had planned to contribute money to a favorite charity, church or educational institution anyway, do it now during 1981 --IF YOU ITIMIZE, she says.

If you wait until 1982, your tax benefit on the itemized "long form" will be lower than it is this year.

That's because tax rates will drop 10 percent from 1980 rates -- starting Jan. 1, 1982.

On the other hand, if you file the "short form," there is reason to wait until 1982.

That's when you will be able to add TO YOUR STANDARD DEDUCTION 25 percent of the

first \$100 you donate.

The percentage allowed will keep climbing until 1986 when the allowable deduction will be the same as for people who file the "long form."

1982 marks the first time people who file the "short form" will have a chance to deduct any of their charitable contributions even though the allowable decuction is only 25 percent of the first \$100 donated.

Of course, not all donations are tax deductible, Granovsky reminds taxpayers. Some groups, such as lobby ing groups, do not fit the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) definition of "charities" even though the groups themselves may have "tax-exempt" status.

When you donate money to these groups, the donations are not tax deductions for you.

If in doubt about the tax status of any group--or a donation's "tax deductibility" check with the IRS, the specialist says.

Because the IRS will expect proof of your contributions, you should pay by check or get a receipt whenever possible, she adds.
